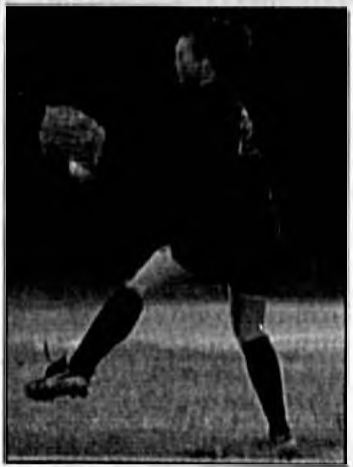

Club shooting suspect turns himself in

Investigators in the Major Crimes Unit of the Seminole County Office have arrested the suspected gunman in the Wavies Nightclub shooting March 21.

The arrest occurred early Tuesday morning as 28-year-old James Roosevelt Lee turned himself into the jail. Lee was charged for attempted murder as authorities believe he shot Timothy E. Thomas, 33, of Sanford, in the head. The shooting reportedly occurred just before closing time, at 1:49 a.m., at Wavies Nightclub, which is located near 18th Street and Southwest Road. T

he argument inside the nightclub is believed to be over a cell phone. Sanford authorities also arrested three Sanford residents last week when a second violent act erupted later that afternoon, which was thought to be in retaliation.

Suspect in murder plot dies from injuries

A husband that reportedly killed his estranged wife and tried to torch the house succumbed to his self-inflicted injuries Wednesday.

Phillip Steinbruchel died at South Seminole Hospital after being treated for numerous stabbing wounds and burns. Police believe Phillip killed his wife Susanna in a murder-suicide plot.

Longwood firefighters responded to 970 Lormann Circle Tuesday morning when a residential fire was reported. Authorities however found a small fire that was contained to a bedroom and the two lifeless bodies.

Schools integration plan nearly finalized

SANFORD — After 34 years of shuffling students, creating magnet programs and building classroom facilities to ensure racial equity, Seminole County Public Schools' officials say the district no longer operates a "dual education system based on race" and

After three decades, school board's move from under federal watch still sparks concern

seeks to come from under federal supervision prompted by a lawsuit of five Sanford residents in 1970. However, some longtime Sanford black residents wonder if the School Board will

continue its progress of racial equity once the Consent Decree is lifted.

The School Board and the U.S. Justice Department agreed on Monday to submit a final plan of "unitary sta-

tus" to a federal judge, demonstrating how the school district has met the "practical" challenges of the Consent Decree, the mechanism the federal government instituted in 1970 to desegre-

gate the county school system. Since that time, three consent decrees have been implemented to make changes to the inequities in the school system as it relates to black students, particularly those in the Sanford area.

To help satisfy the desegregation orders, which

Lights out: Airport runway encounters blackouts

SANFORD — A "handful" of commercial airliners was diverted from Orlando Sanford International Airport in early March after the lights on the main runway failed.

Crews quickly repaired the edge lighting on runway 9L/27R, but the system failed two more times within one week. After the second failure, a temporary lighting system with "tens of thousands" of feet of electrical cable was installed.

Airport officials do not know precisely why the lighting system failed.

"It's definitely an old system," said Victor White, the airport's chief operating officer and vice president of the Sanford Airport Authority. "The materials have been out there for decades. However, it looks like there may have been a lightning strike that caused the initial problems."

White said at no time were passengers on the airlines or residents who live around the airport in harms way.

"There was no danger to anyone," White said. "Our crews responded immediately, and at no time were we without lights for more than a couple of hours."

The airport's main run-

Approximately 20 paramedics, three Seminole County Sheriff's deputies and a Sanford police officer were involved in bicycle training exercises on Friday, March 19, at Seminole County Department of Public Safety's new training facility on Valentine Way, just off County Road 419 near Winter Springs.

Sanford proud, even in Tennessee: I've never been able to explain the special charm the city of Sanford possesses. People move to Sanford from other parts of the country and immediately develop a fierce loyalty to the place. Sure, not everyone's experience is the same (see **Your Views** on Page 4A), but most non-native's I meet share the same feelings about Sanford that I do — they're proud to live in the city.

The charm even works on non-residents. I received an e-mail from Suzanne Hunt from Collegedale, Tenn., which is just north of Chattanooga. Ms. Hunt subscribes to *The Herald* and wanted to know if the newspaper's "Worth a Thousand Words Photo Contest" was open to people outside of Sanford. I lived in Chattanooga at one time and was interested in her connection to Sanford. I figured she was born in here and moved away.

Turns out she wasn't born here. She never lived here, either. Hunt vacations in Sanford.

"Do you mean Sanford or the Orlando area," I said, thinking she spent most of her time at the Mouse House and was just being polite.

"No, Sanford," she said matter-of-factly. Hunt came to Sanford and the Seminole County Courthouse some time back for a court case she was working on. She fell in love with the downtown area and now makes regular visits. In fact, she's coming to town for the Riverwalk grand opening May 7, 8 and 9. You can't get any more Sanford Proud than that. You certainly don't here people talking about vacationing in West Sanford, or, I mean Lake Mary.

Power of the press?: Thanks to Maria Shreve for writing **Around The Clock** last week. More importantly, Maria, thanks for writing that big check to the Sanford Chamber of Commerce to win a turn as the Clock Keeper.

One of the items Maria wrote in her column asked what District 1 City Commissioner Art Woodruff had done for the Historic District lately. Not sure if that prodded Woodruff to action, but the commissioner attended Thursday night's Historic Trust meeting for the first time in about a year.

Maria, as luck would have it, was missing in action from Thursday's meeting. How 'bout it Art? Want to bid on the column next year?

Name game: The Sanford City Commission agreed to a 50-50 partnership with the Sanford Airport Authority on a \$40,000 public relations contract with Mica McCormick Strategic Partners LLC. The item was on the contest agenda, which means there is little if any discussion on the items listed.

Commissioner Woodruff asked for the agreement to be pulled for further discussion. Woodruff's concerns were twofold: first, does the city have available funding in light of last falls layoffs; and two, shouldn't the city incorporate it's public relations needs into a master marketing plan?

On both counts Woodruff is right to raise concerns, particularly on the second point. The contract awarded to Mica McCormick appears to be a single-shot approach rather than a fully integrated marketing plan city commissioners have said they want. Woodruff failed, however, to acknowledge the white elephant in the room (so did the other commissioners): the Mica of Mica McCormick is D'Anne Mica, daughter of congressman John Mica.

Mica's 7th Congressional District includes Sanford and during his time in the U.S. House, he has been a vocal advocate of Sanford and the Orlando Sanford International Airport. Is this a case of quid pro quo? I doubt it. Representative Mica has directed a lot of federal dough toward Sanford and the region (including \$6 million that Mica announced Friday for preliminary studies of major road projects in the county), and I have no reason to think he would do anything different if his daughter's company weren't awarded a contract. But don't think for a moment that the PR company was naive in choosing the Mica McCormick name.

The agency is actually the recent creation of two well-established Jacksonville companies, The McCormick Agency and Agency Approval and Development. Most of the parent companies' clients are based in Northeast Florida. According to the agencies' own marketing literature, D'Anne Mica will be "responsible for opening and growing The McCormick Agency's Central Florida operations" and touts her "extensive" political background. Despite her recent hiring and relative inexperience, Mica is one of four partners in the parent company.

"What's in a name?" Shakespeare once wrote. Lots of opportunity if it happens to be the right one.

includes increasing the overall educational quality of former all-black schools Crooms Academy, Goldsboro Elementary and Midway Elementary, the School Board turned Crooms and Goldsboro into state-of-the-art magnet schools, and established magnet and other advanced programs at Midway, Hamilton Elementary, Pine Crest Elementary, Millennium Middle, Sanford Middle - all of which feed into middle or high school specialty programs. Seminole High has two magnet and one IB program. Additionally, the district allowed out-of-area transfers to achieve greater integration.

