Project protects Seminole grads

SANFORD — Getting graduating high school seniors to attend an all-night, supervised party with no drugs or alcohol presents challenges, but in her fourth year, Mary Beth Mather has figured it out.

"We had 136 students attend out of 550 graduates," she said Tuesday. "We had a fifth of the class." That is up from 80 Seminole High School students last year.

Project Graduation is a national event. Mather is the mother of Jillian Lindahl, SHS class of 2005. This was her fourth year as chairwoman of the event for Seminole High.

She credits a new venue, a bunch of volunteers and car-

ing businesses and organizers for the boost in attendance to this year's party at Wet 'n Wild in Orlando.

"We got into a really good venue," Mather said of this year's party. The event receives no money from the school district or the school, she said. It is strictly run on donations and parent volunteers.

This year Mather took a chance for the new location. She teamed up with Lyman High School in Longwood and Crooms Academy of Information Technology in Sanford. After having just 80 students show up last year, she had to guarantee 125 this year.

"I have to really go out there and talk it up," she

Firefighters mourn second death in May

SANFORD — Lt. Frank Kucera, 43, a veteran of the Seminole County Fire Department, died in the line of duty on Friday, May 27. He reportedly died after a training exercise.

Kucera has been with Seminole County since June 15, 1981. A 1980 graduate of Lake Brantley High School, he continued his education at Seminole Community College where he received his certificate of compliance and State of Florida Firefighter license.

Kucera was the second Seminole firefighter to die

following a heart attack in less than a month.

Battalion Chief Max Buffkin of the Sanford Fire Department died May 4 following a heart attack he suffered April 23 at home. He was 48.

Kucera was promoted to lieutenant on Oct. 1, 1990. In employee reviews, he was described as a motivator and team builder.

In a recent evaluation, Kucera was described as someone who shows "loyalty to the department, and commitment to his crew and the county."

If clients are on the go, the fitness center provides private showers, with disposable razors, soap, shampoo and

lotion.

Expectant mothers and new mothers can also gain momentum at The Trainers Edge, with many of their personal trainer's specializing in pre-pregnancy, pregnancy, and post-pregnancy training.

Trainer Kim Coggon, who has been with The Trainers Edge for almost four years, said she's seen many success stories go through the gym. One in particular was a young woman who was a Florida state weightlifting champion with a goal of entering the U.S. Navy. In just a few short months of training with Coggon, she got in.

"She was accepted to the U.S. Navy after dedication and hard work," Coggon said. "I'm very proud of her."

Woman claims second attack

SANFORD — Lake Mary Police and the Orange County Sheriff's Department are searching for the truth after a woman said she was attacked for a second time and tied up by a stranger.

Lake Mary Detective Mike Conneely confirmed that news reports of her statements reflected what the woman told police.

"We're looking into the veracity of those claims," Conneely said. He added that the case is looking a little odd.

The woman, who lives in Orange County, said first she was pulled over on Interstate 4 in Lake Mary by a person claiming to be a police officer. She gave the man her license, who started writing information from it. Police said he threw it back at her when she became suspicious of him. He fled in a gray Chevy Lumina with a Florida license plate that reads in part: X16 ???

On May 10, the woman said the same man kidnapped her at gunpoint at an undisclosed Sanford location. He drove her SUV to the U.S. Post Office distribution center on Rinehart Road, near Timicuan, where he sexually assaulted her before getting away on foot. At the time, Lake Mary police said the woman may have been tied up.

Then on May 20, Orange County 9-1-1 received a call from the woman's 5-year-old boy who said his mother had her mouth and hands taped. The woman later told police that the person who attacked her was the same one who sexually assaulted her in Lake Mary. She reportedly was taken to the hospital for minor injuries.

Conneely confirmed that she was given an exam after the sexual assault as well, but he could not release any information. Lake Mary Police released a composite of a suspect last week.

"We've had some leads come in and we are still following some of them," he said.

