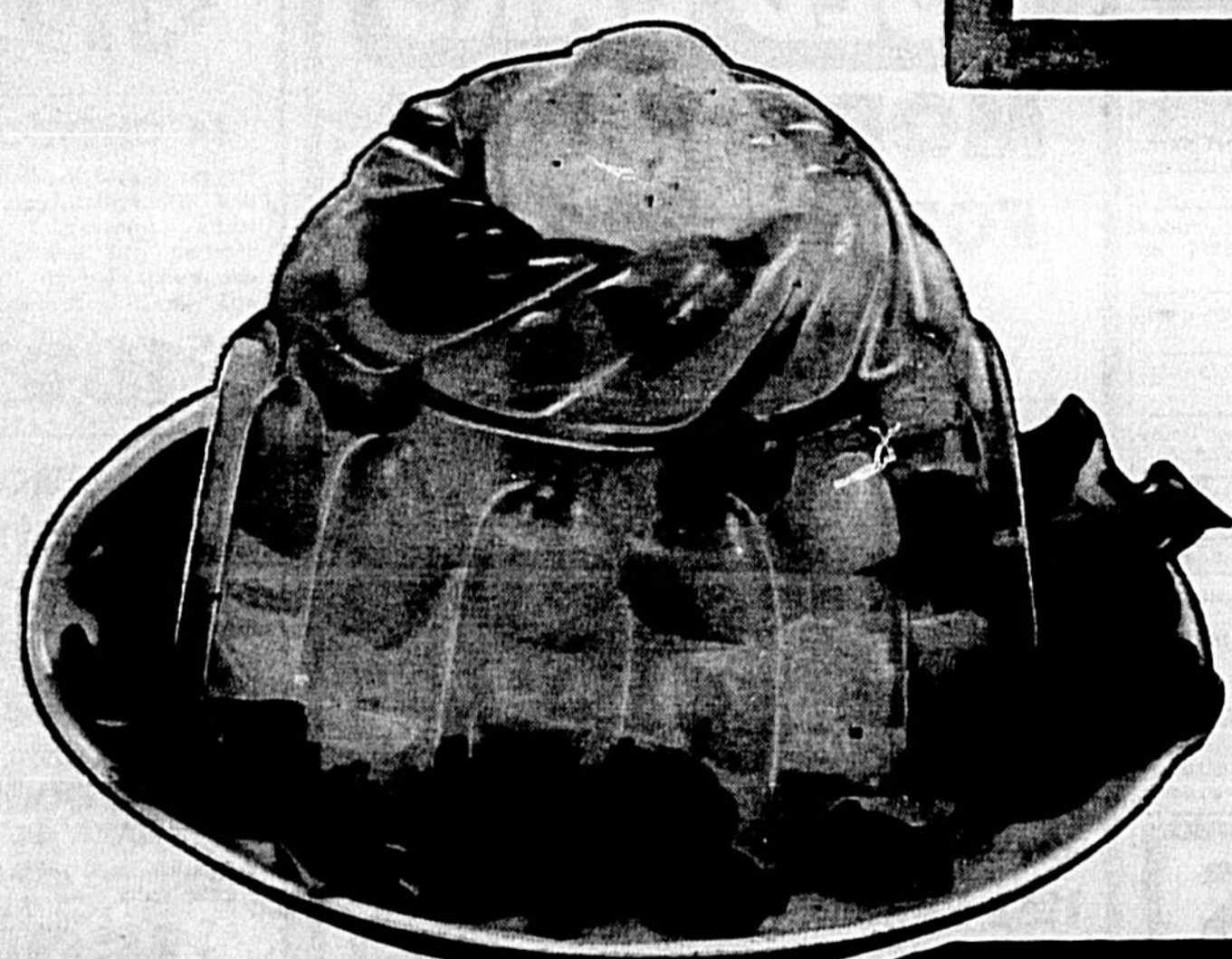

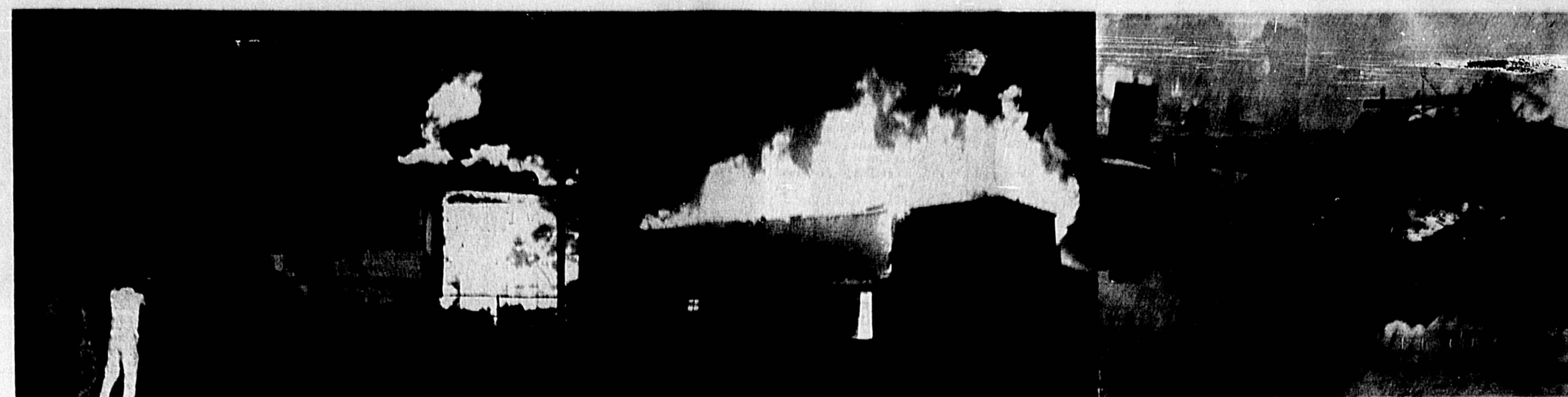

Flames Destroy Navy Base Exchange

Loss Tops \$200,000

Charred ruins of what had been the Navy Exchange building at Sanford Naval Air Station were being examined today to determine what caused the blaze which destroyed the structure housing the dining room and cafeteria, post office, dry cleaning shop, theater and exchange (department store).

Flames discovered at five minutes after midnight this morning razed the building, with an estimated loss of \$175,000 to the contents, all covered by insurance. There was no estimate as to the dollar loss of the building.

Memphis officials were awaiting word from Washington, D. C., whether the exchange building will be replaced in view of the proposed deactivation two years hence. There was some conjecture that, instead of rebuilding, the fire may speed up deactivation.

Two sailors on their way for some night fishing, AMEL H. C. Doster and AMES J. Wentz, saw smoke coming from vents of the cafeteria kitchen and sounded the alarm at 12:05 a.m.

The station fire department responded, and then called in the station fire and crash department (for airplane disasters). With the blaze out of control at 1 a.m., calls were sent out for help to the Sanford Fire Department, Glindeville and Longwood volunteer fire departments and they responded.

Three firemen suffered minor injuries in fighting the blaze.

Cash and other valuables were removed from safes at about 1:30 a.m. and ammunition for sale from the exchange section at 2 a.m.

There was some fear the high winds would spread the blaze to the adjacent dispensary but firemen prevented this. Paints and other garden supplies were removed at 3 a.m.

The ruins were still smoldering at 5 a.m.

It was ironical that the blaze occurred on the final day of duty here for the exchange officer, Lt. Robert Gable, who was relieved today by Lt. (jg) James Hurliutt.

It also was ironical that the fire occurred only two weeks before the departure of the base commanding officer, Capt. C. W. Swanson, due to be relieved Aug. 31 for another assignment after two years here.

N. Orlando Police Chief Quits Post

North Orlando Village Council will meet in special session at 7:30 p.m. Friday to act upon resignations of Police Chief Lawrence Phillips and Councilman Jack Hipp and to fill by appointment at least two vacancies on the zoning board.