High-tech Goldsboro and Crooms, both with predominate white student populations, are prime examples of the progress the board has made.

"It shows when you have a waiting list for students to attend Goldsboro and Crooms," said school board spokesman Richard Wells. "The same thing is true for Seminole High, Sanford Middle, and Millennium Middle."

However, a Sanford City Commissioner who served as the chairman in the 1970's for the first committee on the utilization of Crooms, said some community members have voiced concerns about the new plan and wonder if the school board will maintain "good faith" and continue progress.

"As some citizens have expressed and asked the question, 'What now?' " said Dr. Velma Williams, Sanford vice mayor and a 1959 graduate of Crooms Academy. "Since there is no federal oversight, is the struggle over or has it begun? I would have to remind all concerned that we remain vigilant in holding the school board accountable. We must restrain from being crisis oriented, and develop and facilitate an on-going moni-

toring, and allow the school board to demonstrate good faith. It's all about the quality education of our children, and we're all in this boat together."

Turner Clayton, president of the Seminole County branch of the NAACP, said his concerns are "the hiring, recruitment of teachers and administrators and the disciplinary program, which they haven't addressed in the

unitary status report. Discipline (problems) seem to be at an all-time high."

A federal judge will review the unitary status finding submitted by the Justice Department and the School Board and make a decision.

"We don't know when that will come, it might take days, weeks or months, but I would hope it would be relatively fast," said Wells.

Background of Seminole County Public Schools integration suit

Excerpts from the Seminole County Public Schools Unitary Status Findings, Spring 2004, submitted to a United States District Judge:

In 1970, under the imprimatur of Brown v. Board of Education, the Seminole County School District was found to have operated an unlawfully segregated school system.

The federal government demanded the school system eliminate its segregated schools. Since that time, the school district, in conjunction with the federal government have submitted and implemented several plans to remedy the segregation.

In reviewing the school district's request to lift the consent decree, a federal judge will look at three issues to determine if the burden has been met:

- Whether the school district has complied with the court's decrees to the extent practicable for a reasonable period of time;

- Whether the vestiges of past discrimination have been eliminated to the extent practicable; and

- Whether the school district has demonstrated a good faith commitment to the whole of the court's decrees and to those provisions of the law and the Constitution that were the predicate for judicial intervention.

In determining whether a school district has met its burden, the district court shall examine not only student assignment, but also "every facet of school operations — faculty, staff, transportation, extra-curricular activities and facilities." In addition, more recently, the courts have also considered the relative quality of education offered to black and white students.

To demonstrate good faith, the defendants must show that past commitment is indicative of future reliability.

way, the one commercial airlines use, is 9L/27R. It is an east-west runway, as are two of the airport's secondary runways. There is also one north-south runway. With the exception of the airliners, all flight traffic was redirected to the two secondary east-west runways during the light failure.

White said except for a few cases, effected commercial traffic was put into a holding pattern until the light system was repaired.

"The first time it occurred, we had a few flights that didn't want to wait and went to Orlando International," White said. "Once the lights were repaired they took off and came to Sanford."

White said that while the delay was "horribly inconvenient" to the passengers, "It was really just a handful of planes."

The first lighting failure occurred March 6. Crews partially repaired the lights, but three days later the system failed again. Partial repairs were once again made and airport officials

contacted other airports and airfield lighting specialists in the region. The Greater Orlando Aviation Authority sent a crew and supplied a portable lighting system.

"It sort of looks like a bunch of extension cords strung together," White said. "There are tens of thousands of feet of cable running along the grass. At places where there are taxiways, we've run the cable under those taxiways."

Though the portable lights continued to work, the permanent lights failed for a third time on March 13. At that time airport officials determined that a total system replacement — including circuitry, fixtures, transformers and regulators — was necessary.

White executed an emergency task order to hire Avcon Inc. to assess the problems, develop an action plan and create drawings and technical specifications.

Larry Dale, the airport's chief executive officer, received approval from the Federal Aviation

Administration (FAA) to negotiate an emergency contract with Olson Electrical Company to purchase the supplies and perform the work.

The cost to rebuild the lighting system is \$221,000, of which the FAA has agreed to fund 95 percent.

White said supplies began arriving this week and crews will begin work in about seven to 10 days. Actual construction should take two to three weeks.

"We'll divert the small planes to our other runways so the contractor can perform the work," White said. "The commercial flights come in on regular schedules, so work will be done around those times. And, of course, we'll do as much work as we can at night."

The Sanford Airport Authority will discuss the light system failure at its meeting Tuesday morning. Authority members are expected to declare an emergency, ratify White's and Dale's actions, and accept the FAA grant.

Park, the upcoming grand opening of Sanford's Riverwalk, arts and crafts shows, special parades, and other events which have large groups of participants or visitors, which may prevent the use of normal EMS emergency vehicles.

Harris said the EMS bikes will be equipped with basic life support items such as splints, bandages, and a defibrillator to be used in case of serious problems, in advance of the major EMS units arrivals.

"The first time these EMS bike units will be used publicly, was to be Saturday, April 3, at the Service Crescendo in

the Park," he said. "At the present time, there are an estimated eight bicycles in service on a rotational basis, with the 20 trained personnel on call."

The law enforcement participation in the training exercise was to improve police-related biking skills. Sheriff's spokesman Steve Olson commented, "Our deputies did real well in the training exercise, but those EMS people were really good. They had their bikes leaping over some of the obstacles as if they had been in mountain bike training for years. They were excellent, although we weren't bad either."

Sheriff's Sgt. Chad McDaniel taught the course. "I've been in bike competition since I was eight years old," he commented, "and I've been a qualified instructor since 1993. I usually conduct one to three courses per year all around the state."

McDaniel said the sheriff's office has close to 70 bikes which are used, not only in crowd control, but also to enable officers to gain access to areas undetected, in the pursuit of criminal cases. He added that while there were only three deputies in this recent training course, "almost all of our deputies are qualified in bike patrols."

Professional Basketball. The first pro game was played in 1896 in Trenton, N.J. The Buffalo Germans became the first powerhouse team, with 792 victories over only 86 losses from 1896 to 1925. Dr. James Naismith is credited with inventing basketball in 1891 when his indoor sports of lacrosse, rugby and soccer proved too violent for use at the WMCA in which he was involved.

Baseball. Most people believe Abner Doubleday was the inventor of baseball in 1839.

Doubleday was an important character in American history. An Army officer, he served in the Mexican Wars and the Seminole War in Florida. He reportedly fired the first shot against Confederate forces in the battle in Fort Sumter. Tour guides these days often mention that the troops played baseball in the center of the fort when it was occupied by Union forces.

