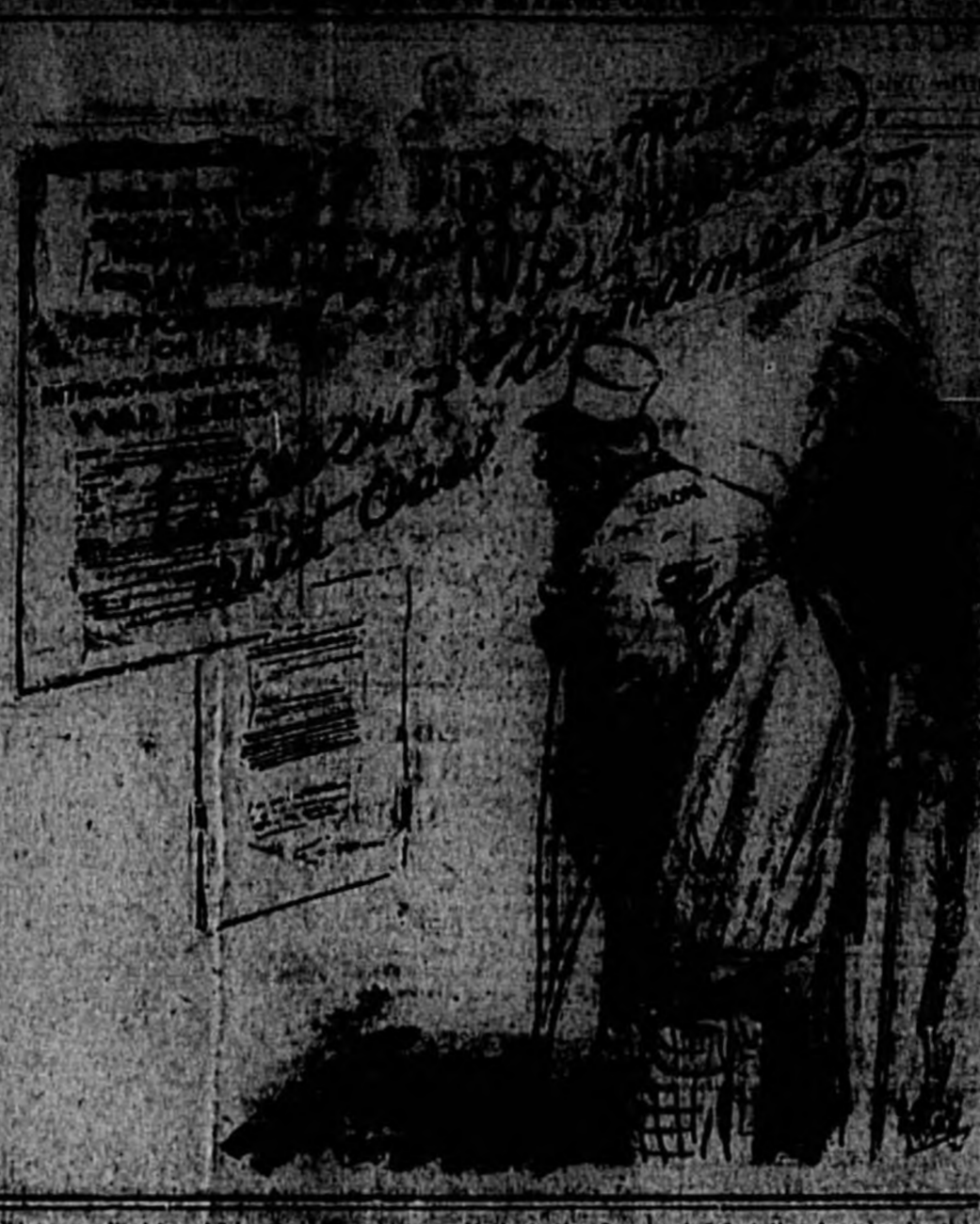

## HOOVER'S DEBT PLAN STRIKES FRENCH S N A G

importance.

France contends that the international credits to be extended back to Germany out of that Nation's payments of "unconditional annuities into the bank for international settlements be repaid within five years."

The American Government claims this is too short a period for refunding if real relief is to be had. It insists on 25 years but might agree to a shorter period, if it is more than five years.

The United States has indicated it cannot give assurances on a demand by France for relief from her obligations under the Young plan to deposit \$500,000,000 richmarks in guarantees in the bank for international settlements if Germany voluntarily declares a moratorium in the future. America contends this is a question for France to settle with the other Young plan signatories, for whom the guarantee is provided. The United States did not sign the Young plan.

America is submitting the counter proposal of 25 years for the refunding considered, a high authority of the administration said, that such a plan was fair to all concerned.

Officially hailed as a "magnificent gesture" action by Italy in immediately putting the President's plan into effect for her debtors. State Department officials expressed the hope other nations would follow the example.

The President's plan contemplated the beginning of the moratorium as of midnight last night. Technical experts expressed the view the lack of agreement at that hour would not affect the plan if an accord is reached later. It could be retroactive, they said.

The United States would not be directly affected by a delay.

Administration officials were loathe last night to speculate on what course would be followed if France and the United States are unable to agree.

Two courses appeared to be open to the other powers, if France does not enter a general agreement for a moratorium. One would be to proceed with a moratorium among the other powers, with France collecting only unconditional annuities from Germany and paying full war debts to her creditors. The other would be some arrangement for a direct financial assistance for Germany and other needy powers through credits sufficient to tide over the acute period.

## Accused Slayers Of Vivian Gordon Acquitted By Jury

NEW YORK, July 1.—(AP)—The slaying of Vivian Gordon, vice witness, remained officially unsolved today when a Bronx jury acquitted Harry Stein and Emanuel Greenberg of her murder.

The verdict, after a trial of more than two weeks, was returned at 4:20 P. M. The jury received the case at noon.

The two men were arrested on Apr. 8, more than one month after the body of Miss Gordon, alleged blackmailer and vice inquiry witness, was found strangled to death.

The contention of the state, based principally upon the testimony of Harry Schiltren, self-confessed driver of the automobile in which the woman was slain, was that Stein and Greenberg had killed her because a man referred to in the trial merely as "Hado-loff" desired her out of the way.

Neither of the defendants took the stand during the trial, basing their defense mainly on alibis. Stein's sister, a night club performer, testified he was at a movie on the night of the murder, and Greenberg declared that for a period of seven days including the murder night he did not leave the apartment of his sister where he observed the orthodox Jewish period of mourning for his mother.
