Drivers' License

While the drivers' license bill as passed by the House of Representatives yesterday is not as strict as it might have been, and falls far short of regulating all those features of highway driving which are a menace to public safety, it is a step in the right direction and should be made a part of the laws of Florida.

Under the terms of this bill which has been amended and redrafted a good many times, anyone at all over sixteen years of age who has driven an automobile during the past year could obtain a driver's license. According to these provisions, even a deaf person, or one who was partly blind could obtain a license.

However, after the first year, licenses would not be renewed to persons who had shown themselves to be habitual drunkards, narcotic addicts, insane, or otherwise incompetent to drive. Imagine an insane person, or a "dope fiend" being allowed to drive a car! They can at present.

Furthermore, this bill provides that under certain conditions licenses can be revoked. Conviction of manslaughter following an automobile accident, driving while drunk, any felony in which an automobile is used, "hit and run", or three convictions for reckless driving in one year, would be sufficient grounds for taking a person's license away from him and prohibiting him from driving a car for a period of one year.

Any person found guilty of driving a car without a license would be liable to a maximum fine of \$500 and imprisonment of from two days to six months. The law would be administered by a department of public safety composed of the governor, attorney general, state treasurer, secretary of state, comptroller, railroad commissioner and agricultural commissioner.

Furthermore, this bill also sets up a State Highway patrol system. Sixty men would be employed under a safety director employed by the State at a salary of \$4,000. This patrol would enforce all traffic regulations and would turn over all offenders to local officers who would then have charge of the prosecution.

There are other special provisions in the bill regarding chauffeur's licenses, restricted licenses for persons between 14 and 16 years of age, and instruction permits for persons learning to drive. The department of public safety would also be empowered to make special regulations as occasion arose.

This bill has already passed the House and is now up to the Senate and Governor Cone. We hope there will be no delay in its becoming a law. All those interested in reducing the accident toll on public highways should use their influence to help make it the law of this State.

Unusual Comparisons

W. R. O'Neal, pioneer resident of Orlando and former president of the First National Bank, recently produced some interesting figures in his column, "Memories", published in the Orlando Sentinel. As some of his figures include Sanford, they should be of particular interest here. In April of 1913, Mr. O'Neal points out, all the banks in Orange county, which then included Seminole County, published their statements. The State Bank of Orlando had deposits of \$975,230.19; and the Orlando Bank & Trust Co. had \$665,115.53. In Sanford there were \$185,876.96 in the Peoples Bank, and \$384,809.84 in the First National Bank. In Apopka there was a bank with \$64,507.33.

This made total deposits for the Orange county of that time of \$2,225,038.65. Mr. O'Neal then goes on to show that the deposits in the financial institutions of Orange county today, excluding Seminole County, amount to practically \$15,000,000, or about seven times as much as they were 26 years ago.

Pointing out that the population then was about 20,000, a figure which we presume included that part of the county now known as Seminole, and today is 45,000, not counting Seminole, which alone has over 20,000, Mr. O'Neal shows that the per capita cash on hand in the banks then was \$111.25 and today is \$333.19.

"In 1913, there was no relief, old age pension, old age assistance, or WPA work", philosophizes Mr. O'Neal. "The County Home had very few guests. Bankers were contented with their income. Merchants did a satisfactory business. The county was growing and real estate increasing in value. Money was available for mortgage loans for anyone who had security. Loans and interest was paid when due. There must be a reason, which it would seem reasonable men could solve.

"Then, the great majority of men were contented and satisfied, planning for the future, building homes, and expanding business. Those who had money to loan, loaned it with the assurance that it would be paid.

"Now, under more favorable conditions," Mr. O'Neal concludes, "there is fear, anxiety, lack of confidence."

