Voss Is Confident He Will Win Over Rep. Joe Hendricks

ORLANDO, April 22. (Special) — With definite assurances of victory flooding his headquarters from throughout Central Florida, Tom Voss, candidate for Congress, expressed confidence here yesterday that he would be swept into office by an overwhelming vote on May 7.

"I am convinced," he said, "that the people want a change in Washington."

"Two years ago," he continued, "a young Orlandoan, Reynolds Duncan, announced against the present Congressman. Three days after his announcement he reported to Camp Blanding as a draftee."

"Despite the fact that Mr. Duncan was unable to make a single speech or conduct any campaign whatsoever he received 37 per cent of the vote on election day. This was largely a protest vote against the Washington way of doing things."

"The opposition vote will be considerably greater this year. I find so many of our people are sick and tired of Washington bungling. In addition to this protest vote, thousands of returned war veterans have become new qualified voters. They too, are disgusted with the Washington muddling of housing, surplus government property, and the ridiculous red tape in connection with the GI Bill of Rights. They definitely favor a change."

Voss added that sentiment for a thorough Washington housecleaning was sweeping the district and he refused to concede his opponent a single county on May 7.

LaGuardia Appeals To Coal Miners To Resume Operations

Key Men In Railroad Operating Brotherhoods To Make Last Decision Tomorrow

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Director General E. H. LaGuardia of the UNRRA has appealed to both miners and operators involved in the current coal strike to resume operations. LaGuardia told the disputants that at least a partial resumption of bituminous mining is needed no coal will be available to move inland desperately needed famine relief supplies in starving areas of the world.

The United Mine Workers chairman, John L. Lewis, plans to leave Washington today for Hazleton, Pa., for a conference with anthracite mine union leaders on new contract demands in the hard coal industry. The present contract Lewis has with the anthracite operators can be terminated on May 31.

CLEVELAND — Key men of the railroad operating brotherhoods — the trainmen and engineers — meet behind closed doors tomorrow to make a final decision on a fact-finding board's recommendation for a 10-cent an hour wage boost and working rule changes. The key men — some 175 general chairmen of the brotherhoods — are expected to decide whether the nation's railroads will continue operation after May 18 or be tied up by a strike by 243,000 workers.

Secretary Asserts Frank Unaware Of Maidanek Activity

NUERNBERG, Germany, Apr. 23, (AP)—The former Nazi general, Hans Frank, was depicted today as an official who was under the impression that the notorious Maidanek concentration camp in Poland was merely a workcamp. A defense witness, Josef Buehler, testified before the Nuernberg War Criminal Tribunal that Frank believed the camp was a workcamp for the use of German troops at the Russian front. Buehler served as Frank's secretary during the German occupation of Poland.

Band Invades Maggiore Cemetery and Robs Mouldering Remains of Fascist Leader; Captives Threaten to Hang Guards

MILAN, Italy, April 23, (AP)—The Italian city of Milan is still today over a sensational grave-robbery and a prison riot. Some time during the night, a band of ghouls invaded the Maggiore Cemetery in Milan and removed the mouldering remains of Benito Mussolini from the unmarked pauper's grave in which the disgraced Duce was buried. The excited local authorities are investigating to find out who, as they say it, were the unknown persons who robbed the grave.

Civil Strife In Manchuria Is Continued

Marshall Is Awaiting Red's Proof That American Aircraft Attacked Troops

CHUNGKING, April 23 (AP)—The mystery of whom planes strafed Chinese Communists in the Szechwan area of Manchuria appears to have been solved. General Marshall in Washington has been informed that Chinese pilots were over the area in American-made P-51's. One Chinese pilot is missing. A message from an American officer in Mukden asked General Marshall to make sure that the Chinese put their own insignia on the planes, which had been obtained from the United States. The officer said the planes still carry the American white star emblem, covered with cold water paint.

CHUNGKING, April 23, (AP)—The fighting between Chinese Communists and Nationalist troops continues unabated in Manchuria with small signs that General Marshall's new truce efforts have yet had any effect. A peiping dispatch to the People's Daily at Chungking says a vanguard of the Government's First Army has reached Kung-ching, 10 miles south of Chang-chun. Because Kung-ching is some 30 miles north of Szechwan, where Communists and Communist armies are fighting, observers presume a part of the First Army has passed Szechwan to reach Kung-ching. Hitter fighting is predicted in this area, where 80,000 Communist troops are said to be concentrated.

While Chungking peace parleys continue, the armed thrusts of Communists in Manchuria are said to be moving ahead. Already small groups are said to have moved into Harbin where the Russians are scheduled to get out Thursday. However, Russian officials in control of the Chinese Eastern Railway were said to have granted Communist flyers permission to transport troops to Harbin. Government sources previously had conceded that Chinese Communists could carry out their threat to occupy Harbin in force. "The Russian has denied the demand that Chinese Communists prove or retract their charge that American planes had attacked their camp in the Szechwan area last week. Maj. Gen. Keller Rockey of the Third Marine Amphibious Force at Tinian has denied the Communist charge and says no Marine plane had flown as far north as Mukden.

The OPA and Price Ceilings

Regardless of what eventually happens to the OPA, the situation will probably not be as demoralizing as pictured by Mr. Chester Bowles...

We would prefer to see the OPA gradually liquidated during the next two years with some limitations remaining on house rentals even longer than that...

However, when President Truman and his administration came out in favor of immediate wage increases following the war and set the stage for the industrial strife which has marked our reconversion efforts...

The net effects of a situation which finds the money in the pockets of the consuming public being constantly increased while the production of goods is curtailed is to bring more and more pressure against the OPA's price ceilings...

