## CAPONE WANTS TO PUT END TO GANG WARFARE

**Head of the Underworld and King of Beer Runners Says "There's Enough Business" for All of the Gang Heads**

Chicago, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Al "Scarface" Capone, reputed leader of the underworld and beer runner "extraordinary," wants to see the end of gang warfare in Chicago "because there is enough business for all of us without killing each other like animals in the street."

Capone, who has taken the name of Brown, gave his version of the gang feuds in a small hotel room, which he said had been his home office and shelter for 14 months.

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Capone saw the genesis of gang killings in the breaking away of members of his own organization, including Weiss, "Schemer" Drucel and Don O'Banion. Capone set up here seven years ago with John Torrio and "Nails" Norton.

## D.P. Davis Drowned In Mid-Ocean While On Way To Europe

**Wealthy Developer's Death is Confirmed In Radiogram From His 2 Companions**

Tampa, Fla., Oct. 13.—AP.—D. P. Davis, vice-president of Davis Island here, and one of the best known real estate men in Florida, was drowned while enroute to Europe, according to a radiogram received here this morning by Arthur Y. Milam, vice president of the D. P. Davis properties.

The radiogram follows: "Davis told overboard early this morning. Ship circled over. Everything in possible done. No hope. Advise family. (Signed) Raymond and Monty."

The persons who signed the telegram are Raymond Schneider and F. W. Montayne, employees of the D. P. Davis organization. They sailed from New York with Mr. Davis last Saturday, Mr. Milam said.

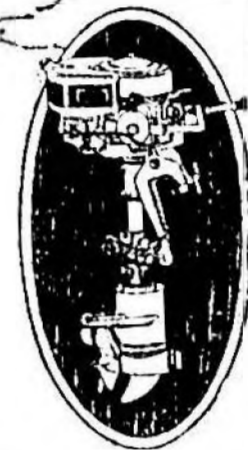

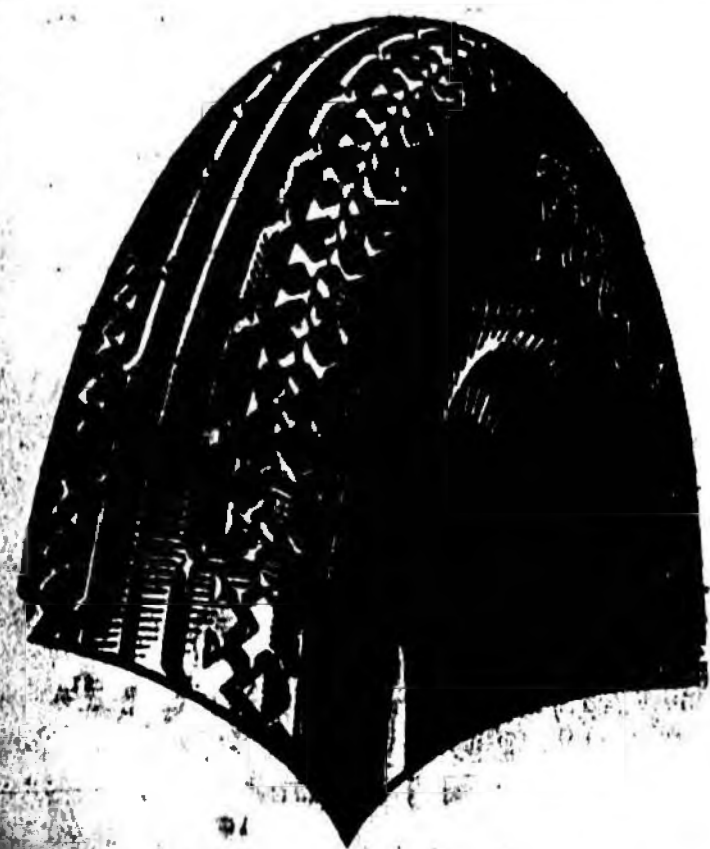

**ELEVEN PREPARES FOR PALANDO TILT**

**Schell's Protoges Are Put Through Hard Workouts in Preparation for Game That to Be Played Saturday**

**Three New Players Have Joined Squad**

**Team Strengthened Considerably by Addition of Two Line-men and Half Back**

Sanford High School's football team, after having bowed in defeat before the strong Putnam team last Saturday, has settled down to a week of practice before the Orlando game next Saturday. Orlando is one of the hardest teams the local eleven faces this year and the battle cry of "Down Orlando" has been adopted.

