Viet Premier Sets Program To 'Win War'

SAIGON (UPI) — Saigon's military government imposed a drastic series of new measures that included a diplomatic break with France, an official declaration of a state of war, and closing of all newspapers.

French Premier Charles de Gaulle said he would permit no opposition to his program that also provided a curfew for Saigon, outlined “very strict control” of economic, and threatened more “drastic but temporary measures.”

Casselberry Votes July 26 On Charter

Referendum election on adoption of a charter for the city of Casselberry has been set for July 26, in a proclamation issued this week by Mayor Owen Arntley following a special act of the 1965 legislature providing the charter subject to adoption by a “majority of voters.”

The charter bill abolishes the present “town” and creates the “city” of Casselberry. It provides for and defines its government, jurisdiction, powers, duties, franchises, immunities and privileges; authorizes impositions and improves taxation methods; sets penalties for violation of city ordinances; sets powers to be exercised by the municipality, and provides for transition of officials to the city created under the act.

In conjunction with Arntley's proclamation, Mayor Harry Hawthorne, town clerk, announced that registration books are open from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. daily in the municipal annex.

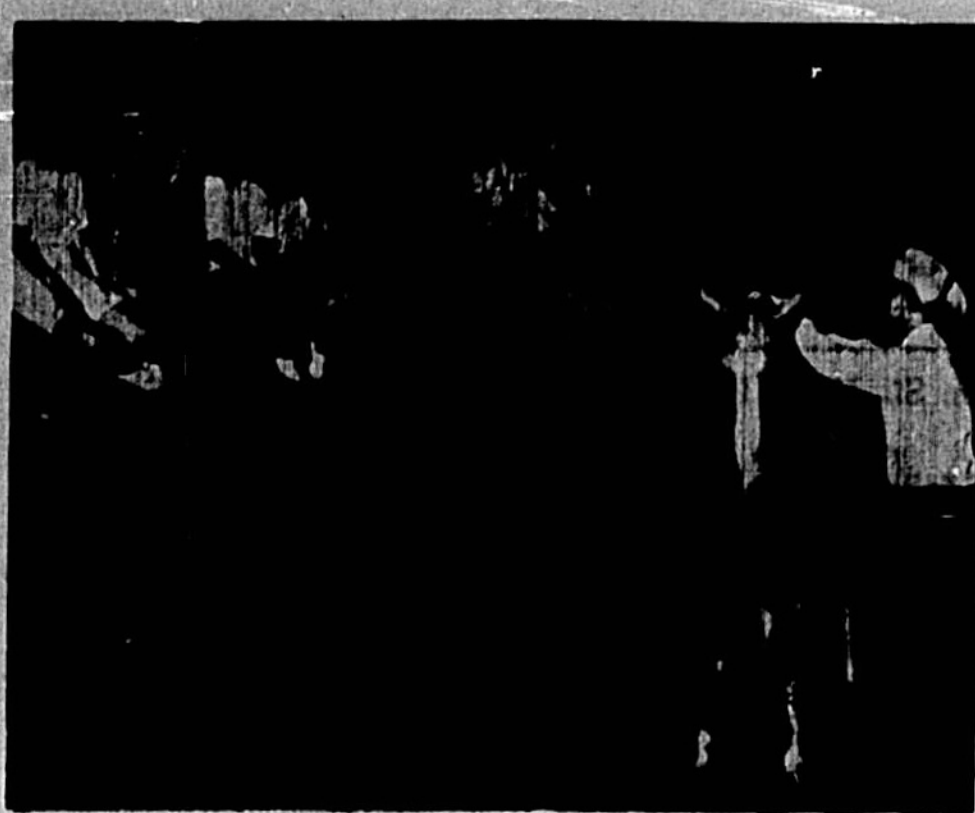

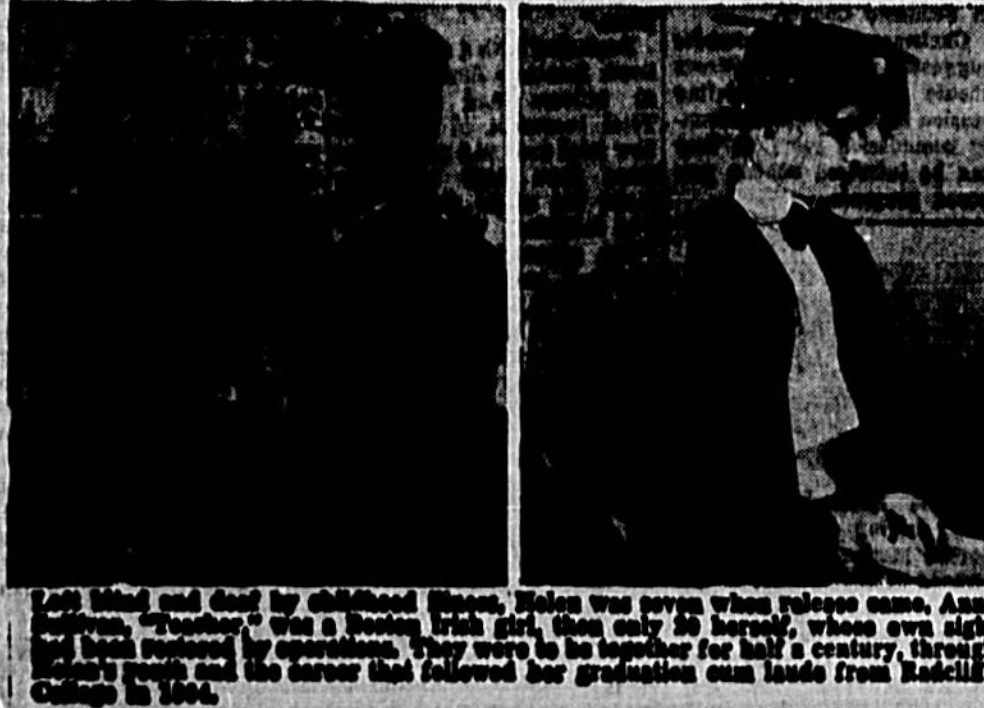

The halfway point of the major league baseball season is approaching and this far it's been one of the toughest.

The defending champions in both leagues are mixed way down in the second division and even without the St. Louis Cardinals and the New York Yankees in contention, there's still two red-hot pennant races heating up.