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement processed the woman's SUV following the sexual assault in Lake Mary, Conneely said. The vehicle was processed for evidence and released back to the woman's husband. He could not give any details as any evidence found in the SUV is still being processed.

"We're still awaiting officials details," he said. "They're pretty busy."

When asked what people should think about the story, Conneely said people should just use due care.

"There is no need to overreact or become fearful," he said. "People need to just use common sense."

He said he is waiting on the final report on the case from Orange County.

Longwood spends thousands for tribute

LONGWOOD — With a split 3 to 2 vote, the city of Longwood Commission voted to pay \$66,000 for a Heroes Day Monument to be erected in the Historic District. With landscaping the cost to escalate to nearly \$100,000.

After months of discussion, commissioners required a special meeting May 18 to decide the fate the proposed monument.

Faced with a May 20 deadline, the commissioners voted 3-2 in favor of a design submitted by Paul West, from West Memorials in Memphis, Tenn.

Working with an original design created by Mayor H.G. "Butch" Bundy, West was initially contacted by Deputy Mayor John Maingot, who provided West with design input from each of the five commissioners. West then developed a design he hoped would please all five commissioners.

West flew down from Memphis to present his final design at the May 16 City Commission Meeting. Before attending the meeting, West spent time earlier in the afternoon with Commissioner Dan Anderson tweaking the final design.

After presenting his rendering of the proposed Heroes Day Monument, West informed the commissioners that a decision would have to be reached no later than May 20 if the commissioners wanted the monument to be in place by Sept. 11, 2005.

Commissioners have designated that day for a Heroes Day Memorial ceremony to honor those who lost their lives in the World Trade Center disaster, while also honoring the veterans of past and present wars and giving recognition to members of the local police and fire departments — "men who put their lives on the line each and every day," according to Maingot.

Because the commissioners were unable to give West a definite answer the night he attended the City Commission meeting, a special meeting was called for the following Wednesday.

Dressed more casually than they do for regular City Commission meetings, the commissioners, along with City Administrator Richard Taylor spent about 90 minutes discussing the design submitted by West and the cost involved in building the monument.

As the meeting got underway, Bundy acknowledged that he was having second thoughts about making a hasty decision while faced with an impending deadline. The mayor suggested getting the public more involved in the process and mentioned that he wouldn't mind seeing a few more bids from local design companies in hopes that one might provide a cheaper alternative to the design submitted by West.

Commissioner Mike Holt said he was by no means an expert in the field of art, but stated that he didn't really care for the overall appearance of the 9-foot, 2-inch black granite monument that would weigh more than

25 tons. Holt said he was still partial to the original design created Bundy — a simple design featuring two black granite columns placed on a pentagon shaped base, a monument in his opinion that truly emphasized the piece of steel girder from the World Trade Center that was presented to the city of Longwood a few months earlier.

Maingot, however, urged the commissioners to, "Get on with it." He favored the more contemporary design submitted by West and agreed with the idea that the monument should not be an admittance of defeat at the hands of the enemy, but a symbol of the enduring spirit and determination of the American people.

Commissioner Brain Sackett agreed with Maingot that the commission had spent enough time discussing the various design proposals and the time had come to move forward with the construction of the much talked about monument.

Anderson said he favored a second, more esoteric, design submitted by West, but agreed with Maingot and Sackett that it was time to move forward if they hoped to have the monument done in time for the Heroes Day Celebration.

Unable to reach a unanimous decision, the matter was put to a vote.

An ordinance approving the design submitted by West, with a cost of \$66,000, was passed by a 3-2 vote. Maingot, Anderson and Sackett voted in favor of the design. Bundy and Holt voted against it.

With the final design now settled, West Memorials was given the green light to proceed with the project. Using a granite broker who specializes in Chinese granite (China being the leading, and cheapest, source for black granite) West placed the order for the stone to be blasted from a Chinese mountainside.

"China is to the granite business what the northeastern United States was 100 years ago," he said. The use of imported granite was much discussed during the design process. The city commissioners would have preferred to use American granite, but doing so would have added substantially to the final cost of the monument.

