First to announce was Claude Pepper, brilliant, young attorney of Tallahassee, who made so startling and so spectacular a race against the veteran incumbent two years ago With all due respect to the memory of Park Trammell, the feeling is prevalent throughout the state that the election in 1934 was stolen from Mr. Pepper when the "hot vote" of Tampa's Cuban wards was counted and some districts went 600 to 1 against him.

In view of the narrow margin by which Pepper was defeated two years ago, and the fact that his opponent at that time was a man of exceptional political sagacity, who had never been defeated for public office throughout his long political career and who was recognized as one of the strongest vote-getters this state ever produced, and in view of the further fact that it is generally conceded a majority of the people wanted Pepper for their senator at that time, it goes almost without saying that he will be a powerful contender in the present race.

But almost as quick to announce was former Governor Doyle Carlton. 
"The 1935 drop in the American death rate," Dr. Dub lin said, "was foreshadowed by the decline among the Met-ropolitan's 17,000,000 Industrial policyholders, which was announced last January, since the mortality experience of this large cross-section of the general population is an ex-tremely sensitive index of what is happening in the country at large.
