

'Whiskey' Coming Over Canadian Line Proven Shine And Cut Stuff Bottled

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—The flood of Canadian whiskey which spilled over the border during the first years of prohibition, has largely been dammed up and the thirsty get only "moonshine" and "cut" whiskey with Canadian labels, reports from St. Paul, Detroit, Cleveland and Chicago indicate.

Prohibition authorities in the St. Paul area say that 55 per cent of the liquor sold there is red-tailed alcohol. Rum running over the Minnesota line, they say, has been "well in hand for two and a half years."

Even the anti-prohibitionists admit little Canadian liquor is available. What there is comes in by automobile, generally run at night on non-stop trips from the border to the Twin-Cities. The alcohol used in connecting fake liquor comes in from the east under false consignments and many large seizures have been made.

There are 16,000 "blind pigs" in Detroit, estimates Frank H. Croul, commissioner of police, which would indicate a large and steadily flowing supply of alcoholic drinks. Before prohibition there were 1,200 licensed saloons. Some genuine liquor escapes the blockade on the Detroit river and on Lakes St. Clair, Huron and Erie, but federal agents assert that most of the Canadian labeled whiskey is spurious, some of it poisonous and most of it green and unfit for consumption.

Rum runners in the Detroit area get a comparatively small return for the chance they take, the rate of pay being 50 cents a case for beer and \$1 a case for whiskey. Most wholesalers, however, pay the runners a flat salary, generally \$50 a week.

"Cutting" has become more and more profitable. It is a process of making green moonshine or water and alcohol taste like genuine whiskey by the addition of a small amount of a recognized brand. So great has become the demand for good whiskey for "cutting" purposes that this liquor itself is watered and is often merely a skillfully blended "cut" whiskey.

An effort to stifle river running at Detroit is now being made by Carey D. Ferguson, collector of

customs, who has become "admiral" of a fleet of nine fast boats, with 200 agents concentrating on the liquor traffic.

The liquor business in and around Cleveland consists almost entirely in the manufacture and sale of corn whiskey with a sideline on the importation of Canadian beer, declared Thomas Stone, former prohibition chief. Much home made wine, from alcohol, is sold, as is synthetic gin made from alcohol.

Whiskey running and importation of bonded liquor into Cleveland is a rarity. Beer is brought in carload lots from Canada, billed as cost iron, concentrated lye and other merchandise. Beer formerly was brought across Lake Erie in small boats but since the government rum chasers became active, this mode of transportation has decreased.

Official confirmation is lacking of reported aerial bootlegging in the Chicago district, but it is agreed that automobile, rail and water transportation are almost equally popular among rum runners in this territory.

New processes have been developed in the manufacture of intoxicants in this area which are known as "cleaning" denatured alcohol. Just what processes are used, besides redistillation, is a mystery which federal agents and chemists are trying to solve. They suspect the moonshine magicians have in their pay chemists as clever as any in government employ.

In striking this particular source prohibition field agents raided a Chicago drug store where the principal stock was body-rub alcohol. Much of it still was in cartons but some had been poured into two-gallon jugs. In these floated a liver-like substance which resembled the "mother" of vinegar, substance was Russian mineral oil. The druggist explained that this which had been put into the alcohol to consume its "denatures." As to whether he disclosed his real secret, prohibition agents are uncertain.

Thus far the department has unearthed fewer "cleaning plants" handling industrial alcohol in Chicago than on farms; in out-of-the-way rural places, and in small towns.

Greyhound Races To Be Held at DeLand

DELAND, Fla., Nov. 5.—(A)—Greyhound races will be inaugurated here this winter on a tract now being constructed. The track with grand stands, club house and kennels will be known as the DeLand Kennel Club. H. C. McGowan of Hagerstown, Md., is promoting the project. One hundred dogs of racing stock will be brought here, McGowan said.

LIQUOR IMPORTS DROP

GLASGOW, Nov. 5.—(A)—British spirits for medicinal purposes entering the United States legally announced to only 1,361 gallons between January and May. At this rate not more than 3,000 gallons will be sent from England for the entire year. Before prohibition was effective in the United States, Britain sent more than 1,250,000 gallons annually.

Synthetic Board From Sawdust Is Dream Of Tacoma Lumbermen

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 5.—(A)—A synthetic board, non-inflammable and resisting heat and cold, may soon be manufactured from sawdust.

A group of lumber men here became interested in the possibilities of the product, after a demonstration proved that the synthetic board would withstand a flame that would cut through steel. Sawdust and other mill waste are treated with chemicals and made into a pulp. The pulp then is pressed into boards of any size.

Lumber men behind the project believe that it will make possible fire-proof houses of wood. The cost of synthetic boards was estimated at \$15 per thousand square feet for boards one-quarter of an inch thick.

Baggage Case Said Most Interesting In Annals Of The State

Tallahassee, Nov. 5.—(A)—The case of the Jacksonville Baggage company versus the Florida Railroad Commission, described by legal authorities as possibly one of the most interesting cases in the jurisprudence of the state, and perhaps the nation, was argued in the Supreme Court here.

