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Operations In Florida Fully Explained In His Statement Today

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Jan. 15.—(AP)—The Florida holdings of Charles Ponz, formerly of Boston, now operating a land syndicate with headquarters in this city, total 10,000 acres of land in the northern section of the state, according to a statement he issued here Thursday.

He claimed the land cost \$40 an acre including the cost of subdividing and putting it on the market.

His plan of operation was outlined in his statement. His syndicate finances, the purchase of Florida acreage through the issuance of \$10 units of indebtedness and also uses the money to subdivide the land into lots.

The lands are subdivided into 23 lots, 25 by 50 feet, to the acre, which are offered for sale at \$10 each. The investors in the syndicate plan to offer a return of 300 per cent in approximately 60 days time. The syndicate agrees to redeem at maturity each \$10 unit for three times its par value and offers to unit holders three ten dollar lots in exchange for each unit.

If the unit holders decline to accept the lots and request cash, the syndicate attempts to dispose of the lots for the unit holders. In the event the syndicate is unable to pay the cash, the unit holders must accept three ten dollar lots for each of their units.

Collier To Place His Florida Holdings On Market In Short Time

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Barrow G. Collier, multi-millionaire land owner of Florida, announced here Thursday he would place his holdings in the southern part of the state on the market in the near future. His Florida property amounts to more than 1,100,000 acres of land, which includes a major portion of Collier county.

He announced that the disposal of his property would take the form of one of the largest promotion and development projects in the history of the state. Plans were virtually completed he said, and previous announcement has been delayed to prevent subdivision of lands.

The property will be sold to developers only, he said, and speculation would be discouraged. The property he owns has been under intensive development during the past few years, he announced.

"In comparing Sanford with other cities in Florida, the subject of population must be considered. With this thought in mind it can be conservatively stated that few towns of a similar population throughout the state can show more modern development than is found in Sanford."

In other sections of his book, Mr. Fox lauds the many attractions of this community, stressing the wealth and resources derived from the fields, and touching on the equable climate and wealth of tourist attractions to be found in the state.

Miss Abby Doudney, county nurse, and Dr. Charles Duffin, state health officer in charge of this district discussed the campaign being waged by the health department to induce every parent to permit children to take the active test, and explained at length the nature of the test and the beneficial results that were expected to result from a knowledge of exactly how many children were immune to diphtheria.

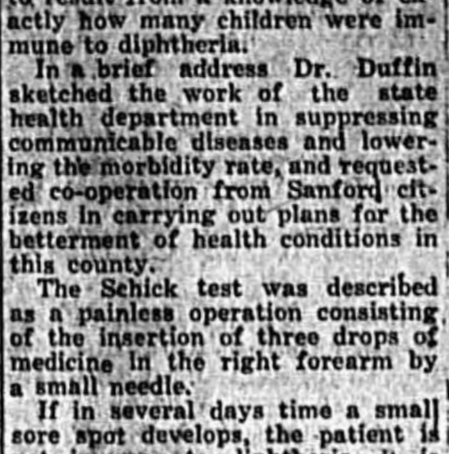

The Unfortunate F. E. C.

We read about another train wreck on the Florida East Coast the other day. Three people were killed and twenty injured. Ordinarily these train wrecks don't get into the papers. Railroad officials don't think it makes good reading. But this time, W. C. Durant, well known automobile manufacturer, happened to be one of the victims, and newspapers just had to account for his scratches as well as the special train which immediately took him to New York.

At first it was thought that the millionaire had cracked his skull, but it later developed that he had only cut himself while shaving. Railroad officials were further congratulating themselves that the three men killed were only negroes. It wouldn't have made much difference if they had been white people, but the negroes gave them no concern at all.

As we understand the details of the accident, Mr. Durant's private car was attached to the end of train eighty-six. Train number thirty-six was following closely. As to further details there seem to be two versions. The first is that train eighty-six slowed down so as to take a curve with greater comfort to passengers and thirty-six, not being advised that trains were to slow down for curves, naturally crashed into the rear of the other train.

But by far the more generally accepted theory is that the engineer of thirty-six, doubtless knowing that he himself must be followed on the Florida East Coast Railroad very closely by another train, and seeming to be between the devil and the deep blue sea, elected to run into the train ahead, rather than be crashed into behind.

The F. E. C. was nice to Mr. Durant—he can have no kick coming. The F. E. C. furnished him with a brand new special train and rushed him and his injured face to New York, and so far as we have been able to learn that train got through without a mishap. That's more than the F. E. C. would have done for anybody else. They might have provided any ordinary millionaire with a special train but they wouldn't probably have wrecked it before they got it out of the state.