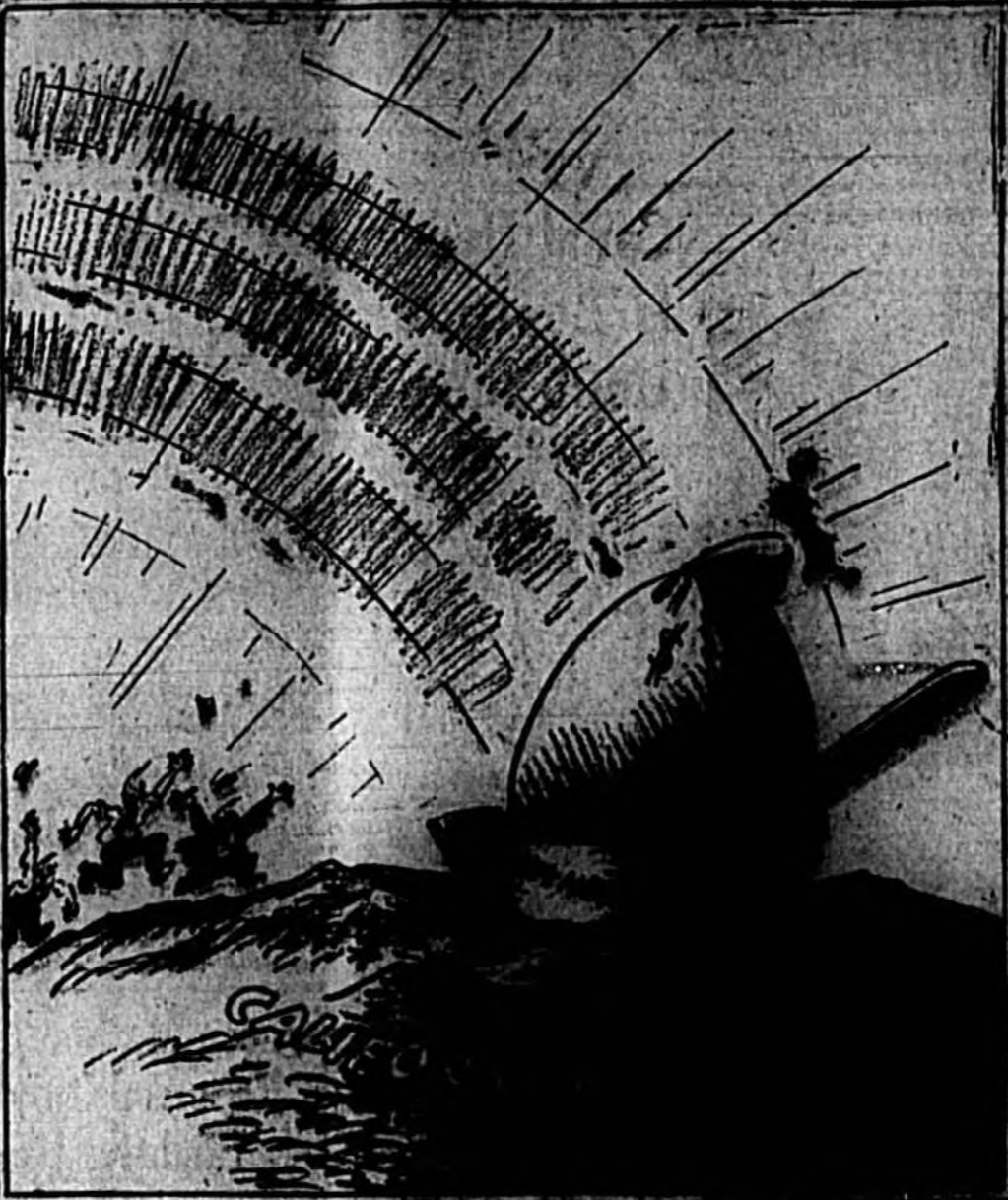
\$1,000 Will Be Given For Best Egg Meal Menu

Florida Workers Paid 190 Million Dollars In 1938

TALLAHASSEE, May 24.—Florida workers were paid 190 million dollars during 1938 according to a report of the Department of the Florida Industrial Commission. The report summarized all returns filed on 1938 employment by firms covered under the Florida unemployment compensation law. Total wages and salaries reported for the year were \$190,000,000. The division collected contributions at the rate of 2.7 percent on \$5,225,945.19, which was credited to the employers under the pay roll tax of 3 percent in the Federal Social Security Act.
