#### Depositors crowd new bank

SANFORD — Dozens of people crowded the downtown Sanford branch of Federal Trust Bank this morning in response to a letter mailed Friday.

The letter detailed the change from the former First Federal Savings and Loan Association to Federal Trust Bank, which acquired the failed institution April 3. Federal Trust spokesman Anne T. Coonrod said most of the customers had questions about the transfer of accounts from First Federal to Federal Trust and certificate of deposit interest rates.

Coonrod said CDs will be lowered to the bank's savings rate of 4 percent until holders come in and renegotiate rates.

Coonrod said many customers are comforted to know former First Federal executive George Foster is now Federal Trust president.

#### Clarification

Paul Mashburn, president of the Home Builders Association of Mid-Florida said an HBA employee was incorrect if she committed the HBA to donating electrical supplies to Seminole County's one-stop permitting office renovations.

"She is an employee of the HBA and in no way represents the HBA," said Mashburn, owner of Vicking Builders, Winter Park. "If she made that statement, she is incorrect."

Although county records and memos state Beth McGee, HBA regional affairs specialist, told commissioners on Feb. 11 the HBA committed to donating the materials valued at \$12,000 to \$15,000, Mashburn said this morning the materials may have been pledged by individual members of the HBA, but not the organization. Mashburn said such a pledge was never approved by the HBA board of directors.

#### Two winning tickets sold

TALLAHASSEE — Holders of a pair of winning tickets will split an estimated \$7 million over the next 20 years after the latest Lotto drawing. Lottery Secretary Marcia Mann said.

Lottery officials said Sunday only two tickets bore the six numbers — 5-7-8-27-34-49 — drawn late Saturday. The tickets were sold in Port Charlotte and in Pierson, which is in north-western Volusia County.

# SHARE designed for all

## Volunteering service helps pay for food

SANFORD — Members of the Retired Seniors Volunteer Program are organizing a low-cost food program for Seminole County to reach those people falling through the "safety net" of government assistance programs.

"We have to turn a lot of people away each month because they don't qualify for the food commodity program," said Jean Metts, volunteer coordinator for a free food program at Zayre Plaza. "But these are still people who aren't making it. This will help those people who

fall through the cracks and get more people helping each other."

The program Metts is researching is called SHARE - Self Help and Resource Exchange. Under the SHARE program, anyone can buy food packages for \$13.50 and two hours of volunteer service per month. The public can purchase as many food packages as they want during the monthly distribution, but each costs \$13.50 and requires two hours of volunteer service.

The closest SHARE distribution host is the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 606 on Virginia Drive in Sanford. See SHARE Page 5A

# Magnet school support uncertain

## School board to probe using concept at SHS

JACKSONVILLE — Despite the success of "magnet" schools designed to promote desegregation in the Jacksonville area, officials say federal and state support is uncertain.

The future of magnet programs will be a topic in meetings beginning this month between the Duval County school system and the Jacksonville branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

The magnet schools are part of a desegregation agreement between the school system and the

NAACP branch, intended to voluntarily integrate schools by attracting white students to the city and blacks to the suburbs.

During their Tuesday, April 28 meeting, the Seminole County school board will discuss for the first time the possibility of using a magnet school at Seminole High School to increase enrollment.

No decisions have been made on such a program. The board has expressed some interest in it, though they said there would be an initial cost of more than \$300,000 to get the program running.

A group of Seminole High supporters are urging caution and are promoting rezoning as an alternative to increasing the number of students at the school.

The Duval County system has 89 magnet

programs featuring focused classes in a variety of subjects from athletics to foreign languages. At least 10,372 students are expected to enroll in magnet programs in the next school year.

"The Duval County school system has implemented, all at once, more magnet schools than any other system in the nation," said Julie Rasmussen, supervisor of program development for Jacksonville schools.

One success story is Stanton College Preparatory School, where seniors last year walked off with \$4 million in aid, an impressive list of college-level courses under their belts and a string of academic competition wins.

Stanton has earned a reputation as one of the most successful schools in the country, vice principal Arthur Roberts said.

# Petition in circulation to disband the Longwood Police Department

LONGWOOD — A citizens petition is being circulated in Longwood. It calls for a public referendum to decide abolition of the Longwood Police Department.

While there is nothing written on the petition, identifying who may be circulating it, City Commissioner Paul Lovstrand said, "I'm circulating it, along with about a half dozen other people."

He commented, "In doing this, I'm being criticized by other members of the Commission for trying to save the city some money, and for not being willing to wait for a Cost Analysis Task Force to resolve the matter."

The petition calls for a section of the City Charter to be amended to dissolve the city's police department

within 180 days after passage. It specifically states, "No one with the power of arrest shall be on the payroll."

Without its own police department, the wording of the petition specifies, "The City Commission shall depend on the Sheriff or Seminole County for police protection and shall contract with the Sheriff to provide additional police protection and police functions for the City of Longwood."

By doing this, the petition states, "...there is a potential annual savings of hundreds of thousands of dollars to the citizens of Longwood."

