# Unique Salute

It seems certain now that the United States in the near future will have a new national park, one that will be unique in the world.

For the last 10 years, ever since the last American-to-be was processed through it, Ellis Island has stood abandoned in New York Harbor, just beyond the Statue of Liberty, Shortly, says Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udail, he will present a plan to President Johnson whereby the island and its buildings will be turned into a park, with gardens, promenades and an immigration

The latter, suggested some time ago by the National Park Service and countless private citizens, is what will make the park unique.

The immigration movement to America (which still continues, of course) represented the greatest mass migration of people in human history.

In the 180 years between 1781 and 1961, more than 42 million men. women and children staked their lives and fortunes, what little fortunes they may have had, on this new experiment called America. At the peak, in the first decade of this century, nearly nine million came to these shores.

All of us, ultimately, trace back to

immigrants. The contribution of each of the scores of nationalities and ethnic groups to the country is scarcely calculable. America today is not a homogeneous alloy, the product of the so-called "melting pot," but a fabric made of many interwoven cultural strands.

If each nationality were given a

color, the history of the nation would be seen as a multicolored, evolving pattern. At one time or another, a single color is dominant—first the English, then the northern Europeans, the Irish, the Eastern and Southern Europeans, the Chinese and

It is not always a pretty pattern. There is a black hue, the only one forcibly added to the fabric. It has kept apart, as most of the others were at first, before they gradually interwove with the old pattern, adding freshness and strength.

Nothing could be more fitting than that the buildings of old Ellis Island, which represented the end of a long journey and the beginning of hope for so many millions of Americans, should become a museum dedicated to their story.

It is even more fitting that Udall's announcement he made at this time, for it coincides with the publication of John F. Kennedy's last book, "A Nation of Immigrants," on which he was working at the time of his death. Completed by his brother Robert, it makes a plea for the overhauling

# Plane Wreck Sighted Atop

The scattered wreckage of a Bonanza airliner that apparently carried 28 persons to their death was found today on a mountain top about five miles southwest of McCarran

Clark County sheriff's depules said there apparently were no survivors.

Charles Nichals, a pilot for Alamo Airways which aided in the serial search said, "X's pretty badly broken up, pretty well acattered.

A Bonanza spokesman said the sirline is "proceeding with notification of next of kin on the assumption there are no survivors."