But that's all right. We are betting on the F. E. C. anyway. We are betting that some day the F. E. C. is going to get a train down the East Coast without a single wreck and without killing anybody, and then all these people who are saying that it isn't a good and efficient railroad, and is just out to make money and isn't trying to give the people the best of service, will feel ashamed and be sorry.

Motoring To Florida

Although thousands of winter visitors are coming to Florida by train, many by ship and a few by airplane, the largest number appears to be coming by automobile. Every highway leading into the state is crowded by an almost continuous line of motor cars making their way to the "Land of Sunshine."

As Brisbane Sees It

The Pay of Judges. The Right Air Force. See It Good For You. Our Land is Booming. By ARTHUR BRISBANE Copyright 1925 by Star Co.

CONGRESS SHOULD not neglect at this season, the question of decent pay for federal judges. All the judges in the national service are underpaid. For justice on the supreme bench and all through the federal judicial service, the shamefully inadequate pay is a disgrace to the richest nation in the world.

It is impossible of course for the judges to make any campaign on their own behalf. But the country that depends upon them for justice and protection should pay them at least enough to live decently.

LIEUTENANT COLONEL Foulke, commanding air forces at Mitchell Field, says there should be a great "terminal" for airships in the east, located on the Newark Meadows, west of Jersey City, close to New York, connected with New York by subway.

The idea is sound, including the suggestion of an elevated landing field. Connected with it there could be a great minimum expense, a waterlanding for the navy's hydroaeroplanes, thoroughly sheltered. This plan had previously been suggested by Dwight Morrow, head of the President's air committee.

NEWARK, JERSEY City, Hoboken, Elizabethport and New York City are destined to be one great city with forty millions of people, equaling in population England or France. An adequate air terminal, in the center of that future city should be bought and built by the government now, for post office and commercial flying in peace, and other things in war. It wouldn't be any war, if we had the right commercial fleet.

That's why President Coolidge constantly urges the development of commercial aviation.

SIMILAR GREAT combination landing fields for hydroaeroplanes and other airplanes should be established in the principal cities of the nation, Chicago, San Francisco, Seattle, Los Angeles, New Orleans, Galveston, etc.

Corn prices are low, "hogs are high." This puzzles farmers and packers. Corn and hog prices should go up and down together, since the pig is really corn, changed into meat. There is always something to puzzle and distress the nation's organization, and after election day, he hasn't much influence in government, compared with railroads and other big financial units.

AT THE Midday Luncheon Club in New York you can see eating at the same time, those that could not get together in the old days. Farmers are attracted all over the land, and if you could get them together, there wouldn't be any hall that could hold them.

OUR BRITISH brothers have also their worries. The year just closed is the worst for trade in Britain's modern history, the balance of trade has lost two billions of dollars against the British. Forty-five million additional pounds of imports, a total of thirty-five million pounds of exports make a British unhappiness. But they "muddle" through in the British way, and will come out on top.

UNCLE SAM is riding along on velvet. Severe competition abroad and in the world's market at home, said to be ahead of our producers. But every year, concluding providence, seems to be with us now.

THE CITY of Cardiff, in England, makes a wise experiment, fighting the taste for whiskey by selling good hot soup at two cents a bowl. This nation does not appreciate the value of good soup.

LAWYERS AND LAW

DEARBORN INDEPENDENT

Mr. Schlesinger is a lawyer. He is quoted as saying that if Blackstone were here now he would be working in someone's law library for \$100 a month. It is not knowledge of the law, he says, that counts, it is the ability to make somebody take your view of the law.

That uncovers the sore of lawyer law. Perhaps it goes deeper and uncovers the utter futility of all human law in the absence of rational behavior and good will. The law, we know, cannot prevent crime. Perhaps it is outside human possibility that law should do this. Disputants could settle their disputes with justice; judges sometimes could, if permitted. But not the law.

Yet, on entering the polling booth the citizen does not require that he shall compel someone to take his view of his right to vote; the law gives him the right, and he exercises it. On entering a bank, the depositor does not require to bring the cashier over to his view of his right to draw on his account; the law gives him the right, and he exercises it. But immediately the law gets into its own special territory, that is, the courts, it ceases to have such directness of operation, such automatic effectiveness. In the name of the law the plaintiff puts up his claim, and in the name of the law the defendant denies it, and the stronger lawyer is able to make the worse side the better case.

In such instances the law is merely Marquis of Queensberry's rules for legal fistfights. It stays here in where you must fight, and this is how you must fight. It does not say: Law decides this, therefore there is no fight. In true law, however, it would be the law that fights—for the rights assailed, against the wrongs assailed. But our laws do not fight; they are but rules as to how the lawyers shall fight. And of course, in such case Mr. Blackstone will always have to take a back seat for Mr. Schlesinger. Until such time, at least, as laws become automatically operative and not dependent on unscrupulousness of practitioners in litigation.