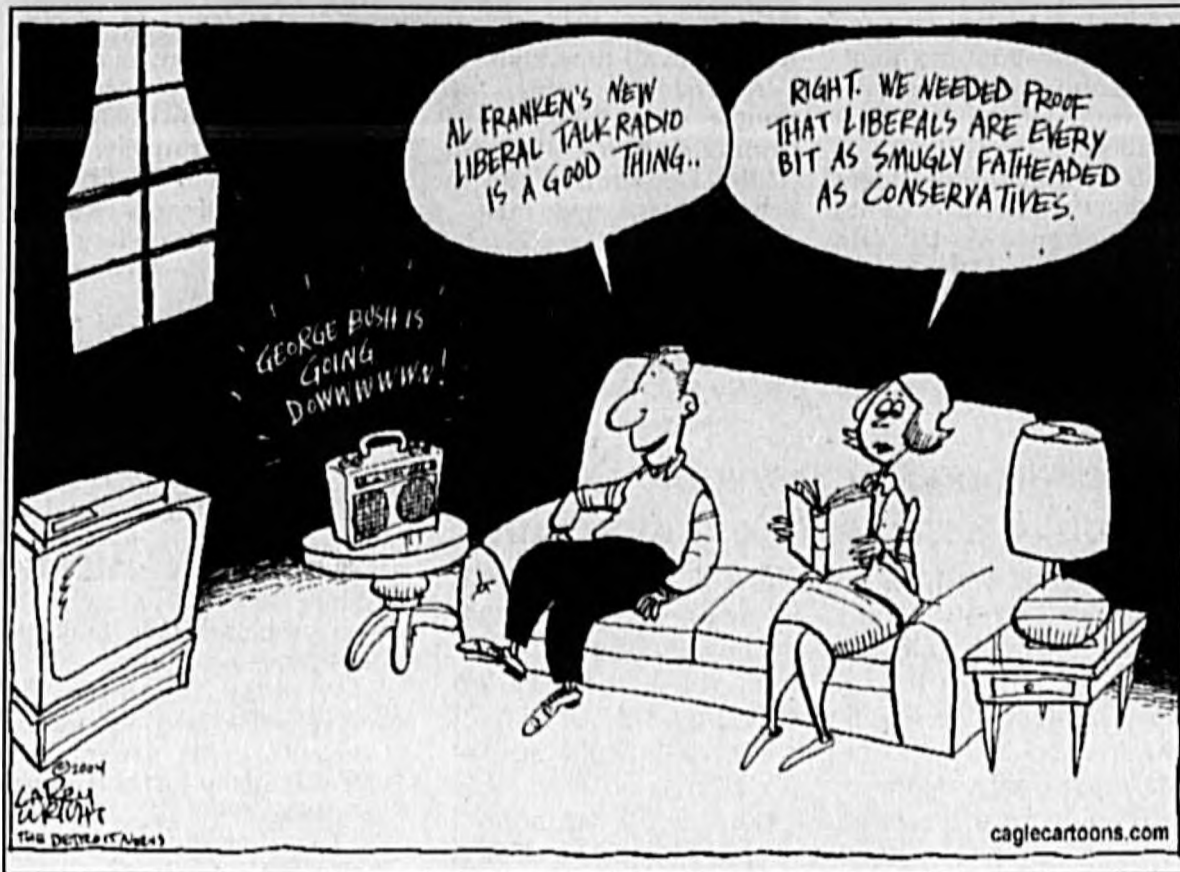
Many years ago, Albert Spalding (Spalding Sporting Goods) set up a committee to determine who invented baseball, and the result showed Doubleday as the creator. Sanford couple upset about excessive noise

To the editor:

We moved to Sanford in the middle of January, 2004. We were lured here for two primary reasons. First was the home we found, which the landlord boasted as being a prime piece of property, and second was the research we did on Sanford. Moving from out of state, we could only trust the claims the landlord and the city made. Unfortunately, both have let us down.

The issues with the landlord are best left as personal issues, unless the circumstances lead to other required measures. Therefore, in this letter, we will focus on the city of Sanford.

We were attracted to Sanford because of the "historic values" they claimed, because of the waterfront park project, which is only a few blocks from us, and we were attracted because we got the sense the government and the people really cared for their city and were very proud of it.

The first day we arrived we were nuisanced by cars driving by with stereos blasting so loud, it would wake us up not to mention the times when we just wanted to

appreciate a nice, quiet time on the porch. We called on the city to help us. We thought, in turn, it would also help the community. Certainly a community cannot afford to invest several million dollars in taxpayer projects only to ignore the problems of the city itself, thus, freightening the very people they are trying to attract away from the area. We worked with the City Manager, the mayor's office and the police. All were eager to help and all were understanding of our predicament and the disastrous effect it would have on the community. All, however, have yet to show the substance of their claims.

We tried to work directly with the police to help them enforce the city noise ordinance. And we know from personal experience that these prostitutes will go to extreme measures to bait their catch - our fifteen-year-old boy was propositioned on 3rd Avenue one afternoon.

We have no option open to us other than to leave the area and find a more suitable community. We are not alone. The people next door to us are leaving after less than a year and the people renovating another home are going to try to sell rather than remain there. We know the Historic Preservation Society appreciated all we have done to the home we now have. I imagine we will be missed, as will all good citizens who are leaving Sanford.

Knee-jerk hostility toward gays is rampant in black United States

You'd think black Americans — still struggling against a lingering, if muted, racism — would occupy the front lines in the battle against bigotry.

But a knee-jerk antipathy toward gays and lesbians is rampant in black America, nowhere more evident than in the black church. Black ministers often overlook more commonplace sins — lying, gossiping, fornicating — to denounce homosexuality from the pulpit, casting Christianity as a harsh and narrow religion of exclu-

sion. As sins go, it's safe enough, I suppose, to denounce homosexuality. If gays and lesbians are no more than 10 percent of the population, their numbers in any congregation are likely to be small — too small to threaten the preacher's paycheck. But lying, gossiping, fornicating — denouncing those sins may besmirch large numbers of church folk, right up into the pulpit itself.

Several of Georgia's black clergy took their distorted Christianity into the public square last month, urging the Legislature to endorse a state constitutional amendment banning same-sex marriage. Their last-minute lobbying paid off, persuading a handful of black legislators to give the amendment a narrow victory. (The measure will go before Georgia voters in November.)

The ministers' anti-gay activism is hardly the black church's finest hour. By using the Bible to defend bigotry, those black ministers joined the tradition of white Southern ministers who used Scripture to endorse slavery. ("Slaves, obey your earthly masters with fear and trembling, in singleness of heart, as you obey Christ." Ephesians 6:5.)

Like other conservative Christians, many black ministers blithely declare that human civilization has always recognized marriage as the union of one man and one woman, as sanctified by God. Their history is as wrongheaded as their theology. In "A History of the

Wife," Stanford University scholar Marilyn Yalom writes, "In biblical days, a Hebrew husband was allowed to have more than one wife. For each, he had to give his father-in-law a sum of money," a practice which underscored the assumption that a wife was property.

Indeed, a sober reading of Leviticus — where homosexuality is declared an "abomination" — makes that clear. The proscription against adultery is meant to prohibit a man from having sex with another man's wife, his property. Sexual relations with his slaves (but not another man's slaves) were sanctioned. ("If a man has sexual relations with a woman who is a slave, designated for another man ... an inquiry shall be held. They shall not be put to death, since she has not been freed; but he shall bring a guilt offering for himself to the Lord." Leviticus 19:20.)

It is disappointing to see black ministers — several of whom are old enough to remember the lash of Jim Crow — brandishing the Bible against gays the same way Bull Connor wielded a billy club

against civil rights marchers. Of course, they adamantly resist comparisons of the crusade for gay rights to the movement for civil rights. In a statement opposing same-sex unions, several black ministers wrote: "To equate a lifestyle choice to racism demeans the work of the entire civil rights movement."

But Rep. John Lewis, D-Ga., who faced down billy clubs and fire hoses, begs to differ. Supporting gay rights, Lewis recently said to a Senate committee: "We have been down this road before in this country. The right to liberty and happiness belongs to each of us and on the same terms, without regard to either skin color or sexual orientation."

So does Coretta Scott King, widow of Martin Luther King Jr. Speaking at a gay pride rally in Atlanta several years ago, she said, "I wanted ... to reaffirm my wholehearted support of freedom from discrimination for lesbian and gay people. I do so because I believe that all forms of persecution are wrong."

"As my husband said, I have fought too long and hard against segregated public accommodations to end up segregating my moral concerns. Justice is indivisible." Amen.

The Way We Were: Founding city family fed growth

The following information is edited from "Memories of Seminole County Families" published by the Seminole County Historical Society. It is available at the Museum of Seminole County History.

Hibbard Casselberry family
Hibbard Casselberry was the son of a prominent surgeon, Dr. William Evans Casselberry and Lillian Gold Hibbard, daughter of Chicago pioneers. Since he was the first

grandson born after nine granddaughters, his grandfather celebrated by raising a flag and giving the new arrival a \$100 gold piece. This was in Chicago in 1893.