Bids are currently being secured for the landscaping of the area surrounding the monument and for the construction of the monument's base. The total cost of the monument with landscaping will range from \$75,000 to \$100,000.

When asked how he would respond to criticism in regard to monument's cost, Maingot said: "Most cities in and around Central Florida already have monuments to honor our military services. Somewhere along the line, someone has to show appreciation for their dedication and service to country. We have a number of active military personnel who live in Longwood."

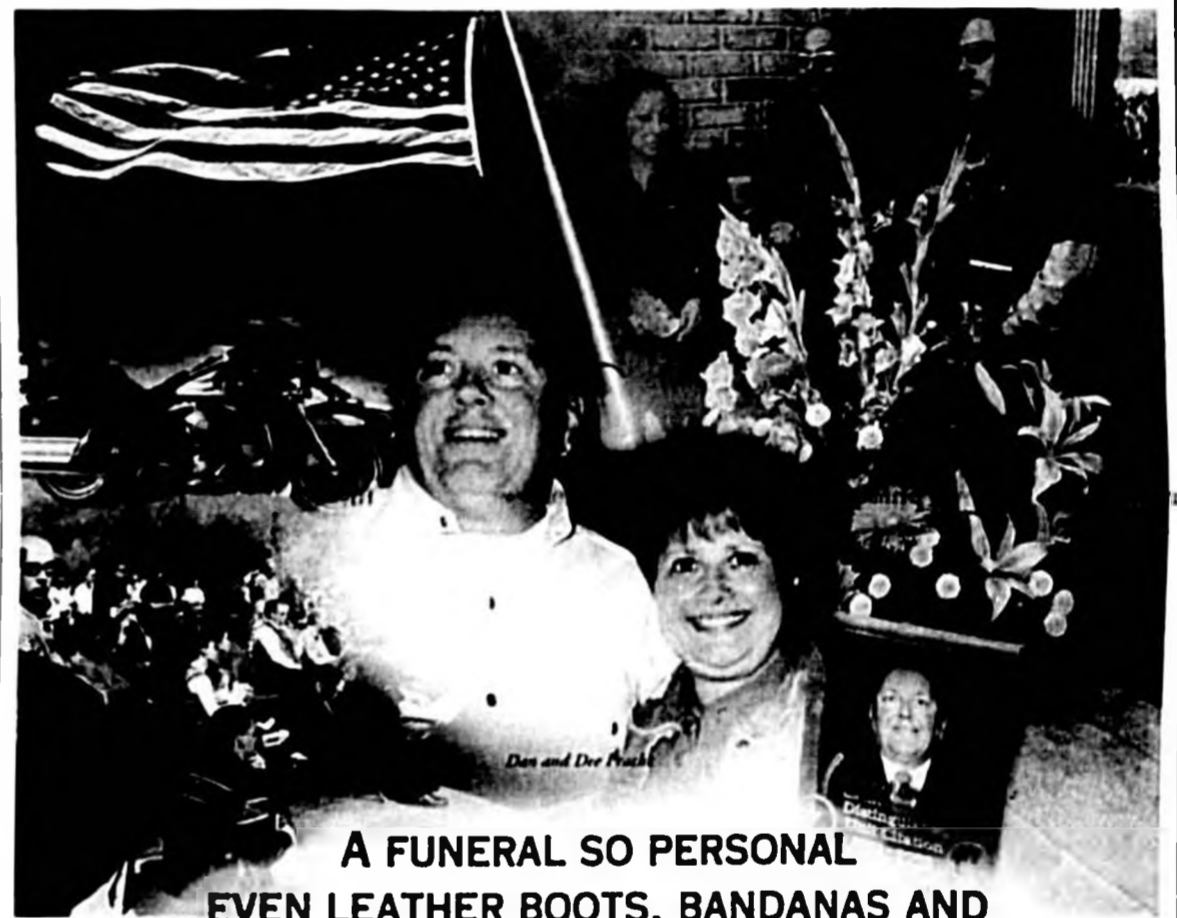

According to City of Sanford Aquatics Director Tony Ackerson, the success of the fledgling team has been no small feat.

