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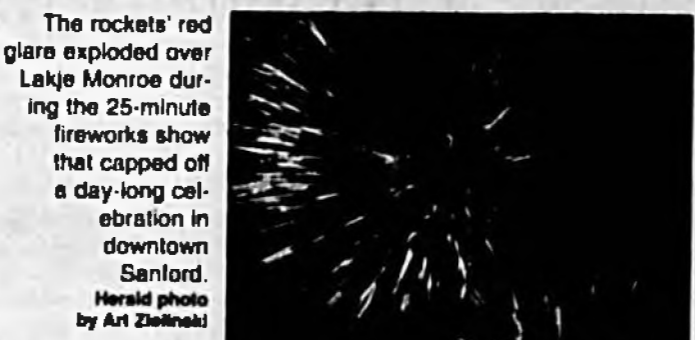

## Record crowds jam downtown Sanford

**SANFORD** — A record crowd of more than 60,000 people celebrated the Fourth of July along Sanford's waterfront, participating in festivities throughout the day and viewing a 25-minute fireworks display. The traditional celebration at Fort Mellon Park featured live music, 20 minutes of fireworks, and a water ski show. Despite the record crowd — last year's Fourth of July drew 40,000 people — police and fire officials said there were few problems during the all-day celebration. Seminole Boulevard and Mellonville Avenue were engulfed in a traffic jam for about 40 minutes following the fireworks, which ended at about 9:45 p.m. Some of the traffic flowed through the city's side streets, but the worst of it was over by about 11 p.m. There were no major traffic accidents. The Sanford police had 62 officers on the scene, including bike patrol and foot

patrol units. The K-9 unit was also on-call. "It was really a huge success," said Cleo Cohen, Sanford police spokeswoman. "We want to stress how well-behaved the crowd was. It really went well."

However, one man was arrested at the corner of 11th Street and Mellonville Avenue at about 10 p.m. for disorderly conduct. Officers also broke up a couple of other arguments without making an arrest, Cohen said. One person on a boat in Lake Monroe was treated for an asthma attack after the fireworks display, and two people were escorted to safety after drinking too much. However, no one had to be escorted to local hospitals, said Inspector Pete Tucker of the Sanford Fire Department.

Sanford City Commissioner Brady Lessard remarked after the fireworks display that the traffic flowed better than in past years. "This is great," Lessard said. "It was an awesome fireworks display, and a terrific day. The traffic is moving smoothly." Festivities began with the Farmers' Market in Magnolia Square, and activities continued throughout the day. Vendors served the traditional hot dogs, popcorn, cotton candy, ice cream and drinks. Two live bands performed on stage. Some people began arriving before 9 a.m., shopping in the Farmer's Market and staking out prime viewing spots along the waterfront seawall. Many of those attending were families and couples, as children gasped at the fireworks. Sanford Main Street presented the fireworks in partnership with Seminole County, the City of Sanford, Mix 105.1 and Power 105.9. Seminole County provided \$5,000 toward the festivities. Sanford provided \$7,000 worth of services such as police and fire department personnel. More people attended this year because many cities, including Orlando, had can-

## Sanford may alter rules for campaign signs

**SANFORD** — The recent District 3 Sanford City Commission race brought a variety of campaign signs along roadsides. Expect more campaign signs later this month for county races.

The City Commission race, won by Randy Jones, involved five candidates. By comparison, 15 candidates turned in qualifying petitions in Seminole County races last week.

Meanwhile, Sanford is considering changes to its Land Development Regulations which would allow candidates to place political campaign signs along roadsides as soon as they qualify. Currently, candidates must wait until 30 days prior to the election. "They ought to be able to put their signs up in July. What good does it do to qualify if you can't campaign?"

"They ought to be able to put their signs up in July," said Sanford Mayor Larry Dale. "What good does it do to qualify if you can't campaign?"

The city's Planning and Zoning Commission is expected to consider the proposed change on Thursday during its 7 p.m. session at City Hall.

Currently, candidates deposit \$100 with the city prior to placing any signs, but must wait until 30 days prior to the election to place the signs.

The deposit is refunded to the candidate if all signs are removed within seven days after the candidate is either elected or defeated. If the signs are placed prior to 30 days of the election or are not removed within seven days after the election, the \$100 deposit is for-

## Sanford student inventors finish third in nation

**SANFORD** — The honors keep coming for a team of inventors at Millennium Middle School in Sanford.

Four-person team placed third in the national championships of the Bayer/National Science Foundation Award for Community Innovation.

The award, which was announced at a banquet held June 25 at Epcot, comes with \$4,000 in savings bonds.

