Falls take a greater toil of adult life than any other ype of home accident, according to the Metropolitan Life insurance Company, Palis in the bathtub, however, popularly considered a leading menace to life and limb, actually are responsible for relatively few deaths. This is borne out by a study of the circumstances surrounding fatal accidents in and about the home among the company's adult indus-

Nearly han of the racal talls in the home took place on stairs, but a considerable number occurred when the victims were merely walking about a room, or going from one room to another. In many instances a rug was reported as the cause of the fall, and in others highly polished or wet floors, or objects left carelessly around, were held responsible.

The next most frequent classes of fatal accidents were fires and burns, often the result of the victim dozing off in bed or in an upholstered chair with a lighted cigaret or pipe, or of such practices as pouring gasoline or kerosene on fires to kindle or hasten them,

Absorption of poisonous gas, firearms accidents, and the swallowing of polsons also resulted in a substantial number of the fatalities among those insured.

"Each year accidents in and about the home kill approximately 28,000 people in our country, about 6,000 of them at main working ages of life," the Metropolitan reports. "In addition, at least 100,000 persons are permanently crippled or disabled annually in home accidents, and some 4,000,000 more are injured severely enough to be kept from their regular activities for one day or longer."

A concentrated, nationwist, drive cal check-up to men and women over 50 years of age would save many thousands of lives from caucer, according to the top medical official of the American Cancer

This proposal, by Dr. Charles S Cameron, ACS medical and relentifle director, is being recommended to all units of the cancer control organization as a means of saving 35,000 additional lives annually. The six-point physical examina-in would include these areas where cancer frequently occurs:

Cameron says that the goal should be the detection of cancur before it talks," before symptoms of any kind appear. New medical concepts of "early" diagnosis stress the value of finding the disease when it is "silent." This can apparently well.


