Marriage Is Help To Students, Says Dean

IOWA CITY, May 13.—(AP)—Marriage has proved an aid to scholastic attainments at the University of Iowa, a survey of more than 100 married couples residing on the campus disclosed.
"Nearly 60 per cent" Dean of Men Robert F. Rowan and Dean of Women Virginia D. Irge said, "grades of students married while attending school improved after they assumed the responsibility of marriage."
Dean Irge added:
"The chief problem these students face is the question of financing their lives together. Many of them have told me they could live more cheaply in a little apartment than they could at their father's and sororities."

Rhode Island Hits Florida Vehicle Law

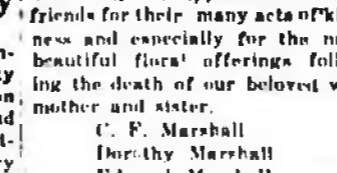
PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 13.—(AP)—Because Rhode Islanders who go to Florida to work during the racing season have been forced to register their automobiles immediately upon arrival, Floridians who come to Rhode Island to accept employment or establish business must register their cars and pay a full year's fee, Wilfred J. Paquin, chief of the Division of Motor Vehicles, has ruled.
On the statute books here is a law allowing reciprocity between this and other states in the matter of vehicle registration. Hence the ruling and it applies also to Georgia, Iowa, Nevada and New Mexico.

Starting the game with a two-run lead yesterday as they did the day before—a contest with the same club, the Lookouts failed to connect in succeeding innings and lost to the Reds in DeLand by a 3-1 score. The Reds collected eight double plays, four of them by Holdstock.

Dave Swindell and Bill Cates scored Sanford's two counters in the first inning. Malby was the first batter up, and fanned. Stuffy McCrone was then given a base on balls but was out at second on the fielder's choice as Swindell made a play. Cates was hit by the pitcher and went to first and Swindell to second. Barnes then singled, Swindell scored, and in a fast double steal pulled by the locals Cates scored and Barnes went to second. On a passed ball Barnes tried to make third, but he turned his knee while sliding for the bag, rolled off the marker and was called out.

The Lookouts used two pitchers, Veale for five innings and then McCrone the balance of the game.

The Reds counted once in the second, rapped Veale for four hits in the fourth to score three times, and fell upon McCrone, who relieved Veale in the fifth, for five more hits and six runs in the seventh. A hit batsman, a triple, and long fly to center enabled the Reds to add two more in the eighth.

Jimmie Roberson, former DeLand third sacker, who played his first game Sunday with the Reds had a good day at field, making two putouts, five assists without a bobble, and was on the starting end of a double play. Buster Kinard, switched to left field, made two sensational catches of long foul fly balls.

Boxing Relations Of Yale-Harvard Broken

By The Associated Press. CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 13.—Harvard severed boxing relations with Yale as a result of the dispute over the match on Mar. 17 at New Haven, which ended in a 4-to-1 tie.

This break-up, one of the few that has ever occurred in almost a half-century of Harvard-Yale rivalry, became known when the Crimmins committee on the regulation of sports approved 1936-'37 varsity schedules in boxing, wrestling, soccer, tennis and fencing. Yale held its usual place on all except the boxing list.

The demand of Avery Brundage, president of the A. O. C., at its last meeting here Apr. 5 that all Olympic money collected be turned over to the treasurer, brought results, Kirby found.

"We are as well off as we were in 1932 and 1933 at this stage, and far better than in 1920," Kirby said. "If the tryouts in all sports met the estimated amounts, we will go over the top."
