Col. Lindbergh's Philosophy

Those who are satisted with British propaguids and would like to read the side of the argument which is suppressed by the "controlled press" of this country would be interested in "A Letter To Americans" by Col. Charies Lindbergh which appears in the current issue of Collier's magazine and in more or less abbreviated form in practically every newspaper in the United States.

Col. Lindbergh writes a must logical and convincing appeal to freedom loving Americans to keep out of war, to stop sending aid to Britain, to let Europe wallow in its own mire, and to stay at home and strictly mind our own business. It is none of our affair, the Colonel contends, and by intervening we are only piling up trouble for ourselves, for our children and our children's children.

The crux of Lindbergh's argument is that there is nothing we can do for England anyway which would malerially alter her fate and that by interfering we are merely prolonging the agony and atleking our own necks out, thus inviting the most ignominious defeat any country ever suffered. "I believe that for us to enter the conflict in Europe at this time would result in defeat and humiliation," he writes.