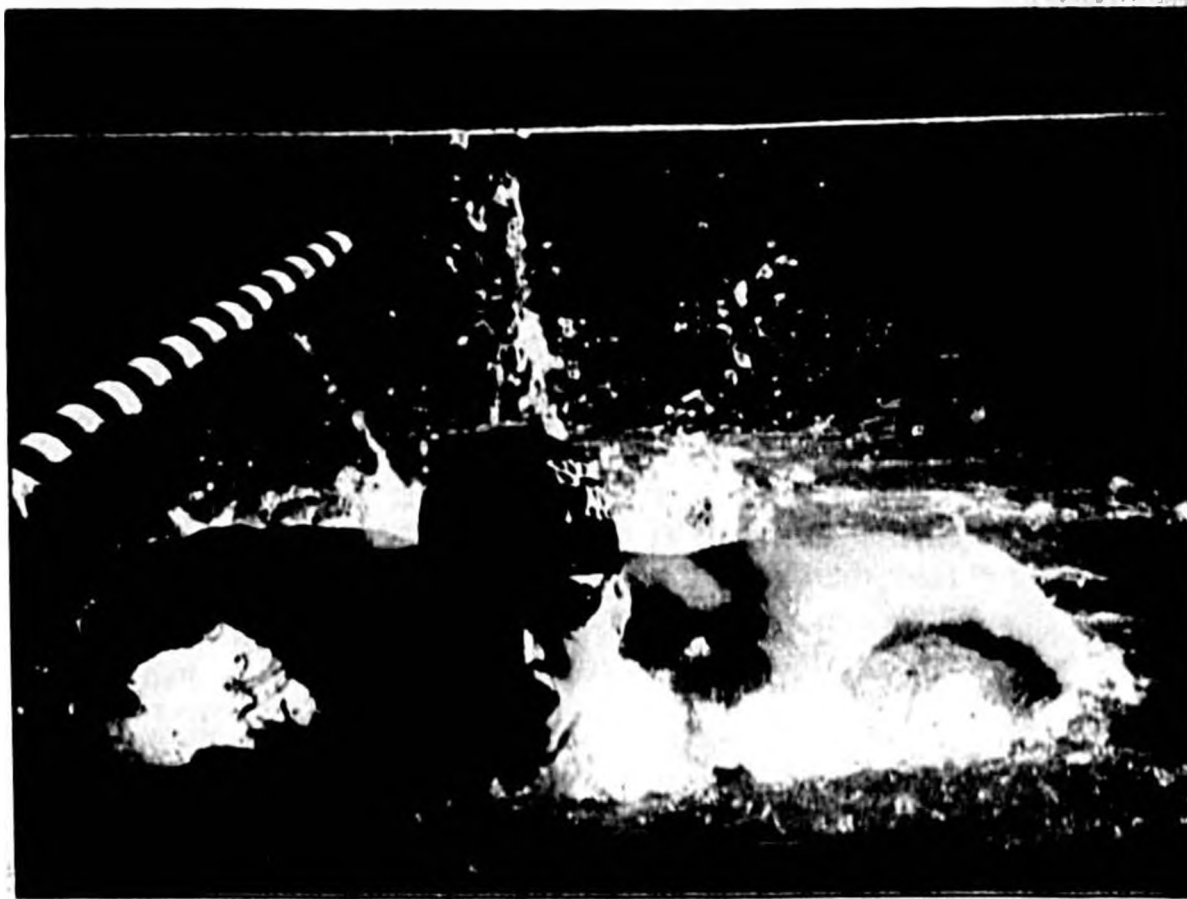
"This area is clearly the most competitive one in the state," said Ackerson, who also founded and coaches the team.