Wilhelm Hohenzollern, late Kaiser of Germany, is more useful in his place of retirement in Doorn, than he was in the imperial palace in Potsdam, Germany. In Doorn he frequently says things and does things which furnish amusement for the population of the globe, which is more than he did when he wore a crown and claimed co-partnership with Herr Gott.

The funny thing about the ex-kaiser at the present time is that he still takes himself seriously. It is quite amusing. He is under the impression that a considerable part of the population of Germany is longing for a restoration of the Hohenzollern regime, and he does not propose to resume that regime until he is given a nicely engraved invitation to do so.

At any rate, this is the gist of a recent interview which he has given the world. Here are his exact words: "I will not return to Germany unless the people over-throw the present regime and demand my restoration." If these are his final words, his unwavering determination, it is safe to say that he has a permanent residence in Doorn. It is quite difficult to believe that the people of Germany are sufficiently repentant of their treatment of Wilhelm to abjectly beg his pardon, or that they are sufficiently desirous of the restoration of the monarchy to demand his return. In fact, there is apparently only a small group of people of small influence who are harboring the idea of a restored monarchy.

Northern Farmers Profit In Florida

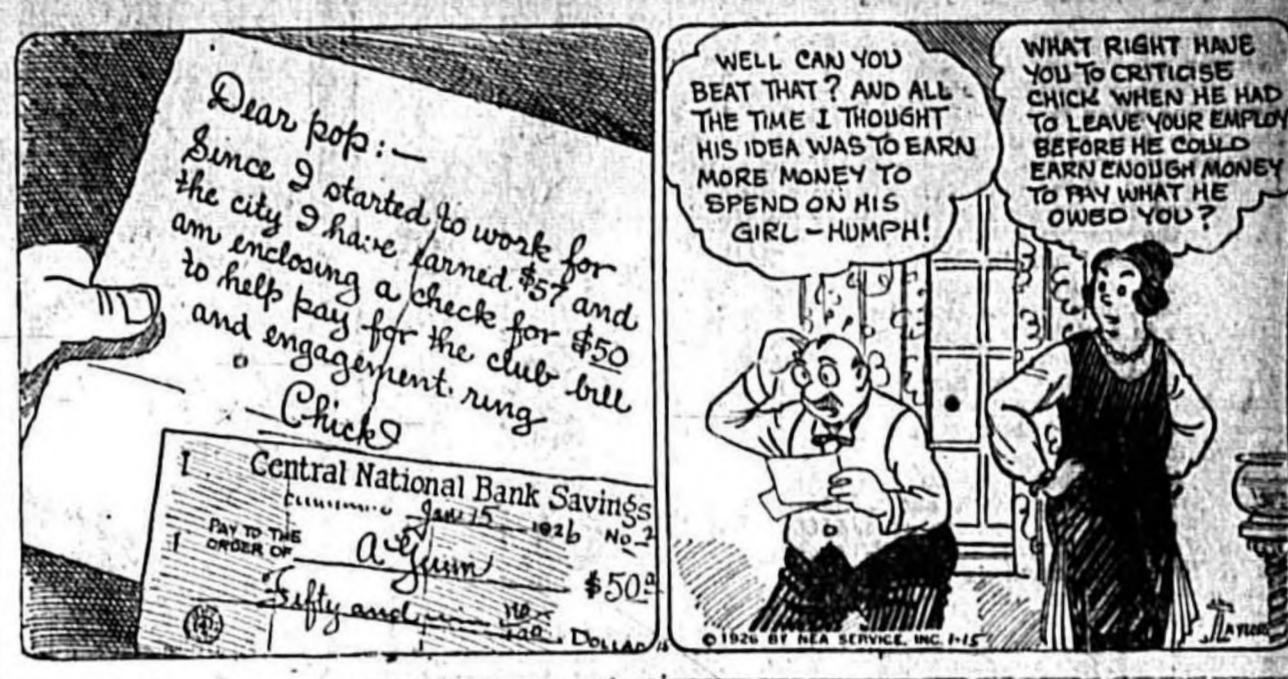

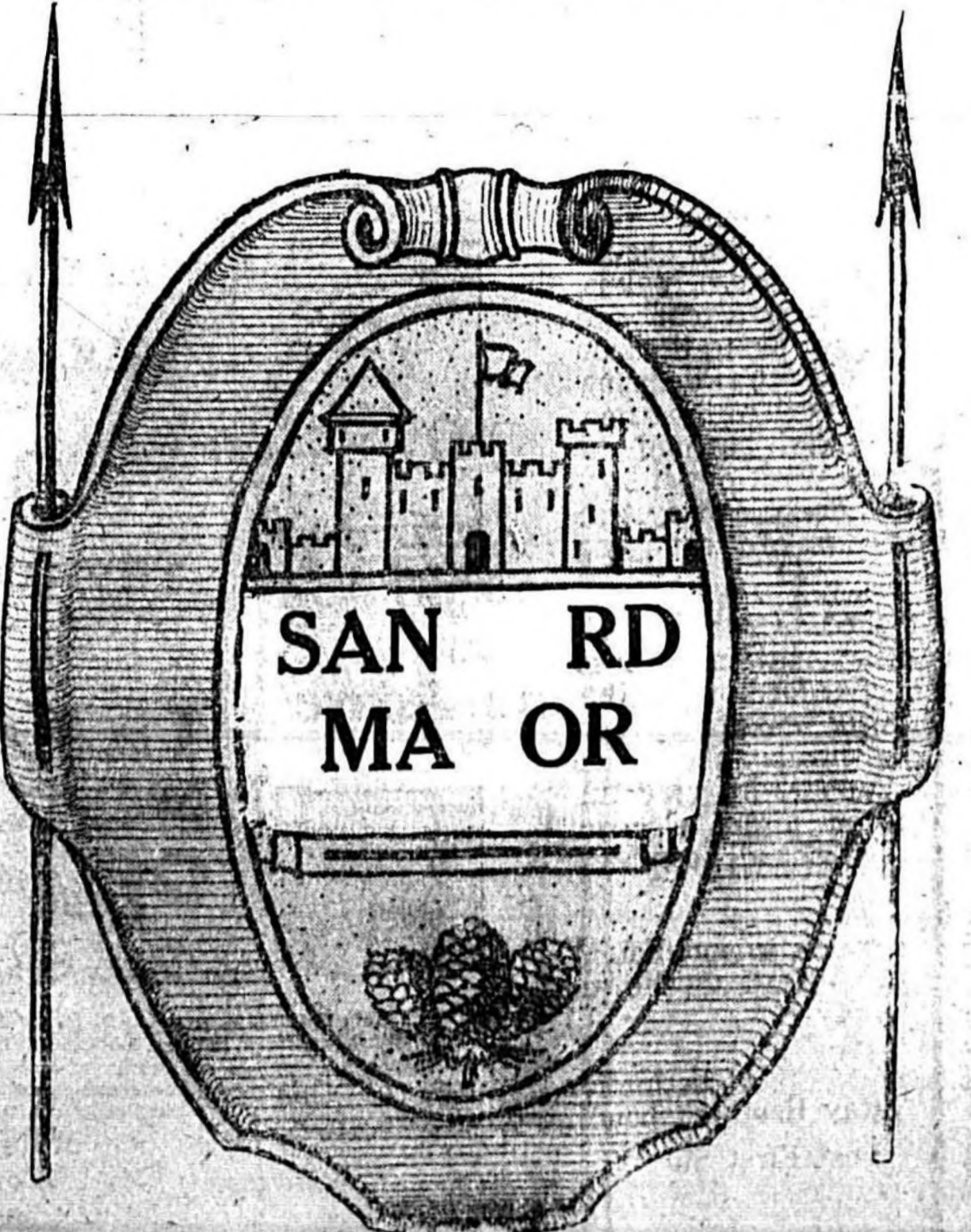

