JOHNSON IS NOT LIKELY TO RESIGN AS LEAGUE HEAD

Clark Griffith, Thomas Shibe, Col. Rupert and Connie Mack Call to Pay Respects to President American Loop

CHICAGO, Dec. 19.—Ban Johnson, president of the American League, is not likely to resign, despite the startling manner in which the club owners of his own organization rebuked him at a meeting here Wednesday for his attitude toward Commissioner Landis and deprived him of much of the power he has exercised in organized baseball for more than 20 years.

The American League executive remained in seclusion Thursday, but remarks of Clark Griffith, president of the Washington club, Thomas Shibe, president of the Philadelphia club; Col. Jacob Rupert, of the New York Americans, and Connie Mack of the Athletics, were sufficient to convey the impression that they strongly will support their league chief and do not want him to resign.

Griffith, with Shibe and Mack, called at the American League headquarters Thursday to pay their respects to Johnson. They made themselves clearly understood that they did not come to ask Johnson to resign. As Johnson failed to put in an appearance at his office they conveyed their views to Henry J. Killilea, a Milwaukee attorney, and life long friend of Johnson.

"Ban Johnson resign as president of the American League! Why should he resign?" said Mr. Griffith. "There seems to be a mistaken impression about our visit. We were not appointed to call on Mr. Johnson and ask him not to resign. There is no reason why he should resign."

"We come to pay our respects to him because we are all with him. In my opinion the baseball world will never see a greater baseball figure than he has been."

"As a matter of fact the letter we presented to Commissioner Landis was passed merely to clear the atmosphere much misunderstanding in baseball and we wanted to clear it up for all time. We all know that arguing is harmful to the game and the only way to stop it is to take the necessary action to stop it."

"As far as we are concerned, we stand behind Mr. Johnson the same as we have always stood. When I get back to Washington I am going to write him telling him just that."

Griffith with the other baseball leaders, parted for the east Wednesday night. Commissioner Landis was willing to discuss the league, golf or any subject except baseball, when interviewers found him.

Chicago Institute Opens School For Actors And Writers

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—Drama entered the official category of the fine arts at the Chicago Art Institute with the establishment of a department for the study and practice of acting, play writing and costume design, and when the construction of a theatre to house these activities was begun. The theatre will seat about 700 persons. Its architect made investigations in Europe and incorporated many special devices for the rapid and convenient handling of scenery without the usual means. The chief of these is a sky dome over the entire stage, which obviates the use of draped curtains for exposures, and of movable floors on which an entire setting, with its furniture and actors, may ride to positions within the proscenium.

Old U. S. Stamps Sell High in London

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Sir Nicholas Waterhouse's famous collection of American stamps was auctioned in London recently and realized \$68,500. Many of the stamps still remain in England, but a large number were returned to America. Elliott Perry, of New Jersey, paid \$1,125 for a ten cent black of 1851 stamps which originally cost Sir Nicholas about 450.

Another rare block of eight five cent brown stamps of the issue of 1847, realized \$3,750, and was purchased by Philip Ward of Philadelphia. Seven years ago this block was bought by Sir Nicholas for \$100. Among other high prices were \$500 for a five-cent blue, 175 for a thirty-cent ultra marine pale carmine, \$450 for a five-cent blue and brown, and \$375 for a 24-cent purple and green.

Warner and Rockne, 2 Famous Grid Mentors, Will Match Strategy Soon

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—When the "Four Horsemen of Notre Dame" ride into the Golden West for a post-season game with the Stanford Cardinals at Pasadena, Cal., New Year's day, it will be a clash of two schools having similar basic principles of coaching. Knute Rockne, the Notre Dame mentor, is a product of the modern school of gridiron teachings, while his veteran opponent in this clash is Glenn "Pop" Warner, one of the pioneers of football coaching. Both are aggressive teachers, both are versatile creators of trick plays, yet both are disciples of the orthodox off-tackle play.

Notre Dame's team this year is regarded, from coast to coast, as one of the greatest pieces of gridiron architecture ever assembled. It bowled over a field of opponents which was representative of every section of the country except the far West, and the game New Year's day provides a means of comparison between the football as played on the Atlantic seaboard and the game as developed on the Pacific coast.

Notre Dame has defeated such teams as Army, Princeton, Nebraska, Georgia Tech, Northwestern, Wisconsin, Carnegie Tech, Lombard and Wabash.