Will we see that oft-repeated phrase that this looks like "the year the Yankees didn't win the pennant"? If the Yanks only had to pass up one or two teams to make up the 11 games they're now off the pace, you could safely say without much reproach that when September comes the Yankees will be on top.

But, just like the year when the New York club led to put their whammy on either the Chicago or the Baltimore, this time around there's still ball clubs that seem to have it.

Not only are the White Sox and Orioles going after that World Series payroll, but Minnesota, Cleveland and Detroit can smell the green stuff too.

Presently the Yankees are 7 1/2 games behind the fifth place Tigers and 10 1/2 back of the frustrating Twins. With not a reliable pitcher on the staff, and Mickey Vernon's waddled by more injuries, that's too much ground to make up.

I'm dreadfully sorry (huckle), you proved and rich Yankee backers, but this is the year New York does without the World Series.

Cuban Exiles Indicted

TAMPA (UPI) — Four Cuban exiles, including the leader of an anti-Castro organization, remained free on \$1,000 recognizance bonds today following their indictment by a Federal Grand Jury on charges of conspiracy to illegally export war munitions.

The indictments were returned Wednesday against Dr. Orlando Bosch, head of the Revolutionary Insurrectionary Recovery Movement, and Jose Dias Murojen, Gerardo Gutierrez and Marcos Rodriguez Ramon.

The four Cubans then signed the recognizance bonds and left the courtroom. Moments later Bosch collapsed and was treated and released at a hospital for "simple malnutrition."

The grand jury here did not consider the case against the two Americans.

Customs agents confiscated a number of aerial bombs at the time of the arrests. Cuban exile sources said at that time that the group had planned to load the bombs onto a B24 bomber for an attack on Cuban targets.

