



### A New One, The SLA

Russell Key, secretary of the Florida Press Association, who writes an interesting column for a number of Florida newspapers, has come out with a suggestion which is likely to receive more attention in the near future, and which, it seems to us, should have received the consideration of congressmen long before this. He proposes that in addition to the NRA, the PWA, the RFC and all the rest, there should be created a SLA.

Now the SLA, in case you haven't yet guessed it, means a Small Loan Association. Its purpose would be to make loans of from ten to five hundred dollars to persons of very limited means who on small regular wages or salaries are temporarily in need of more funds than their incomes provide. The SLA would not require security for the loans other than the good name and reputation of the applicants and a steady job with a fixed income.

Once a regular part of our economic system, such loans have largely passed out of existence during the past few years in so far as the better class of credit institutions are concerned. The only places where a man with a small income and no gilt-edged securities can obtain accommodation are pawnshops and questionable finance companies which almost invariably charge exorbitant rates of interest.

Commenting on these so-called loan sharks, Mr. Key points out that the legal rate of interest in Florida, as far as these finance companies are concerned, is about 42 per cent, and that some of these agencies, when dealing with particularly ignorant clients, have been known to go far beyond this limit. He cites one case where a man had borrowed twenty dollars and during the next four years had paid \$640 in interest and still owed the principal.

Probably eighty-five per cent of the people in this country can secure no credit accommodations at all except from such concerns as these. When sickness or death, or some other catastrophe, creates a sudden and exceptional burden on the family budget, there is nothing for them to do except to go begging, or to borrow from some loan shark who will bleed the life out of them for years to come.

If it is good business for the government to make loans to banks and insurance companies in order that their obligations may be met; if it is a proper function for the government to provide funds to railroads to meet their bond maturities; surely it is not heresy to suggest that some lending agency be provided under governmental control which might supply small amounts of cash to the average run of citizens at reasonable interest rates.

Such an addition as SLA to our already rather inclusive alphabet soup might well be the finishing touch to our battle for recovery. At least it would give the little fellow as much of a square deal as the big fellow gets.

### Protection Of Wild Life

Of interest to sportsmen generally and particularly to nimrods, is the announcement that the federal government proposes to "do something" toward the elimination of conditions which have reacted adversely on the wild game, especially waterfowl, of the country. The plan calls for the creation of a federal conservation agency into which will be concentrated all the various game protection devices in the United States.

It is proposed to link together the NRA and AAA in such a way that jobs will be given to the unemployed in assisting to protect and to increase wild life and to provide uses for the marginal farm lands which will be taken out of production through the workings of the agricultural act. Section 202 of the Recovery Act calls for the "construction and improvement of publicly-owned instrumentalities and facilities for the conservation and development of natural resources."

At the present time the government owns some fifty-five National Wild Life Reservations, comprising about 5,000,000 acres, which might be developed into migratory bird refuges, the Associated Press explains. For the protection of upland game birds, such as pheasant, quail and partridge, use may be made of acreages taken out of crop production under the Farm Administration's acreage reduction program. In addition, farmers will be educated in using production control areas for raising game as a farm crop and in producing and marketing game birds.

It was estimated that employment would be given to between 2,000 and 10,000 men in reforesting and improving drained lands once used by wild fowl as nesting and breeding areas. The Civilian Conservation Corps already has done extensive work in state and federal areas to reclaim land for wild game use. Funds to finance the plan would come from public works or other Federal appropriations, according to preliminary plans. In order to make possible an early start, with provisions for the ultimate return of the money through a system of taxation and licenses.

Secretary Wallace, of the Department of Agriculture, has already appointed a committee for the purpose of developing this plan. Its chairman is Thomas H. Beck, editorial director of Collier's magazine. Other members include J. N. Darling, cartoonist for the New York Herald Tribune, and Professor Aldo Leopold, of the University of Wisconsin. It is hoped that this committee will be able to perfect a plan for the protection of the wild life in this country and also one which will bring about an increase in its production.