Hibbard graduated from Yale University in 1916 with an engineering degree and served as a naval officer in World War I. He married Mary Elizabeth Leonard on June 25, 1921, in Winnetka, Ill.

In 1925, while there were visiting an aunt in Winter Park with their two sons, Hibbard Jr. (2) and Leonard (1), Mary Elizabeth broke her arm. While waiting for it to heal, Hibbard fell in love with the area and saw its many possibilities.

He moved his family there and he and Gordon Bennett began a development known as Fern Park Estates. His daughter, Mary E. "Molly" Moretz was born in 1932.

Casselberry later went into business for himself, shipping ferns by Railway Express to florists all over the United States and Canada. His Casselberry Gardens also grew and marketed flowers including shipping to Belgian Azaleas.

He acquired more land on both sides of U.S. Highway 17-92 where he built homes and began to develop what was to become a town. The first houses were Normandy cottages designed by architect James Gamble Rogers. They were featured in a national magazine.

In 1940 the state legislature agreed to let Casselberry and other property owners incorporate the area into the town of Casselberry. It was tax free, with Hibbard Casselberry providing garbage collection, fire fighting protection, road maintenance and utilities for residents in the early days. He also donated property for schools, churches, civic organizations, a cemetery and many city buildings and facilities.

Casselberry was elected the town's first mayor and was later on the town council. As a result of an explosion on his navy ship, Casselberry was deaf in his right ear. To better hear his passengers, he drove cars with the steering wheel on the right side. He would drive prospective buyers through the backwoods scrub, amazing them with his dreams for the area.

Because the government didn't consider shipping a priority during World War II, Casselberry became a defense contractor making bomb parachutes and other items for the war effort. He was given priority to build 23 houses for workers, and a 15,000-square-foot building. It was called a miracle building as it was completed in only 21 days.

After the war, the sewing machines began making children's clothes and chenille bedspreads instead of parachutes. Casselberry also owned Casselberry Driving Park for training horses, in 1945-51. And as a real estate broker, he founded both Casselberry Land Company and Casselberry Utilities, Inc.

He was a member of the Seminole County Chamber of

Lake Mary Prep club excites school peers with robotic soccer tournament

LAKE MARY — The robotics club at Lake Mary Preparatory School recently kicked its way to valuable lessons in friendly competition and practical engineering in front of their peers.

Competing in a DaVinci Robotics Educational Foundation sponsored competition, eight teams fielded robots in a bracket-style soccer tournament. For most of the school year, the club had been meeting every other Wednesday designing their robots with the objective of creating a machine that could score soccer goals on a mini-playing field.

Kits were provided by the foundation, but there were no set patterns on how to design the robots, said Carol Biggers, club sponsor and science chair at Lake Mary Preparatory School.

"There's different designs on how the (miniature soccer) ball is contained," she said pointing to the Hells Belles team bright red robot "Muerte" — Spanish for death. "That's like a snow shovel, which is a design that's good."

Starting at opposite ends of the obstacle-covered playing field, the robotics club teams were tasked with creating a robot that could score as many soccer goals as possible within three minutes. Some teams went on the offensive pushing the small soccer ball immediately into the opponent's territory, while others tried a more defensive approach.

"We basically tried to hold it the whole time," said ninth grader Sarah Pepe who teamed with Cat Rambo and Cecilee McMichen to form Hell's Belles.

The Belles escaped the first round, but ultimately their plan failed as Team BJMS ousted the girls in the semifinals before losing to team Richard Melon in the finals.

The girls were pleased with their robot's performance and said the project was challenging.

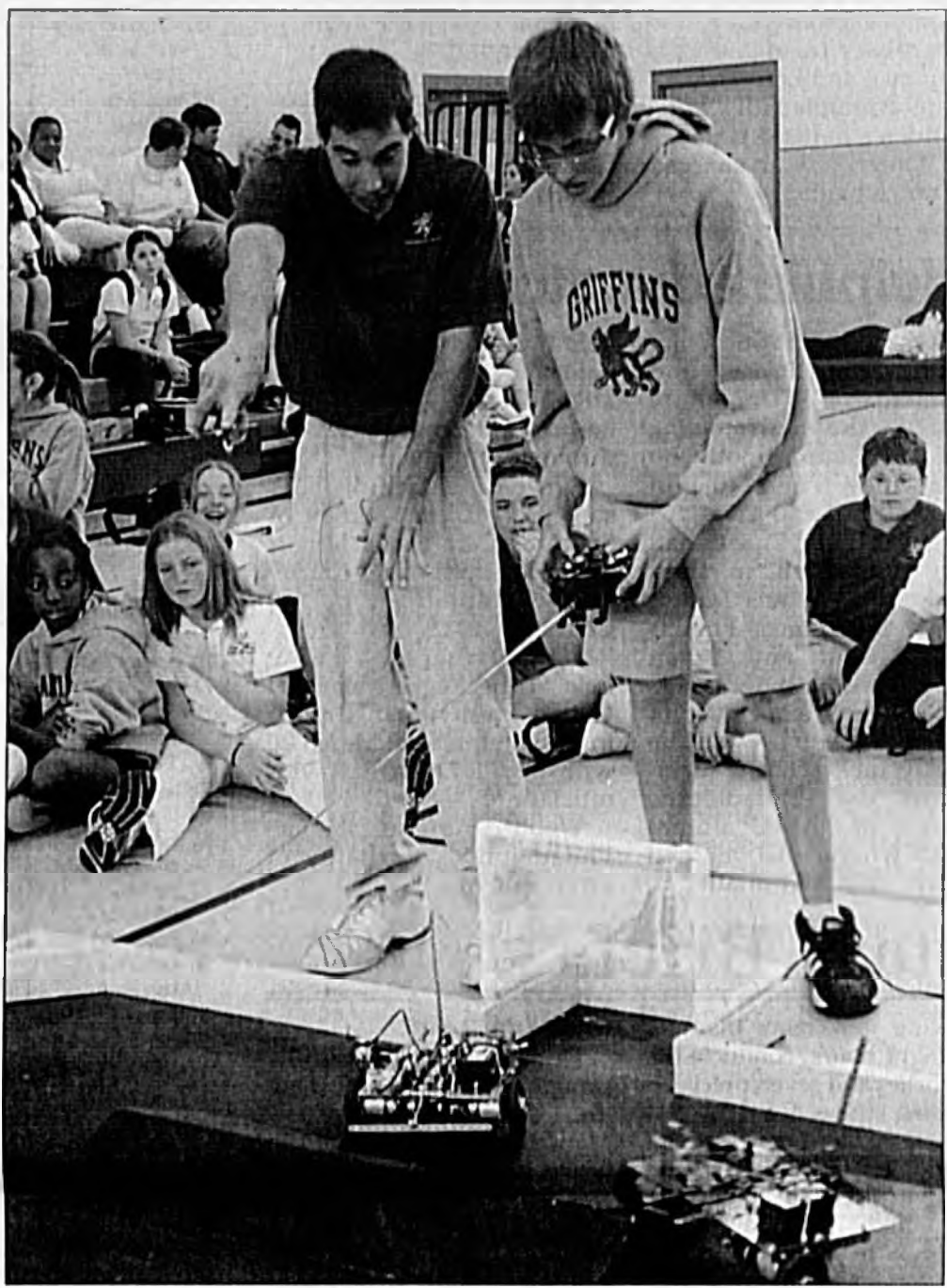
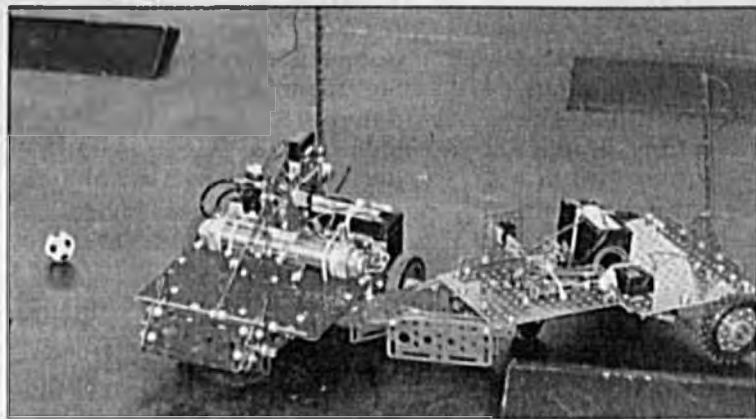
"The kinetics were killer and getting a good design was difficult," McMichen said.

