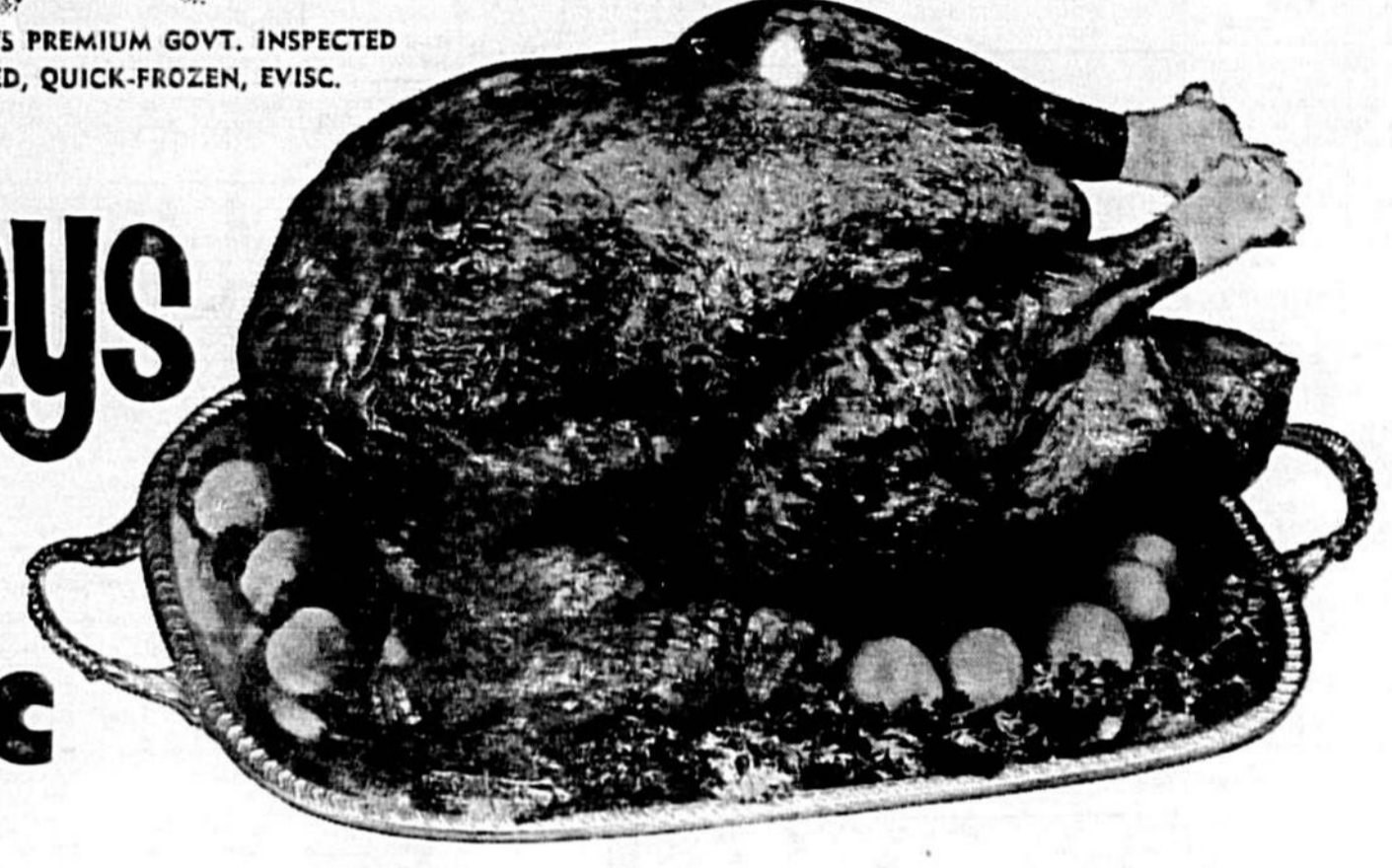

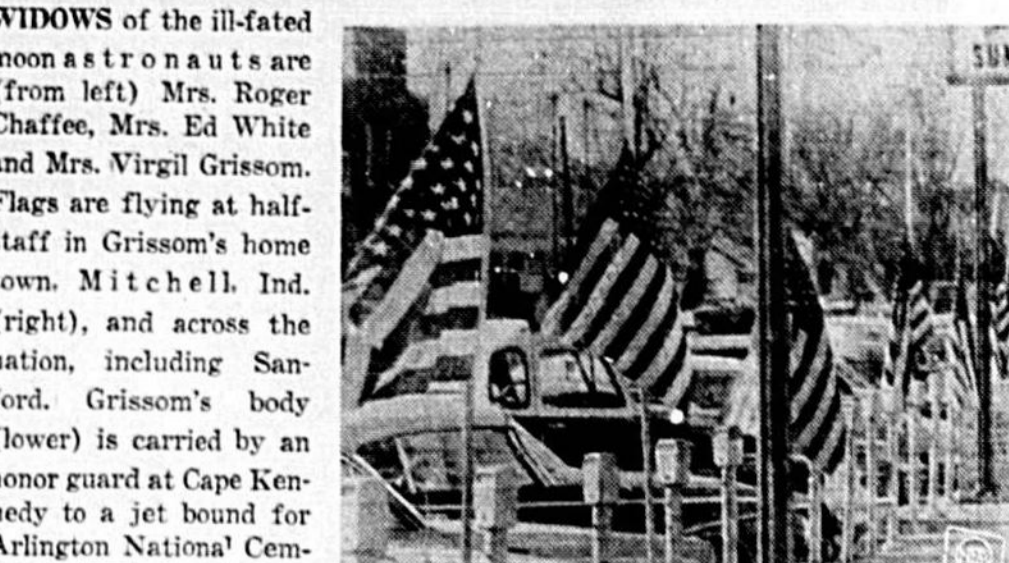

Fighting Slacks In Vietnam

South Korean Infantrymen reported today killing 21 Viet Cong in a new operation on South Vietnam's central coast.

Elsewhere, no ground fighting of any size was reported, and over North Vietnam heavy fog and cloud layers sharply reduced American air strikes.

One wave of Stratoforters hit Monday night at a suspected North Vietnamese base camp area 17 miles west of the U.S. Army Special Forces camp at Pli Djereng near the Cambodian frontier.

The new South Korean operation was launched Sunday with a helicopterborne assault in the coastal area 15 miles northeast of Nha Trang.

WASHINGTON (AP)—American policy in Vietnam has quickly gained center stage at Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearings on U.S. over seas involvement.

Despite protestations by Chairman I. W. Fulbright, U.S. officials are expected to be asked to avoid in any foreign policy discussion.

Another wave struck today at a troop concentration in the Do Xo area, a longtime Communist stronghold 36 miles north of Kontum City near the Laos border.

The report made it clear that the new warheads are slated for — if not already in — production and that steps are being taken to overhaul old nuclear intercontinental ballistic missiles already stockpiled.

