Rezoning hearing may end July 15

SANFORD — Attorneys said Friday that some actions taken by the Seminole County School Board and school officials regarding high school rezoning may be criminal violations of Florida's Sunshine laws for open government.

Judge Debra Nelson heard arguments in civil court about Sunshine law violations. Parents from Sabal Point and Tusawilla subdivisions are suing the school district to redo its high school rezoning process.

Attorney Dennis Wells said Friday that some of the evidence in the case could show that school officials knowingly violated the state's open government laws. That is a criminal offense.

The hearing adjourned Friday afternoon and will continue on July 15.

If the school officials retain personal attorneys then the hearing may be delayed to give lawyers time to prepare. If the officials plan to invoke the Fifth Amendment instead of testifying, the hearing can go on without their testimony.

Dianne Kramer, former deputy superintendent of schools, and Bill Vogel, superintendent, both said they could not speak to the criminal allegations. Kramer now works for Orange County Public Schools.

Vogel said he would need to talk with School Board attorney Ned Julian before deciding whether to retain an attorney for himself.

Deputy kills man who rushed him with knife

LAKE MARY — A Seminole County sheriff's deputy shot and killed a 48-year-old man who ran at the officer with a knife June 22 near Lake Mary.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement are investigating the shooting death of Louis Capone, who the Sheriff's Office said was "suicidal". The incident occurred about 3:30 p.m. Wednesday at 2516 Grassy Point Drive in the Colonial Village Apartments.

The Sheriff's Office released updated information from the investigation as it stood Thursday afternoon.

Deputy Sheriffs Herb McDuffie and Kevin Peterson responded to a 9-1-1 call from Capone's half-brother, who had tried to take the knife away. Sheriff's Office spokesman Steve Olson said Capone apparently armed himself with another knife before the deputies arrived.

As two deputies entered Capone's apartment, they found a large amount of blood. They called for assistance, according to Olson, but were committed at that point to check on Capone.

The deputies confronted Capone in his bedroom. Capone refused to comply with the commands of the deputies, Olson said.

Capone jumped out of the bed and ran after McDuffie, who backed into the living room. Peterson deployed his Taser, but Capone continued to advance on McDuffie, Olson said.

When McDuffie ran out of

Property values soar behind robust economy

SANFORD — Property values in Sanford have increased almost 18 percent since last year, the Seminole County Property Appraiser's office announced Friday in its report of 2005 preliminary taxable values.

Property Appraiser David Johnson said Friday that the increase of values in Seminole County as a whole is the highest increase in the last 15 years.

"That's good news," Johnson said. "It's reflective of a robust economy."

The city of Oviedo was second highest in the increase with slightly over 15 percent. The lowest increase was Lake Mary with slightly over 8 percent.

Johnson said there are several factors that are keying into the increases. In Sanford, in particular he said, new construction, new homes, news businesses and an increase in values in existing neighborhoods due to home renovations led to the 18 percent increase.

"It shows people's confidence in making an investment in real estate," Johnson said.

Aides' stories of school abuse appear inconsistent

Conflicting statements between two aides raised questions from the Seminole County school district's hired investigator Andrew B. Thomas, but Casselberry Police Department says the inconsistencies give the aides more credibility.

Those two aides, Sabina Nowik and Michelle Alessandri, worked in Kathleen Garrett's classroom for two to two and a half years. They both alleged they had seen inappropriate behavior by Garrett that caused them concern. Both said they went to their supervisor, then Assistant Principal Josephine Opisso, but their complaints went unanswered.

An investigative report by Thomas was released Monday, June 20, to the public.

The inconsistencies noted in Thomas's report and other conflicting statements the two aides made were regarding whether or not they had actually witnessed events of Garrett's alleged abuse.

Garrett, who was arrested in October of last year, stands accused of child abuse against autistic children in her care at South Seminole Middle

School where she was a teacher until her arrest.

During the investigation several people came forward to allege past abuse by Garrett, such as former teacher aides and parents of former students. All claimed they went to school officials at both Indian Trails Middle School and South Seminole Middle School to voice their complaints.

Incidents at Indian Trails led school officials to discount the abuse accusations due to lack of evidence and they transferred Garrett involuntarily to South Seminole.

The two aides described an event where Garrett made a student stand against the wall as punishment, allegedly rub-

County ready for annual battle against mosquitoes

SANFORD — Seminole County officials do not know how recent heavy rains will impact the mosquito population, but workers check every day to monitor the little pests.

"We monitor mosquitoes year round and we've been larviciding since April," said Owen D. Reagan, principal engineer with Seminole County. Killing mosquito larvae in county ponds is the first line of defense.

"The numbers aren't really up yet," Reagan said. One reason may be that the last few years have been so wet. Eggs laid over a period of years have had the moisture to develop.

"Pretty much anything that could get wet has gotten wet," he said. The main concern besides the itchy bites is disease, specifically West Nile Virus carried by some of the 77 species of mosquitoes found in Florida.

Reagan said the disease carrying mosquitoes appear later in the year, especially in August and September.

Seminole County contracts with Clarke Mosquito Control of Kissimmee to monitor and eradicate the blood-sucking insects. One way they monitor the bugs is with eight strategically placed traps.

Andrew Gentes of Clarke demonstrated how the traps work at Sylvan

Woman's death leads to criminal investigation

LAKE MARY — What appeared at first to be a normal death of an 89-year-old woman turned into a criminal investigation when employees at The Gables Assisted Living Facility brought allegations to state officials.

The Lake Mary Police Department initiated a criminal investigation following an abuse report received by the Department of Children and Families June 10.

The allegations listed on the abuse report specify that Stella Schwager, 89, died June 9 due to an untreated medical

condition, according to the Lake Mary Police Department.

The complaint alleges that the staff of The Gables Assisted Living Facility, 3655 W. Lake Mary Blvd., denied Schwager of proper medical care in reference to an "impacted bowel" condition. The complaint alleges that the condition led to Schwager's death.