Rambo added, "We basically came into this not knowing what to do."

Helping the teams develop their robots were Buzz and Alexia Dawson of DaVinci Robotics Educational Foundation. Buzz is a former NASA engineer and is a technical expert on Robot Rivals, a cable television program on the Do-It-Yourself Network that pits college students head-to-head to build robots that complete determined tasks.

Alexia Dawson said the robot competition stimulates students with creativity while developing mathematical computation, engineering and design skills.

Recognizing outstanding black women

On May 13, 2004, Americans will celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the landmark Supreme Court decision that declared "separate educational facilities are inherently unequal."

Recognizing the enormous impact of this ruling, the California African-American Museum presents through the Gates' Brown vs. Board of Education, a historical and artistic inquiry that commemorates school desegregation, particularly relevant to African-Americans but a ruling

applicable to all American citizens.

Kianga Ford, daughter of Brenda Ford of Sanford, was selected as one of the artists working

with sound and language as a primary media. Ki, as she is affectionately known by her family and friends in Sanford, graduated from Seminole High School and is an alumni of Tajiri School of Performing Arts and Academics.

Ford's improvisational and site-specific story projects an attempt to highlight and destabilize the psychological dimensions of social identity formation. Ford explored the sensations of exclusion and belonging, her immersive audio-textual installation probes the relationship between individual and collective, intimate and public, given and contingent, categorical and particular. Ford says her "environment" combines the sculptural concerns of space, body and interactivity with the questions of audience, authorship and perspective embedded in her narratives.

Her work has been shown in venues around the Los Angeles area, including Track 16 at the New Wight Gallery, and Six Months Project Space.

Ford's auto-textual explorations are informed by her studies in English and Theater at Georgetown University, Washington, D.C., where she received her bachelor's degree in 1994. Her master's degree from UCLA in 2003 and she is currently a doctoral candidate in the History of Consciousness program at the University of California, Santa Cruz. She will complete a dissertation on articulations of race and identity in contemporary exhibition. She is also an Irvine Doctoral Fellow in the Department of Art History and Visual Art at Occidental

First the history of the church, now the mystery

Last week I wrote here about the historical marker dedicated at the First Methodist Church of Geneva. While at that dedication ceremony, I inquired of longtime Geneva resident and church member Lorraine Whiting, as to the possible whereabouts of a missing chalice once adorning the sanctuary there.

(Lorraine had mentioned its disappearance to me a while back, but had asked me to wait before publishing anything about the mystery surrounding the sacred cup.) Lorraine replied that the cup was indeed still missing, and promised to send me the background information regarding its special historical ties to the church, which she did.

The pages of "The History of the First Methodist Church of Geneva," compiled by Katherine Flynt Kilbee in 1967, read: "The Church has received many gifts through the years. One of the earliest known was a silver Communion Cup, presented by Ida Leonard Raulerson."

The following story of that Communion Cup was read by Bessie Proctor Herman during a church service marking the 100th Anniversary celebration of the rural house of worship.

"For many years, Mrs. W.J. Daniel, mother of Rev. J.H. Daniel, was the Communion steward and the original silver cup was in her keeping.

"Mrs. Daniel was the first teacher of my mother, Bertha Hart David (Mrs. W.J.). A few weeks before her death, she placed in my mother's hand the silver cup, expressing the desire that she would keep it as long as she lived.

"After my mother's death, finding the cup in not a very good condition, I had it resilvered and engraved. Not knowing the exact date as to when the cup was given, I decided the founding

date of the Church would be appropriate. "On the 100th Anniversary of the founding of the Church, the cup was returned to its original home with a fervent prayer that it would always serve as a reminder of the faithful ones who loved the Lord and served and worshipped there."

The church history also noted that the cup was used for Communion until individual Communion cups were favored.

When I asked church Pastor Jeanine Spangenberg about her words to the congregation the Sunday following the historical marker dedication she had this to say.

"On Sunday I thanked the congregation for coming out and told them that there is no doubt that this church has been around for 128 years doing ministry not only among themselves but out in the community because Christ is in their midst. We gave thanks for all of those that have gone before us showing the way, and gave thanks for

the people that are there now and who remained Christ centered and are still carrying on God's mission in the world. Being a part of this congregation has not only blessed the ministry that I have been called to do, but has been a blessing to my life."

Said Spangenberg when asked about the chalice: "The chalice came up missing as they were getting ready to celebrate their 120th Anniversary back in 1997. It is believed that someone may have taken it home to clean and then forgot about it. You know how we get so many things going on in our lives and we put something aside to do later and then forget all about it or misplace it.

"For the current membership, a lot of them don't even know about the chalice but for the persons that have been around for any length of time and have watched the history of this church unfold, it has left a hole — an emptiness. It would be nice if we could

Commerce, Charter member of Post 256 American Legion and served as its commander, also VFW Post 1005, Lions Club and Community United Methodist Church.

His second wife was Martha Norris, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Norris of Casselberry. They were the first couple to be married in the Community Methodist Church. Their two children are Lillian (1949) and John Norris (1952). The Casselberry Home, "Bridgewater" was built in 1952 and overlooked South Lake Triplet.

Considered a controversial character, Casselberry would engage in hot debates at council meetings, but would always shake hands with his adversaries afterwards. When he died, Aug. 17, 1969, after a long illness, the city declared an official day of mourning. The flag flew at half staff and the city hall was dedicated to his memory for his many contributions to the city. His wife, Martha died on Aug. 26, 1990.

Leonard Casselberry and family

Leonard Casselberry, the second son of Hibbard and Mary Elizabeth Casselberry, was born Nov. 18, 1924 in Chicago and moved to Winter Park with his parents and older brother Hibbard, Jr. the following year. He attended schools in Winter Park and Bolles Military School in Jacksonville.

As an Aviation Ordnance Mate Third Class in the U.S. Navy, his first assignment after trade school was at the Sanford Naval Air Station. He was later stationed in Beaufort, S.C. where he married his high school sweetheart, Margaret Jane Williams on June 9, 1944. She was the daughter of Harvey and Bertha Williams of Winter Park.

After the war, Leonard and Jane made their home in Casselberry where they raised their four children. These are Daniel Leonard (born June 3, 1947), Richard Shannon (Sept. 28, 1948, Melenda Jane (Dec.

29, 1950) and Catherine Lee. Daniel is a Methodist Minister in Delray Beach. He and his wife, Cheryl Blausler have two children. Richard is a civil engineer and property manager in Casselberry. He and his wife, Donna Hall Genova have four children. Melenda and husband Patrick Edmiston are Bible translators in Papua, New Guinea. They have two children, Catherine, a costume designer, and husband, Rev. John Cox, who live in Winter Park and have two children.

Leonard managed the Azalea Driving Park, a winter training facility for standard bred horses, and also Azalea Lodge, an American Plan hotel from 1945-51. He was also a home builder and developer, real estate salesman, fern grower, and restaurant owner. He helped his father build the city's first sewer system and treatment plant, the first modern sewer plant in Seminole County. He was the first scout master of Boy Scout Troop 341 and a charter member of both

the Casselberry Lions Club and Community United Methodist Church. He is a former member of the city council and a member of the volunteer fire department. He helped organize the American Legion Post 256 in Casselberry and served as post commander.