The seventh-grade team's invention, the "Kiddie Katcher," consists of a hinged frame with netting and an alarm system designed to catch infants who

climb out of their cribs while simultaneously alerting caregivers.

The students — Heather Walker, Amanda Ohbayashi, Allison Giardino, and Nick Marrinson — are already accomplished inventors. The team finished second overall in the nation last year for the invention of Pack Rax in the Bayer/National Science Foundation contest that challenges students to use science and technology to develop solutions to community issues.

Pack Rax can be used underneath seats on school buses to hold book bags and other items that tend to clutter the aisles. The group has formed a

licensed business and is working with the Seminole County school-district's Transportation Department on the testing and development of the invention.

Not resting on their laurels, the same group of four students are regional semifinalists in the competition this year for their invention of a Kiddie Katcher.

Each year, 9,000 crib-related injuries and 54 deaths occur, said Vera DeLoach, a teacher at Millennium and sponsor for the team. The Kiddie Katcher is designed to reduce the number of injuries and deaths. The prototype consists of a hinged frame attached to a crib. When

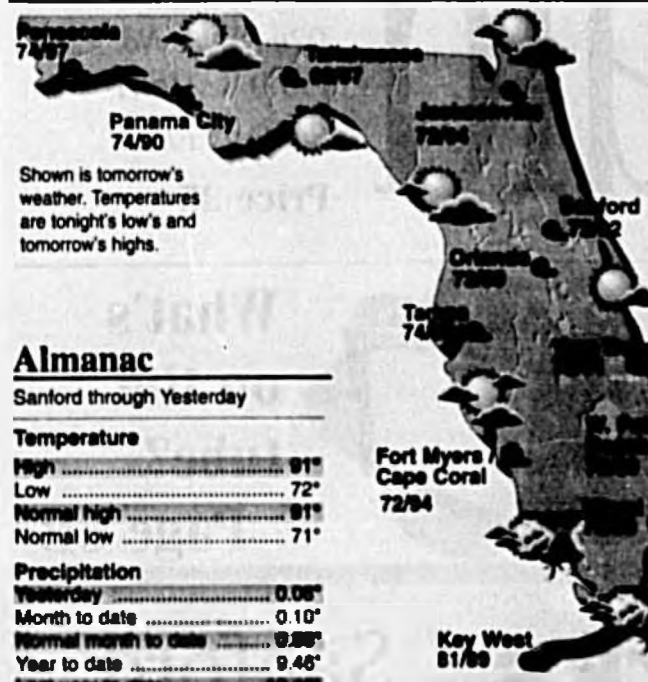

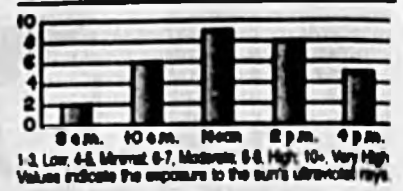

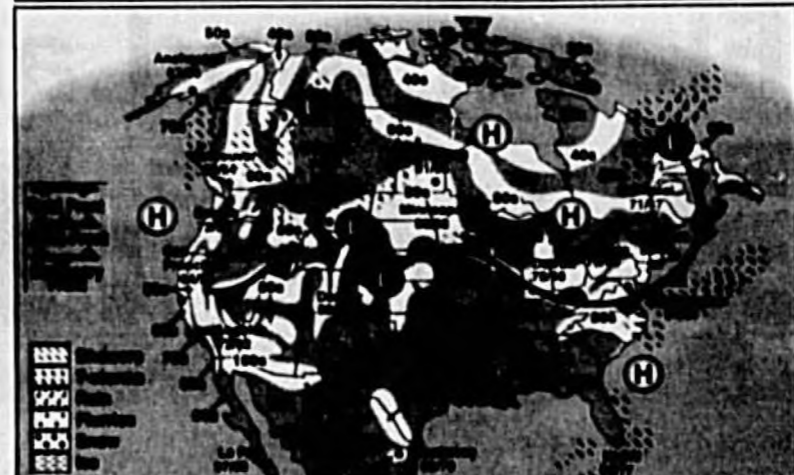

## Burial insurance rebates possible

Florida Treasurer and Insurance Commissioner Bill Nelson has announced that one of the country's biggest life insurers will provide \$206 million worth of relief to millions of poor and minority policyholders nationwide, to settle charges of racial discrimination and other unfair practices.

Nelson said policyholder refunds and other restitution will be made by American General Life and Accident Insurance Company, to resolve allegations that several companies it acquired charged blacks more than whites for burial and other insurance, and even after the sale of race-based policies was halted in the 1960s, the practice continued with insurers collecting higher premiums from African Americans.

