

# All-Day Session Set Tomorrow **City Faces Budget Deficit**

#### By GLENN McCASLAND Herald Staff Writer

The Sanford City Commission will begin a search for \$57,369 tomorrow in an effort to balance a "bare bones" red-ink budget.

The search kicks off when the Commission sits down for a day-long work shop on the proposed 1975-76 fiscal year oudget of \$3,559,874 - some \$18,000 higher than last year's \$3,541,601.50 budget, but short by more than \$57,000 of balancing with estimated revenue for the coming year. City Manager Warren "Pete" Knowles said he hoped to keep the Commission in session "as much of the day as possible" in order to bring the budget into








BURNED JA' HAS NEW LOOK Repairs at the Seminole County Jail are moving along on



## Jobless May Go To Work

#### **Patching Railroad Tracks**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Thousands of unemployed persons would be put to work patching up deteriorating railroad tracks throughout the nation under legislation before Congress.

Officials of Amtrak and railroad labor organizations gave their support Wednesday to four bills designed to reduce unemployment while improving the rail system. Testifying before the House subcommittee on transportation and commerce, Amtrak President Paul Reistrup said that top priority for all upgrading should be

given on routes on which Amtrak operates. He noted that Amtrak is modernizing its aging fleet of passenger cars and has placed more than \$525 million in orders for new locomotives, cars and turbine powered

#### Astronauts To Be Tested

CAPE CANAVERAL (AP) - Space agency doctors examine three American astronauts today to certify their readiness to fly a joint mission with two Russian cosmonauts next week. The exams, scheduled to last several hours, have a dual

purpose: to make sure the astronauts are physically fit and to gather baseline medical data for inflight and sunght comparison. The tests are being conducted at the Johnson Space

Center, Houston, Tex., where astronauts Thomas Stafford, Vance D. Brand and Donald K. Slavton are undergoing final training for the flight.

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) - Gov. Edmund Brown Jr. signed legislation Wednesday reducing the penalty in California for possession of up to an ounce of marijuana to a traffic ticket-type citation and a fine of up to \$100. The law, passed after years of legislative struggles, goes into effect Jan. 1, 1976. It makes the possession of up to one ounce of marijuana a misdemeanor. ## Mideast Peace: **No Other Choice**

The tandem meetings of President Ford with Egypt's Anwar Sadat and Israel's Yitzak Rabin clearly have set the stage for another attempt to negotiate the important first step toward a settlement in the Middle East. Mr. Rabin's comments on leaving Washington raise the hope that Secretary of State Henry Kissinger may soon be heading back to Jerusalem, Cairo and other Middle East capitals for another round of shuttle diplomacy.

Mr. Sadat and Mr. Rabin have got the message across that each expects the other to yield to some degree from the positions which led to a stalemate in the Kissinger mission last March. The cooling off period since then, and the recent talks with Mr. Ford, may have illuminated areas where such concessions can be made.

Not that making concessions would be easy for either party. Mr. Sadat may be faced with justifying a compromise in Egypt's diehard position that Israel must surrender every inch of Egyptian territory occupied since 1967 if there is to be any pledge of "non-belligerency" toward Israel. On the other hand, Israel may be obliged to compromise on the position that her need for security precludes a complete withdrawal from the Sinai unless there are ironclad guarantees against a future attack from that direction.

Syria and Jordan may be aware that compromises are in the wind. Their well-timed announcement of a new agreement to confront Israel with their coordinated military forces along her eastern front is a reminder that an Egypt-Israeli settlement would not mean that they are any less determined to press the issue of Israeli occupation of Jerusalem, the Golan Heights and the West

While the dogs of war at times seem to be straining at their leash in the Middle East, there is a compelling force at work to enhance the possibilities for peace. It is simply that no one at this point could win anything if there is another war. Israel and her neighbors have the firepower to leave their respective cities and countryside in rubble. The Arab world as a whole would risk the destruction of its greatest economic asset - its oil ndustry.

Peace in the Middle East is essential if the energy supply for Western Europe is to be uninterrupted. The United States of America would find itself in an immediate energy crisis if its Arab oil supplies were cut off. Even the Soviet Union, the perennial mischief-maker in the Middle East, can see that its whole investment in detente would go down the drain if an Arab-Israeli war brought on a confrontation of the super-powers.