An autopsy was requested by the Lake Mary Police Department. The Volusia County Medical Examiner's Office conducted the autopsy June 13. Toxicology results are

Chief Brian Tooley reports that several of his officers volunteered to go undercover to uncover any uncovered activities Suzie and her ladies might provide for the price of a cover charge.

Despite the hubbub, the flyer appears to be a prank. The city's director of planning and community development, Russ Gibson, says he can find no documentation of someone applying for a permit or business license for such an establishment. Furthermore, Gibson says city ordinances prohibit gentlemen's clubs and massage parlors in downtown and throughout the city.

Why would someone play a prank when it's obvious such a business would not be allowed in downtown? There are two possible reasons. The first possibility is that the prankster just wants to goof on downtown merchants and residents who are easily excitable. The second possibility — and I think the more probable one — is this person is trying to make the point that the city has a history of allowing businesses to set up shop in locations that do not meet city ordinances.

Anyone remember *Joker's Palace*? A trio of Volusia County business people planned to open an "adult arcade" featuring slot machines and free beer next door to the Helen Stairs Theatre. *Joker's Palace* was two days from opening when *The Herald* published a front page story about the business. In fact, the day the story broke, the slot machines were delivered to the building. The owners had met with the city's planning department, yet no one in City Hall had a clue about the business. You may think the creator of the Suzi's flyer is guilty of outrageous facetiousness to suggest that the city would be careless enough to allow a strip club downtown, but we almost had a casino.

Don't get all hung up about strip clubs, however, because I think the prankster was also trying to make a more refined point about the consequences of the city's ineptitude in following its own ordinances. The building the flyer was posted on is currently being renovated after sitting vacant for decades. The building owner, G. Andrew Speer, isn't talking about what businesses will occupy the space, but a business card floating around downtown indicates that a call processing center (i.e. the actual place your 1-800 call goes when you have questions about your computer, a credit card bill, an infomercial, etc.) intends to lease part of the building.


Now a call center is better than a strip club, but it's still not allowed by city ordinance. According to the city's rules, only retail establishments (basically stores and restaurants) can occupy first-floor space in downtown. What purpose does that ordinance serve? Let me answer that question with another question: Have you ever seen a call processing center in a mall? How about a medical billing center, a lawyer's office or an accounting firm? You don't see these types of uses in a mall because malls are designed to attract maximum traffic for their tenants. Accounting firms and call centers don't attract pedestrian traffic. Putting such offices in a mall creates "black holes" or gaps where pedestrians do not go. Businesses near black holes suffer because the volume of traffic is greatly reduced. The same concept applies in downtowns like Sanford's.

Not only do these black holes reduce pedestrian traffic, they take up the limited supply of space available to retail businesses. As a retail center, downtown faces competition not only from the malls but the strip centers anchored by the "big box" stores. If downtown is to succeed, we need as many retail choices as possible. Ask the proprietors of a retail shop if they object to another retail store opening downtown. They'll tell you they don't mind because shoppers like visiting several stores in one area. The restaurant owners will tell you the same thing. They want other restaurants near them because it provides their patrons with choices, and more choices attracts more patrons.

While the city is asleep at the wheel, the first floor of the old Touchton's Drugstore has become an insurance processing center. *Word Around The Clock* is the Orlando Sentinel is moving is Seminole County news bureau into the first floor of the Welaka Building. How long will the city ignore it's own rules?

I'm not positive who the prankster is, but I've got a guess. I'm betting he's a downtown merchant, and he's prone to carry a joke or a grudge too far at times. In this case, I think he's right on point. The city must enforce the first-floor retail ordinance. Not enforcing the ordinance will result in existing retail shop owners facing the same fate as one of Suzi's message parlor patrons — they'll be screwed.

Lake Park Thursday. Carbon dioxide tanks connected to the traps lure the mosquitoes, just as exhaled CO2 from mammals attracts them. A light also brings the bugs in and a small fan blows them into the trap, Gentes said.

The insects are then studied to determine species and numbers. Clarke employees are in the field every day to check traps and also to check for mosquito larvae in the county's ponds.

Data from these checks are analyzed to see if spraying should take place. Spraying can involve backpacks with larvacide to kill them in the early stages of life, or trucks also spray in neighborhoods and roads.

If the populations really explode, aerial spraying has been done. Last year after the hurricanes, one trap that normally has about 1,000 mosquitoes in one check had more than 95,000, Gentes recalled. Aerial spraying, however, knocked out about 98 percent of the bugs, he said. Federal government funding paid for that spraying to keep disease under control.

Mosquitoes, depending on the species, can reproduce in as little as five days to two months. One egg batch may contain 30 eggs, Gentes said.

So far this year, only one horse in Seminole County has contracted Eastern Equine Encephalomyelitis Virus. That occurred in May. The diseases can lead to encephalitis in humans, which is swelling of the brain and it can be fatal.

In 2004, 42 cases of West Nile Virus were confirmed in residents of seven Florida counties, none in Seminole County. However, six chickens in Seminole did contract West Nile.

Residents may not know that the county maintains five flocks of chickens. Each

flock contains six birds and they are bled on a regular basis to test for mosquito-borne diseases. The flocks are placed around the county, some near the mosquito traps.

John Cochrane, environmental manager for the county Health Department, said the birds are bled every other week or so until a positive result for disease occurs. Then the checks take place every week, he said, and data is sent to the state.

The state Department of Health makes the call to send out a disease alert, and Cochrane said the county Health Department carries it out.

West Nile Virus is commonly found in Africa, West Asia and the Middle East. It is related to St. Louis encephalitis virus found in the United States. It can infect humans, birds, mosquitoes, horses and other mammals.

The most severe type affects a person's nervous system. It can cause inflammation of the brain (encephalitis), or inflammation of the membrane around the brain and spinal cord (meningitis).

Prevention is the key to protecting oneself from West Nile or any mosquito-borne disease, county officials said.

First there are the five D's of prevention. Don't go out at Dusk or Dawn. If you go out, Dress so the skin is covered with clothing. Protect skin and clothing with DEET mosquito repellent, and empty containers and Drain stagnant water where mosquito larvae can thrive.