"When you look at the number of local teams, pools, and programs just in this area, it's incredibly hard to be among the best. We just try to always do the right thing for our kids, our parents, and the community, and so far it's working out nicely."

According to Ackerson, nothing involving Sanford swimming has come easily. The city has had no public pools since the mid-1960's, meaning not only the swim teams, but also the public swim lessons for Sanford residents vanished as well. The net result was that countless children in Sanford were growing up without ever having had the opportunity to even consider competitive swimming as an option. The effect was obvious to Ackerson when he began his coaching career at Seminole High School in 1988.

"I came in thinking, 'O.K., we'll turn this thing around quickly', but it was unbeliev-

Stetson captures A-Sun Crown, 8-0, over FAU

Open regional against No. 7 National Seed Florida Friday

DeLAND — Friday afternoon, the Stetson Hatters were two outs away from having their season come to an end. By Saturday evening, they were conference champions.

Ryan Heacox and Chris Ingoglia combined on a four-hit shutout as Stetson defeated Florida Atlantic 8-0 in the championship game of the 2005 Atlantic Sun Conference Tournament at Melching Field.

The Hatters (35-26) won three consecutive elimination games to capture their fifth conference title and their first since 2000.

"We have hosted this thing for the last four years, and this is the first time we have done this, and I am so happy for the guys," Hatter head coach Pete Dunn said. "There were times this season that we didn't look good but the

guys really got it together the last two weeks. They played hard, they played well, and that translated into the conference championship."

Heacox (3-0), making just his second start of the season, continued his season dominance over Florida Atlantic. On Saturday he worked 5.2 shutout innings, allowing just three hits and one walk. In four games against FAU this season, Heacox is 2-0 with a save in 13.1 shutout innings.

"I could have definitely gone longer, but I knew we had two great guys in the bullpen ready to come in," Heacox said. "I felt that once we got into tournament play, everyone would come together. We have a great pitching staff, and when we throw strikes we are tough to beat."

Chris Ingoglia took over for Heacox with two outs in the sixth, and retired 10 of the 12 batters he faced, including seven on strikeouts. It marked the first shutout in a championship game in the 27-year history of the Atlantic Sun.

"Even though I threw 120 pitches on Wednesday, my arm felt fantastic," Ingoglia said. "I knew that my defense was behind me, and that the other team was pressing, and all I had to do was throw strikes."

Shane Jordan went 3-for-5 with two runs and two RBI on Sunday, and batted .429 (9-for-21) during the tournament en route to Most Valuable Player honors.

"Our pitching was unbelievable," Jordan said. "Not just today but in every game. They really

came through in the clutch."

Brian Bocock, John DeStefano, Jon Still, and Robbie Elsmiller joined Jordan on the all-tournament team. Bocock singled, doubled, and homered on Saturday, driving in three runs.

After struggling throughout much of the season, Stetson's pitching staff stepped into the spotlight and tossed 15 shutout innings to finish the tournament.

"We had great pitching performances, especially those two seniors, [Cameron] Abel and Heacox," Dunn said. "Both those guys hadn't pitched in about a month, but they just gutted it up and went out there and did the job. Heacox gave us all that we asked of him and Ingoglia came in and finished it up for us."

During the past three seasons that Stetson University has hosted the A-Sun tournament at Melching Field, the Hatters watched the three other in-state conference schools — UCF, Jacksonville, and FAU — win the league title. This year, it was Stetson's turn.

"We knew we had to win this, our record wasn't good enough to get us in as an at-large," Dunn said. "The kids really persevered coming down the stretch."

The team learned Monday morning that it will be the No. 4 seed at the NCAA Gainesville Regional and will play host and top-seed Florida at 8 p.m. Friday night at McKethan Stadium.

The 2005 champions of the Atlantic Sun Conference, Stetson (35-26) will be making its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance in the last

six years, and its 14th postseason appearance in school history. The Hatters will face the Gators (40-20), the No. 7 national seed and the eighth-ranked team in the nation, in the opening round.