A scheduled arraignment was started June 16 but was continued until June 20 when their attorney said they were weak to comprehend what was going on.

The four Cubans then signed the recognizance bonds and left the courtroom. Moments later Bosch collapsed and was treated and released at a hospital for "simple malnutrition."

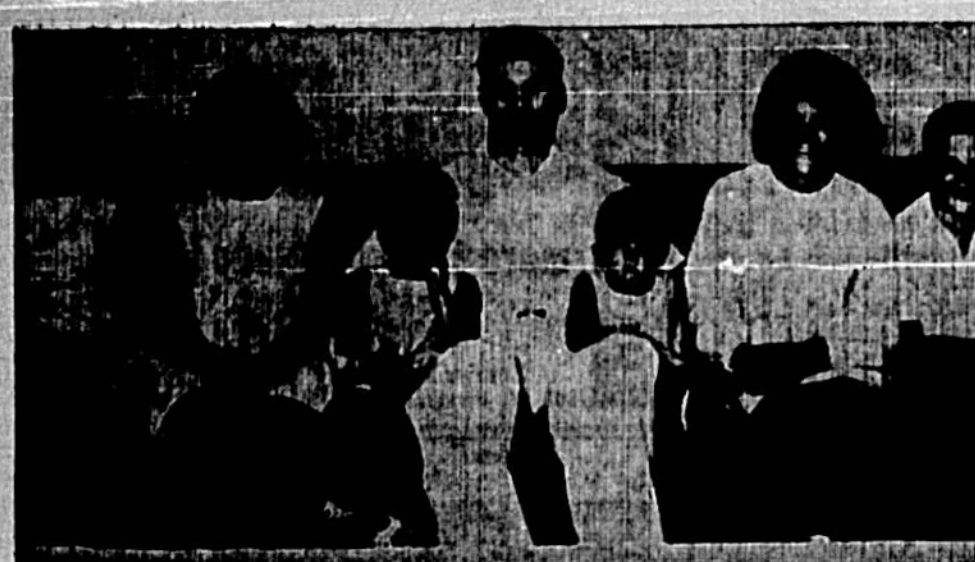

Floridians Sink Money Into Market

NEW YORK (UPI) — More Floridians than ever are sinking their money into the stock market.

The New York Stock Exchange said in a census report Wednesday that since last

in 1962, Florida has climbed to 10th state in the nation in corporate stock ownership, an increase of 35 per cent.

In all, the report said, 700,000 Floridians own stock, or one out of every eight citizens in the state. This compares to one of 10 in 1962, and the 25 per cent gain in shareholding compares with a national growth rate of 18 per cent, according to Exchange President Keith Funston.

Floridians represent 3.3 per cent of the nation's shareholding companies with a net worth of \$1.5 billion.

in relation to income would continue to go down.

He said the average American family would spend only about 18.3 per cent of its disposable income for food in 1968. This compares with 18.5 per cent last year and about 20 per cent in 1960.

Freeman said weather conditions had caused some vegetable prices to temporarily

rise above last year's levels.

AMA Plans No Action On Medicare Plan

NEW YORK (UPI) — The 200,000-doctor American Medical Association (AMA) appeared headed today toward an official no-action policy on Medicare until that controversial measure becomes law.

Impassioned debates on the part of AMA members who advocate boycott of Medicare after it is passed by Congress was expected in today's final session of the AMA's 114th annual convention.

But the 28-member House of Delegates, which governs policy for the AMA, was expected to follow the recommendation of its reference committee on legislation and public relations. After considering resolutions advocating non-participation by doctors in Medicare, it rejected that boycott action.

It offered a substitute resolution saying American physicians pledge themselves to continue actively to secure or restore the freedom, high quality, and availability of medical care that has been an American tradition and responsibility.

"That when the fate of the pending Medicare legislation is determined by the House (of Delegates) will review, in special session if necessary, the wisdom of a boycott of Medicare in whatever action is deemed necessary."