The team is in good shape and will be stronger next Saturday than it has been for any of the games thus far. The team has been materially strengthened by the coming of two additional line-men and one half back, all of whom entered school last Monday.

Bart and Angus Fordham former of Buford South Carolina, experienced football players, are making an excellent show. Both of these boys are line-men and weigh about 200 pounds. In two practices this week he has opened holes in the line that horse and wagon could go through. Angus Fordham is a tackle and weighs about 170 pounds. He has also been playing football this year.

Stotenberg is the new backfield man and he has shown up very well so far. He plays one of the half positions and weighs about 150 pounds.

The remainder of the squad is in good condition and will be in good condition for the hard game this week. Captain Thompson feels that had effects from the blow that he received in the Palatka game. the bay upon the shores of the first island. At the same time hundreds of workers were employed in clearing off weeds and trees and within a few months the island was bare of the vegetation which had hidden the soil.

A boulevard was constructed and many other paved roadways were built. Early buyers of lots began to erect homes and Davis let contracts for half dozen handsome homes, three of which have been constructed.

At the time when he turned over the development to Stone and Webster he had progressed considerably in carrying out his promise to the city commission. The Boston concern immediately took up the work and has been pushing Davis' plans to completion.

Just before he relinquished his active interest in Davis Islands, Davis undertook the development of a large real estate project at St. Augustine known as Davis Islands. He was also interested in development projects in Texas and Florida.

Davis married Elizabeth, daughter of Tampa Oct. 10, 1925, at St. Petersburg. He had two sons by his marriage, George R. and David, Jr.

Miss Nelson, a popular society girl of Tampa, was reigning queen of the Gasparilla carnival at the time of her marriage. The couple had their wedding guests secret an hour before they motored to St. Petersburg when they notified the family. Immediately after the marriage they went to New York on a honeymoon trip.

On Dec. 10, 1925, social circles in Tampa and throughout the state were surprised at a report from Key West to the effect that D.P. Davis had been granted a divorce on the grounds of desertion. The divorce was signed by Judge J. Peterson B. Browns of Key West.

Finally these fellows began to make a little money and forgot we were the ones who put them in business. They began thinking they were bigger than we were. Then they told us they were going in for themselves. Well, that was all right with us. We figured there were customers for all the beer in the world, and they were welcome to those they could dig up.

"But pretty soon they began to get nasty. Nails and O'Banion had been killed and the other guys were feeling chesty. Finally we had to talk to them about it and tell them to stay in their own yard and behave themselves."

Soon after, however, Terrio was attacked, but according to Capone was willing to forgive and forget.

"I talked to Hymie Weiss and the others, saying: 'What do you want to do? Die before you're 30? I don't.' We started over. We kept our bargain, but they broke theirs. I sent word to those fellows to stop while some of us were left alive. They would not listen. A couple weeks after that 11 cars drove past this hotel at noon and gave us a machine gun fire that made this street look like a battlefield."

Then followed another fierce conference, which broke up when Capone and he refused to offer up for an assassination the two men who had fired on Duce and Weiss on Michigan. The investigation into the shooting Monday, did not divulge any valuable clues.

One inquiry was started into charges that the murderers had uncovered a gang plot backed by at least \$100,000 to corrupt witnesses and jurors in the murder trial of Joe Salas, a Weiss henchman.

