

Bronson agrees with police examiner George Hubler that the SPD needed to re-organize and address areas where it was found to be weak - even dysfunctional. Hubler told the commission Monday that the department was improved. 'One day it can be a very good, even great department," he said.

Hubler advises a national search for a chief but said, "The acting chief should not be overlooked. His record should be compared to the others."

For the moment, the acting chief has a fistful of dollars coming to him and a sense he's doing two - perhaps three jobs extremely well.

# Suspect was part of bogus police gang

CASSELBERRY - A Casselberry man shot Friday night by law enforcement officers has an extensive, violent criminal history that includes terrorizing and robbing Central Florida parel." residents while part of a phony police gang in the late 1980s and early '90s.

Neal Everett Nicarry, 37, 18 recovering at the Orlando Regional Medical Center in cus- nal history that includes sevtody of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. He will be booked into the Seminole on a law enforcement officer, County Jail when he is released from the hospital. Seminole County Sheriff's Office spokes-County Sheriff's Department Chief Deputy Steve Harriett said.

Nicarry faces charges of two counts of aggravated assault on a law-enforcement officer, as well as armed burglary, reckless driving, and fleeing and attempting to clude an officer. Harriett said.

"This man has a pretty violent record," Harriett sald. "He was

part of this group of criminals who terrorized residential areas and apartment complexes throughout Central Florida in the late 80s, early 90s. They would smash in doors, sometimes yell 'police' and rush in with guns wearing police ap-

Drugs, jewelry, cash, and other valuables were stolen during the robbertes. Harriett said.

Nicarry has a 15-page crimieral charges of armed robbery, kidnapping, aggravated assault and drug possession, Seminole person Deanna Brown said.

Nicarry was shot Friday when he lunged at deputy sheriffs and a Florida Highway Patrol officer with a screwdriver, Brown said.

Deputy Michael Cannaday and FIIP corporal Larry Smith approached Nicarry in a shed in the backyard of a residence at 111 Pine Street in Altamonte Please see Phony, Page SA

## Safety chiefs could report to one rather than five city officials

SANFORD - The city wants to extend Ray Bronson's term as acting chief through March and to encourage residents to approve a referendum that month that would require the police and fire chiefs to answer to the city manager/public safety director.

A similar referendum failed a few years ago but Mayor Larry Dale said he is confident it will pass In 1999 because of more awareness by those who live in Sanford.

George Hubler, a police department examiner, has insisted for two years the city make the change - that it is confusing and inappropriate for the police and fire chiefs to report to five

"In the type of government you have, the chiefs should report to just one person - the city manager," Hubler said.

Hubler returned to the city Monday to explain the findings in his evaluation of the police department a year after he found it to be a 'dysfunctional' unit.

The SPD, he said, had made improvements but needed to implement more of the suggestions he had made a year ago.

"One day it can be a very good, even great department," Hubler told the city commissioners. He urged the commissioners to conduct a nationwide search for a new chief to replace Joe Dillard who is retiting on March 28.

## City employees will keep benefits

SANFORD - The Sanford city commission voted to approve a five-year contract with the Florida Recycling company and to pay the city's sanitation workers full annuities and sick-leave benefits.

The commission voted 5.0 to approve the full \$113,800 in annuities for retirement, and \$154,500 in 100 percent accrual of vacation and sickleave. Under different options available before the commission, employees could have received less than the full benefits, especially if they were not

vested in the Florida Retirement

Florida Recycling (FRS) of-fered the lowest bid on customer rates, and is by contract required to provide the same services in Sanford that the city has been providing.

The city will approve the contract with Florida Recycling (FRS) provided that all details of the contract can be negotiated between the city's staff and the company.

Under the rate schedule approved by the commission Monday night, residential rates will decrease 13.74 percent and commercial rates will be lowered by 10.03 percent.

#### Insurance salesmen charged

TALLAHASSEE - Florida Treasurer and insurance Commissioner Bill Nelson announced that 25 people, including two dozen life insurance salesmen have been charged with participating in an investment scheme targeting mostly elderly cit-Izens of Central Florida and coastal communities. The recent arrests are in addition to the original 13 arrest made in pursuant to an October indictment by a statewide grand jury.

According to the indictment, investors were promised hefty returns for putting their retirement savings into an upscale golf, recreation, and entertainment complex in Altamonte Springs, Investigators reported that the 20 men and five women

facing the new charges persuaded investors to cash in annuities, IRAs and other investments in exchange for promissory notes backed by phony "financial guarantee bonds" issued by non-existent insurance companies.

## Resume bank available to the disabled

TALLAHASSEE - The Able Trust, also known as the Florida Governor's Alliance for the Employment of Disabled Citizens, has launched Phase II of Abilities On-Line, an Internet Job bank for people with disabilities. Phase II enables Florida citizens with disabilities to post their resume on the website free of charge, while allowing employers to search these resumes for candidates meeting their employment needs. The Abilities On-Line job bank is located at http://jobs.abletrust.org directly or The Able Trust website http://www.abletrust.org.

Job seekers with disabilities will be given a registration password by The Able Trust that will enable them to access the job bank. Upon entering the site, they may complete the online resume with information about their employment history, education, honors, activities and certificates, along with other relevant employment information. Job seekers may then link their on-line resume to employer job postings that have provided an email address.