More and more one is hearing such comments in the market places. "I didn't ask you how much it costs. I want some bacon." Or, "Don't tell me you haven't any butter. I'm willing to pay for it."

How high will prices go if the OPA is suddenly abolished? That is hard to say, even for Chester Bowles, because everything depends upon production...

Nobody is going to like these price increases except, of course, the producers. And some folks are going to be hurt by them, but as between black markets, with all the gangsterism and lawlessness that they involve...

Veterans Build Homes

While everybody is excited over getting houses built for veterans, 100 GI's in Dallas, Tex., have decided to build their own. The company, called the GI construction Co., is headed by a former chief petty officer who built air strips in the Pacific...

These men, who learned their building skills under fire in Europe and the Pacific, expect to put up 400 houses, giving veterans preference as customers. They even handle the details of getting the GI loan. They have encountered the usual building material shortages, but their battlefield experiences in improvising have stood them in good stead in this civilian work...

Here's a heartening veteran story. These men are not waiting for the government to do something for them. They have learned that the government, like God, helps those who help themselves.

South American Roads

Central and South American countries are bidding for tourists from the United States in a very practical manner. Studying this country's road building techniques are 21 engineers from South America. They are attending traffic control classes at Yale University, getting realistic training under state highway departments by working on new projects, visiting equipment plants and generally absorbing U. S. highway-making methods.

When the visiting engineers transplant these theories into reality in their own regions, the North American automobilist will begin to feel at home whizzing over the roads of his neighbors to the south. At present there are few good automobile roads, and the Pan-American Highway is not yet ready for any comfortable travel, because there remain so many gaps in its construction. The traveler is limited by the few plane and railway routes and the slow and plodding burro. This holds him to the larger centers, without much chance to view the countryside as he does in his car at home.

If he will talk with experienced farmers, Agricultural Extension Service workers, and others who are familiar with the problems as well as the possibilities of farming, he will be able to develop his plans with greater promise of success than he would without the information that he can obtain from such people.

There are many factors to be taken into consideration in agriculture—market demand, acreage, production methods, soil condition, pest control, costs and returns, and others—and the veteran who is thinking about farming should learn as much as he can about all of them.

After their war experiences, it is easy to understand why many veterans find the quiet and the creative characteristic of agricultural life appealing, and everyone wishes them well. It is, however, very important for those who enter this vocation to have a realistic understanding of what is necessary to attain their objectives; if they have such an understanding, their chances of success will be far greater than they would be otherwise.

By Spuds Johnson VETERAN THINKING ABOUT FARM WILL DO WELL TO GET INFORMATION FIRST. Since the end of the war, scores of veterans have gone into farming in Florida, and it is the hope of all that they will succeed. Some are raising poultry, others are raising livestock, and others are concentrating on such crops as vegetables, flowers, and citrus and other fruits. Whatever their specialties all of them will do well to keep in mind the importance of producing as much as possible of their home food supplies. It is also well for them to try to produce more than one cash crop for market. Diversification is just as important in farming today as it ever was. Many farms being operated by veterans are not large, as farms go, and this means that intensive agriculture must be practiced to make them successful. Diversification, rotation, soil conservation, and improvement, and careful planning are necessary. Some lands, such as much of the federal acreage available for homesteads, simply are not fertile enough to produce crops profitably, and veterans who have thought of obtaining farms should investigate carefully the condition of the soil and its possibilities before buying. It is highly important that the veteran investigate before he goes into the rather complex business of trying to make a...

William Helis Counting On Rippey To Come Through In 1946 Derby

NEW YORK, Apr. 23 (AP)—Some one of these Springs you will be reading about William Helis, the New Orleans oil man, winning the Kentucky Derby. It may even be this year when the classic will have its 77th running at Churchill Downs on May 4.

Helis, in case you've forgotten, is the man who got his most publicity out of a horse that never raced—he paid \$85,000 for Pericles. Helis thought he had a bit of a strangle hold on last Spring's Blue Grass renewal but none of his three-year-olds ever reached the starting gate.

Now he has come up with a bay colt called Rippey. The son of Pompey-Broad Rippey, unraced as a juvenile last year, won his first start with plenty to spare.

Running in an overnight allowance at Tropical Park on March 23, Rippey broke third from the gate and soon opened a lead of 10 lengths. He won easily by six lengths in 1:11 1/5 for six furlongs.

Helis bought Rippey for \$12,000 and now there's a price tag of \$100,000 on the colt whose sire, Pompey, was second choice in the Derby 20 years ago. Pompey quit after showing early foot and finished fifth, 12 lengths behind the winner, Col. E. R. Bradley's Bubbling Over.

Helis, who paid \$100,000 for Vadhia Orphan and \$55,000 for Attention had a poor year on the turf in 1944 but that didn't stop the wealthy sportsman from increasing his racing stock and holdings. In 1945 he did fairly well.

Last August he was top man at the Meadow Brook sales on Long Island, paying \$62,200 for seven yearlings. At the Kenilwood sale in Kentucky he came out second in bidding, spending \$122,740 for 12 thoroughbred babies.

Helis will be in the yearling market again this season, but in 1947 his Helis Stock Farm, the old Hancock Farm at Jobstown, N. J., will produce about 20 yearlings.

5 Winners in 6 Days
If his five winners in the first six days of the 1946 New York season at Jamaica is an indication of his turf success, it appears as though his patience is about to be rewarded.

If Rippey gets to the post on Derby day it will be the first time that Helis will have his sights in the run for the roses. Rippey's early workouts for the \$100,000 added test show that he's ready.