Simultaneously, federal authorities started an investigation of a report of a plot to bomb the home of United States Senator Dineen and other federal authorities, because gangsters believed them responsible for starting a grand jury into Chicago vice conditions.

Ladders run from the "outwalk" to hatches in the side and from there the mechanics travel back their tiny suspended cabins on short duralumin ladders running directly over nothing at all except the far distant earth.

Amidships are the duralumin bunks for the crew and tables where they may read, eat or play cards while off duty. Still further aft the walk drops into the tail of the ship where cables creak as the men in the cabin twist their wheels and shift their leavers. At the forward cabin, "outwalk" jumps upward and continues forward over its top, standing upward to the nose.

The inspection of the ship complete, night had come on. The newspapermen, drawing courage from the unconcern displayed by the ship's crew, crawled into a bunk and slept as serenely as though he were on solid earth and not flying through the clouds.

## Marketing Problem To Be Discussed At Cotton Men's Meet

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 13. (AP) Representatives of cotton grow- ing states were assembling here today for a conference tomorrow which will attempt to determine methods of marketing the present cotton crop and finance the 1927 planting. The conference was called by Governor H. L. Whitfield of Mississippi.

At a conference yesterday at Osceola, Arkansas, representatives of the cotton growing industry moved to meet the low price emer- gency by legislative enactment re- quiring a 50 per cent reduction in acreage for 1927. The general as- sembly of Arkansas was called on to enact a law guaranteeing a 50 per cent cut in next year's crop.

## WILLS IS DECISIVELY BEATEN BY SHARKE

### DOWNFALL OF WILLS IS SEEN BY BIG CROWD

### Referee Stops Battle In The 13th Round and Gives Decision To Sharkey on Foul

### Negro Conceded Only One Round

### Victor Goes in Ring With Disadvantage Of About 26 Pounds

NEW YORK, Oct. 12 (AP)—Graduates of Uncle Sam's boxing outfit stand today in supreme command of America's best weight fighting forces. Less than a month after the Tunney, ex-harrier, captured the Dempsey and won the world championship, Jack Sharkey, Boston, erstwhile pugilist, made a decisive victory over Harry Wills, negro, and ex longshoreman, in a fight for 46,000 spectators at Flamingo Field last night.

The downfall of the "Black Panther" who for seven years had reigned as the outlandish crown of pugilism, came on a lead which Wills, 37, was a bleeding, almost helpless figure, stumbling about in an effort to stem the two-lasted attack of a 23 year old when the referee, Harry Haley, stepped between the fighters in the thirteenth round of the action and declared the fight over.

Wills had been warned repeatedly by Haley for starting rather prolonged landing in the clinch. Wills' face, and Wills' left hand while he pointed away at the body with his right, all had brought their warning. The way to his corner at the end of all championship fights for Wills.

Wills handled Sharkey easily in the clinches, but took a right and hit to the head as they broke apart. Wills jabbed with his left but failed to keep it sharp, repeated misdeeds. They were circling away at each other with little to do when the bell sounded. A left jab was sent to Sharkey.

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Wills took a sharp left to the face. Blood showed from a cut under his right eye. Sharkey complained the negro was holding. Wills rushed and then drove a vicious right to the negro's head. Sharkey was more than holding his own at fighting. Wills covered up and was bleeding badly after taking a pounding at close quarters just before the bell.

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Seven of 13 Escaped Convicts Recaptured

NASHVILLE, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Seven of the 13 escaped convicts who made their way to freedom through an underground passage from the Tennessee state prison here last night had been recaptured this morning, prison authorities told the Associated Press.

The prisoners made their way through a hole which had been dug in the rear of a cell. They were led by W. A. Craig, sentenced from Memphis on a charge of murder.

It was thought one of the loose prisoners was responsible for the robbery of Robert Hinkle, an ambulance driver after taking all of Hinkle's clothing the holdup man fled, leaving his victim shivering in an alley.