Coffin Of Pedro Menendez De Avilez To Be Preserved In Davis Shores Vault

ST. AUGUSTINE, Jan. 15.—Don Pedro Menendez de Avilez, millionaire builder of Davis Shores, \$50,000,000 real estate development on Anastasia Island, directly across the Matanzas River from St. Augustine, will preserve for posterity the most ancient relic that has any connection with the city—a relic that is considered priceless by antiquarians.

The relic is the coffin in which the bones of Don Pedro Menendez de Avilez, adelantado of Florida and founder of St. Augustine, rested for more than 250 years. The coffin will be placed in a specially built mausoleum on Davis Shores.

This coffin now rests in a vault in St. Augustine. It was brought to this city recently by Don L. Cuesta, Sr., wealthy cigar manufacturer of Tampa, who brought it from Spain for the City of St. Augustine after it had been presented to this community by the Spanish government as the only tangible relic of the man who had established the first white settlement in the western hemisphere.

Brought From Spain

The coffin of Menendez, of fine hard wood, was discovered a few years ago in a niche in a cathedral at Avilez, the home city of the founder of the island settlement in America. After nearly 400 years Spain had decided to pay some mark of tribute to the man who first planted her flag on the North American continent, and it was determined to remove the bones of Menendez from the wooden coffin, place them in a new steel casket, and entomb them in a mausoleum.