It specifies that the "additional level of protection shall not exceed 22 deputies the first contract year."

The present Longwood police department has 39 sworn officers, headed by Police Chief Greg Manning.

# Lush garden: Start with seeds

Want to have a lush yard and a garden filled with beautiful flowers and more vegetables than your family and neighborhood could possibly eat? Of course you say...but that takes money. Maybe not as much as you think.

An alternative is growing your plants from seeds. Instead of buying that plant for one dollar, buy an entire package of seeds that may give you 50 plants for the same price. Not only will the price per plant decrease, but your choice of plants greatly increases. A garden center just cannot stock the huge number of plant varieties that are available from seeds. Perhaps the most important reason, aside from the economics and plant choices, is that of accomplishment. There is nothing more exciting than when our seeds "give birth" and we see tiny green leaves start to poke out of the growing medium.

Growing medium? I hear many of you saying "I knew there was a catch — growing seeds is complicated." Au contraire, growing most seeds is not complicated, however, there are a few things that we can do to make our job and the seeds' job easier. Let's begin with growing medium.

One of the major reasons seeds do not germinate is because they are not kept moist. The ideal growing medium is moist, porous (so that the roots can grow easily) and sterile (to prevent disease). Potting soil tends to dry quickly, and though I have used it successfully, it is time consuming and my results are better with the medium. Garden soil may also be used but should be sterilized first by

wetting it and baking it for at least 30 minutes at 180°F to kill fungus (trust me, the smell generated by this process is worth going out and buying a bag of medium). Some ready-made growing medium mixes available at garden centers are found under the names of Ready Earth, Pro-mix, Jiffy-mix.

You can also make your own by using sphagnum or peat moss, vermiculite, and perlite. My personal preference is one third each peat, vermiculite and perlite. To moisten this, I add one part water per eight parts medium, i.e., for each eight cups medium, use one cup water in a bucket or bag and mix well.

The next step is to select a shallow container. Since only an inch or two is required for roots the first couple weeks of growth, you can use egg cartons, cream cheese and fast food containers, cups, just about anything. The important thing here is to allow for good drainage. Recycled market paks from last season may be used if soaked for 10 minutes in a one-part laundry bleach to 10-parts water solution. Garden centers have plastic seeding trays with removable segmented paks and covers that are inexpensive.

Fill your chosen container

with medium. At this point, I drench my medium with a fungicide solution of one half tablespoon Benomyl per gallon of water and let drain for about two hours to prevent damping off.

You are now ready to plant your seeds. The most often asked question I receive is "How deeply should seeds be planted?" A good rule of thumb is to plant seeds twice the depth of the smallest diameter of the seed.

Florida can be tricky. Many seed envelopes suggest certain months to plant seeds yet if we tried them here at that time we may get germination but our plants would struggle to live. Try to know as much as possible about when to sow seeds for Central Florida, light and temperature requirements for best germination, and normal days required for germination. The more you know, the better your success rate. Some of the flowering bedding plant seeds that will show good results if planted now include: amaranthus, ageratum, cosmos, marigold, morning glory, celosia, coleus, salvia, and ornamental peppers.

I usually try to plant one to two seeds per compartment in my seeding tray so that they are easily transplanted. Some seeds, such as coleus, are so small that I broadcast them on top of the growing medium. Do not even try to cover, just keep them moist, and when the leaves start to touch, transplant to a compartmentalized tray.

Once the seeds are sown, proper humidity should be maintained. This can be done by covering the container with glass

or plastic, sticking it into a plastic bag or topping with a plastic tray. If using a plastic bag, do not let it touch the medium. Those plants requiring dark may be covered with aluminum foil. Be sure to check periodically the moisture level and apriz when necessary.

Proper temperature is required for good seed germination. I have put seed trays in the bathtub, window sills, top of the refrigerator, under fluorescent lights — and have had best results under fluorescent lights in my garage. If it gets too warm, I open the doors.

As the leaves start to show, take off the plastic cover and allow the lights and fresh air to help the seedlings grow. Bottom watering is suggested and as true leaves develop, use a soluble plant food such as Peters, Miracle Gro or Hyponex at one quarter the label strength. As the seedlings grow this can be increased to one half label strength and administered from above.

As you can see, growing plants from seeds is fun, gives more variety and choices, and is economical. The next problem is...what will we do with all these plants?