Dead birds may be an indicator that West Nile Virus is in an area. Anyone who sees dead birds should report that to www.wild-florida.org/bird/ or call the Seminole County Health Department at 407-665-3387.

bing her body against the boy saying, "Cry for momma". Alessandri told the Casselberry Police Department's Corporal James Goodman, in a sworn written statement, that Garrett slammed her body against the child's. But to the school district's investigator she used the word "stood back-to-back" instead of "slam".

But Nowik, the second aide, stated to the Casselberry Police Department that Garrett "came over and pressed her backside up against him, moving her feet out to add more weight against the boy".

Casselberry Police Spokesperson Lt. Dennis Stewart said that one or two word contradictions are common.

"There's going to be some inconsistencies," Lt. Stewart said. "When we do our interviews we try to be as professional as we can. We try to get the interviewees to be as descriptive as they can be and hopefully anyone doing a subsequent interview would do the same."

In another instance, where Garrett allegedly chipped a child's two front teeth, Alessandri gives a few more contradictions, as does Nowik.

Alessandri told Casselberry police in her written statement that "[Garrett] slammed his head in his desk with force and chipped his two front teeth. [Garrett] was not aware that I saw her through a small window on the classroom door".

To the investigator Thomas she claimed that "one of them (either her or the other aide, Nowik) looked through the small window in the door to the classroom and observed [the child] seated at his desk crying."

Thomas pointed out in his report that: "In her police statement, Ms. Alessandri stated that she had been the one looking in through the small window in the door."

Alessandri also told Thomas she saw Garrett standing behind the child with her hand on or near his head, according to his report, even though she claimed in her written statement to the police that Garrett "slammed" the child's head.

During the interview she admits to Thomas that "...the conclusion that I drew was that...she was the one who forced his head down on the desk."

Another inconsistency related to the other aide, Nowik, regarded a child who Garrett allegedly shoved in his own vomit forcing him to clean it up.

Nowik told police that when he was told to clean it up and refused, Garrett "grabbed him by the back of his neck and shoved his face in it. She then pushed him out of his chair onto the floor (still hand around neck) pushing him down to clean it".

To the contrary, Nowik told Thomas that she did not actually see how the child ended up on the floor cleaning the vomit.

Thomas said in an interview Thursday that it is not unusual for people to perceive things differently.

"Here, you've got inconsistencies. A witness's story differing over time, which is a little more problematic," Thomas said of the aides'

different statements. Lt. Stewart said that he would find it problematic if the aides' stories didn't change.

"To be real honest with you, I'd be more concerned if the stories were so packed and there were no inconsistencies at all...as if it were rehearsed," Stewart said in an interview Thursday.

In Thomas's report he wrote that he suspected Nowik exaggerated the misconduct of Garrett and he pointed out several inconsistencies in Alessandri's statements.

"It's a gut feeling," Thomas said Thursday.

Lt. Stewart, on the other hand, said the inconsistencies could be chalked up to the interviewer.

"If there is a situation where there are two different investigators in two different time frames, there may be some inconsistencies in the way they respond," he

said. "It's a whole different thing talking to police. And, now I'm talking to my boss, who may fire me."

Although in this case, Thomas is not the aides' employer, he was hired by the school district to do an independent investigation.

Thomas told The Herald that his primary focus as a lawyer is representing school districts mainly in the Orlando area.

It was recommended by Thomas to the Seminole County School District that both Nowik and Alessandri be reassigned for their failure to report the alleged and suspected abuse by Garrett.

Nowik and Alessandri claim they reported the incidences to their supervisor, but Thomas said in his report that they should have reported Garrett to the Abuse Hotline or to law enforcement.

Both aides were unavailable for comment.

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

In the 1932 Olympic Games, she won two gold medals and also set world records in the javelin throw and the 80-meter high hurdles. Only a technicality prevented her from obtaining the gold in the high jump.

In 1932, she took up golf as a hobby. Six years later, she married a professional wrestler. In golf, by 1946, she won the U.S. Women's Amateur tournament, and in 1947 won 17 straight golf championships and was the first American winner of the British Ladies' Amateur Tournament.

In 1948 she turned professional. She won the U.S. Women's Open in 1950 and again in 1954. That same year she won the All-America Women's Open. She also excelled in softball, baseball, swimming, figure skating, billiards and football. She was named the woman athlete of the first half of the 20th century. She died of cancer in Galveston, Texas at the age of 42. WHO WAS SHE?

No. 2 - I'll give you her name - but you supply her nickname. Mildred Gillars was born in about 1900 in Portland, Maine. During World War II, she broadcast Nazi propaganda to U.S. troops in Europe. After the war, she was arrested on June 25, and convicted of treason. She was sentenced to 10 to 30 years in prison and fined \$10,000. She was released after serving 12 years and ended up teaching music at a convent school in Columbus, Ohio. She died in 1988 in Columbus. What was the nickname they gave her?

No. 3 - This man was born June 26, 1819 in Ballston Spa, N.Y. He served in the U.S. Army during the Mexican War and the Seminole War in Florida, prior to serving in the Civil War Union forces. He was stationed at Charleston, S.C. where he is said to have manned the first of Fort Sumter's guns to fire back at the Confederates. He was also in the second Battle of Bull Run, Antietam, Fredericksburg, and by the time he was promoted to major general, he fought in Gettysburg. He was once credited with having invented a sporting event which was played in Fort Sumter. The matter has since been debunked. He died at the age of 73 in Mendham, N.J. WHO WAS HE?

No. 4 - This woman will be identified, but it's up to you to name the song for which she is credited. On June 27, 1859, Mildred J. Hill, a schoolteacher in Louisville, Ky. composed a song. Her younger sister, Patty Smith Hill wrote the lyrics, which were first published under another name in 1893, in a book "Song Stories for the Sunday School." The lyrics were amended in 1924 to what they are today. It is now considered sung somewhere in the world every minute of every day. While the two ladies earned very little from the song, later copyright owners are said to have received millions of dollars. Mildred Hill died in Chicago in 1916, without knowing that her melody would become the world's most popular song. What was the song?