In August, 1924, a delegation of citizens of St. Augustine and Florida went to Spain to be the guests of the Spanish government

at the ceremonies lasting three days at Avilez when the bones of Menendez were transferred to their new resting place. All the negotiations incidental to this trip were made by Mr. Cuesta, who has a summer home in Spain.

In the party were John B. Stegson, Jr., of Deland, president of the National Historical Association; Mrs. Jeannette Thurder Connor, authoress of early Spanish colonization historical sketches; Mr. Cuesta and Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Goode, Senator and Mrs. A. M. Taylor, Miss Edith Taylor, Col. and Mrs. W. A. Mac Williams, Robert R. Scott, Frederick S. Vail and Edward G. Vail, all of St. Augustine, and Frank W. Nix of Hastings and New York.

Mr. Stegson was intrusted with the headboard of the coffin which he now has in the North, treating it with a process which will preserve it forever. Mr. Cuesta had charge of the coffin until a month ago when the city commission of St. Augustine made Mr. Davis the official custodian with the provision that he erect a mausoleum or museum in which the coffin will be displayed to the public, with proper safeguards. The building and ground on which it will stand will be deeded to the city.

Students of history declare that while the first settlement of the Spaniards in America was made on the mainland, a few hundred yards from Davis Shores, without doubt Menendez, when he arrived in the Matanzas River late in August, 1565, "men" have landed first on that part of Anastasia Island which is now Davis Shores to make the reconnaissance of the harbor. Sir Francis Drake, who burned St. Augustine and Governor Ortelrophe, who bombarded it, when they came later, landed there.

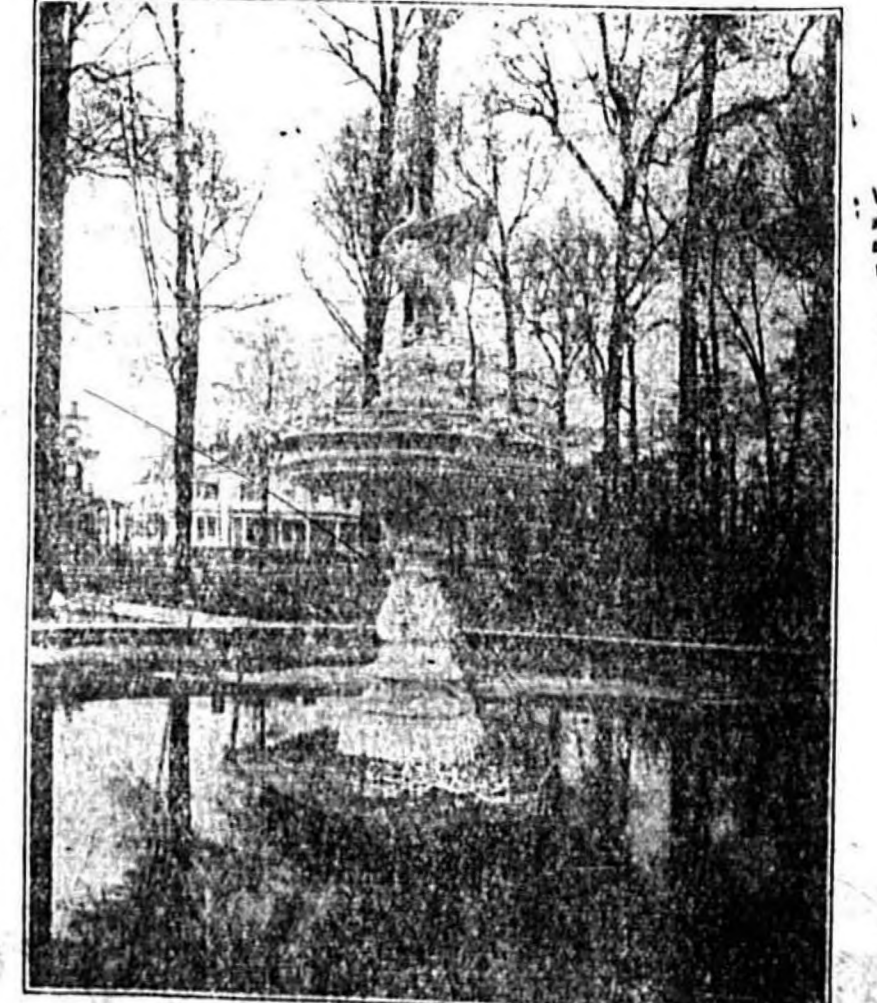

In the absence of E. G. Sewell, of Miami, vice president of the East Coast organization, Alfred Wark, president of the Greater Palm Beach Chamber of Commerce was elected vice president of the organization.