The new president of AMA, Dr. James S. Appel, has urged the medical profession to participate actively in developing Medicare and in implementing the measure if it becomes law — but to work with reason and logic through legal procedures to amend it into what the AMA conceives to be the highest quality of medical care.

ELLENWOOD, Kan. (UPI) — Struck by the full brunt of the raging Arkansas River, this small west central Kansas community today faced a bitter struggle to save washed-out dikes and levees.

A small but gallant band of 50 workers fought through the morning hours to restrain the flood's destructive path, but one commented: "We're taking more water than we can handle."

Flood waters seeped into the west and south ends of the town, and threatened to burst through the levee. A dike near the bridge was the last line of defense.

More than 100 of the town's people met at the south end of the community Wednesday and the civil defense established the town's flood fighting headquarters for the release were set up in the high school.



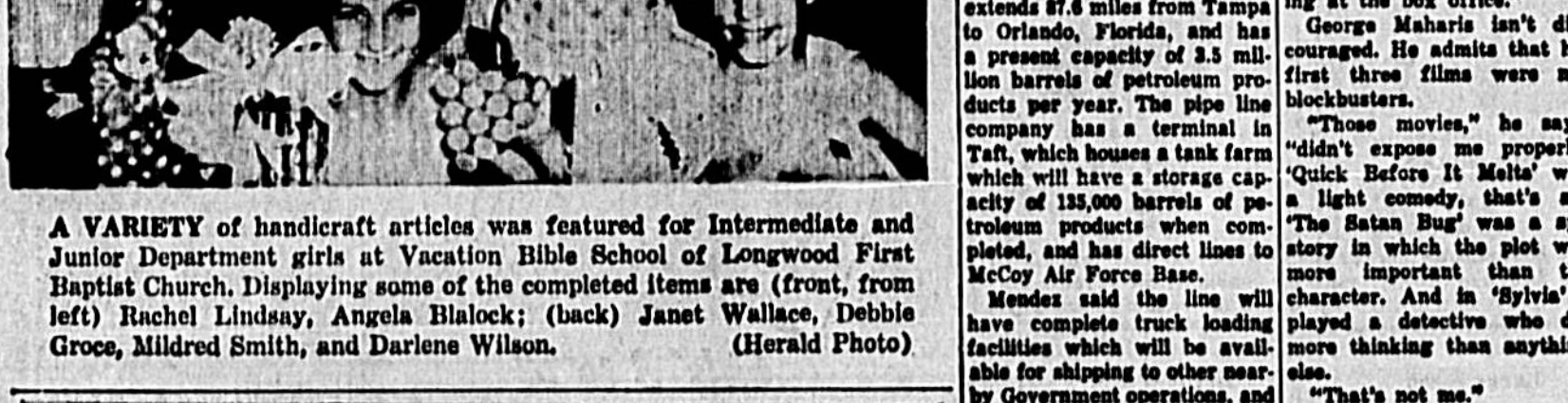

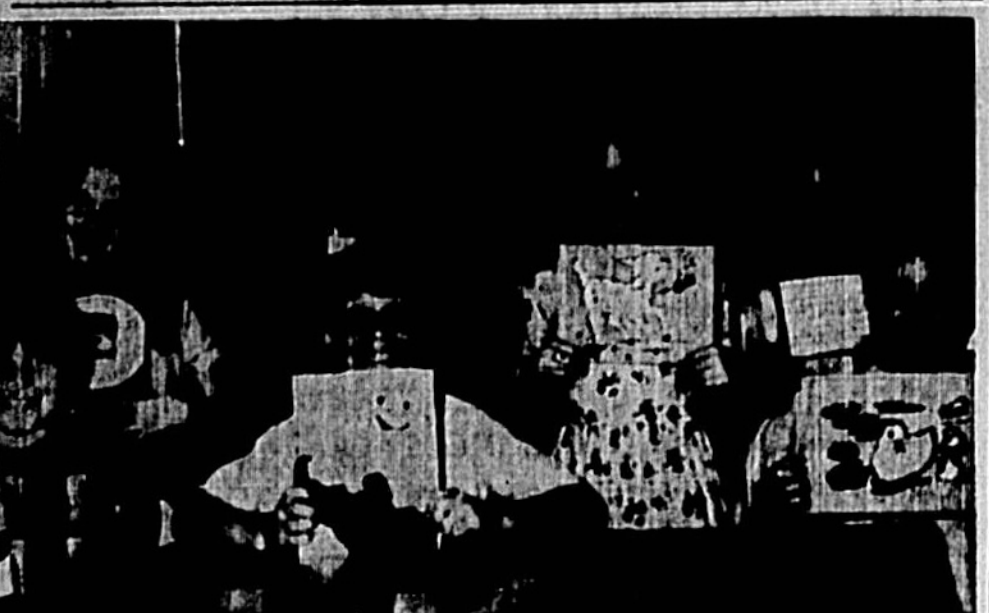

AMA Rejects Smoking Report

NEW YORK (UPI) — The policy-making body of the American Medical Association (AMA) declined Wednesday to endorse the 1964 surgeon general's report on smoking and health.

The AMA's governing House of Delegates, in session on the fourth day of the association's 114th convention, voted not to adopt a resolution by the Oregon delegation to endorse Surgeon General Luther L. Terry's report which said that smoking is directly related to some kind of lung cancer, to respiratory diseases, and to general health.

