We would prefer to see the OPA gradually liquidated during the next two years with some limitations remaining on house rentals even longer than that, if all its regulations were prepared in a spirit of justice to all parties concerned and if its price cellings could be enforced with equal fairness and firmness. Since the national economy has been taught to walk on crutches, it is hardly fair to kick the props out from under it all of a sudden.

However, when President Truman and his administration came out in favor of immediate wage increases follow ing the war and set the stage for the industrial strife which has marked our reconversion efforts, they themselves were sounding the death knell of the OPA. Any reasonable man knew that you could not raise wages without dangerously increasing the pressure against the price cellings while in-terruption of production in the midst of great national shortages was simply to invite the very inflation which Chester Bowles fears.

The net effects of a situation which finds the moneyin the pockets of the consuming public being constantly increased while the production of goods is curtailed is to bring more and more pressure against the OPA's price ceilings and to turn buyers from the legitimate dealers where prices are low and goods unohtainable to the black markets where the prices may be high but where anything can be bought for a price.