Following the adoption of resolutions extending a vote of thanks to Titusville and Titusville Chamber of Commerce, the meeting adjourned to meet again at Vero Beach in April.

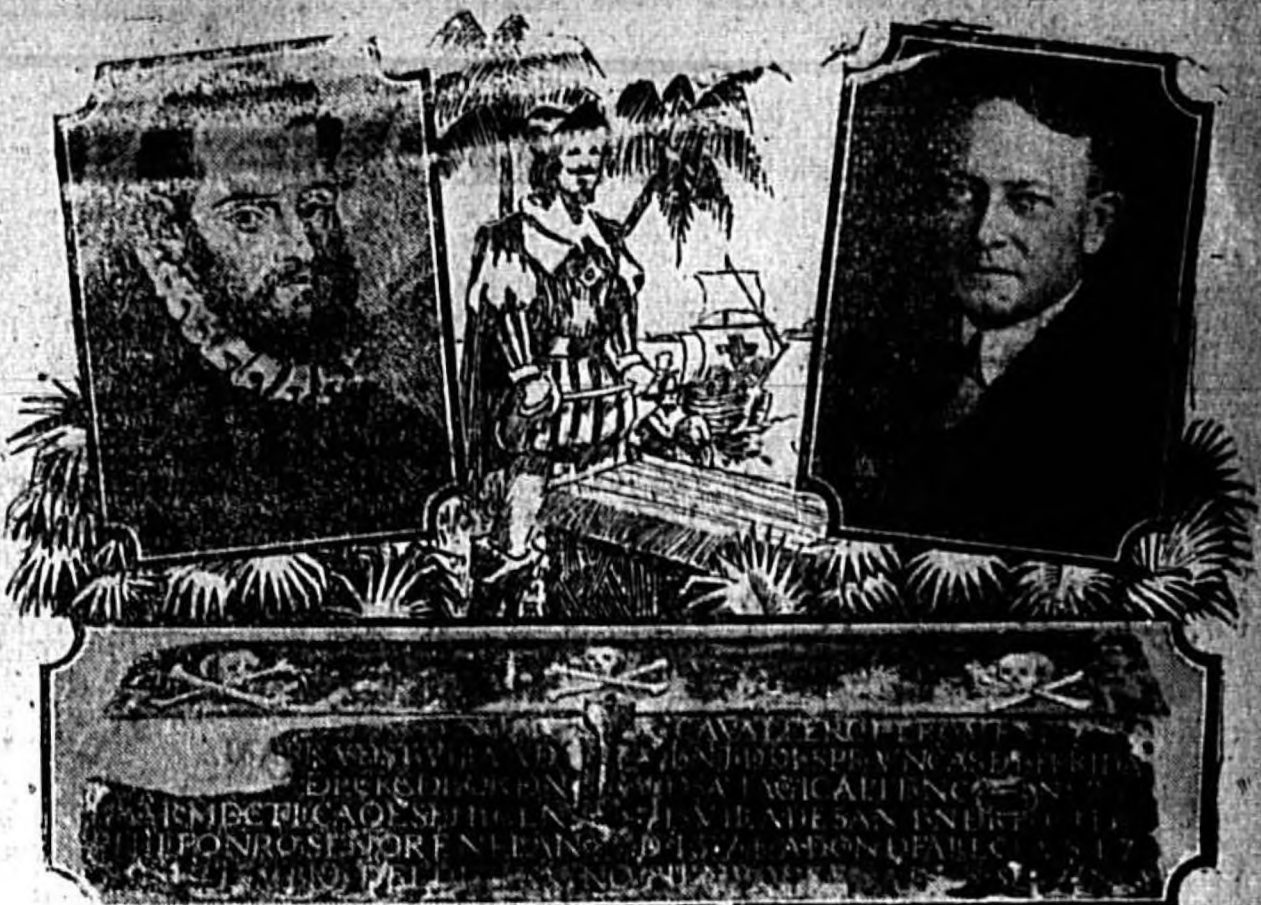

HOUSE TO VOTE ON FIVE OTHER DEBT MATTERS

Approval Given Settlement With Italy By Vote Of 257 To 133; Payments Extend Over Period Of 62 Years
17 Republicans Are Against Agreements
Mussolini Government Comes In For Bitter Attack By Rainey, Illinois Democrat
WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—The Belgian war debt settlement was approved today by the House.
By a vote of 214 to 24 it passed and sent to the Senate a resolution to authorize acceptance of the terms as recommended by the American debt commission.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Having approved by a vote of 257 to 133 the Italian war debt settlement, the House turned today to five other debt agreements with no expectation of development of similar opposition to them.
The agreement, described by its proponents as amounting to a virtual cancellation of the debt, binds Italy to pay this country \$2,407,000 in exchange for the \$1,848,000 originally borrowed, the payments extending over 62 years.
In the voting, 113 Democrats who were opposed to acceptance of the settlement, were joined by 17 Republicans, two independents and one Socialist while 13 were paired against the proposal and 17 did not vote.
The Mussolini government came under the debate as well as the settlement itself, Representative Rainey, Democrat of Illinois, picturing the premier as a "cruel and vicious" character, charging him with destroying the liberties of his people.
Representative Garrett, of Tennessee, Democratic leader, Representative Rabhorn of Illinois, Republican, and Hull, Democrat of Tennessee, also were prominent in the opposition.
Terms of the settlement were defended as fair and equitable by Chairman Green of the Ways and Means Committee, which presented the acceptance resolution and Representative Burton, Republican, and Crisp, Democrat of Georgia, who served with the debt commission.
The remaining debt settlements are those with Latvia, Estonia, Belgium, Rumania, and Czechoslovakia.

Missouri Man, 68, Is Swindled Out Of \$10,000 By Con Men
MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 16.—(AP)—A Missouri farmer, bent with the weight of his 68 years, a victim of a \$10,000 swindle by confidence men, has retraced his steps to his farm home at Sheridan, Mo.
"I thought that I could make a few cents and believe in the men who seemed so gentlemanly and business like," was the only comment W. W. Aldrich would make to local police before his departure.
The swindle scheme started in Hot Springs, Ark., on Dec. 26, with the idea of "playing the exchange" on tips, as a back ground.
Aldrich was induced to mortgage his farm and with his savings, which totalled \$10,000, played into the hands of three men, one of which called himself E. Burns, another a Mr. Taxton and the third unidentified.