The advanced warheads apparently have increased powers for penetrating a kind of nuclear shield which an enemy might generate as an anti-missile defense, and for withstanding blast and heat effects of counter-missiles launched by a defender.

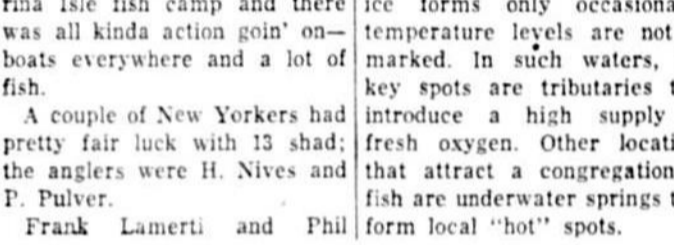

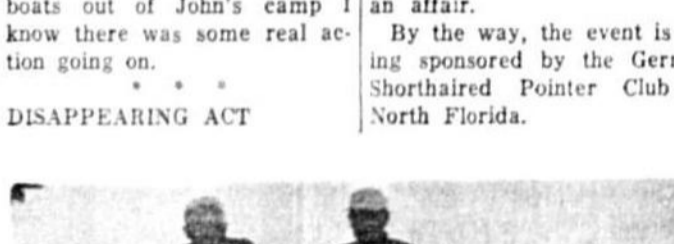

The Bruins from Los Angeles were the unanimous choice in the voting by a national panel of 28 sports writers and broadcast all night after Chicago Loyola 1a 82-67 in their only game last week.

Unbeaten UCLA, also a unanimous selection the previous two weeks, crushed Illinois 129-82 Sunday for its 16th victory. The halting, however, was based on games through last Saturday.

North Carolina held second place after beating Virginia 103-78, boosting its record to 13-1 The Tarheels collected 299 points.

Louisville advanced one place to third with 284 points followed by Texas Western, 221 points, and Princeton, 214. Points were awarded on a basis of 10 for a first place vote, 9 for second, 8 for third etc.

The Cardinals beat Bradley, 69-59 and Princeton, 69-59 in Western advanced two places fourth after defeating Arizona 84-58, 59 and Brigham Young 85-76. The Miners have a 14 record. Princeton remained in the No. 5 spot. The Tigers downed Pennsylvania 70-66.