Additionally, the agreement imposes a \$7.5 million sanction on the Nashville-based company to be split among various states

based on the number of affected policyholders in each of them.

American General has subsequently announced it will contribute another \$2 million to the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

The matter started with Nelson's investigation of burial insurance by five companies, covering 4.9 million race-based policies or policyholders' beneficiaries nationwide. Since that time, other insurance companies have joined Nelson in seeking the regulatory restitution.

American General will be contacting policyholders or their beneficiaries and has set up a toll-free phone line, 1-800-681-4944 for those with specific inquiries. The other companies are still reportedly under investigation.

In all, Nelson said the company has been fined \$1,224,600 in fines, to be repaid to certain policyholders or included in future premium reductions.

At precisely 7:52 p.m., a projectile soared into the front yard and landed four feet from our front door.

## A hero retires Quarterback always called the right kind of plays

When I got the phone call seven years ago that Arthur Ashe had died, I was giving my toddler son a bath. My husband had known Ashe fairly well, so the news hit hard. As I mourned for Ashe's family, I also thought about my son, splashing there in the tub. I figured as he grew older, he might look, as many children do, to sports figures as his heroes, and now we had lost one of the few who I could, without reservation, hold up and say, "Study him."

Steve Young was another of those few. As I watched Young announce his retirement from football, my mind again went to my son, now almost 10, and to all the children who tape sports posters over their beds and collect trading cards and whisper the play-by-play of their own last-second touchdown passes in the backyard. "Study him," I want to say again.

They should know that Young is the first-born son of a man named Grit who, upon listening to Young's complaints about his first season at Brigham Young University said, "You can quit, but you can't come home." Young knew better than to quit at anything. Still hanging in the garage of the Youngs' home in Greenwich, Conn., is a unicycle with a scuffed and torn seat from the long days Steve spent wobbling and crashing until he could ride the unicycle as well as the boy across the street.

My son and his generation should know that Young managed to be a straight-arrow without being a nerd. He didn't drink or smoke, and he pitched a no-hitter the day after the senior prom because he was the only player who wasn't hung over. (Am I pushing it to mention that Young rose at 5 a.m. on school days to attend Mormon classes 19 miles away in Scarsdale, N.Y.?)

Our children should know, too, that Young's life wasn't perfect. When he signed with the United States Football League for the largest contract in the history of sports, he became known as the \$40 million man and was held up as a symbol of what was wrong with America. He wanted to be what was right with America. "The big money depressed him," Grit said. And in his heart, Steve wanted to be playing in the NFL like his hero, Roger Staubach. "He woke up the next day and he had given his dream away," Young's mother once told me.

The irony, of course, is he never cared about money. Even with his huge salary, he drove the family Oldsmobile for the longest time and lived in an unfinished two-story loft on the property of family friends. Brent Jones once cracked that Young's clothes were so cheap and unfashionable that he could pass for a sportswriter. After 49ers games, he usually went to Chill's in nearby Belmont for dinner.