Phillips, who took over the job as police chief the first week in July, told The Herald today that "although I realize that the salary (\$200 per month) was when I accepted the office, I have found it inadequate to meet today's high costs of living and feel council will be unable to find any qualified man to do the job for this amount of money unless he has part time work elsewhere."

He said he "realizes council is working on a most limited budget but do feel that with re-examination, the salary could possibly be raised to \$300 per month if a co-operative attitude is received from the people."

Phillips, who as yet has not been invited to attend Friday night's meeting, said, however, he will "and if invited, to explain my situation and views to council and the public if they will listen with an open mind."

He stated that he is offered only in a constructive manner with no intention of adding to the troubles of a council which already has a thankless job."

He urges that for future growth and prosperity of the village, greater co-operation be established between council and citizens to provide adequate police and fire protection as well as to promote the area as an attractive location for homeowners and possible light industry. In his opinion, he stated, the village now is "a healthy giant that's dying — a sick King Kong. Every person out here should become a one-man Chamber of Commerce."

Phillips' resignation, effective Sept. 1, has been turned in with request that he be released immediately, if possible.

Hipp, who was appointed to fill the group 2 council seat after resignation of Ewington Harville shortly after his election March 15, has moved from the village.

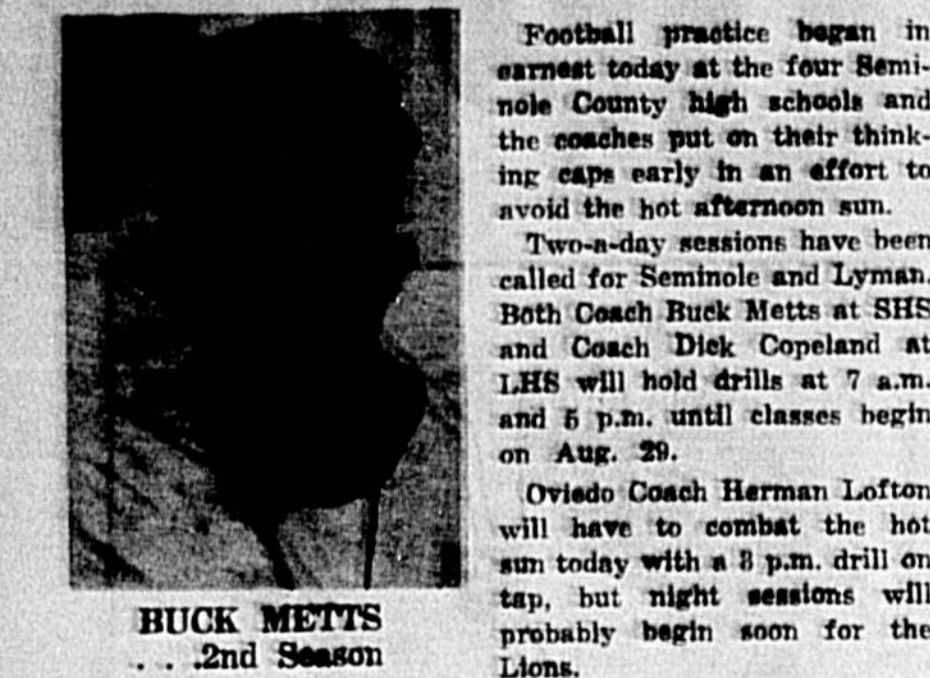

Blame Laid In XB70 Loss

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Air Force said it has taken disciplinary action against three colonels and a civilian for helping to stage an unauthorized publicity stunt that ended in the death of two top pilots and the loss of a \$500 million plane.

Air Force Secretary Harold S. Brown, in an investigative report, charged that the ill-fated formation flight June 8 over Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., was made for the sole benefit of General Electric and without proper authorization from Washington, GE, which built engines for five planes involved, wanted to use pictures of the flight for advertising.

In the report to Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara, Brown said that one colonel had been removed from his job, while two other colonels and a top civilian official of the Air Force Command Aeronautics System Division were officially reprimanded for their part in the stunt.

