Dragon Vs. Bear A 'Divorce' The World Now Believes

Copley News Service

WASHINGTON-What some students of world affairs describe as the most important international political development of recent history took place 10 years ago. It was in the late summer of 1963 that the murky and vaguely alluded to tensions between Moscow and Peking suddenly were confirmed in public.

What had been described as the unbreakable "comradely alliance" of the 1950s became the openly bitter feud of the last decade.

Today, the ongoing enmity between China and the Soviet Union is one of the basic factors on which all of today's calculations of global power

All but a few of the skeptics-the ones who said from the start that it was a "phony split"have now become convinced that the dragon and the bear are indeed serious in their proclamations of mutual hate, suspicion and

According to military intelligence reports there is more Soviet military firepower-and most of the Russian air force-pointing at the Chinese along the Sino-Soviet border than is aimed at the North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces in Europe.

The same evaluations claim there are more Chinese forces massed at key points along the Sino-Soviet border than there are in the Fukien

Veep's Unique Constitutional Status

While constitutional authorities disagree sharply on Vice President Agnew's possible immunity to indictment before impeachment, one makes an argument which might weigh in his favor should the matter reach the Supreme Court.

Since there are no legal precedents and the U.S. Con-stitution is unclear on this vital issue of priority, all the authorities fundamentally root their judgments in what they are valling the "practicalities."

Though he is in what appears to be a distinct minority, Prof. Alexander Bicket of Yale is the man who comes down on the side that could be helpful to Agnew as he struggles for immunity from indictment and trial on kickback charges now being reviewed in Baltimore by a U.S. grand jury.

"It's a close question. There's no settled authority. But I've concluded he can't be indicted before he's impeached

because there's no way to by-pass him in the presidential succession process while he's alive."

Bickel's point is that the Vice President is the one man on the succession ladder whose place is fixed by the Constitution and could only be altered by the slow amendment procedure demanding ratification by 38 states.

The professor adds: "It's not that he's indispensable, but that he's To put it directly in practical terms, this means the Vice President, if first indicted, could be sitting in a courtroom undergoing trial, only to be tapped on the shoulder and notified suddenly that he was president.

This is Bickel's answer to University of Chicago Prof.
Philip Kurland and others who contend that the governing "practicality" is that the Vice President has no significant duties and thus can easily be spared for trial. In the Kurland view, the President is the only truly indispensable man, since the nation cannot have his chosen

chief executive passing time in court while matters demanding leadership and decision pile up. One legal scholar who shares this judgment but cannot be named is troubled by the idea of applying the same docthe top office at any moment. He reasons that there should be a means of "getting at" him (by indictment) without reliance solely on the uncertain route of impeachment. (No vice president in history has ever been impeached.)

The Constitution, incidentally, is specific in saying that, while impeachment itself goes only to removal of a man from office, he is also "liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punistanent, according to law."

Its failure to say whether the latter process may in any instance precede impeachment is where the rub comes.

How Rep. Gray **Beats Living Costs**

By JACK ANDERSON WASHINGTON-"I'm a poor man," said Rep. Ken

He admitted, of course, that he owns a helicopter suitable for hopping over Washington traffic jams. And a luxurious, 50-foot houseboat. He also wears the fanciest clothes in Congress, selected each day from a vast wardrobe of stylized suits.

We discovered that he helps pay for his high living out of campaign collections. Last year, he amassed a \$26,000 campaign chest, which he tapped for such unlikely campaign expenses as carpeting his houseboat and buying tickets to Washington Redskins football games.

Gray had little legitimate need for campaign funds, since no credible candidate ran against him. As evidence of this, he ran up the biggest plurality of any Congressman in the country. Nevertheless, he hoarded over his campaign finances like a possessive shopkeeper. He was his own campaign treasurer. The dapper Democrat is a power on the House Public

Works Committee, which has jurisdiction over highway

construction and other public works. Many of his con-

tributors, it developed, have their hands in this particular pork barrel. CONTRACTORS

Highway builder H.H. Barter, for example, contributed (\$2,500 to Gray's campaign. Barter was reluctant, however, to talk to us about it. All he would say was that he did federal contract work "once in a while."

Another highway contractor, Eugene Simond of Carbondale, Iil., kicked in another \$2,000. He refused to answer any questions at all. Still another road builder, R.B. Potashnick of Cape Girardeau, Mo., gave Gray \$500. James

Knott, who is in the asphalt business, coughed up \$450. In addition, Gray was paid a \$300 honorarium by the American Institute of Architects and the Consulting Engineers Council for a speech on public buildings

The Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee funneled \$1,000 to Gray. "They asked me if I had a tough race," he explained. "I said no, but if there's money left over, I do have other needs." He collected another \$1,000 as his cut from a post-election, debt-clearing dinner thrown by Ilinois Governor Daniel Walker.

The flamboyant, boyishly handsome Gray, using the fast-talking technique he developed as an auctioneer, rattled on for three hours about his finances. He is also an accomplished magician, and there was an element of now-yousee-it-now-you-don't in his spiel.