Answers - No. 1 was Mildred "Babe" Didrickson Zaharias. No. 2 the nickname was "Axis Sally". No. 3 was Abner Doubleday, originally considered the inventor of baseball. No. 4 The song originally named "Good Morning to You" became "Happy Birthday to You".

Clock hits the nail on the head about crime

To the editor:

The Around the Clock article of Saturday June 18, about crime prevention and zero tolerance law enforcement hit the nail on the head. Unfortunately, it did not swing hard enough and the hammer bounced off. The identification, arrest, prosecution and incarceration of criminals, otherwise known as the Criminal Justice System, is just that; a system, made up of independent parts that must all function together with the same goal: To prosecute and incarcerate criminals so that the streets of Sanford are safer and better.

It includes a city commission that really supports the police force, and that stands tough against criminals and their family when they think they have been treated wrong. The city commission, police chief, and Internal Affairs Division must not reflectively suspend officers every time a complaint is made. Criminals and their families need to know that if they don't follow the directions of a law enforcement officer while they are discharging their duties, that they will held accountable and we will not entertain frivolous complaints against our officers.

The commission must also not turn to an "impartial arbiter", to decide if a police officer acted in an appropriate way. Impartial arbiters do not have a pattern of always finding for the complainant, and it is rumored that the arbiter the city has used has a pattern of settling for the complainant. Our police officers need to know that when they come to work they have the full support of the management and commission. They must also know that they will be judged based on the information they had at the time and whether they performed as trained. Our police officers should not worry that they may lose their job due to over sensitive criminals.

It takes judges that issue arrest and search warrants on probable cause, not a preponderance of evidence. These same judges must then sentence convicted criminals to the maximum extent allowed by law. We had the exclusion zone in the Historic District, which was supposed to keep repeat offenders out of the neighborhood on which they preyed. The last I heard was that opposition by the judges made this program unenforceable.

Our state's attorney prosecutes all cases brought to him by our police department. The state's attorney must not have a pattern of giving easy plea bargains, because that is just a bargain for the criminal, not the citizens. Criminal defense attorney's need to know that their clients will spend time in jail.

Our state's attorney and judges made national news last year for their soft stance on crime. All need to be held to a better standard and replaced if the pattern continues. If these team members all take a get-tough policy on crime, criminals will know that Sanford and Seminole County are not the places to get caught

breaking the law. They'll stay out and we'll be better for it.

And finally, it takes a newspaper that researches the behavior of the city commission, the judges and the state's attorney and reports on their actions, not their intentions. The participation of "the fourth estate" is critical to educate the public, so that we know which judges are law and order judges, if our state's attorney is a good aggressive prosecutor, and if our city commission covers at the sign of controversy. This requires long-term sustained effort, mostly from The Herald, because we know The Sentinel doesn't care about Sanford.

When I first moved here our police department seemed to have an aggressive attitude toward policing. They ran speed traps and noise traps on 13th Street. They ran prostitution and burglary stings and traps. They got out of their cars to confront suspicious activity. Now it seems as if the police department has been beaten down and has taken a reactive posture; not wanting to stick their neck out. I hope I'm wrong. I'd like to know that our police officers go to work with a sense of pride in what they are doing, anticipation that they will be out there busting criminals, knowledge that their effort will lead to a successful prosecution, and that they have the appreciation and support of the community for a job well done.

Since this law was introduced it has been used often by the Sanford Police as a "tool" at the ready for the detainment of people on bikes at any time after sunset, so your suggestion of an after 10 p.m. "crack down" renders mute. It has further been my observation that the police are never shy about approaching someone in the middle of the night no matter the use of conveyance. It all comes down to being within the area at the same time.

Also noted in your work was the comparison with the way larger cities have dealt with the harassment of panhandlers. While these people are annoying it remains a separate issue and a much lesser affront in comparison to a common thief.

Also so, in clothing this letter of attempting to present both sides of a very important issue, I would suggest that career crimi-

nals go buy a light for their bike, and be ready to explain that lawn mower at 3 a.m. too.

As for those of us losing sleep over all our stuff, about all we can do is put our toys away when we are through with them. What it all comes down to is once it's gone, it's gone, no matter the tactic of any police department or the perception of any newspaper editor.

Police chief addresses crime questions

To the Editor and Citizens of the City of Sanford:

In the June 19, 2005 Sunday edition of *The Sanford Herald*, important law enforcement questions were asked for the City of Sanford and its residence. As chief of Police, I would like to respond to these questions and be very forthcoming with the public and protect, support and partner with our community members.

The Sanford Police Department is providing law enforcement services to a rapidly growing and developing community. To effectively lead the Police Department, it is crucial that I routinely take a very critical look at the level of crime in our city as well as police responses to that crime. To stay abreast of any new criminal activity or public nuisance issues, the Sanford Police Department command staff members meet weekly to review crime statistics, identify hot spots of activity, discuss response strengths and weaknesses and develop a plan of action accordingly.

I believe that the future of the City of Sanford is bright as it will continue to thrive and develop its residential, retail, business, industrial and institutional bases. The residential population alone has increased by more than 20% in the past five years. Although our population has significantly increased and our calls for service during 2004 were in excess of 110,000, the index crime rate between 2000 and 2004 has dropped 17.8%. The Sanford Police Department has made progress; but, that's not good enough and we are taking a zero-tolerance enforcement policy for crime in Sanford.

Although Sanford's population has significantly increased in recent years, the Police Department's resources have not. As with any growth and development, increased numbers of people bring increased opportunities for crime. To keep pace with the current growth and to best position officers to address emerging hot spot areas, the Sanford Police Department is redeploying police officers to maximize effectiveness. During May and June of 2005, concerns surfaced that increased numbers of officers patrolling Sanford's neighborhoods were needed. Also, due to the explosive growth along the I-4 - Rinehart Road corridor, the Police Department found itself challenged to meet

the additional law enforcement demands in this area with the current allocation of personnel. To meet these needs and best serve a growing population, several officers will be re-assigned from other specialty areas to patrol. An overlap patrol shift will also be eliminated allowing the greatest number of officers on patrol twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. I recognize the needs of the community and the Police Department is constantly adapting to make the best use of its strained resources.

