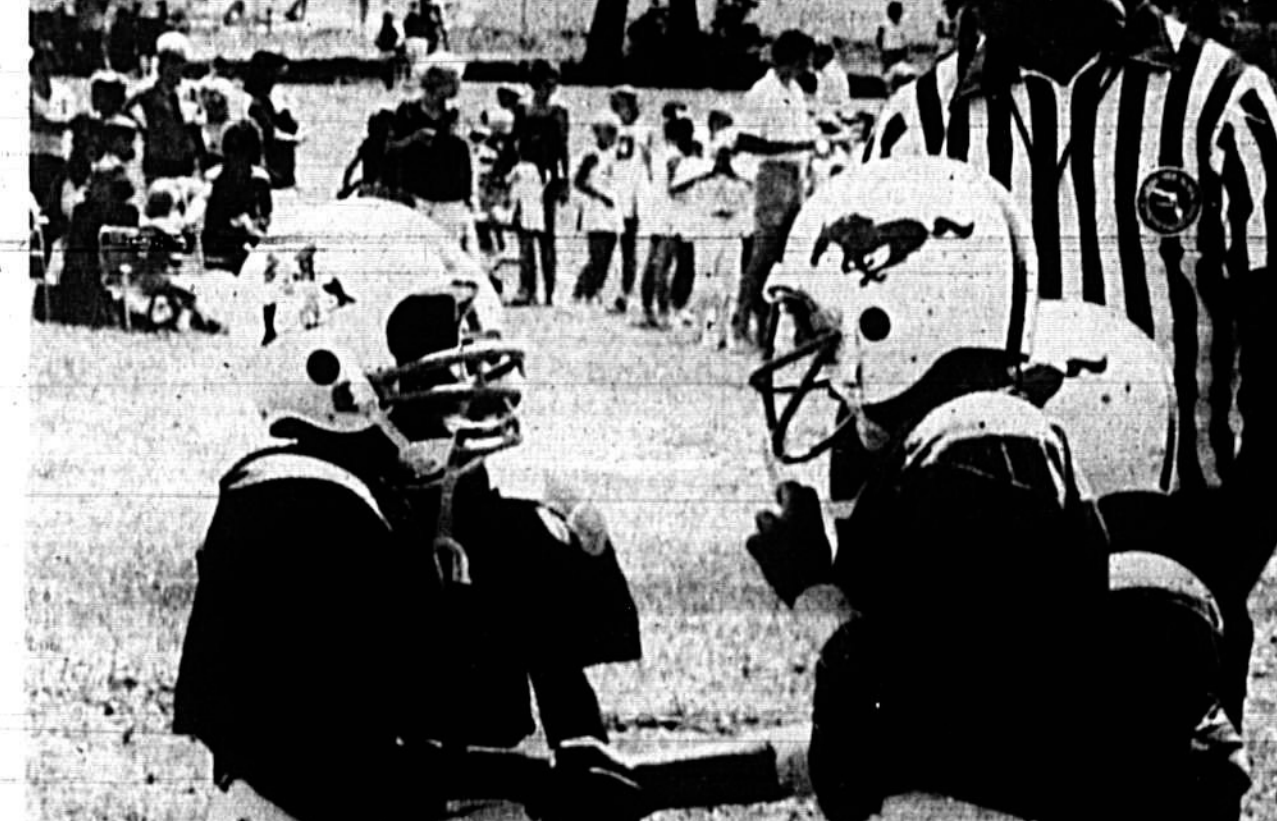
Bengals Nip Steelers, Dallas Drops Bucs

Cincinnati quarterback Jack Thompson, who played the entire second half after Ken Anderson re-injured his left knee, fired two fourth-quarter TD passes to bring the Bengals back.

The Steelers' problems began midway through the first quarter when Ray Griffin picked off a Terry Bradshaw pass and returned it 28 yards for a TD. On the next play from scrimmage, Franco Harris fumbled the ball away and Sunter kicked a 27-yard field goal that gave the Bengals a 10-0 lead.

On a 4-yard run with 9:13 left, but Thompson tossed a 22-yarder to Dan Bass, bringing the Bengals within 28-27. Elsewhere, San Francisco beat the New York Jets 37-27, Dallas defeated Tampa Bay 28-17, San Diego trounced Denver 30-13, Buffalo defeated New Orleans 35-28, Minnesota upset Chicago 34-14, Miami allied past Atlanta 20-17, Houston topped Baltimore 21-16, Los Angeles routed Green Bay 51-21, Oakland edged Washington 24-21, New England downed Seattle 37-31, Cleveland defeated Kansas City 20-13 and Detroit beat St. Louis 20-7. The New York Giants are in Philadelphia tonight.

Cincinnati raced to a 10-0 lead in the opening quarter and Pittsburgh's four punt returns and two pass interceptions kept the Bengals close even after the Steelers took the lead. With Pittsburgh—shooting for a fifth Super Bowl ring in the 1981 NFL title game—clinging to a 28-27 lead in the closing minutes, Frank Pollard fumbled away a kickoff return, setting up Sunter's game-winning kick.