Who could profit by war in the Middle East? No one at all. In such circumstances, Israel and Egypt probably see no choice but to seize the present opportunity to lay the first stepping-stone toward peace.

## Inflation Fuel

The ploy of the oil-producing nations to squeeze higher prices out of the world market despite a self-imposed "freeze" will undoubtedly accomplish its purpose. But it may be counterproductive.

Ministers of the 13 nations in the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries agreed to base the price of petroleum on the Special Drawing Rights system of monetary exchange instead of on the inflation-plagued dollar.

The immediate result will be an expected hike in the per barrel price of oil of about 30 cents. And over the long run, the move will add fuel to the inflationary flames, which are not contained within the United

States borders. Sooner or later, the cost of food and raw materials shipped to the oil nations will reflect the upward pressures. Inflation is a global disease that will respond only to global remedies, a fact that has not yet penetrated, apparently, the euphoria of OPEC in its newly discovered economic power.

Whether you're a fisherman for sport or for commercial purposes, or just an interested person, you might be interested in attending tomorrow night's public hearing at the Sanford Civic Center when the State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission will discuss the pros and cons of hoop nets and the use of same in the St. Johns.

That meeting will begin promptly at 7:30 and a capacity crowd is expected. The Game and Fish Commission passed a law, which became effective July 1, allowing use of the nets in the river between the Volusia Bar and SR 46.

but organizers of Friends of the St. Johns (FOSJ) have voiced strenuous objections to this law and asked for the public hearing.

Seems many people feel commercial fishermen are taking too many game fish from the river in their hoop nets, but the fishermen claim all they get are trash fish.

Too, we've been told that many of these commercial fishermen put wings on the hoop nets, thus extending their potential 'catch' width.

According to a summary of rules and regulations from the Game and Fish Commission, applying to commercial fishing, fish dealers and commercial boats (e. ective July 1974), we note that the nets are limited in the species they may take to non-game

fish, shiners, eels and turtles. The rules and regulations say that the nets must have a maximum diameter of six feet with a minimum mesh of two inches stretched.

No where in those rules and regulations do we see anything that bans the use of wings on these nets, though it might be inferred. Nevertheless, tomorrow night's session should bring out some interesting points, pro and con.

## Managerial Woman Still A Rarity NEW YORK (AP) - Despite equal op

portunity laws, it will be a long time before women managers in numbers will be pulling the levers at high levels of American industry, a management specialist says.

The explanation, says Eugene Jennings, has nothing to do with sex, courage or ability. It may, however, have a lot to do with intelligence, the desire for achievement and job satisfaction.

"The woman manager is discovering what male managers have known for years, that much of managerial work is tedious and boring," says Jennings, a professor at Michigan State University and a business consultant.

Many women, he continues, "are no different than many men who after 8 or 10 years in the managerial world learn it is not what it is cracked up to be. A lot of the work is simply routine and almost meaningless if you don't have a reason to justify it."

Jennings believes that "the married male with a family can justify the tediousness and or erousness of his work because he is supporting a family; but a woman whose husband is a good breadwinner cannot do so."

After a decade or less in managerial work, many highachieving women have learned a great deal about carrying the authority and esponsibility of managing in terms of profit objectives and budgeting for performance.

Many of them are in the \$20,000 to \$40,00 salary category and have had experience running a branch office or department or zone. They are just being noticed for possible promotion to division manager

At this point many of them leave managerial work, Jennings notes, and seek something more rewarding. Finding herself on what she considers a treadmill in terms of job satisfaction, a woman often goes into business for herself.

Another alternative noted by Jennings, who is credited in managerial circles with having built he first computer program to monitor executive mobility, is to work for a smaller, serviceoriented corporation that requires more initiative and creativity.

A third alternative is to say with the cor poration but to guit line, or supervisory work. and take on staff work, such as planning, ad vertising, personnel and aspects of finance that seem more technically than managerially

ennings stresses that the decisions made by women aren't signs of inadequacy. "Not all men are cut out for management and not all women are either," he says. But the women, seemingly, have a chance to do something about it.