The crash occurred when an F104 fighter piloted by famed test pilot Joseph A. Walker collided with the \$500 million XB70, one of only two such planes in existence. Walker and Air Force Maj. Carl S. Cross, flying his first copilot mission in the XB70, were killed.

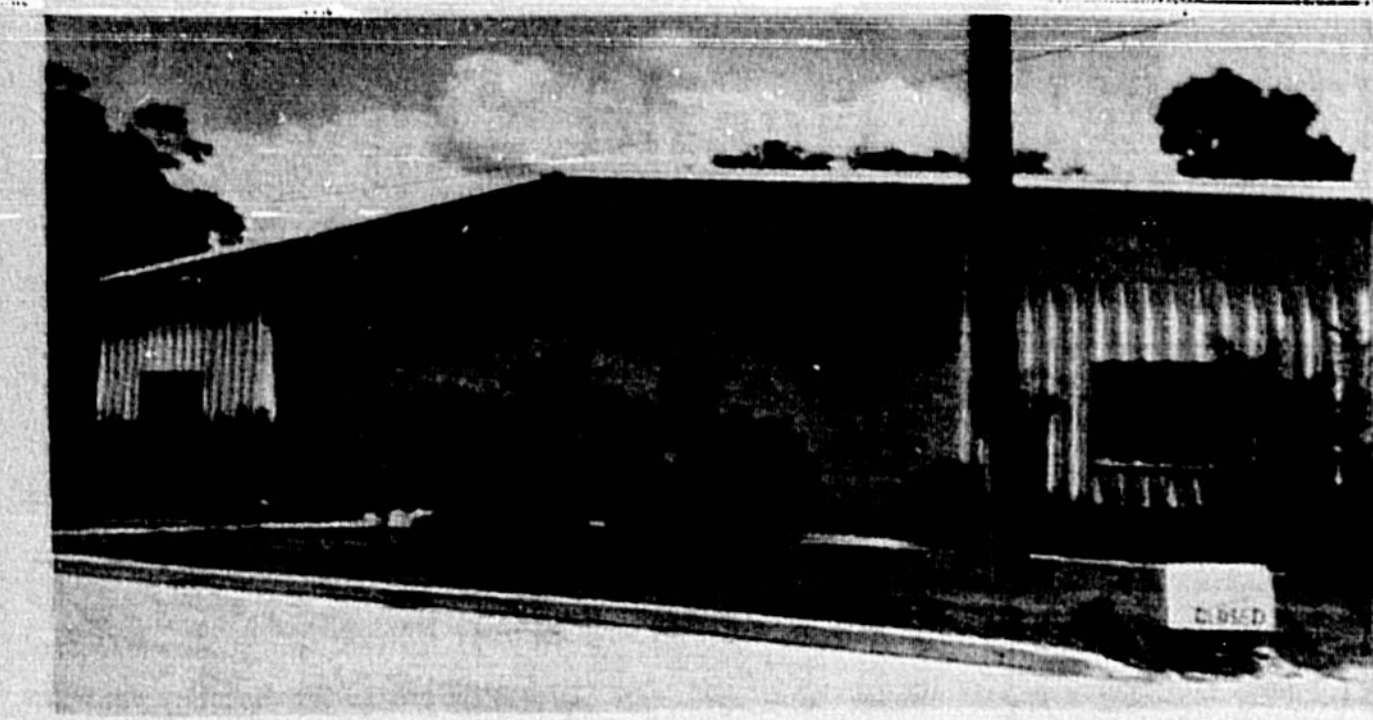

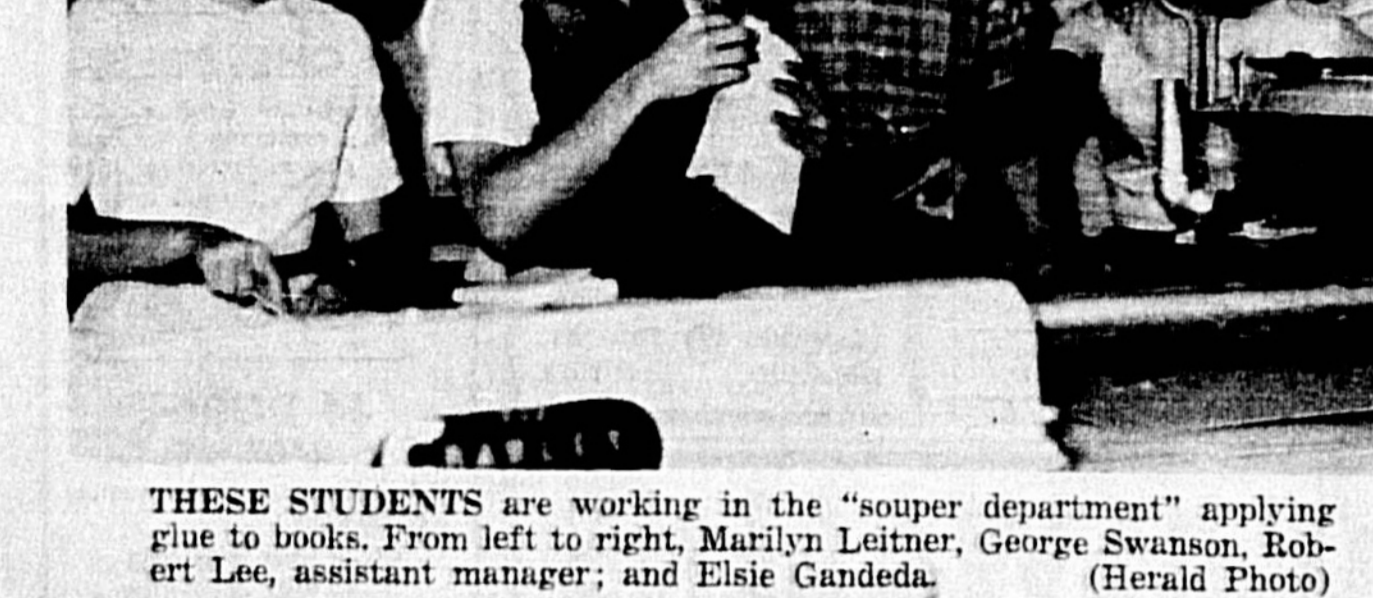

Herald Tribune Is Dead After 131 Long Years

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Herald Tribune, heir to the journalistic legacy of Horace Greeley and James Gordon Bennett, is dead.

The end of the Herald Tribune, which has not published for 115 days, was announced Monday by the World Journal Tribune Inc., the new publishing firm incorporating the Herald Tribune, the World-Telegram & Sun and the Journal-American.

Matt Meyer, president of the new company, said the publishers planned to go ahead with new afternoon and Sunday papers. Labor difficulties have kept all the planned newspapers from being published since the merger was announced last April.

Meyer said the long delay has caused a loss of "talent in all creative departments of the Herald Tribune."

"It now has reached the point where we cannot bring the public the kind of morning newspaper hoped for. We are unwilling to settle for less," he said. "We are therefore consolidating our talent and resources into an afternoon and a Sunday newspaper, to be known as the World Journal Tribune, in both instances," Meyer said.

Originally the company had planned to publish the Herald Tribune in the morning, the World Journal in the afternoon and the World Journal Tribune on Sunday.

The ties of the Herald Tribune left Manhattan with four major dailies, including the World Journal Tribune. The others are the morning New York Times and Daily News and the afternoon Post. Manhattan had six major dailies before the merger. Thirty-five years ago there were 12.

Thus only the word Tribune on the new masthead remained of a journalistic history that began with the penny-a-copy Herald of James Gordon Bennett in 1835. Six years later Horace Greeley's Tribune was merged with the Herald. Separately, and later as the merged Herald Tribune, the papers were home to some of the greatest names of American journalism: Mark Twain, Richard Harding Davis, Henry J. Raymond and Charles A. Dana. In modern times, the Herald Tribune's columnists included Art Buchwald, John O'Hara, Walter Kerr, Walter Lippmann and Red Smith.