After spending an anxious 24 hours following the disclosure of the swindle, the farmer sought the aid of police here. Descriptions of the men were wired to principal cities near Memphis and a thorough search of the city made, but the men have not been found.

FORMER SOLON ENTERS PRISON FOR TWO YEARS

John W. Langley, For Twenty Years Congressman From Kentucky, Begins Sentence Of 2 Years In Liquor Case
Suffers From Mental Strain, He Declares
"I Am Going To Be A Model Prisoner," Says Ex-Representative At Prison Door
ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 16.—(AP)—John W. Langley, for 20 years congressman from Kentucky, entered the Atlanta Federal penitentiary here this morning to begin serving a two year sentence imposed for violation of the national prohibition law.
Stating that he was suffering from high blood pressure and from a tremendous mental strain undergone during the past few weeks on account of his impending imprisonment, the former Kentucky congressman had to be assisted up the steps of the Southern station.
Mr. Langley, who is a Fullman at the station, Mr. Langley chatted for a few minutes with newspaper men and posed for photographs.
"I am going to make a model prisoner," he stated "and I am confident that the public eventually will realize my innocence."
Langley was convicted two years ago with two other men for conspiracy to remove 1,200 cases of liquor from the Belle of Andros, a distillery in Kentucky. The case was appealed to the supreme court, which confirmed the conviction.

Mexican Forecasts Amicable Treaty On Petroleum Acts
MEXICO CITY, Jan. 16.—(AP)—In the opinion of Luis Morones, minister of trade and commerce, indications are most favorable for an agreement between Mexico and the government with regard to the details of a petroleum act. The Mexican government is expected to make its position known in the next few days.
"The Mexican government," he said in a statement to the Associated Press, "has only one desire in its relations with the petroleum industry—to make it cash dry enore in the same protection of law and moral aid of the authorities as Mexican investors."
"There is no reason for doubting the spirit of abundant welcome with which Mexico always has received and always will receive foreign business men who are disposed to comply with the laws of the Mexican republic."
"The Mexican government reportedly has said that foreign investors will find in Mexico magnificent opportunities. They are magnificent in the prospect of a new moral aid of the authorities as Mexican investors."

Girl Killed When Auto Turns Turtle
ST. AUGUSTINE, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Miss Katherine Casey of Pittsfield, Mass., was killed, and R. B. Jones of St. Augustine, was severely shaken up and bruised when the automobile in which they were with two others, were crossing the Anastasia Island causeway, turned turtle late last night.
Two of the four occupants were uninjured and the car, which turned two complete somersaults covering a distance of nearly 100 feet, was a total loss. Local authorities are making an effort to communicate with the dead girl's relatives.