His wife Jane is a Rollins College Alumna and a retired journalist, having worked for almost 30 years as Religion Editor and staff writer for the Sanford Herald. She has served on the board of several charitable organizations as well as on the Administrative Board of Community United Methodist Church. She has served as president of the local unit of United Methodist Women, and is past recipient of its "Woman of the Year" award.

Both Leonard and Jane are members of the Good News Jail and Prison Ministry President's Council and Wycliff Associates. They have a special interest in Christian missions and have traveled in 21 countries.

This church has always opened its doors to any and all who would enter, and perhaps in doing so, opened the way for this cup to be removed without record of its whereabouts.

If any who read this column believe they have any information about this Communion Cup and where it might be, please call the church at 407-349-9596. The cup may also simply be dropped off at the church or the rectory with no questions asked.

Note: In a follow-up phone conversation with Lorraine Whiting (who, along with Imogene Yarborough compiled the information on the

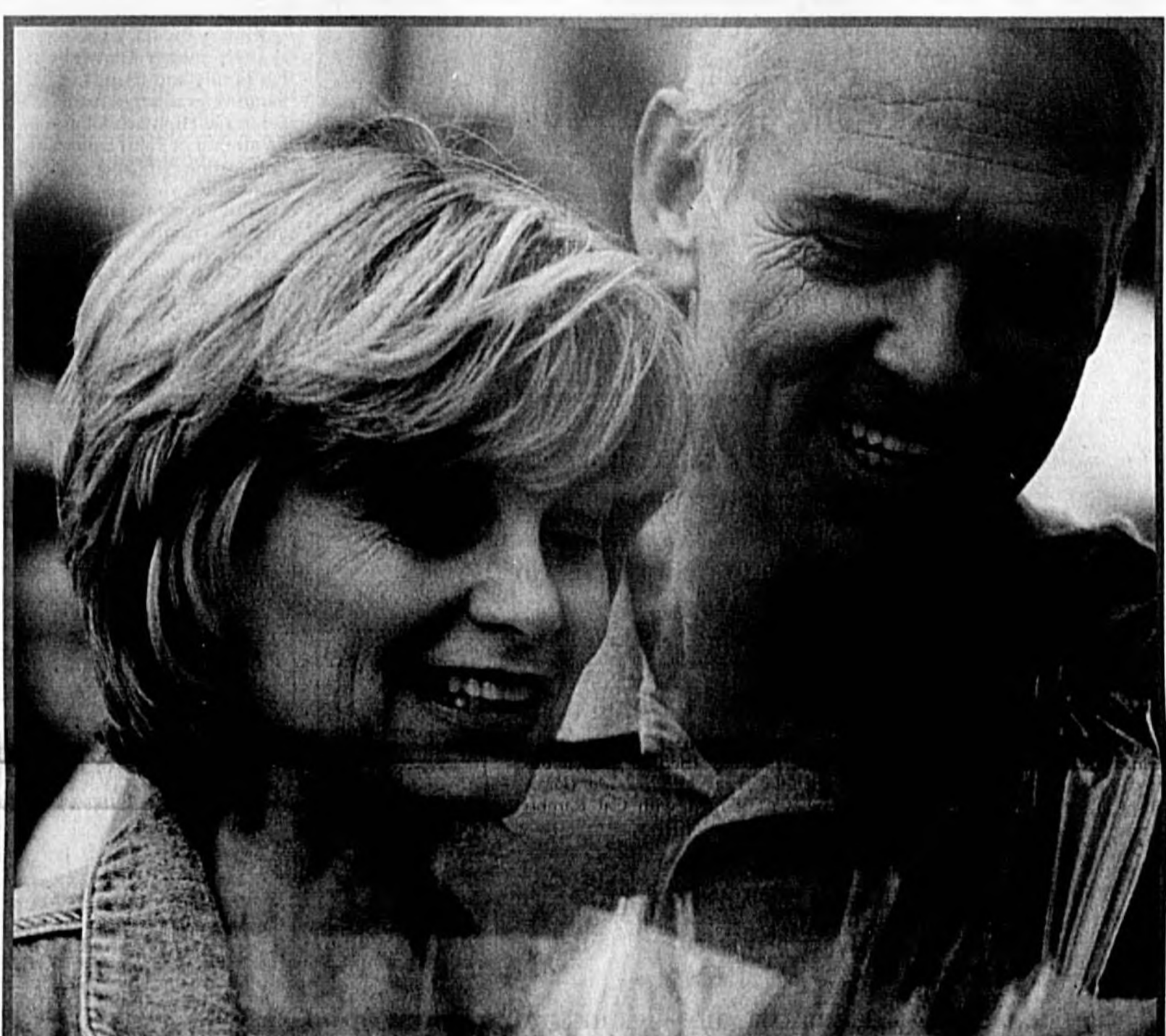
church's historical marker) she spoke of the history of the Daniels family, noting that they had lived near the school house and that the son, Herman Daniels, indeed went into the Methodist Ministry, and was a contributor to the original opening of the Museum of Geneva History. Bessie Herman, mother of Mrs. David, lived on a dirt road off of Lake Geneva near Lake Harney Road. It was often commented, she added, that Ward Hall, where the cup — along with furnishings from the original 1877 Chapel — was displayed, had a special spirit within, felt by those who spent time there.

On May 13, 2004, Americans will celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the landmark Supreme Court decision that declared "separate educational facilities are inherently unequal." Recognizing the enormous impact of this ruling, the California African-American Museum presents through the Gates' Brown vs. Board of Education, a historical and artistic inquiry that commemorates school desegregation, particularly relevant to African-Americans but a ruling applicable to all American citizens.

Kianga Ford, daughter of Brenda Ford of Sanford, was selected as one of the artists working with sound and language as a primary media. Ki, as she is affectionately known by her family and friends in Sanford, graduated from Seminole High School and is an alumni of Tajiri School of Performing Arts and Academics.

Ford's improvisational and site-specific story projects an attempt to highlight and destabilize the psycho-physical dimensions of social identity formation.

of its comprehensive plan amendment that bans schools from the area.

The two-pronged proposed plan outlines the creation of a high-tech district and amends school siting criteria. The overlay protects businesses and industries in the Interstate 4 corridor north of Emma Oaks Trail, south of County Road 46A, east of I-4, International Parkway and Banana Lake Road and west of Lake Emma Road and Rinehart Road from other uses that are not consistent with the area. The second part of the amendment proposes to ease the ability for the School Board to site elementary schools in residential areas, but forbids elementary, middle and high schools from the corridor.

According to Lake Mary City Manager John Litton, the agenda item for the plan was delayed to consider some of the issues raised

by the School Board, but the city does not intend to back down from its proposal to ban schools from the high-tech district.

"It was such a short turn around and the questions kept coming that just in the abundance of caution it is not going to hurt us to delay it for 30 days," Litton said. "We're just trying to be fair in the process, but at this point we don't have any intent to make any major changes."

"I think it's important to keep the window short so the pressure stays on us so we either do it or move on," he added.