The residents of Sanford must not tolerate crime and a reduced quality of life. Property crimes in Sanford are perpetual and require constant vigilance. Business and community members, the Police Department will soon increase its number of officers on the streets, but I implore you to partner with us to reduce Sanford's property crime by reducing the number of opportunities for criminals. Don't be an easy victim. Secure your property and vehicles every day - every night. Don't leave valuables unattended and in plain sight. Each of us MUST harden the target! Sanford's community policing unit will gladly respond to help you assess the vulnerabilities of your property and provide crime prevention tips. Feel free to contact the community policing unit at 407-323-3030 for a property assessment. Should you become a property crime victim, report it as soon as it occurs. Often I hear of a specific crime from a group of citizens, only to discover that it was never reported. We don't know about it if you don't report it. To reclaim stolen items it is essential that you provide the make, model and serial number of your property. Help us by keeping your records current.

During the past few months, Police Department administrators and officers have attended several community meetings, have heard citizens' concerns and are aggressively taking steps to make improvements. Additionally, during the past few weeks, I have been meeting with patrol squads and have emphasized that we are taking back our streets, taking back our neighborhoods and will aggressively pursue criminals to the fullest extent of the law. I encourage more neighborhoods to develop neighborhood watch programs and to conduct regular community meetings. For assistance to develop a neighborhood watch program, contact the community policing unit.

Sanford citizens, I assure you that the Police Department has heard your concerns, recognized the needs, and is taking immediate, decisive steps to place more officers on patrol. We pledge to constantly be aware of the level of criminal activity as well as quality of life issues in our city. A zero-tolerance law enforcement policy now prevails in the City of Sanford. Partner with us - be intolerant of crime. Together, we will reclaim our streets and our neighborhoods and make it known that criminals cannot thrive and operate undetected in our communities.

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



The Way We Were: Essays offer beauty tips

The early Sanford High School Salmagundis of the 1920s were quite different from those most of us remember. Of course there are pictures of each of the classes, but instead of an abundance of other photographs, these early Sallys contained essays, poems, jokes, etc.

The high school these students attended was the one located on Palmetto Avenue at 9th Street. It had been completed in 1911. The name was changed to Seminole High School when the new building on French Avenue was built in 1927. The former high school then became Sanford Junior High.

In 1921 the Chamber of Commerce offered prizes for an essay contest, so it was probably the same group who held a contest in 1922 for essays on "How I Would Beautify Sanford". Some of these were printed in the 1922 Salmagundi. Here are excerpts I have edited from these.

How Central Park Could be Beautiful (by) Naomi Scroggins, 1924.

If I were wealthy, nothing would give me more genuine pleasure than selecting some part of my city to beautify.

A great addition to the appearance of any city is at least one pretty well kept park. Sanford has good material to work with along this line. I would suggest the following improvements to Central Park; (I believe this is what is now known as central park, located between 4th and 5th Streets, Oak and Park Avenues).

First, plow up all the ground and have a chemist analyze the soil to find out what it needs. Do what is necessary to give the soil the elements that it lacks. Then start doing things.

Plant St. Augustine grass and while it is getting a good start, I would put a small wire fence around it.

In the meantime, I would take every piece of that supposed-to-be fountain out of the park. If an attractive fountain can't be found to put in its place, one that will really and truly fount, then have a little rose bed in the center of the park.

A park is not true to its purpose if it does not have some recreation. Therefore, we should have a well-kept tennis court on the grounds.

Plenty of pretty tropical palms and plants, and not so many flowers would be appropriate for a city park, especially in Florida. The walks through the park should be paved with rows of probably hibiscus bordering them. A statue or two would also add to the place.

Then the bandstand could be painted and have a large American flag floating broadly above it.

Why Not Beautify Sanford? (by) Alice Bolly, 1923

One of the first suggestions I would mention for making Sanford the "City Beautiful" is to plant flowers in the parks. Why not plant several vines around the band stand and we could have the Bougainvillea City.

Another suggestion is why not clean up around the ice plant? It is a very untidy and on one of the main streets in the city limits. There is old wood and iron lying around it and when we have strong winds the street is always wet from the water sprays. Could this, not in some way be remedied?

Improvements for Sanford. (by) John Wilson, 1924.

Sanford would be much improved by the tearing down of those fish houses on the lakefront and by removing that old railroad and ties.

Another great improvement would be a sidewalk running along parallel to the lake.

The greatest though, would be to organize boat clubs so people of Sanford could take advantage of Lake Monroe. We could have pretty boat houses and attractive club houses right out over the water.

These would attract the tourists as they come in on the boat and would also be helping make Sanford beautiful.

In Sanford, Johnson credits the increase to all areas of Sanford.

"To zero in on Sanford, they've over the years, worked very hard to increase their tax base, and that's obviously happening. And the good news is, it's across a broad spectrum. The west side is going up along Rinehart, downtown is booming and the east side near Celery Avenue. It's kind of all over the city, which is good," Johnson said.

In a press release from the appraiser's office, Johnson said that property owners continue to find Seminole County a desirable place to live due to the economy and quality of life such as good jobs, schools and neighborhoods.

Preliminary taxable values are provided annually by the property appraiser to the taxing authorities to be used in setting their millage rates. The numbers are also submitted to the Florida Department of Revenue for tax roll approval purposes. Taxpayers should expect to receive their proposed tax notices in mid August with these numbers reflected as they relate to their property.

Johnson said that depending on what the taxing authorities do, property taxes might increase as well.

"They have the authority to lower the tax rate. Whether they do or not, I don't know," Johnson said.