Midwest Braces For New Storm

Snowbound Chicago continued to dig out from under mountainous white drifts today, but not until this morning. All braced for another weather onslaught.

Snow and freezing rain chilled the Midwest. Two inches of new snow was recorded in Park Falls, Wis., in six hours. Minneapolis, Minn., measured one inch in a similar period. The freezing rain extended southward into Iowa and southern Wisconsin.

The Weather Bureau issued hazardous driving warnings for most of the upper and western Midwest.

Major expressways and most state roads were open in Chicago area, as were 600 miles of Cook County roads. The state of Illinois had the help of 83 snow removal units from Iowa and Wisconsin in clearing high ways.

A Chicago judge imposed stiff sentences in three cases involving looting of unattended stores just west during the city's record 23-hour snow storm. In reply to your editorial of Jan. 26 entitled "Too Much Power?" I commend you for bringing the issues of the Florida Education Association's Legislative Program for 1967 to the public; however, I feel that not enough emphasis was placed on the entire program and a rather distorted view was taken on one item in the program which calls for a professional negotiatory statute.

Item II of the FEA Legislative Program for 1967 reads: "Provide A Professional Negotiatory Statute."

Enact legislation to guarantee, at the request of the local professional associations, a set of procedures, written and officially adopted by the local association(s) and the school board, which provides an orderly method for the school board and the local association(s) to negotiate, through professional channels, on matters of mutual concern, to reach agreement on these matters, and to establish educational channels for mediation in the event of impasse.

What this means, simply, is that a statute be provided that is a difference between professional negotiatory committees be allowed to represent their board and to discuss items of mutual concern, such as, salaries and teacher welfare, professional rights and responsibilities, teacher education and professional standards, improvement of instruction, public relations, and conditions of work.