Whittle Case Is Nearing End In Circuit Court
State Resists Case Against Former Employee Of Bell Telephone Company Facing Charge Embezzling Funds
Essie Whittle, former employee of the Southern Bell Company, is being tried today in circuit court on a charge of embezzlement which grew out of alleged discrepancies in the handling of the money and books belonging to the company during the time she was employed at the local office.
It was brought out at the trial that Miss Whittle first started the company's service in 1919 and that she left in March, 1928 after being off duty for several weeks owing to illness. It is said to be the contention of the state, for the defense that any alleged misuse of company funds might have taken place during the defendant's absence from her duties.
At 1:30 o'clock the person the state retires the case and Miss Whittle was called to the stand in her own defense. The evidence is expected to be entirely in the hands of the jury before 6 o'clock.
Attorneys Landis and Fish of St. Land and J. G. Sharrow of Sanford, are counsel for the defendant. M. B. Smith is prosecuting attorney.

Sixteen Officers Of National Guard Visitors In Sanford
Sixteen National Guard officers from many states were met at the station and welcomed to this city this afternoon by E. W. Pearson, chairman of the local Chamber of Commerce, who was advised of their coming in a telegram received from Adjutant General Foster.
The officers are touring Florida following a convention held at St. Augustine, attended by representatives of practically every National Guard organization in the United States.
"It is a great pity that these men could not find time to stop over in this community for a study of local conditions," Mr. Pearson said in commenting on their visit, "but their schedule prevents them from staying longer than a few hours in any city in this section of the state."
Officials of the local National Guard units assisted Secretary Pearson in welcoming the visitors to Sanford.

Building, Engineering Contracts In Country Surpassed All Records
NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Building and engineering contracts in the U. S. during 1932 surpassed all previous records, a compilation by F. W. Dodge Corporation estimating the total conservatively at \$6,808,000, shows.
Not only was the volume larger beyond all precedent, but it continued at a record breaking rate up to the end of December, when it stood at \$5,000,000.
Total construction in 32 states, exclusive of Texas and the far western states, was computed at \$5,217,000,000, an increase of 30 per cent. over 1931, which was a record year. The estimated value total for the entire country showed a 24 per cent increase over 1931.
Building for residential purposes led the construction with \$1,517,000,000, or 23 per cent of the total. Other leading categories included public buildings and utilities, commercial buildings, manufacturing, and transportation.

Wallace Is Arrested In Connection With Beach Narcotic Case
CINCINNATI, O., Jan. 16.—(AP)—Jack Wallace, fugitive from justice under indictment in Chicago in connection with the Beach narcotic case, was arrested by Federal agents here last night. Wallace is also said to be wanted at Omaha, San Francisco and other cities on charges of larceny and burglary.
According to William J. Callahan, and William J. Spillane, government agents, they recognized the fugitive on the street and arrested him. He held them in custody until last Thursday when he was released from Miami, Fla., where he had been for several months.
Describing his flight from Chicago, the federal men said he was an involved story of being threatened with death unless he left the city immediately. He left the city before the Beach narcotic case was scheduled for trial.

Mercier's Condition Shows Little Change

Proposed Bill Puts Anthracite Industry In Coolidge's Hands

Resolution Presented By New York Solon After First Motion Is Strongly Opposed
Strike's End Would Finish U. S. Control
Former Miners Refuse To Make Appeal To The Chief Executive
WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—A resolution proposing that President Coolidge seize and control the anthracite coal industry for duration of the strike was introduced today by Senator Copeland, Democrat of New York, after action on his proposal that the president be requested to act, had been blocked by opposition from both sides of the chamber.
Urging prompt action, the senator said the present situation is "fraught with imminent danger to the public health."
The resolution was presented shortly after it was alleged at the White House yesterday that the president regards the government as unable to act in the controversy, until Congress provides legislation permitting intervention in industrial disputes.
Senator Copeland first offered a joint resolution empowering the president to act but he scrapped it in favor of the simple request because of the delay which would be entailed in passage of a resolution through the usual legislative channels of both chambers.
Congressional action in the coal situation is also being opposed by several members of the mining industry conferred yesterday with Secretary Davis of the Labor Department. They did not ask for special action in the handling of the industry, but they sought a change in the terms of the coal act of 1931.
The report states that the operators in the New York conference "did not change their attitude which they assumed on Jan. 9 at Atlantic City, and they persistently insisted that no settlement should not provide for a continued and permanent arbitration of wages and conditions would be considered.
The refusal of the operators to join in a petition to Congress to pass legislation to regulate the industry gave evidence that their only desire for arbitration is to reduce the wage of the mine workers and permit their profits to be regulated by themselves.

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