People who have homestead exemptions on their home are protected by the Save Our Homes amendment, Johnson said. The amendment does not allow their property taxes to go up more than three percent each year.

"They are protected from rapid increases," Johnson said.

The history in Sanford has shown a fluctuation in the taxable value increases. In 2000, Sanford only saw a five percent increase, but in 2001 and 2002 there was

over a 10 percent increase both years. Then, in 2003, the increase dropped to 6.87 percent and hopped back up to almost 11 percent in 2004.

Johnson said another trend they are seeing in his office all over the county is more multi-family homes going up, such as townhomes.

He said that was due to land cost rising along with a lack of developable land. Developers are limited to smaller pieces of land and building more units per acre.

"I think it's all a function of the dynamics in Seminole County and Sanford specifically," Johnson said.

Elections summit looks at future through 2012

SANFORD — Seminole County Election Supervisor Michael Ertel held Democracy 2012 on June 21, a forum to discuss election-related issues.

The issues included early voting, felon processing, disability access to polls, touch screen voting systems, paper verification of votes and voter outreach drives.

The forum took place at the Supervisor of Elections office on Airport Boulevard.

Democratic Executive Committee Chair Carol Cox sat at the head of the table with Ertel (a Republican); Sean Concannon (Seminole County Libertarian Party); and Jim Stelling (chairman of the board for the Seminole County Republican Executive Committee).

Seminole County Tax Collector Ray Valdez (a state committeeman for the Republican party) sat next to Paul Partyka (former mayor of Oviedo and state committeeman for the Democratic party). The League of Women Voters was represented by Sheryl Scheibe.

Lake Mary City Commissioner Michael McLean, disability advocate Kyle Consider, and Chris Dorworth (former head of the Bush/Cheney 2004 campaign for Seminole County) were also among invited guests sitting in the middle of the room at the forum conference table.

About 40 spectators were on hand for the event. Longwood City Commissioners (and Republicans) Butch Bundy, John Maingot and Mike Holt sat among three rows of chairs filled mostly by members of the Seminole County Democratic Party.

The forum began with a wel-

come from Ertel and a request for all involved to remember their civil manners once the discussions began. Ertel said each topic would be discussed among forum participants first, with a public input session to follow each item on the agenda.

The tone of the evening remained surprisingly civil as participants and audience members discussed polling boundaries (changing from 50 feet to 100 feet), ID requirements at polling places, and the location of suspected felons in order to determine their voting status or lack thereof.

Ertel announced the addition of 4 more early voting locations: the Casselberry Public Library, the Lake Mary Public Library, the West Branch Line Public Library in the Altamonte Springs area) and the Oviedo Public Library. Voter outreach programs and voter registration efforts were also discussed.

The most anticipated item on the evening agenda involved touch screen voting and paper verification for touch screen voting machines. The Help America Vote Act now requires each voting precinct to have at least one touch screen voting machine, machines designed to make voting easier for the handicapped and disabled. In Seminole County they are 126 precincts.

The Diebold voting machines ordered by Ertel for county use do not have the capability to store or reprint a ballot should there be a need for a recount. All votes tallied by touch screen machines are stored on the machine's hard drive and transferred electronically to county election officials.

DEC's Carol Cox, a computer programmer, said later, "Considering how close past elections have been, if you do need a recount on the current touch screens your not doing an accurate recount. The touch screen machine is only retabulating the original numbers coming off the machine's hard drive." Having worked in the business, Cox said, "People do make mistakes in coding and the software used by the touch

screen machines is closed to public view. It's well worth the money to retain the integrity of the voting process—something that voters clearly want to ensure that their votes are recorded properly."

Ertel stated that although he recognizes the desire for paper verification, no printers can be purchased until the state's Division of Elections certifies a Diebold printer. Law requires that all election equipment be state certified before use.

Ertel said, "I would much rather have a flawless election than an election with new gadgets involved that may or may not be as safe as secure. I want 100 percent surety that what we are doing assures a 100 percent success rate. We need to be deliberate."

At one point, Ertel posed the question: "Do we really want to spend \$75,000 on printers?" To which most in attendance, regardless of party affiliation, answered in unison with a resounding Yes! Toward the end of the discussion Ertel repeated the question and once again heard the public's response, which he acknowledged, and promised to act upon as soon the new equipment is certified.

Talking by phone, Cox said, "We will be pressing Secretary of State Glenda Hood's office to certify compatible printers for the touch screen voting machines to make sure this is done as soon as possible, and definitely in time for the November 2006 county-wide elections, which will include the race for Governor, as well as state senate and county races."

While discussing disability access with disability advocate Kyle Consider, Ertel mentioned that the county had purchased 10 portable handicapped parking places to be used at polling stations. Made of a heavy plastic, the awkward, but lightweight parking spaces can be transported by pickup truck or van. Ertel's office has also offered to pay for the paving of handicapped permanent parking spaces at polling locations.

The idea for the forum came to Ertel last fall when he was running for the position of Elections Supervisor. Ertel was defeated by Dennis Joyner, but assumed the post when Joyner stepped aside for health reasons. Ertel said, "I wanted to have these events twice a year...open the lines of communication between the office and the public. Since the heightened attention of the 2000 elections organizations and governments tend to put their heads in the sand and cut off communication."

Heightened attention requires letting people in, so they can discuss things. Communication creates trust. With trust, comes cooperation."

As far as Ertel could determine, the June 21st forum was the first of its type in Seminole County.

If not the first, Ertel believes it was certainly the first instance in a very long time that the chairs of the three major political parties gathered together in a public forum. "I thought it was pretty cool that they were able to put politics aside to come together to discuss these issues."

pending, but Lake Mary police officials acknowledged the impacted bowel condition.

The investigation remains open and that other agencies, including the Department of Children and Families are also conducting investigations.

Other allegations that are being investigated, police said, are complaints that The Gables staff did not sufficiently document previous incidents of suspected abuse or neglect, nor have they reported such incidents to DCF's abuse registry as required.

It is also alleged, police said, that members of The Gables staff may not be sufficiently trained and/or licensed to practice the positions they are currently employed to fulfill.