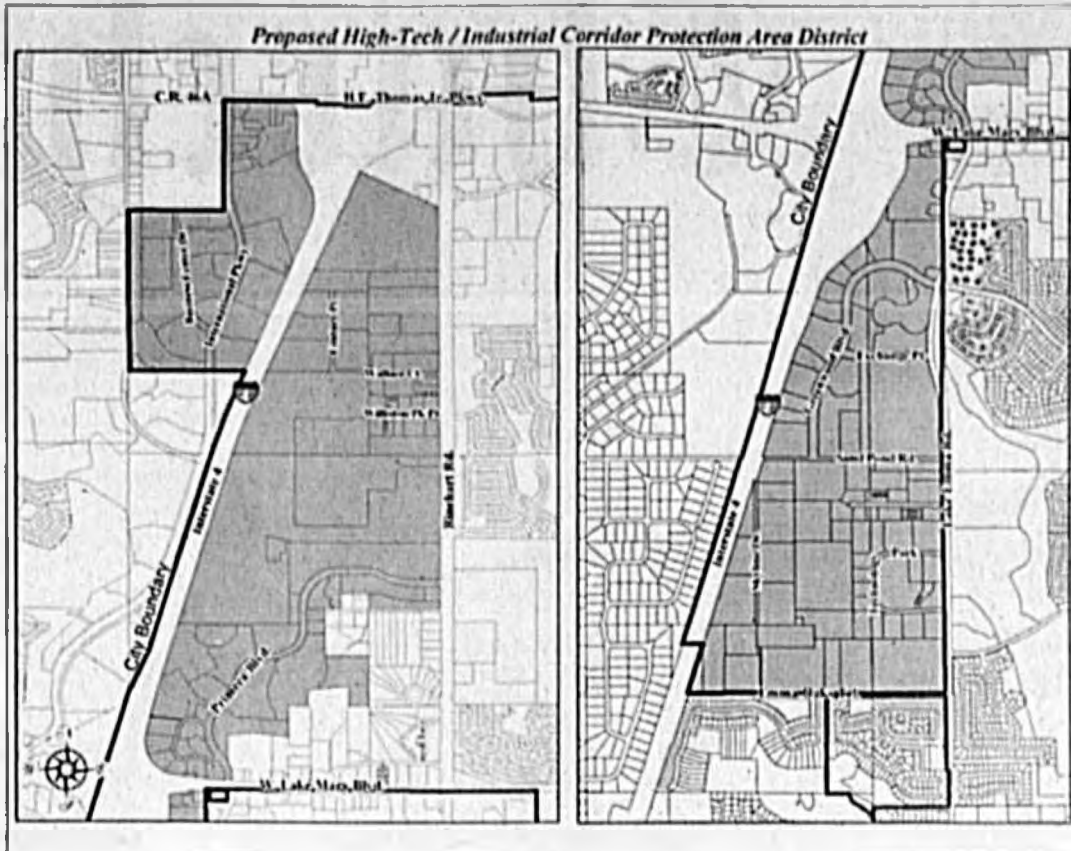
Litton said he feels the plan actually eases the process the School Board has to go through to site a new elementary school in Lake Mary.

"Some people might say we're anti-school and we're not," he said. "Nothing would make me happier to have (another) elementary

school in Lake Mary."

The School Board, however, was not the only ones to have issues with the plan. Commissioner Gary Brender said after the meeting that he too had some concerns with the plan. He said the prohibition of all schools in the high-tech district could have the chance to negatively impact economic growth in the area.

"There are some larger corporate interests that are looking at Lake Mary and those corporations as part of their employee benefits have provisions for childcare that extend beyond simple childcare," he said. "They actually have a K-3 program so the employees can have their kids in school essentially at their site. Well if we restrict all schools that obviously restricts corporations from having a school environment as part of their benefits."

for Lake County Government for four years.

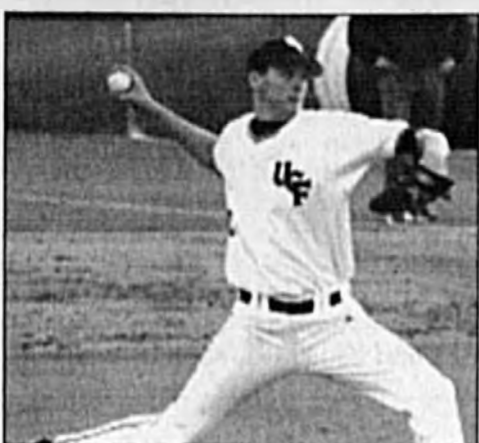

Seminole then came back with one of its best offensive games of the season in the win over the Greyhounds.

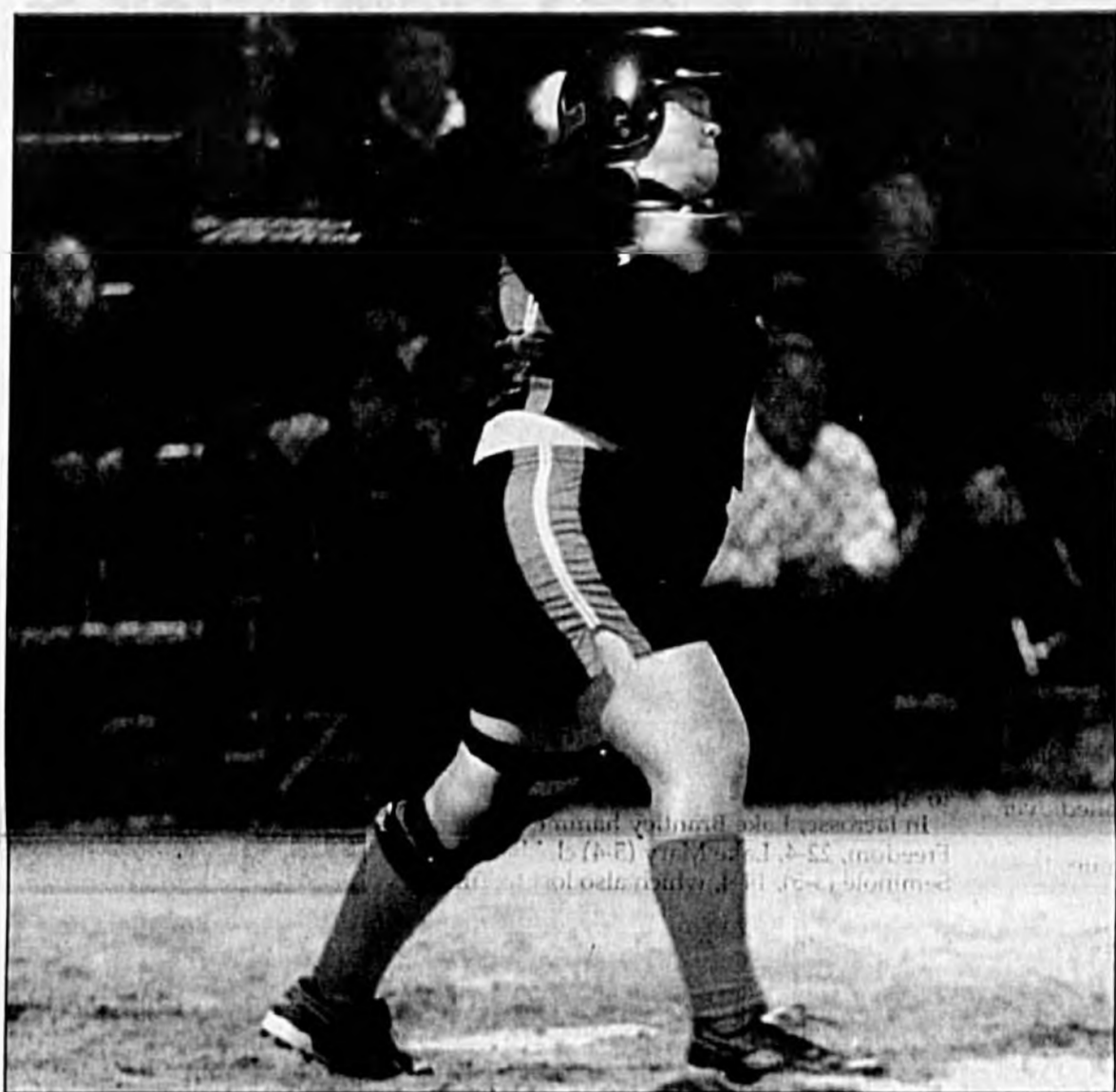

Lake Mary then ran its record to 13-2 with a huge Seminole Athletic Conference victory over Oviedo, 4-1.