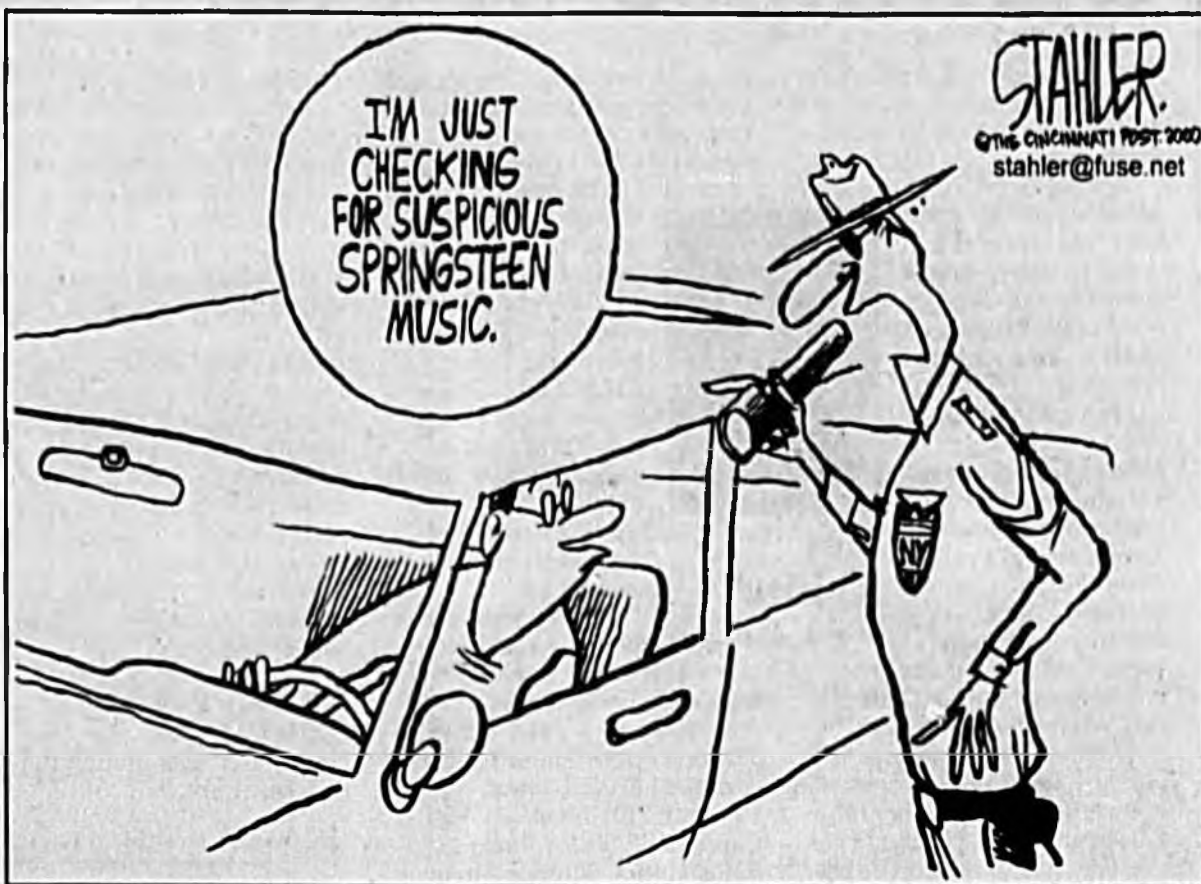
I think our children ought to know the difficulty Young faced in replacing the legendary Joe Montana after waiting so long in his shadow. In particular, they should know what he said when the 49ers lost in the much-ballyhooed showdown against Montana and the Kansas City Chiefs. Young, as competitive and driven as any athlete alive, swallowed his disappointment gracefully. "Maybe the student still has something to learn from the master," he said.

I want my son to hear, too, Young's explanation for retiring. He spent months soliciting input and weighing options. He was Hamlet in a helmet. But finally he decided, and he gathered his coaches and ex-coaches, players and friends to share the news. Young explained the decision was, in the end, a spiritual one.

"It just kind of settled on me that it was the right thing to do," he said.

The explanation was too vague for some reporters, who pressed him for details. But Young didn't have any. "It just settled on me," he repeated. Ashe, I'm certain, would understand exactly.

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## Society needs to heed Huxley's warning

Who does not rejoice at the prospect of diseases cured and defective genes repaired now that the genetic code has been cracked? Still — as we've seen from the beginning of time, when Cain killed Abel, to modern times, when humans still murder other humans and wars rage — objects, science and technology can be used for good or evil purposes. It depends on the intent of the user.

In an age when technology feels few restraints, science has been given a new tool with which to perform miracles. But science can debase human creatures when it treats us as evolutionary accidents with no intrinsic moral significance and the state assigns itself the role of God.

Before moving forward with no firm ethical guidelines, we should revisit Aldous Huxley's classic 1932 novel "Brave New World." In it Huxley visualizes a planet without moral controls, presided over by a single world government. Designer humans

are created in laboratories to fit the needs of a society whose highest goals are utilitarianism and happiness, which is the ultimate objective of humanity.

"World Controllers," as Huxley calls the authority, suppress individual initiative in favor of uniformity.

Family is gone, and so is any sense of spirituality. Only carnal pleasure is pursued, and any rituals must be orgiastic in nature. The new "trinity" in Huxley's mind would be Henry Ford (the idol), soma (a wonder drug) and sex. Ford has been replaced by the Dow Jones Industrial Average as our contemporary idol, but drugs and uncontrolled sex are still with us.

In the book, students who tour the Central London Hatchery and Conditioning Center observe various machines and techniques that promote the production and conditioning of embryos. "Predestinators" decide the future function of each embryo within society, and each is

assigned a job. The society has a five-tiered caste system that ranks Alphas and Betas on top (now we know where Al Gore advisor Naomi Wolf got this idea).

In his follow-up work, "Brave New World Revisited," Huxley said the only way to create a permanently stable society is for a totalitarian regime to exercise absolute power. The social motto is "Community, Identity, Stability." Community is established by dividing the population into segments in which the Alphas function as intellectual superiors, and another caste, called "Epsilons," performs menial labor. Identity is established in the Conditioning Centre where embryos are separated into five groups.