The complaint also said some members of The Gables staff participate in acts of retaliation against residents,

motivated by allegations of racism.

Commander Steve Bracknell of the Lake Mary Police Department said workers at the assisted living facility are legally supposed to report suspected abuse. The facility is also required to have certain staff members on hand.

"The bottom line is there is evidence that this may or may not have happened with this woman," Bracknell said Friday. The police are required to investigate and will turn over findings to the state's attorney to see if any charges are warranted.

"It's going to be a long drawn out thing," Bracknell said of the investigations. The toxicology report may tell whether Schwager's body was poisoned as a result of the impacted bowel, he said.

To his knowledge, the

police had not investigated any other abuse claims at The Gables, which is owned by the Spring Hills corporation, based in Woodbridge, N.J. The company owns similar businesses in Orlando; Morristown, N.J.; Dayton, Ohio; and Alexandria, Va.

Bracknell said the department was surprised by the allegations because it has been a great asset to Lake Mary.

"I've been there myself," Bracknell said. "When this surfaced, we were dumbfounded because it is an exceptionally nice facility."

According to a Lake Mary police report Mary McDyer, executive director of The Gables, is listed as a suspect as are Petrona McLean of Sanford, a resident assistant; Desiree Rowe of Sanford, director of nursing; and Althea Williams of Oviedo, a resident assistant.

room to retreat (he had his back to a closed sliding glass door), he fired his gun to prevent Capone from getting close enough to cause harm, Olson said.

Peterson was behind Capone so he had to take cover when McDuffie shot.

"After the shooting stopped (Deputy Sheriff) Peterson went into the living room and secured Mr. Capone and Fire Rescue personnel arrived to care from him," Olson said Thursday.

A knife that Capone brandished was recovered in a location that is consistent with the deputies' accounts of the incident, he said.

An electrical cord that had the end removed leaving bare wires was found plugged into the wall in the bedroom, Olson explained. The cord was taken into evi-

dence.

"There is no information at this time as to whether Mr. Capone had ever used it to harm himself," Olson said.

Autopsy information is not available for release from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement yet. It will be made available as soon as it is released, Olson said.

Both deputies were to undergo critical stress debriefing, said Lt. Barry Smith of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Mental Health officials will be available for those involved in the incident, he said. The deputies can talk about what happened, but not as part of the investigation. Often feelings are brought to the forefront and dialogue can help those

involved, Smith said.

The debriefing also makes the deputy feel part of the process.

"They don't feel like they're pushed to the outside, although it's not part of the investigation," Smith said.

McDuffie will be placed on administrative leave while the Florida Department of Law Enforcement investigates.

McDuffie came to the Sheriff's Office in May 2002 from the Altamonte Springs Police Department.

He has been a law enforcement officer since 1991 having served in North Carolina prior to moving to Florida.

Peterson was with the Sanford Police Department prior to joining the Sheriff's Office in October 2000.

Dodging the raindrops

River Rats ease past Barracudas, 4-1, to extend FCSL lead

SANFORD — The new Sanford River Rats are beginning to look a lot like the old Sanford River Rats.

When the River Rats won the inaugural Florida Collegiate Summer League Championship last year, they did it with a combination of great pitching, strong defense and timely hitting.

And that is exactly what they are doing now as Thursday night at Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium, Sanford got its ninth straight strong pitching performance and the offense did just enough in dodging the rain-

drops and a strong Daytona Beach Barracudas squad, 4-1. Sanford had seen its five-game winning streak snapped, 2-1, by the Winter Haven Wart Hogs on Monday, but the locals bounced back quickly on Thursday.

River Rats starting pitcher John Ducey gave the fans a glimpse of how the night would go when he retired the Barracudas in order in the top of the first, striking out the final two batters.

Sanford lead-man Courtney Propst jump-started the offense on the second pitch he saw as he doubled down the leftfield line, the seventh double of the season for the former SCC and current-UCF standout.

The fans then had an opportunity to visit the concession stand and souvenir booth as a shower delayed the action for over an hour.

When play resumed, Daytona had a new hurler as Kris Gawriluk could not return and was replaced by Joe Testa.

Former Lake Mary star Matt Horwath greeted him with an infield single, advancing Propst to third, from where he scored on a double play grounder, giving Sanford the quick lead.

That run was all that Ducey needed as the

righthander had a no-hitter for three innings and allowed just four singles and three walks, while striking out 11, over the first eight innings to run his record to 3-0.

Brandon Webb worked the ninth, allowing a run on a hit and a walk, striking out two.

The River Rats scored their second run in the sixth inning when, with one out, Jonathan Lucroy singled, stole second, advanced to third on a grounder by Bridger Hunt and scored on a two-out single by Kyle Patrick.

Sanford added a pair of insurance runs in the eighth inning on a triple by Lucroy and an RBI double by Hunt. Ducey, who had walked, scored later in the inning on a wild pitch.

Propst ended the night 3-for-4 with the double and a run scored to lead a 12-hit attack.

Lucroy had a single to go with his triple and scored two runs, while Hunt had a pair of hits, both doubles, and an RBI. Patrick had two hits, including a double, and an RBI, and Horwath had a pair of singles.

Also contributing were Chris Kemp with a single and Ducey scored a run.

Lake Mary's Austin Pride had the RBI for the Barracudas.

On Monday, the River Rats offense could not come through with a clutch hit as the Wart Hogs pitching trio of Westly Spickard, Seminole Community College All-American Mike McClendon, who was the winner, and Mark Starr, gave up nine hits, but did not walk a batter and allowed just the one unearned run in ending the Sanford winning streak.


Kyle DeYoung was the tough-luck loser for Sanford as he allowed just five hits and two earned runs, while striking out seven and walking none, in his first appearance.

Dana has fished with me several times over the years, but she had never caught a redfish. I had never caught a redfish with her on the boat. Finally, Thursday became the day that

Dylan also managed a 20-pound red and a 17-pound red. Poor me, I never caught a fish. We left the house at 4:30 a.m., yes it was early for my wife. I was under intense pressure to catch fish. Dana said something about my life being shorter if we didn't catch a fish before the sun rose above the horizon.