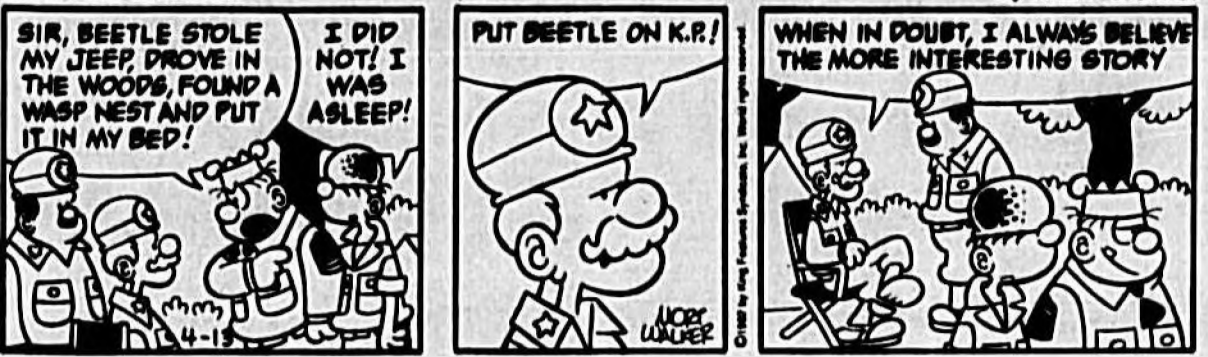

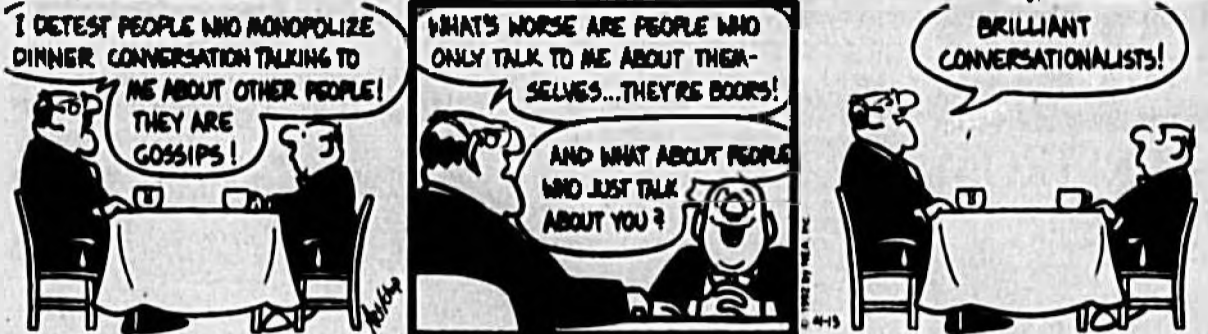

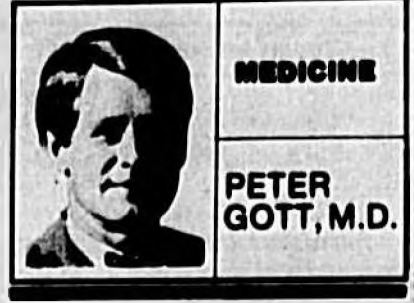

**DEAR READER:** From your brief description, I believe you have a persisting sinus infection, which can cause headache, humming in the ears (tinnitus) and a cough (from postnasal drip). Perhaps your antibiotic treatment wasn't long enough. In my experience, sinus infections sometimes require two or three weeks of therapy.

Of course, I could be wrong. You might have an unusual ailment, such as a tumor in your pharynx (behind your nose) or in your sinus. However, your symptoms seem most consistent with sinus infection -- or, more precisely, infection in more than one of your sinuses.

Your neurologist took an appropriate next step by ordering a CT scan of your head. This special X-ray test will enable the doctors to "see" the structures within the skull, including the sinuses. Any abnormality, such as infection or tumor, will be readily evident. Follow through with the scan and heed the doctor's advice about further treatment.

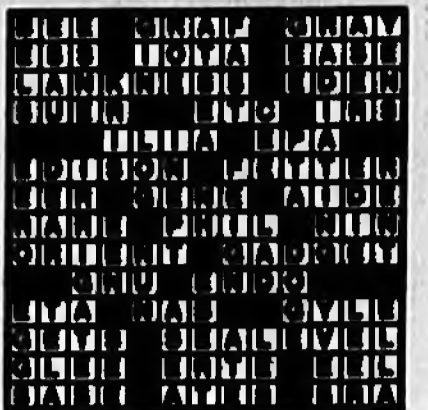

**WIN AT BRIDGE**

The concept of the danger hand is learned early in one's bridge career. Sometimes the danger hand is the one with sufficient winners to defeat your contract. But more often it is a hand held by an opponent who can make a fatal switch through a weak holding like king doubleton.

There are several ways of keeping the danger hand at bay. Cover the East-West cards in the diagram. Against your four-heart contract, West leads the spade king and East signals with the jack. How do you plan the play? North's double was negative, promising four hearts (or five if he didn't have sufficient points to bid two hearts). South was not worth his jump rebid, and North had an automatic bid of game because of the double fit. The main danger is that West

holds the diamond ace. If so, you must try to keep East off the lead. Therefore, you must duck the first trick, in case East's spade jack is from the jack-10 rather than jack doubleton. Let's suppose West continues with another spade. You win and must lead a low heart.

If you cash the ace first, you give West a chance to unblock the king. He knows you haven't got the heart jack, because otherwise you would take the trump finesse.

West is now helpless. If he wins with the heart king, you will score 10 tricks via three hearts, the spade ace, a spade ruff in hand and five clubs. If he plays low, you put up dummy's queen and lead a low heart. When East plays the nine, you duck, allowing West to score his king anyway.