The state chooses what each child shall learn (which it largely does now, with the exception of private and home schooling). The parental relationship with children is dirty and improper. Feelings are obsolete. Children are conditioned to think and act only as members of their class rather than as individuals.

This 68-year-old book is Huxley's warning against the

misuse of science. He sees science as a potentially dehumanizing force, robbing the human race of that which makes us distinctive — our creativity, our ability to love, reason and relate to God (though Huxley claimed not to believe in God, it's nice that he saw the need for someone to). All of these human distinctions are replaced in Huxley's novel by science with the help of an all-pervasive state.

Can't happen here? It did in Germany, Russia, China and other places where science joined politicians in a quest for the master race and the perfect state and got the worst of all possible worlds. Aldous Huxley attempted to warn his generation about the consequences of soul-less technology. In our time, who in political and scientific circles is going to sound the warning that we should know the rules of the road and our destination before putting our trust in the human genome map, the scientists who can read it and the politicians who seek to manipulate it for their own purposes?

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## It's time for the U.S. energy secretary to go

Just imagine if Bill Richardson — rather than J. Robert Oppenheimer — had been entrusted with locking down secrets at the Los Alamos weapons laboratory during the Manhattan Project.

Adolph Hitler would have won the race to develop the world's first atomic bomb. We'd all be speaking German today.

That's how derelict the energy secretary has been in discharging his duty to safeguard America's nuclear secrets from its enemies. And that's why he needs to relinquish his post — voluntarily or involuntarily.

It was a mere 13 months ago that Richardson declared, "Our nation's nuclear secrets are today safe and secure."

His assurances came in the wake of damning revelations that foreign spies had infiltrated the nation's weapons labs — which the energy secretary oversees — and stolen secrets to every weapon in the U.S. nuclear arsenal.

Richardson accepted no

responsibility for this egregious breach in national security, laying blame at the feet of his predecessors. Nevertheless, he pledged to implement a host of "security reforms" that were to prevent any further thefts of nuclear secrets at Los Alamos and the other weapons labs.

Now we find that Richardson's supposed "security reforms" have utterly failed. For someone was able to stroll into the lab's supposedly "secure" vault at least two months ago and make off with two computer hard drives containing technical details on every nuclear weapon in both the U.S. and Russian arsenals.

And, once the disappearance of the hard drives was discovered (on May 7), once Richardson was finally clued in on the security breach (24 days later), and once a full-blown investigation was under way, someone was able to stroll into the lab's supposedly "secure" X Division and return the missing drives without detection.

"There's going to be disciplinary action," Richardson harrumphed. "There's going to be accountability."

Well, sure. It goes without saying that the culprits who made off with the hard drives from the "secure" vault at Los Alamos must be disciplined (maybe they'll be thrown in a prison cell next to Wen Ho Lee, the former Los Alamos scientist charged with "mishandling" our nation's nuclear secrets).

But someone else must be held accountable for this latest lapse in national security at Los Alamos. And that someone is Richardson, who guaranteed the American people that our nuclear secrets were safe and secure under his watch.

The energy secretary's defenders say that the criticism heaped upon him in recent weeks is strictly "partisan." But it's not just Republicans on Capitol Hill who believe that Richardson has completely fallen down on his job, has betrayed the nation's trust.

Indeed, Sen. Robert Byrd, the West Virginia Democrat, advised Richardson, "You will never again receive the support of the Senate for any office to which you might

be appointed. It's gone. You've squandered your treasure."

And Byrd was echoed by Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle, the South Dakota Democrat, who was one of Richardson's staunchest defenders last year when the first Los Alamos security breach was revealed.

"The bottom line is that the buck has to stop somewhere," said Daschle. "And it generally does with the secretary of energy."

Richardson has lost the confidence of fellow Democrats, of former colleagues on Capitol Hill, not merely because of the latest theft of nuclear secrets from a national weapons lab, but because the theft is symptomatic of the overall, woeful state of security at Los Alamos, Sandia and Lawrence Livermore — despite the energy secretary's supposed security reforms.

Bill Richardson has proven himself unfit to oversee security of the nation's nuclear weapons laboratories. As the Germans might say: Bei ihm ist Hopfen und Malz verloren (He's a dead loss).

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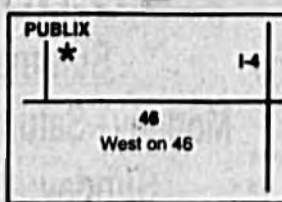

feited. The \$100 is also forfeited if the signs are found in the street right-of-way.

Community Development director Charles Row said the city is often faced with candidates claiming that they did not place any signs in the right-of-way, saying someone else placed the signs inappropriately.

Candidates have also complained that the 30-day requirement often does not correspond with the qualification period.