Luckily for me, a trout was very gracious and hit her top water Chug Bug on her second cast. Three casts later another trout crashed her plug. About that time the sound of redfish crashing mullet was heard. Another guide was working

the fish with a charter so we kept pace at a distance.

The school he was working was large, but on the run. Redfish don't bite well when they are moving. I decided to leave for another school and sure enough they were sitting right where they were supposed to be. These fish were moving, but the movement was there tails waving high above the water.

The first cast, Dana landed her first redfish. There was a great sense of relief in my gut, because I knew the early rise was worth the effort. I also knew my life had been extended. Moments later Dylan hooked up and landed his 20-pound red. There were some nice fish in the school, but I had to go find the bigger fish.

We headed back to the first school and they had settled down. That usually happens if you leave them alone for a bit. Instead of poling to the fish, I staked the boat out and they came to us. The school of over 200 redfish came within 20 feet of the boat. The big red hammered the shrimp and it was lights out for the next 20 minutes.

I was glowing inside when the fish came aboard and I was able to snap the picture of Dana and Dylan holding that big red. This was the first picture of them together holding a red. I plan to frame this memory and hopefully many more will follow.

It is not just about catching fish. It boils down to quality time on the water with your family. There is the beauty of the surroundings we have been blessed with. There are many sights to take in while on the water such as dolphins, manatees and hundreds of wading birds. The beauty of the sun breaking the horizon and the calming effect the water has on your soul. Take a day and enjoy the water with the family.

The bite remains solid in the Mosquito Lagoon and Indian River. The large schools of redfish are everywhere. The trout bite is hot. The Rip Tide 3 inch Mullet is great for trout. They also like to chew on the Rip Tide Flats Chub rigged on a Daiichi 3/0 Butt Dragger hook. For the redfish use live shrimp or pinfish rigged on a Daiichi 4/0 circle hook and 20-pound fluorocarbon leader and 4/15 pound test Power Pro Fishing Line.

FWC INVESTIGATING TWO DEAD ON BOAT IN SILVER GLEN RUN

An Orlando couple died early

Father's Day while sleeping on their 23-foot Chaparral cabin cruiser moored in Silver Glen Run near Lake George in Lake County. Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) investigators suspect they died of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Dead are Scott Michael Moeller, 36, (DOB 9-16-68) and his wife Stephanie Moeller, 35, (DOB 3-25-70), of 9329 State Road 535 in Orlando.

The couple had left DeLand sometime Saturday along with friends on two other boats and moored up together in the run about 5 p.m. They had dinner and socialized until about midnight when they all retired to their respective boats for the evening. All three boats had generators running for air conditioning during the night.

About 8:45 a.m., Sunday, June 19, one of the friends knocked on the Moeller's boat but when he got no reply he thought they were still sleeping. About an hour later he returned, noticed their generator was still running, and they still did not respond to his knock. Shortly after that, around 10 a.m., the Moeller's generator stopped running. This time the friend pounded on their door and when they didn't respond, he went inside and found the couple dead in their bed.

The friends called 911 and emergency personnel arrived shortly afterwards. When they entered the cabin they discovered it had a high concentration of carbon monoxide. Emergency personnel pronounced the couple dead at 10:37 a.m., probably from carbon monoxide poisoning.

The medical examiner in Lake County will perform an autopsy to determine the cause of death.

The FWC investigation will focus on how the carbon monoxide entered the cabin of the vessel. Since the boats were moored close together, investigators will look at whether the fumes came from Moeller's boat or from one of the others, or from a combination.

"Unfortunately, carbon monoxide poisoning is not uncommon on boats," said FWC investigator Mike Fischer. "The gas is odorless and colorless. It poisons its victims and they don't even know it is happening if they are asleep. In fact, someone can get carbon monoxide poisoning on an open deck or ski platform because of the way the exhaust fumes are vented at the back of the boat."

This is a chilling reminder that boaters need to be aware that carbon monoxide poisoning can affect them too. The initial symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning are red rosy cheeks, fatigue, lightheadedness or headache. As exposure progresses, the lips and fingernails may turn blue in color, limbs may feel heavy and

victims become lethargic. In the final stage victims fall unconscious and die.

Those who survive carbon monoxide exposure may suffer permanent damage to the central nervous system. Boaters planning to run generators on boats to run air conditioning, or for any other purpose, should install carbon monoxide detectors which warn when the levels are dangerous.

If you suspect you or someone else is suffering from carbon monoxide exposure leave the area immediately and seek medical help.

NEW MILITARY GOLD SPORTSMAN'S LICENSE AVAILABLE JULY 1

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is providing service men and women a new way to enjoy their favorite outdoor activities.

Beginning July 1, the FWC will offer a Military Gold Sportsman's License to active duty and retired military that are stationed in Florida or have lived in the state for six months and claim Florida as their primary residence. The reduced-fee annual license (\$20) offers the same privileges as the traditional Gold Sportsman's License (\$83.50). It includes hunting, saltwater fishing and freshwater fishing licenses and wildlife management area, archery, muzzle-loading gun, turkey, Florida waterfowl, snook and crawfish permits.

The Military Gold Sportsman's Licenses are only available at tax collectors' offices. Those wishing to purchase one must show their

military ID cards plus a Florida driver's license or orders showing they are stationed in Florida.

Beginning at 10 a.m. (EDT) July 1, sportsmen can apply to purchase Dove Club Permits at any county tax collector's office, authorized license agent, online at MyFWC.com/dove or by calling 1-888-HUNT-FLORIDA (486-8356), toll-free from anywhere in the United States or Canada.

Dove Club Permits, which are available on a first-come, first-served basis, allow one adult and one youth (under age 16) to participate in all scheduled hunts for a designated dove field (up to 8 days). These half-day hunts cost \$150 and enable the permit holder and the youth to both take a daily bag limit of birds.