The Railroad Commission's side was presented by Fred H. Davis, the commission's attorney while John E. Eartridge, of Jacksonville, argued for the baggage company.

The case grew out of the commission's charge against the baggage company and the Jacksonville Terminal company of unfairness in the handling of baggage for railroad patrons. The terminal company, the commission alleged would facilitate the movement of baggage only when the baggage company had been employed to handle the patrons' possessions. The baggage company, in turn, claimed that such a method had been pursued to protect its own interests; that by handling belongings or patrons, it was protected by an indemnity, which otherwise would not be enjoyed were just anyone employed to handle the baggage, and some of the possessions be lost en route.

ARTISTS' COLONY FIND TAOS TRIBE BEST RED MODEL

Statuesque Physique, With Perfect Aboriginal Background Choice of Type By Eleven Artists In Camp

TAOS, New Mexico, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Of all the aborigines, the Taos Indian appeals to members of the famous Taos artists' colony as having the background best suited to the brush.

The picturesque setting in which the Indian is found and the Indian himself with his statuesque physique are the reasons why the eleven persons—ten men and one woman—who form the colony are here.

"The Indians of Old Taos hold to their customs and costumes more tenaciously and remarkably than any others," says Burt Phillips, dean and founder of the colony. "They live in a picturesque environment, which they fit to summer and winter. The lure of the native Spanish life around the plaza of Taos pueblo and adjoining villages is strong. An endless variety of subjects are here available—the mountains, canyons and mesas and, above all, the marvelous coloring, which seems to find its equal nowhere else in the country."

The Taos group is said among the first band of artists to receive a large order for pictures from an organization. Each member was commissioned to paint three murals for the Missouri state capital building. As a result of the commission, the panels of the new Missouri capital may be expected to reflect accurately the spirit and methods of the Taos Society of Artists.

One member of the society, John Sharp, now is confining himself entirely to the painting of Taos Indian subjects. The Taosians are a stalwart race, everyone a striking figure, given to standing on housetops in white robes at sunrise. They have furnished Sharp with an inspiration which now is occupying his entire attention.

The colony is the outgrowth of a friendship struck up between Phillips and E. L. Blumenschein in the Latin Quarter of Paris during the late nineties.

The pair pioneered into the Taos country shortly before 1900 after an arduous trek overland from Denver. Blumenschein later went to Arizona to paint Pima Indian subjects, but Phillips stayed on and it was his persevering efforts that finally led to the coming of the other ten artists.

Champaigne Corks Cause Flurries In Cafe Waiters Circle

LONDON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Used champagne bottle corks are collected by waiters in large restaurants here as eagerly as are tips. The corks are worth money and figure strongly in the quotations on the champagne market.

Wine merchants established a cork clearing house that is known to all city cafe waiters. It is designed to boom the particular brands of champagne which the wholesalers or retailers want to "unload."

Waiters in all the large restaurants where champagne is served receive daily quotations on the clearing house rates, the cork prices varying from two pence to six pence each. The price of corks fluctuate weekly according to the brand of the wine and its popularity.

At times when sales of any brand shows signs of falling off the price of its corks rises, as an incentive to waiters to aid in stimulating the sale of this particular kind. Waiters everywhere here now collect champagne bottle corks as greatly as they do tips.

Rail Board Chairman Returns From Cement Tariff Case Hearing

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 6.—(AP)—R. Hudson Burr, chairman of the Florida Railroad Commission, returned recently from the cement hearing at New Orleans. The investigation, conducted by Examiner John T. Money, was into alleged discrimination in freight tariffs on cement in the Southeast and to the Southeast, and to more nearly place rates on a mileage basis, bearing proper relationship to and from different producing territories.

Mr. Burr sat on the bench with the examining commissioner. Commission Money gave until Feb. 1, for the filing of briefs, after which oral argument will be set for a future date. The New Orleans hearing was the third on the cement controversy.

DUBLIN, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The festival of the Tailteann Games, which proved successful in Dublin last year, is to be repeated in 1928, and preparations are well under way.

Lieutenant Bell of the United States Army, who last year had charge of the American team, recently visited Dublin and conferred with Postmaster General Walsh, who is the Chairman of the Tailteann Council. Lieutenant Bell reported much American interest in the festival and said American teams will be organized for the 1928 festival.

Girls' Clubs Stage Impromptu Exhibit In Holmes County

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Three hundred members of girls' clubs of Holmes county will stage a fair all their own on Nov. 14.

C. J. King, publicity director of the Department of Immigration, learned during a recent trip through that section of the state. The young women, affiliated with clubs claiming a membership of 301, have adopted a canning program which will set forth in the minutest, as well as the most

appetizing, detail the table resources of Holmes county. Each girl will place on exhibit at the fair 12 cans of preserves and vegetables of 10 different varieties, in addition to can of meats put up themselves and ready to serve. There will be 3,600 cans in all.