Ten out of 15 candidates who turned in petitions last week for county races had the number of signatures required to avoid paying a qualifying fee.

Those who will not be

required to pay a fee include county judge Group 4, Carmine Bravo; county judge Group 3, Jeff Dean and Mark Herr; County Commission District 5, Bob West and Don Nicholas; County Commission District 3, Grant Maloy and Stephanie Smith; Clerk of the Court, Maryanne Morse; Property Appraiser, Bill Suber; and Supervisor of Elections, Sandra "Sandy" Goad.

Candidates who did not get enough signatures to qualify for office can pay a fee during

qualifying week, July 17-21. The fees vary depending on the office, whether the race is partisan, and whether the candidate is from a major of minor political party.

School Board candidate Dede Schaffner, who is running against Bob Goff, turned in more than 2,000 petitions, needing 1,862 to be validated. However, because of signatures from unregistered voters and duplicates, she came up 32 signatures short.

In addition, School Board candidate Sylvia Pond and County Commission candidate Dean Ray also did not have enough signatures.

Two Libertarian candidates for County Commission races did not have enough signatures to avoid paying the fee. James Coakley Jr. is running in District 1 and Zea Proctor is running in District 3.

# State offers waivers on federal education loans

The Florida Department of Education is offering a waiver of the one percent fee on federal education loans.

The waiver is expected to save Florida students and parents \$6 million over the next year.

"In a time when every dollar counts for students pursuing higher education, we are proud to offer this substantial savings to college students and parents in Florida," said Tom Gallagher,

the state's Commissioner of Education.

Federal law allows financial institutions to collect up to one percent in fees as an insurance premium from each education loan they guarantee. This fee has been used to pay lenders for loan defaults and to support default prevention programs.

The waiver is available to all borrowers filing for Federal Stafford Student and Federal PLUS Parent loans guaranteed on or after July 1 of this year, for any borrower using the Florida

Federal Family Education Loan Program as its guarantor.

The state Department of Education is the nation's eighth largest guarantor of educational loans and offers more than \$300 million in scholarships annually.

Gallagher said he believes the fee waiver will encourage students and parents to ask for a Florida guaranteed loan, and in the process, save money for Floridians.

the frame is extended, netting designed to catch a falling infant unfurls.

When the crib is properly balanced with weights, the netting can hold up to 100 pounds. Should a fall occur, an alarm system attached to the netting alerts parents.

The Kiddie Katcher is designed to be easily used and

can be attached to existing cribs or built into new models. The students tested their prototype with weights and developed a system of counterbalances to ensure the crib does not tip over.

The invention is currently one of the top three entries in the region, including Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Mississippi. Nearly 2,000 students participated nationwide.

The grand prize, a \$25,000 Columbus Foundation Community Grant, went to a group of eighth-grade students from Houston, Texas.

Students finishing in first place in the contest each win \$5,000 college scholarships. Second place earns each student a \$3,000 scholarship. Third place winners win \$1,000 scholarships.