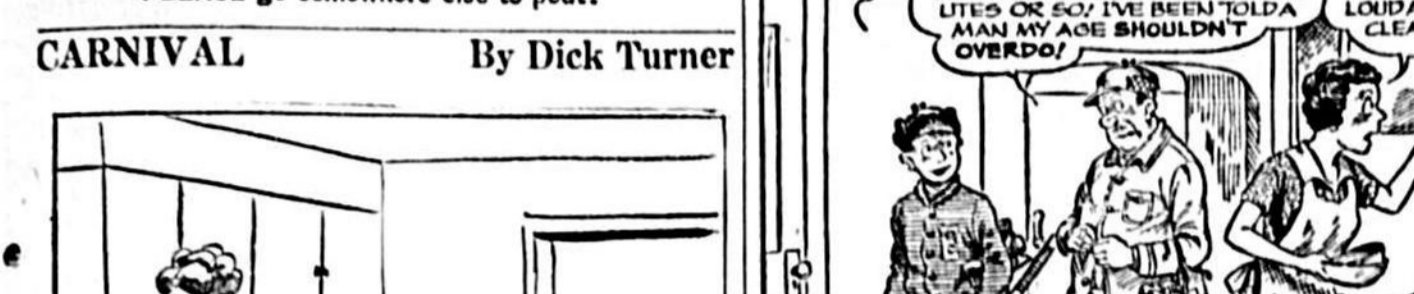

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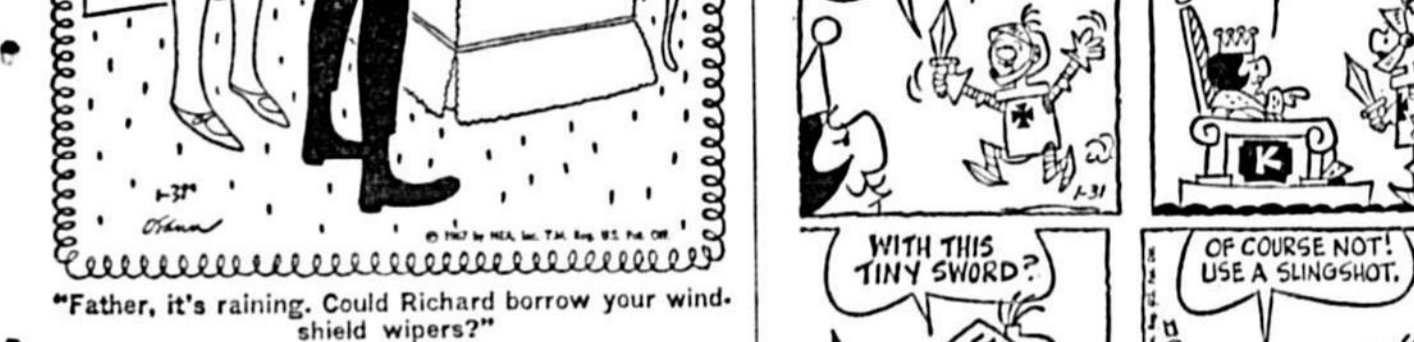
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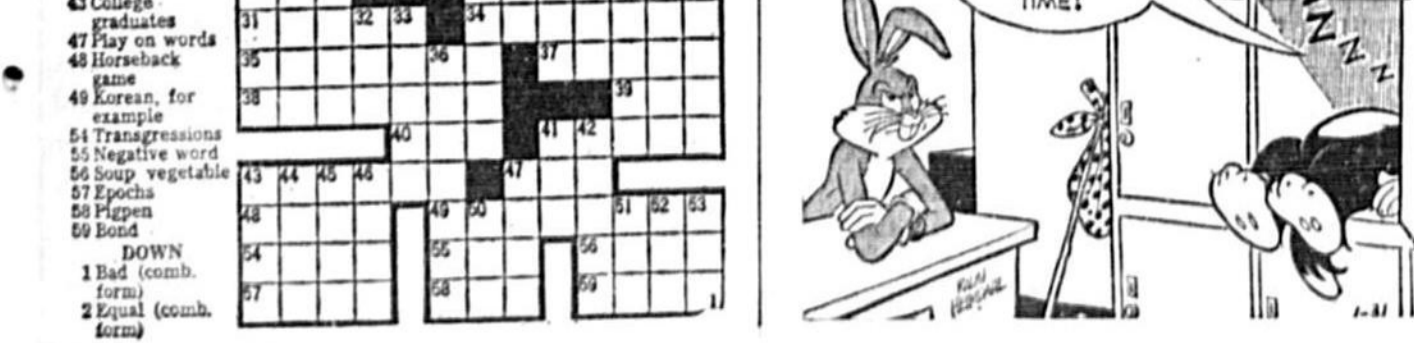

Miniature atomic reactors to provide the power to keep an artificial heart beating are already in the testing stage. Dr. L.E. January said in an interview Thursday. January said that such artificial hearts may be available within the lifetime of adults now living.

"We do know that qualified medical authorities are sure that such hearts are not only feasible but inevitable," he added. He noted that the artificial heart created by atomic reaction will be a problem.

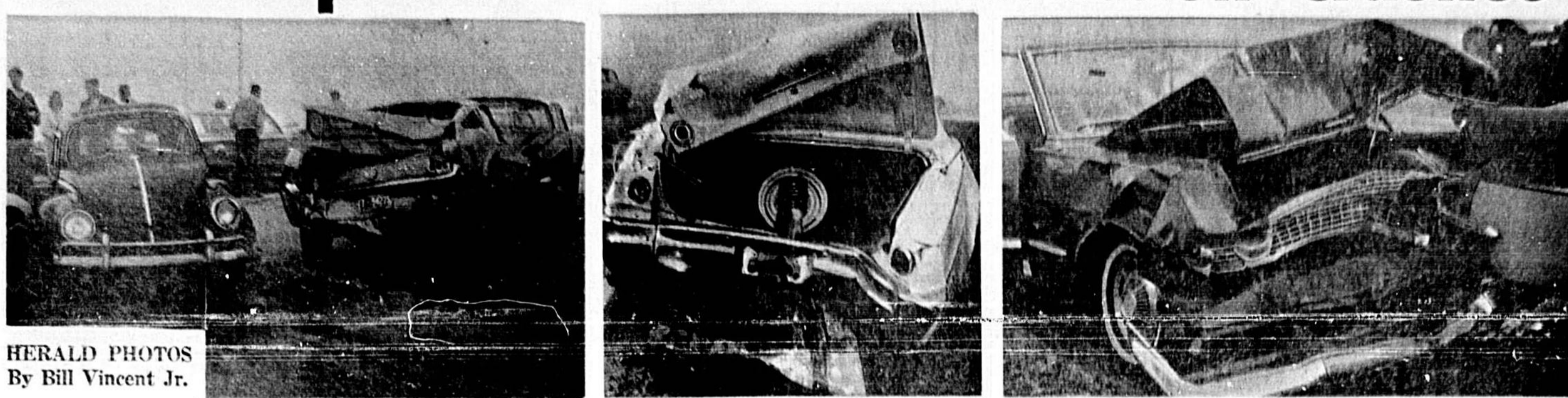