The corporate world is a poor battleground on which to prove women's liberation, says Jennings. It has its own requirements, and they sometimes conflict with personal ambitions.

kill Col. Ernest R. Morgan of Petersburg, Va., unless the U.S. Embassy provided food, clothing and building material to residents of a Moslem slum district of Beirut by 8 p.m. Wednesday. Both U.S. and Lebanese officials indicated the demand

would not be met. Meanwhile, Lebanese officials said the police and army search for Morgan and the kidnapers was continuing

The Palestine Liberation Organization said Wednesday night it also had searched for Morgan but had failed to find him. The 43-year-old colonel was taken from a taxi on June 29 at the height of street fighting between Palestininan guerrillas, leftist Lebanese Moslems and militiamen of the conservative Christian Phalange party.







Seminole County Commissioners have canceled a scheduled Monday workshop a which time they had planned to review a jail fire safety study prepared for their con sideration



# President Launches A New War On Nation's Crime

WASHINGTON - The conventional wisdom is that any American politician who aspires to the presidency must be a credible statesman who can handle the country's foreign affairs with skill and

Or that he must have a rational and vigorous economic program which purports to guarantee prosperity and ulfillment for all.

Or that he must be identified with the problems and needs of one or more of the most important social groups - the farmers, the industrialists, the trade unionists, the minorities.

But as the bicentennial election year approaches, another qualification looms even larger than it has in the past several national campaigns: anyone who wants to be president needs to appear as a crime-fighter. So frightened, horrified and angry are most Americans at the

increase in violent crime in recent years that they might sacrifice many of their other expectations to vote for a man who seemed likely to put a step to it.

So it is that Gerald Ford has taken one of the more important steps toward convincing the people that he should be elected to his very own four-year term in the White House: a message on crime. "Fear of crime," he said, "has caused people to rearrange their daily lives. They plan shopping and recreation during hours when they think the possibilities of violent attacks are lower. They avoid commercial areas and public transit, Frightened shopowners arm themselves and view customers with suspicion. The individual, political and social costs of crime cannot be ignored." Long-awaited and much-touted in

advance, Ford's message was a finelycrafted political document

specifically avoided the phrase "law and order" - introduced as an emotional catch-all to the political vocabulary of the 1960s by George Wallace, the governor of Alabama, and later picked up by Richard Nixon - in order not to offend the blacks and liberals who have come to consider it as a code for epressive measures against the un-

At the same time, the President threw a particular sweetener to the right wing of his own Republican party, which has been increasingly disenchanted with him, by reaffirming his opposition to any federal law that would require the registration of guns or the licensing of gun owners. He steered clear of those currently

Michael Florence says he purchased a new mobile home for his pregnant wife Depise in order that he could move out of the "shack" where they now

He says he made the purchase shortly after receiving a special exception from the county's board of adjustment to park a mobile nome on an acre of property he had recently purchased in south east Seminole County.

But Florence failed to wait on the purchase until the 30-day time period in which appeals can be made on the board of adjustment's rulings. And, Seminole County has appealed the lower board's decision. leaving Florence with a shack, a pregnant wife and no place to put a mobile home.

Last night in public hearings, Florence told the county commissioners of his problem. and said that when none of his neighbors objected to his locating a mobile home on the site near the Red Bug Elementary school, he assumed he could go ahead with the mobile home purchase.

"They (neighbors) would rather have the mobile home there than the shack," Florence

The commission continued the issue until next Tuesday to allow County Attorney Tom Freeman to research the matter for allowing the mobile home on the site with a time limit attached.

The commission appealed the board of adjustment's decision because the board felt the area was not suited for mobile homes, according to John Percy, county land development administrator.

The location of the site, % mile west of Dodd Road and 14 mile south of Red Lug Road, is in Commissioner Mike Hattaway's district. Hattaway says that the area is in an area for single family residential omes. He says he initiated the appeal.

He says there are certain areas which are "fantastic" for mobile homes, but he said the county has determined that the Red Bug area is for single family residential homes.

The location of the site is in agriculture zone. Percy said that there is a quite a bit of development

pressure coming in" from big evelopers in the area. If a lot of single family residences are uilt then a mobile home would not be suitable for the area, Percy said.

"The area is suitable right now," he said. Percy also said that new

procedures will be instituted nmediately to make sure that ndividuals who are granted board of adjustment rulings inderstand that the rulings can be appealed within 30 days.

Percy has recommended that the county commission grant Florence a permit for a mobile home with a time limit to have the permit reviewed after a period of time.