Maravich 'Tired' Of Game, Quits Celtic Training Camp

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Pete Maravich, who once led the National Basketball Association in scoring but now has "simply tired of the game," has quit.

"I've shot too many baskets," Maravich told Celtic Coach Bill Fitch. Maravich, 32, played a key role in the Celtics' stretch drive last year after joining them as a free agent. He entered the NBA in 1970—signing with the Atlanta Hawks for a reported \$1.8 million during a bidding war with the American Basketball Association—and joined the New Orleans Jazz for five frequently bitter years after four with the Hawks.

Ruhle Ropes Giants On 3 Hits

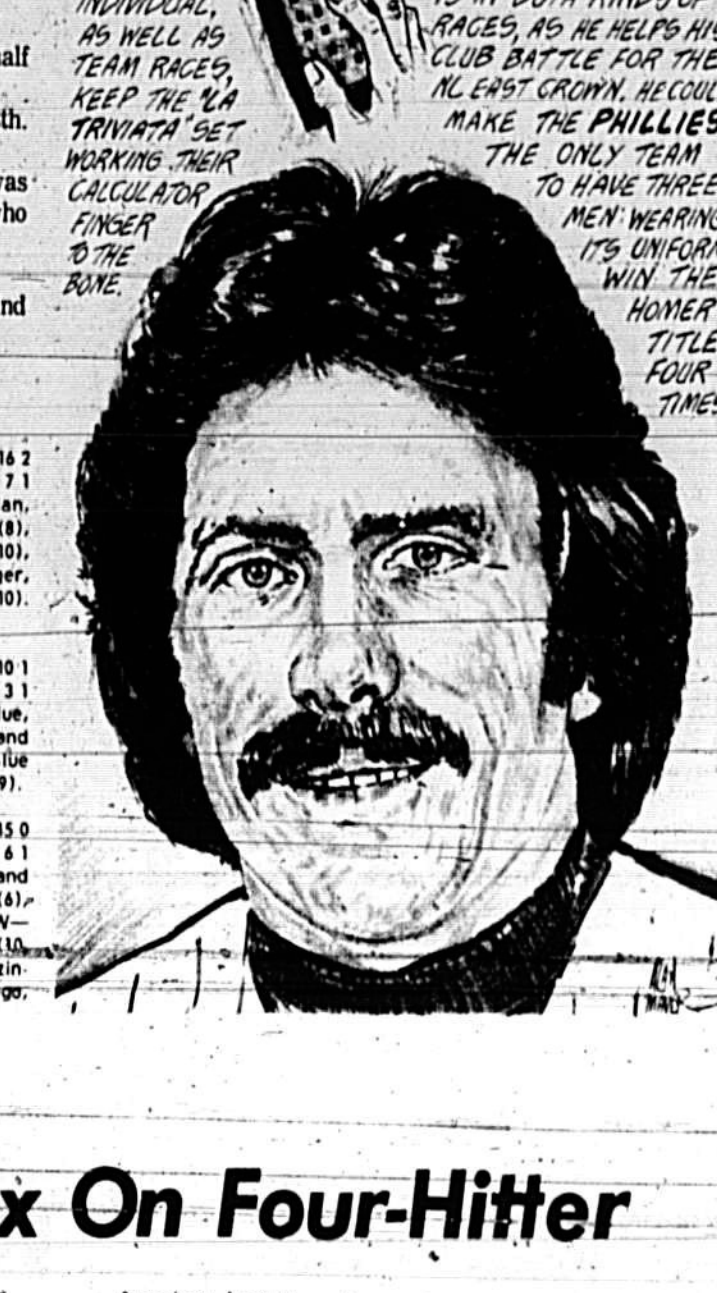
By United Press International Vern Ruhle went out in search of first place and nearly returned with a bit of history as well.

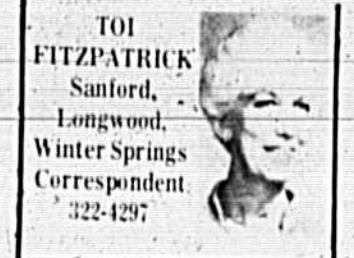
# Yacht Clubbers Sail Waterways On Monthly Cruises

# Tips For September

Hose Circle of the Garden Club of Sanford suggests the following garden tips this month: September is one of the worst months for lawn diseases in Florida. At the first sign of disease, spray with a good fungicide. There is time also to spray, seed or sod the bare areas of the lawn if it was not done in August. Prepare vegetable gardens and flower beds but do not plant until about the first of October. Remove all debris and weeds. Spade the soil and work in peat, compost, and/or cow manure. This is a good time to plant woody trees and shrubs. They will grow roots this winter and have a head start over those planted next spring. Make sure plants and lawn are not suffering from lack of water. Water late in the evening. There will be less water lost to evapotranspiration. Nighttime irrigation will not increase lawn disease or insect problems as many gardeners have been led to believe. Watch out for caterpillars on azaleas. Fertilize mums now. Do not wait until the buds form. Prune wisteria and bougainvillea that failed to bloom this season. Feed ponsettias. It is now too late for pruning them since they may not show color this year. Check the water table under citrus trees. Feed the young trees.