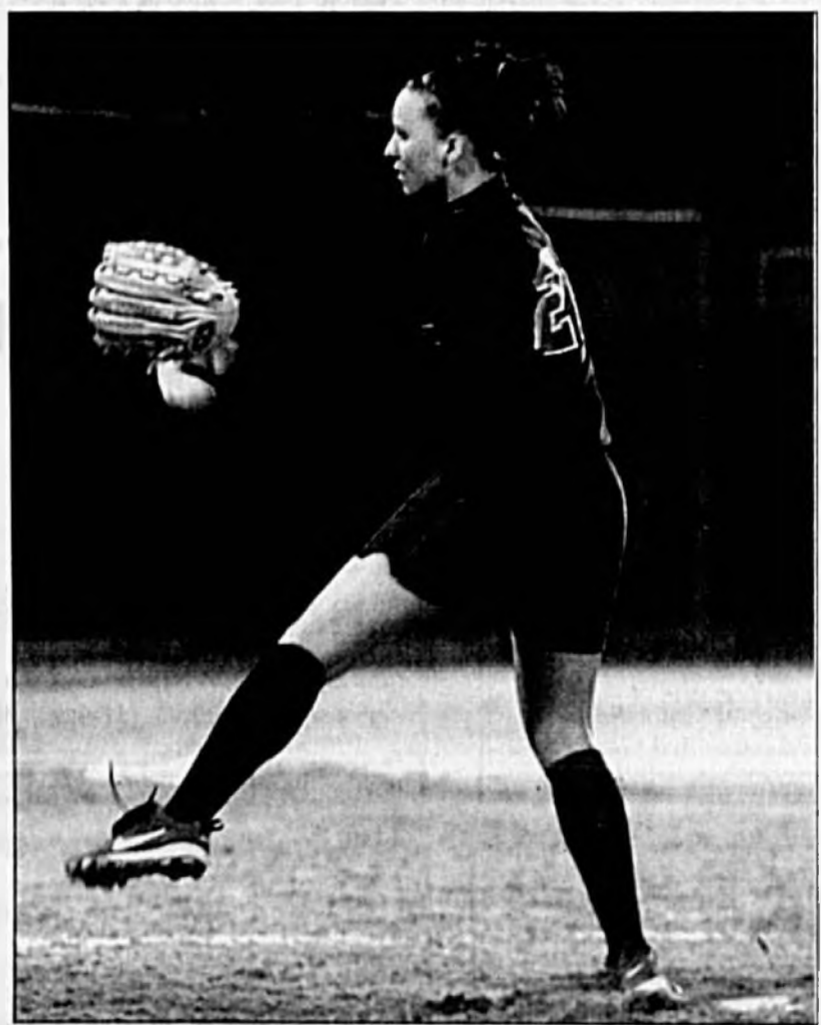

cullass bearing may need to be replaced.
* Check to make sure the rudderstock hasn't been bent.

* Inspect the hull for blisters, distortions and stress cracks.

* Make sure your engine intake sea strainer is free of corrosion and properly secured.

* Check the engine shaft and rudder stuffing boxes for looseness. After the boat is launched, be sure to check these as well as through-hulls for leaks.

* Use a hose to check for deck leaks at ports and hatches. Renew caulk or gaskets as necessary.

* If equipped, ensure that stern drain plug is installed.

OUTDRIVES and OUTBOARD ENGINES:

* Inspect rubber outdrive bellows for cracked, dried and/or deteriorated spots (look especially in the folds), and replace if suspect.

* Check power steering and power trim oil levels. Replace worn-out zincs.

* Inspect outer jacket of control cables. Cracks or swelling indicate corrosion and mean that the cable has to be replaced.

ENGINES and FUEL SYSTEMS:

* Inspect fuel lines, including fill and vent hoses, for softness, brittleness or cracking. Check all joints for leaks and make sure all lines are well supported with non-combustible clips or straps with smooth edges.

* Inspect fuel tanks, fuel pumps and filters for leaks. Clamps should be snug and free of rust. Clean fuel filters.

* Inspect cooling hoses and fittings for stiffness, rot, leaks and/or cracking. Make sure they fit snugly and are double-clamped.

* Every few years, remove and inspect exhaust manifold for corrosion.

* Clean and tighten electrical connections, especially both ends of battery cables. Wire-

brush battery terminals and fill cells with distilled water.

* Inspect bilge blower hose for leaks.

SAILBOAT RIGGING:

* Inspect fittings for cracks and rust. Inspect wire halyards and running backstays for "fishhooks" and rust.

* Remove tape on turnbuckles and lubricate threads, preferably with Teflon. Replace old tape with fresh tape.

* Recaulk through-deck chainplates as necessary (generally, once a decade).

TRAILERS:

* Inspect tire treads and sidewalls for cracks or lack of tread and replace as necessary. Check air pressure. Don't forget the spare!

* Inspect bearings and repack as necessary.

* Test tail and back-up lights. Test winch to make sure it's working properly.

* Inspect trailer frame for rust. Sand and paint to prevent further deterioration.

MISCELLANEOUS:

* Check expiration dates on flares and fire extinguishers.

* Check stove and remote tanks for loose fittings and leaking hoses.

* Inspect bilge pump and float switch to make sure it's working properly.

* Inspect dock and anchor lines for chafing.

* Update or replace old charts, waterway guides.

* Check shore power cable connections for burns, which indicates the cable needs to be replaced.

* Make sure your boating license and/or registration is up to date. Don't forget your trailer tags.

* Review your boat insurance policy and update coverage if needed. Be sure you have fuel spill insurance coverage.

* Make sure you have a properly sized and wearable life jackets in good condition for each passenger, including kids and pets.

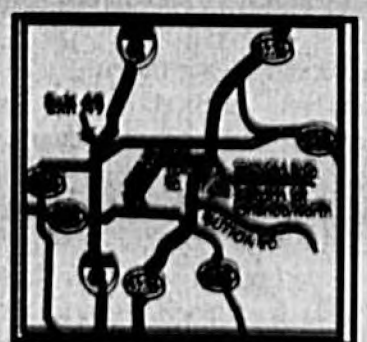

SAVING A SEA COW

SANFORD — Although the official grand opening of Sanford's new Riverwalk is still four weeks away, about 100 people gathered Monday at Palmetto Avenue and Seminole Boulevard for some afternoon excitement.

The attraction? Jax, an injured manatee who retreated to the western basin of the Monroe Harbour Marina.

A rescue team from SeaWorld Orlando managed to capture the manatee but not before Jax put on a show by escaping three times from the half-moon net the team used to finally ensnare him. Once captured Jax was taken to SeaWorld's manatee rehabilitation center for treatment of life-threatening injuries, including a penetrating chest wound, fractured ribs and fluid in the chest.

"The prognosis is poor," said Cara Allen, a spokesperson for SeaWorld. "That's based

New S.R. 417 link to I-95?

U.S. Congressman John L. Mica (7th District-R) has announced that key highway and trail projects in Seminole County have cleared the first hurdle, with passage of a major highway bill in the House of Representatives.

One of the projects would involve a connector between the Central Florida GreeneWay (State Road 417) and Interstate 95 in Volusia County, somewhere in the area of Port Orange or Edgewater.

"Right now, it's a big if," said Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) spokesman Steve Homan. "The money, if approved by the Senate, it would be only for a feasibility study to determine if the project would be viable and if it would, indeed, provide an alternative to traffic on Highway 17-92 and Interstate 4."

"This legislation provides critical funding that will advance construction on major transportation and infrastructure projects both in our region and

LAKE MARY — Weekend motorists in Lake Mary will experience a major inconvenience later this month when a portion of Lake Mary Boulevard is closed for at least two days.