The Hoosiers are exceptionally well-balanced. Light, but extremely fast, they are equipped with a rare assortment of plays, passes and kicks executed by men all adept in their respective positions.

The eleven were hard pressed in only two games this year—against Northwestern and against the Army—both of which were beaten by only one touchdown.

Rockne has started his second team in practically every game this year and then shifted to his first string backfield, Stuldreher, Miller, Layden and Crowley. This combination, irresistible through its great running and passing attack, has swept through all opposition it has been called upon to face and has not been held to less than two touchdowns. On the coast, this alternate arrangement may prove of marked aid to Rockne.

Stanford, with the greatest football eleven in its history has come through with only a 20-20 tie with California to mar its season. The Stanford team is strong and well-rounded but has lacked throughout the season an ability to solve a passing attack. Warner, in charge of the Stanford team for the first year, realized this lack of passing defense when Idaho passed Stanford off its feet and only lost the game when it fumbled on Stanford's one-foot line, the Cardinal recovering.

To offset this weakness, Warner built up the best defense possible and then perfected a passing game to rival that of his opponents, relying on the ancient theory that a good attack is the best defense. The fruit of this attack was brought out in the California game.

With the score 20 to 6 against them and but eight minutes to play, the Cardinals launched an air drive that was halted only by the

MOVE IS STARTED TO CURB PASSING IN GRIDIRON GAME

Coaches Advocate Rules That Would Allow Only 3 Points Or Making Sure This Way; Are Against Run After Pass

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—Although a majority now among football coaches, experts and rule makers apparently is opposed to placing restrictions upon the use of the forward pass, gathering demand for curbing the aerial game has become evident, promising a lively discussion when gridiron mentors gather in New York at latter part of this month to frame their rules recommendations.

The attack launched a few days ago on the forward pass by Harold M. Gore, coach of the Massachusetts Aggies, has aroused keen discussion and drawn support from several sources. Gore branded the aerial game in its present usage as a "menace" to the gridiron spirit and urged as corrective steps that only three points be allowed for a touchdown due to a pass and that the run by the receiver of a pass be eliminated.

L. C. Boles, director of athletics at Wooster college, Ohio, sided with Gore in characterizing the aerial game as a "menace which is relegating football to the category of outdoor basketball," while further criticism was made public today by Foster Sanford, former Rutgers coach and advocate of the rushing attack.

None of these critics, however, apparently wishes to abolish the pass, confining their recommendations to means of putting restrictions on the aerial game. The pass is needed to give balance, says Sanford, admitting the aerial game has come to stay, but nevertheless, he believes it is too unfettered in its present form.

That the rules committee is taking cognizance of the present agitation was indicated today in a statement by Fred W. Moore, treasurer of the Harvard athletic association, that the question no doubt would come before the mid-winter session of the rule makers.

Uses Poison, Pistol And a Noose After Shooting His Wife

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Stefan Matz, 32 years old, of Whitestone, L. I., was found dead, having used poison, a rope and a pistol to commit suicide. He died believing that he had murdered his wife, Anna, whom he had shot four times, each bullet taking effect at close range. These proved to be flesh wounds, however, and at Flushing hospital it was said she would recover.

The couple, who have a seven-year-old son, became estranged three years ago. Matz repeatedly endeavored to effect a reconciliation. Late Tuesday night he accosted his wife as she returned from a theatre, and after a brief but violent argument drew his pistol and fired. Mrs. Matz fell unconscious. On reviving at the hospital she requested the police to find her husband.

Near the Fort Totten government reservation two privates of the 62d Coast Artillery, Battery B—Leo H. Young and John L. Lonkey—discovered Matz's body swinging from the limb of a tree near Bell Avenue, Bayside. Examination showed a phial, which had contained iodine, on the grass beneath the body. There were iodine stains on Matz's lips and on his clothing. The soldiers found a pistol near the phial, the chamber containing five empty cartridges. Matz had used the last bullet for himself, apparently placing the noose about his neck after he had taken the poison and as his body swung free, firing the bullet into his left temple.

Mrs. Matz is employed in the home of John Halliday, leading man in "Dancing Mothers," at Woodlawn Avenue and Twenty-seventh Street, Beechhurst, L. I. Her son lives with her there. The boy has not been informed of his father's death and believes his mother to be ill of tonsillitis.