The surgeon general suggested appropriate remedial action. The AMA has begun a study of its own into cigarette smoking and health. Its referendum committee on public health and occupational health, in recommending that the Oregon resolution not be adopted, said the AMA already was on record in recognizing the contribution of the surgeon general's committee in its report, but that it had also gone on record in June 1964 as not recommending "to wholly endorse it."

Health Warnings

In view of the likelihood that health warnings labels will eventually be required on cigarette packages, it gives one pause to be told that scaring people is not necessarily the best way to get them to do what you do, something for their own good.

This conclusion about human behavior comes from a psychologist with the University of North Carolina School of Public Health and is based primarily on a study of an oral polio vaccination campaign in Florida.

There it was found, reports Dr. David Jenkins, that the fear of a disease or the risk of getting a disease doesn't seem to encourage people to seek a way of preventing it or reducing the risk.

Excessive scare campaigns may, in fact, have just the opposite result.

Fear of cancer, he says, has actually driven some women away from screening clinics.

Apparently the need is to create a moderate degree of concern in people—something more than apathy but less than fear.

Yet some of the people in Florida took the vaccine because "it was the thing to do. It was socially fashionable. It was a way to become a part of the community."

The psychologist credits newspapers with doing a better job of conveying health information to the public than any other communications medium.

Unfortunately, "Teaching facts doesn't always motivate people's behavior," he says. "There are more emotional factors involved in behavior than a string of facts."

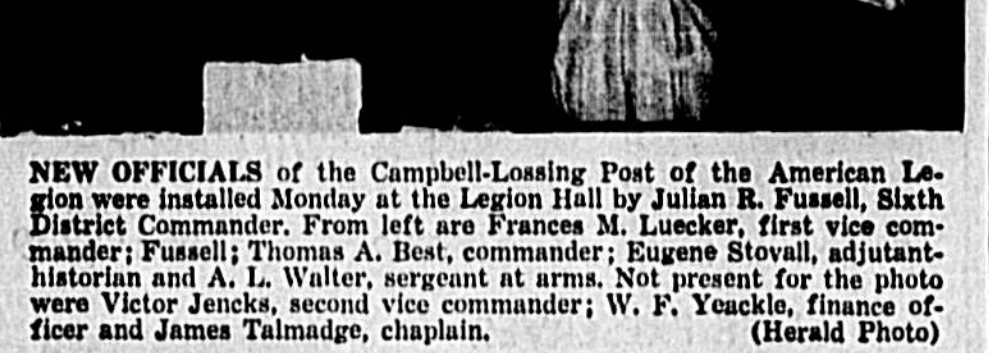