"We are playing with a lot of confidence right now," Dunn said. "We played at Florida two weeks ago and played well. We are not going to be intimidated playing in that situation. By the same token the Gators certainly are not going to be looking past Stetson. They have respect for us."

Also in the Gainesville Regional is no. 2 seed North Carolina (40-17-1) of the ACC and no. 3 seed Notre Dame (36-22-1), champions of the BIG EAST Conference. The Tar Heels and Fighting Irish will play Friday at 4 p.m. to start the double-elimination regional.

"I have got to believe that it is one of the strongest regionals in the entire bracket," Dunn said. "North Carolina has got tremendous pitching and Notre Dame is coming off a must-win situation in their tournament just as we are."

Stetson will be making its second trip to Gainesville this season. The Hatters dropped a close 6-4 decision to the Gators back on May 18. It will be Stetson's first NCAA Regional appearance in Gainesville.

"We are excited about going to Gainesville," Hatters head coach Pete Dunn said. "We have been to a lot of regionals in the state of Florida, but ironically never to Gainesville. I am sure

able how absolutely dead the sport was in Sanford," said Ackerson. "My first year coaching high school, there was something like seven or eight kids on the team, total. I'd ask kids to get their friends to come out for the team, but they'd say their friends were embarrassed to come out because the swim team was perceived around school as being so horrible."

As bad as the reputation of the team was at the time, according to Ackerson, the lack of training facilities made things even worse.

"We were fortunate to have the good people in Sanora and Lake Forest allow us to use their pools for a few years," he said. "But they (the pools) weren't designed to be competition pools, not temperature controlled or anything like that, so inevitably we'd end up begging for pool time at Lyman or Lake Brantley when the water got too cold."

Ackerson's 1996 pitch to then-SHS principal Gretchen Schapker led to the City's commitment of \$500,000 toward a public City pool to be located at Seminole High.

The project was shepherded through the bureaucracy by former Mayor Larry Dale and longtime City Commissioner and pool proponent Whitey Eckstein, who had long pushed for a public pool in Sanford.

The dream became a reality in March of 2000, and Ackerson left his teaching position at SHS to run the pool's aquatics programs, including the creation of Sanford's first swim team in over 30 years.

The team, registered with United States Swimming and Florida Swimming, Inc., has grown from just two swimmers in 2000 to what Ackerson now calls a 'medium sized' team, complete with three coaches, four different training groups, a summer team for beginners, and numbers that Ackerson believes will eclipse over 120 total swimmers this summer.

"It's about the perfect size team for a facility that was built to serve the community first, and that's been foremost in our minds since we started in 2000, the idea that the team should complement the facility, but never overshadow it," said Ackerson.

For the fourth consecutive year, the team will conduct its own version of a 'Little League' swim team for beginners.

The city's 'Summer Stingrays' program will begin June 6 and run through July 30 at the city's Olympic-level facility located on the campus at Seminole High. Aimed at reaching young people ages 5 to 15, the only requirement for joining the team is passing a swim test in which the swimmer can complete 25 yards, in any fashion, without touching the bottom.

The swimmers will be placed in training groups where they will learn the four competitive strokes, starts, and turns, all in an environment that places the highest emphasis on mixing fun with competition. Informal, 'Summer League' swim meets will be held against other local teams' beginning swimmers, meets where all participants get ribbons and no disqualifications are made.

To Ackerson, the summer swim team is clearly the foundation for the future of swimming in Sanford.

"No doubt about it, the summer team is the future of

Sanford swimming," Ackerson emphasized. "These are the kids that start out on swim team because they just love being in the water, and then, over time, they realize that they can be really good at the sport if they stay with it."

"These are the same kids that end up swimming on their high school teams, going on to college swimming, and for the select few, the Olympics."

Practice will be held for one hour each day, Monday through Friday (swimmers do not have to be there every day), at the Larry A. Dale Aquatic Center, 2701 Ridgewood Avenue, and for the select few, the Olympics."
