Some Are Up For Trial, Some

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—Nine tragedies stand out as dramatic spectacles in the news of America today and all present women in the leading roles.

At Kansas City Marie F. Beal was acquitted last night on the charge of murdering her lover, Frank Warren Anderson.

At Los Angeles the jury in the case of Clara Phillips, accused of beating Mrs. Alberta Meadows to death with a hammer, is tentatively convinced Mrs. Meadows was guilty of the love of Mrs. Phillips' husband.

At Fresno, Calif., George T. Harp is acquitted by a common jury of murdering his wife to death, with intent for manslaughter.

At Philadelphia Mrs. Catherine Reynolds is acquitted of killing her husband with a dagger. Facial trial for the same charge.

At Hackensack, N. J., George Chino is acquitted of murdering Mrs. Therese and Charles Scullion on trial for the murder of John Bergen.

At Cleveland, Ohio, the trial of Mrs. Mable Champion, alleged slayer of Thomas O'Connell, has been postponed until next week.

At White Cloud, Mich., Mrs. Mada Hohl is on trial for killing her husband in law with poison.

At New Brunswick, state officials are over the task of attempting to solve the Hall Mills murders.

## WILL HEAR REPORTS ON BIRD BANDING

(By The Associated Press)  
PHOENIX, Oct. 24.—The American ornithologists' union, the largest organization of its kind in the world, will convene its forty-fifth annual meeting at the Field Museum of Natural History here today.

The union, first organized in 1883, now has enrolled about 1,150 persons in its membership, of which about 200 are in foreign countries. This year's meeting will be the first ever held in the Mississippi Valley.

Results of recent work in banding birds in the United States and Canada and a special report from the European bird banding station on the Baltic sea will come before the meeting. Summaries on expeditions into the South Pacific and South America, conducted by the American Museum of Natural History, will be given. Exhibits of bird paintings by American Artists will be shown.

When the splendid boat basin is constructed on the lake front other improvements are made Sanford will then have taken advantage of the water front and there will be big steamers tying up at not only the Clyde Line docks but at the municipal docks that will be built by the city.





Des Moines tops the list with 51 per cent, while Grand Rapids has only 45 per cent. Recent government statistics in the United States show that 45 per cent of the people of the United States own their own homes and 44.4 per cent live in rented quarters.