'PEOPLE-TO-PEOPLE' He stated repeatedly that he was "providing people-to people service" and that the bills paid out of his campaign ands were not "for personal aggrandizement." To pick out a few items, \$1,000 was taken out of campaign

chest to make a boat payment to the Kings Craft Comapny another \$560.34 went to the Rubins Discount Carpet Center for boat carpeting, \$536 to the Anacostia Marina for boat repairs and \$411 for pleasure boat liability insurance. These expenditures, said Gray, were essential for en

tertaining constituents. Referring to the insurance policy, he added fiercely: "If a Boy Scout falls overboard, I want to be covered. I don't want to be sued for what little I have." Gray also charged off as campaign expenditures \$250 to the Washington Redskins football team, \$200 to the Baltimore Bullets basketball team and \$85 to the Ringling Brothers Circus. There were also several small expenditures, such as \$25 for a bachelor party for Rep. Ed Boland, D-Mass., \$15 for an HEW reception and several \$8 payments to the Coca-Cola

He considered it a legitimate campaign expense, he said, "give a Coke to a little kid who's been walking all over

Gray also pays a lot of bills with his Bank Americard. then pays the credit card company out of campaign funds.
We traced almost \$3,000, which was diverted from his campaign funds to pay Bank Americard bills.

He admitted that a counsel to the Clerk of the House had warned him that some of his campaign expenditures might be "questionable." About the time we began our investigation, Gray also rushed off a letter to the Clerk, dated Sept. 6, 1973, acknowledging that "official campaign expenditures should be separated from legitimate operational expenses concerned with my office."

COUNTERATTACK The more Gray talked, the angrier he became. Then he launched into a counterattack. "Jack Anderson," he charged, "is sleeping with a red-headed girl on a boat near mine." (Not true.) "If you stray one inch from the true facts," he shouted, "I'll sue."

When my associate Bob Owens asked the Congressman about a \$3,500 loan listed only as "accommodation for two constituents," Gray, demanding to know the source of our story, grabbed Owens by the tie, clenched his fist and threatened to strike him.







Miss Cox was a 15-year-old American unknown when she came to Dover in July, 1972, and said she was going for the English Channel speed swimming record. What the channel swimming association officials didn't know was they were dealing with a "goddess." But they stopped laughing when Lynne, on her first attempt, swam the channel the hard way - from England to France - faster than it had ever been

Swimming against the tides, she touched the shore of France just nine hours and 57 minutes after leaving Dover. Previous best by a woman was 10:43. By a man, 10:23

Man, naturally, couldn't stand it. So man, in the person of Richard Davis Hart, Springfield, Mass., reasserted male dominance on the channel with a 9:44 clocking just a month after Lynne's record-breaking swim. She claimed Hart's effort didn't bother her, but returned in August, 1973, and again shattered the mark. Lynne's second swim across the channel took just nine hours 36 minutes. The fact her time is only one minute over Barry Watson's 9:35 France to England swim in 1964 - the record with the tides, the easier way -

"Only a goddess could have done what she did," com-pliments Dr. Fahmy Attallah, a Long Beach, Calif.; psychologist and former channel swimmer. "I know from experience that's the most difficult swim in the whole wide

"You have to be physically fit and have outstanding character because it's such a boring swim. A lot who try give up because they lack character. To hold the record for both men and women is a great accomplishment. She's the goddess of the English Channel, the goddess of swimming."

Dr. Attaliah is a family friend but his credentials lend credence to his accolades. An Egyptian, he attemped the channel six times although he never conquered it. He did. however, spend 27 hours, 30 minutes in the water during the 1950 channel swim race. Dr. Attallah had been caught in the tides and was pulled, unconscious, from the water about 300 yards short of his goal. He knows just how difficult the

If not a goddess, however, Lynne Cox is at least a mermaid. A mermaid masquerading as a Los Alamitos teen-

She has probably logged more time in the water than a veteran Southern California freeway commuter has in a car. Lynne grew up on competitive pool swimming but never really cared for it. "It's so mechanical to just swim back and forth in a pool," she explains. "I like to be out swimming in the ocean, going somewhere." Giggling a girlish giggle she adds, "Maybe part of it's because I didn't excel in the pool."

English Channel but, except that the challenge appealed to her, she can't tell you why any more than a mountain climber or race car driver can explain a love for height or speed. After a group swim from Long Beach to Catalina Island - 26 miles across the sea as the song goes - Lynne was certain she could conquer the Straits of Dever in record time.

Convincing her family, which, of course, had to assume the expense of the trip, was easy. "We were quite sure Lynne could do it," said Mrs. Cox, who accompanied her daughter on both journeys to England. "She had been training consistently four hours a day and I don't think any marathon swimmer had ever trained that hard for a channel swim." Though rather thickly built, as a successful channel

swimmer must be, Lynne is well porportioned at five feet, six

inches, 170 pounds and looks more like a high school cheerleader than the world's fastest - England to France -What's next for the goddess of the English Channel, a best in the world at what she does? In her immediate future it's back to Los Alamitos High School where she'll be

something of a celebrity as a junior. Admittedly, however, she needs some new goals saying she has no plans to return for a third channel swim. Most marathon competitions in the world today are for professionals and, as Lynne has no desire to swim for money ("I swim for the love of swimming"), there seem to be a few new challenges for the fastest conqueror of the English

Not one to rest on her laurels she is going to launch a etter-writing campaign at Amateur Athletic Union and Olympic officials hoping to get lake marathon swimming installed as an Olympic event. She's not optimistic, of course. Moving the officialdom of the amateur athletic world could prove more difficult than swimming the Atlantic Ocean. But don't bet this young "goddess of swim" can't do it.
