Sanitary Statute Is Suggested By City Commission

Ordinance, Presented
For First Read-
ing, To Be Adopt-
ed Next Session

The City Commission last night took the first step to put teeth in a movement to force the installation of proper sewage disposal systems in all residences located within the city limits.

Discussion of the situation brought out the point that the Sanford negro quarter would be the area most affected. Commissioners introduced for first reading an ordinance suggested by a representative of the State Board of Health. Second reading will be called for Monday night.

The statute provides for the installation of "adequate sanitary facilities," and authorizes a fine of \$200 or a prison term not to exceed 90 days if violated.

There was an indication on the part of the four Commissioners at the council table that every method at their disposal will be used to see the law enforced.

Particular emphasis was placed on the value of the statute as a means of preventing epidemics. Cost of installing the facilities to be provided by State Board of Health regulations will be small, the sole expense being for materials.

An arrangement has been completed with the WPA whereby labor is furnished, Commissioners reported.

Recommendations that the sanitary ordinance be adopted and rigidly enforced were made by City Health Inspector H. P. Fatten and Dr. W. A. McPhail, head of the Health Board, after a tour of inspection here last week. The Commission last night voted tentative acceptance of a \$3,500 offer from the Umatilla Fruit Company for a 10-acre orange grove in the vicinity of the City Club, now owned by the City.

Planning Board Outlines Ideas For New Work

Park, Parkway, Recreational Survey Proposed By Unit

TALLAHASSEE, Jan. 18.—(AP)—The State Planning Board set out Saturday on a park, parkway and recreational area survey of Florida in co-operation with the National Park Service.

Arrangements for the study were completed by M. L. Montgomery, executive secretary of the Planning Board, who said A. P. Straley, assistant regional officer of the National Park Service, will supervise the study in 22 states working with headquarters in Richmond.

The State Planning Board will represent Florida and will combine its contemplated recreation survey with the study of the National Park Service so that a complete study of all types of recreation may be made simultaneously in this state.

C. M. Graves, associate regional planner of the National Park Service in this region, will represent that organization in the Florida study and will make his headquarters in the Planning Board offices here.

The Florida Forest Service, represented by C. H. Schaeffer, director of its parks, will take part in the recreation study, which is being made throughout the nation at the request of President Roosevelt.

County planning councils in the 67 counties of the state will be asked to cooperate. They helped in the six-year inventory of needed public works construction recently completed for the National Resources committee at President Roosevelt's direction.

Danger By Floods Cause Unbusiness In Midwest, South

Flood danger caused precautions and uneasiness in parts of the middlewest and south today. Melting snows and heavy rains swelled many rivers.

Rains were general over most of the states east of the Mississippi River and were particularly heavy in the Ohio Valley and Appalachian Region.

Unusually warm weather prevailed over eastern states but colder weather settled over the Mississippi Valley, extending as far south as Texas.

Judge James Madden of Niagara is expected at Geseph today for a preliminary investigation of riots. Later a formal inquiry will be held under the Public Inquiries Act.

One of the grievances cited by reformatory prisoners has having led to Sunday's rioting was a ban on receipt of parcels from outside sources, especially at Christmas.

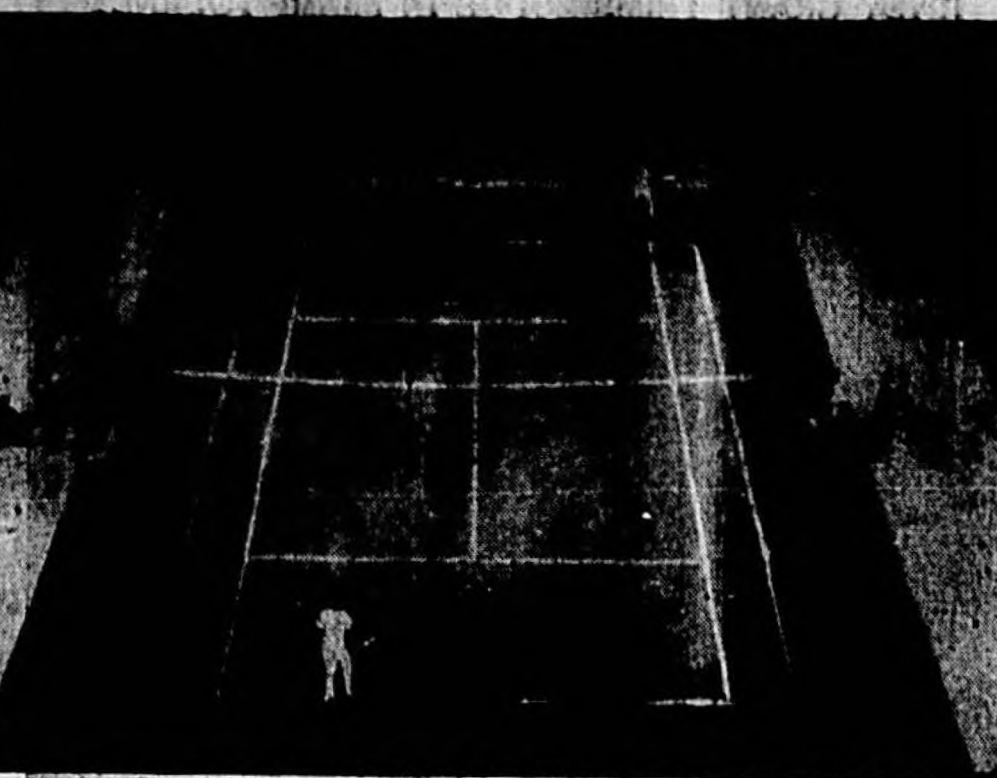

California Fruit Crops Endangered Again By Weather

Three Die As Polar Blasts Ride Before Blizzards On Pacific Coast

Southwest Feels Flood Dangers

Rising Waters Drive Hundreds Of Families From Homes

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Arctic weather held shivering western states in a grip today menacing for the second time this month California's 100,000,000 citrus crop.