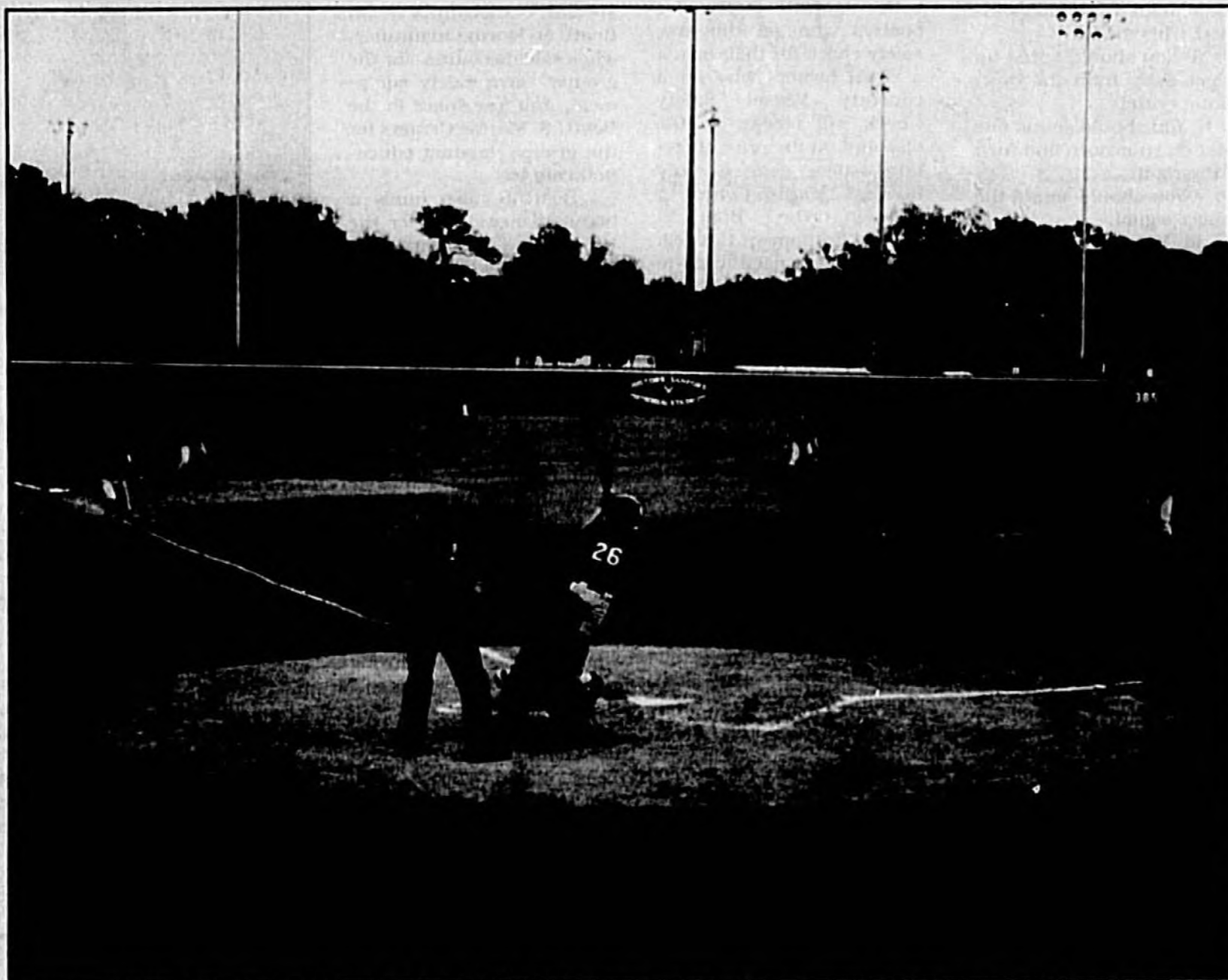

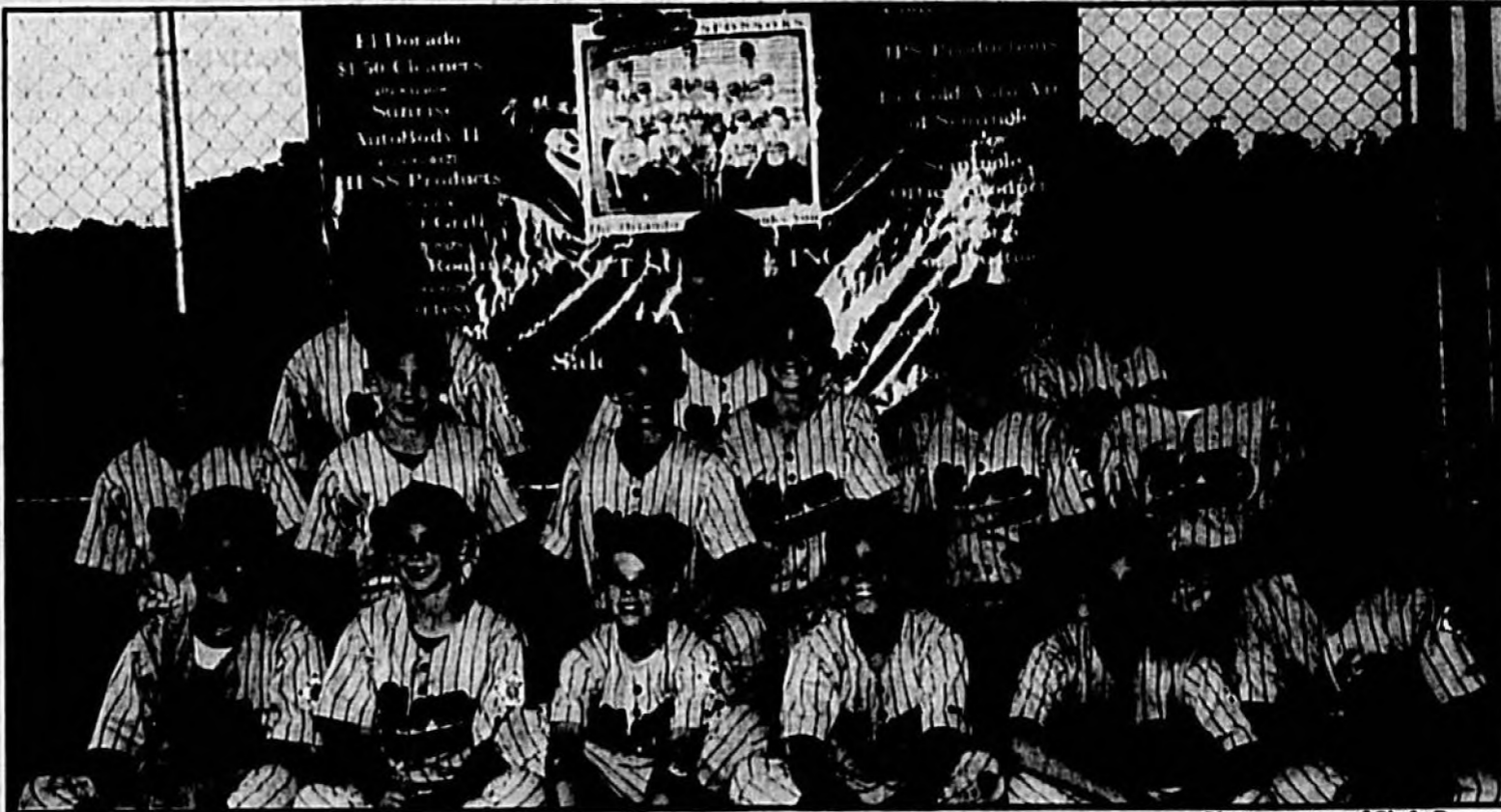

educational requirements, more than half allow successful completion of the BoatU.S. online course to meet their requirements.

John Yarbro of Greer, SC, who recently won the first Boating Safety Challenge drawing for the Garmin Etrex, said, "I thought the online course was better than any course in over 20 years of service in the U.S. Navy."