Three deaths were reported as blizzards rode with a polar air mass sweeping down from the frozen expanse of Western Canada. The deaths occurred in Utah and Montana.

Fruit growers in California kept fires burning all night to ward off frost. A freeze two weeks ago was estimated to have done \$20,000,000 damage to the crop.

Six counties, with Seminole as one of them, will have displays in the Central Florida Exposition opening in Orlando on Feb. 15. C. T. Bickford, manager, informed local interests today.

A Seminole County radio program is scheduled to be broadcast over WDBO on Monday, Feb. 1, between 8:30 P. M. and 9 P. M. in the interest of this section's participation in the exposition.

Other counties having 30-minute periods on the air and which will have display booths are Pasco, Alachua, Marion, Ocala, Brevard and Orange.

Architecture is slated to be the theme of the local exhibits. The Seminole County Chamber of Commerce is in charge of arrangements for the exhibition representing this section.

Local Farm Agent Present At Confab On New Soil Plan

C. R. Dawson, Seminole County farm agent, was in Orlando today attending a convention of agricultural agents from 19 Florida counties to discuss the 1937 Federal soil conservation program.

Agents were to have been present from Hernando, Pinellas, Hillsborough, Manatee, Sarasota, Polk, Hardee, DeSoto, Lee, Charlotte, Pasco, Sumter, Lake, Orange, Brevard, Volusia, Seminole and Highlands.

Each agent had been requested to submit recommendations for a conservation program as applied to his respective county. It was understood that suggestions will be forwarded to the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Washington.

Adding to the pontiff's discomfort was a weakened heart action and an increased difficulty in breathing, Vatican sources reported.

However, Dr. Ambra Milani expressed a belief he could keep the Pope alive for some time to come.

Father Agostina Gemelli, rector of the Catholic University at Milan, was received by the pontiff yesterday to discuss matters connected with the new pontifical academy of science.

The principal speaker before the assembly was to have been Dr. Audrey Lillian Packham, a member of the education department at Rollins College.

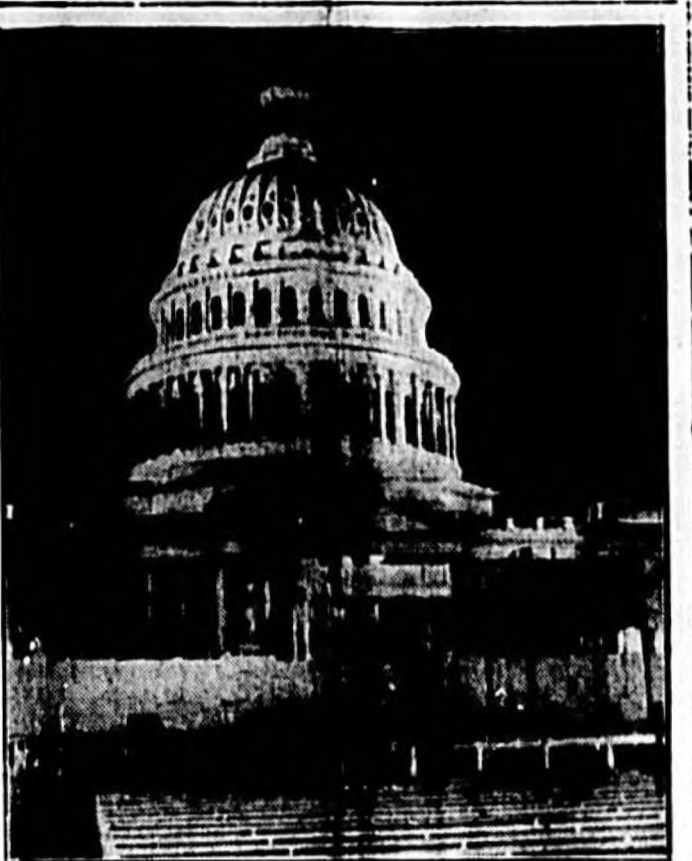
Blazing Meteor Speeds Across Skies Over City

Florida, California Production Reported Up 16 Percent

"Seminole County plantings are checked this week and will come close to 4,000 acres," the report said.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Franklin Delano Roosevelt renewed his presidential oath today and pledged in his second administration to blot out "cancers" of economic injustice.

From a white-clothed stand below the towering capitol dome, the chief executive told a rain-drenched throng: "I assume the solemn obligation of leading the American people forward along the road which they have chosen to advance. The best of our property is not whether we had more in the abundance of those who have too much, it is whether we provide enough for those who have too little."

Roosevelt spoke after placing his hand on an old family Bible and repeating the presidential oath to Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes. A few minutes before, Vice-President John Nance Garner had been sworn in by Senator Robinson, Democratic leader.

In a covered stand about the chief executive, leaders of the Federal Government heard Roosevelt.