"The Boating Safety Challenge is a great way to update your boating safety skills and have a chance to win a GPS," said Chris Edmonston, BoatU.S. Foundation program administrator.

He noted that Michigan, with more boats than any other state, recently enacted a law requiring everyone from out of state to pass a safe boating course before riding PWCs on Michigan waters.

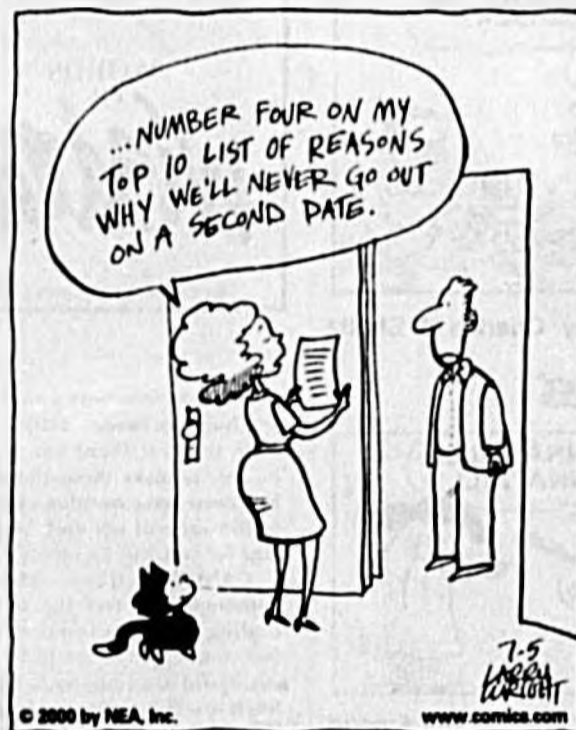

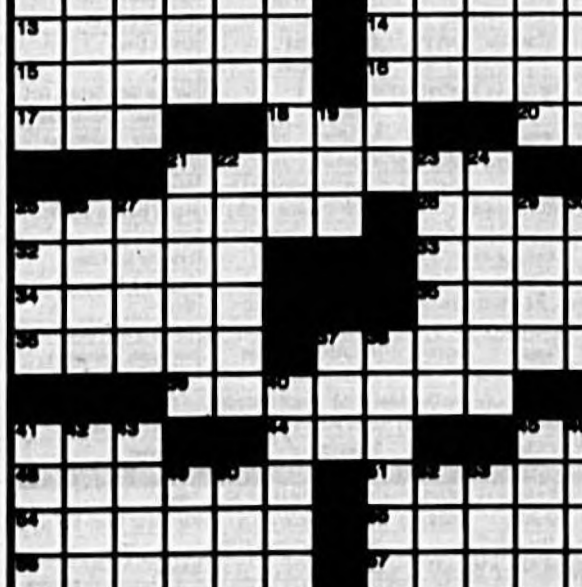