Employers are asked to complete brief registration information upon entering the Abilities On-Line website. Once registered, the computer will assign them a User ID that will allow them unlimited access to search resumes or post job openings at no cost.

A 77-year-old female was contacted via telephone by a Donald Smith Smith claimed to representing a contest and advised victim she had won. The victim reported she has entered numerous contests and sweepstakes over the past year. Smith told the victim she had won \$175,000 and had to pay taxes on the winnings before she could claim her prize. He instructed her to send \$2,000 to an account with the Barclay Bank in London, England, Hegave her an account number to transfer the money from her

bank to the English Bank. The victim did so.

A week later, the victim was contacted by a Paul Carter claiming to be with the same company Smith represented and told the victim was told to transfer an additional \$5,000. which she did.

She was contacted again a week later and told an additional \$9,800 was needed. She again complied.

When connected on October 21 for an additional \$5,000 she became suspicious and told Carter she could not afford to do this. She reported this incldent to law enforcement. The victims bank confirmed the money transfer to England



Broccoli is closely related to cauliflower since both are grown for the clusters of unopened flower buds and tender flower stalks. The Italian word brocco means sprout, bud, or shoot, from the Latin brachium meaning an arm or branch.

Description: Broccoli has two different distinct forms. One is "sprouting broccoli," which makes a somewhat branching cluster of green flower buds atop a thick, green flower stalk, and smaller clusters that arise like "sprouts" from the stems. This form, called "calabrese" in Britain, is the most commonly grown form in the United States.

The other type of broccoli makes a dense, white "curd" like that of cauliflower and is called "heading broccoli" or "cauliflower broccolt." This latter form is usually grouped with cauliflower, leaving the term "broccoli" restricted to

sprouting varieties. Like the other close relatives of cabbage, broccoli is native to the Mediterranean area and Asta Minor. It has been popular in Italy since the days of the Roman Empire. However, records indicate this vegetable was unknown in England until a relatively recent few hundred years ago. It has become popular in the United States

only during this century.

Culture: Broccoli is grown in about 15 percent of United States gardens, according to a national survey. In Florida. broccoli is probably grown to a slightly greater extent than in other areas of the country. comparing favorably with beets and garden peas in frequency of production. However, all three of these vegetables must compete with such cooking greens as collards, turnips, and mustard for space in the garden. Broccoli is welladapted to all areas of the state when grown during the coolest months of the year. Plant in the north and central districts of Florida no earlier than mid-August and continue through mid-March. In South Florida, plant September through January. Although broccolt is a cool season vegetable, it is susceptible to cold

injury especially when the plants are tender and not conditioned to withstand low temperatures. Temperatures of 26-32 degrees F for 30-36 hours some previous years in North Florida. Temperatures in the 30s for 20 or more days may have a severe stunting effect on broccoli. Plants stunted by low temperatures form small central flower buds and very few side shoots. To avoid loss from freezing, plant in February and early March.

Varieties: Varieties of broccoli vary considerably in garden performance. The old standard Waltham 29' still is a top choice. It is ready to cut from 80-100 days from transplanting, and continues to form side shoots (secondary heads) after the main central head is cut. Other varieties for Florida gardeners are 'Green Mountain, 'Spartan Early,' 'Atlantic,' Green Sprouting,' Green Cornet', Italian Green Sprouting, 'DeCicco,' 'Green Duke, and 'Packman.' Caulibroc has the tender texture and sweet flavor of broccoli, but has a lime-green head similar to cauliflower.

Cultural practices: Soil preparation, bedding, liming, fertilization, and irrigation practices are similar to those

for cabbage and collards. Since direct seeding may result in poor stands, start broccoli by using healthy, vigorous 4-to 5week-old transplants. Set have killed broccoli plants in plants 18-24 inches apart on rows that are 36-40 inches wide. Watch for cabbage loopers and imported cabbage worms which are especially troublesome on broccoli.

Harvesting: The central head should be harvested first when it is still tight and compact, with no opened flowers. It takes from 60-100 days from planting to first harvest. As much as 5 inches of the flower stalks should be cut along with the buds. Do not allow the stems to become tough and woody. After the central head is removed, side shoots will develop. Although smaller, these should be harvested at 2-to 4day intervals. The entire harvest period may run from 40-80 days, depending on the season, crop conditions, and locality.

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS \_ The disappointment in the faces of the Lake Brantley football team was evident as the final seconds ticked away.

The Patriots had just watched their season slip away with a 53-7 loss to Dr. Phillips in the first round of the Class 6A state playoffs. The loss meant an end to an undefeated season which had them sitting pretty as the seventh-ranked team in the state after entering the season unheralded.

The Upper St. Johns River Lakes and Marshes from Indian River County north to Lake Harney have historically been considered among the best waterfowl habitat in the state.

This extensive area, including takes Poinsett, Winder, Sawgrass and the Stick Marsh, provides virtually unlimited opportunities for diverse hunting experiences in terms of species, habitats and modes of hunting.

However, the diverse and constantly changing habitats require hunters to do extensive scouting in order to find and access good hunting

Much of the area south of Lake Poinsett is within the Upper St. Johns River Type II WMA and use of the area is regulated by SJRWMD. For details call (407) 726-2862 or (904) 329-

A free migratory bird permit will be required to hunt ducks in Florida.

Hunters, unless exempted, must also have a valid Florida hunting license, a wildlife management area (WMA) stamp if hunting on a WMA (\$25), a Florida Waterfowl Stamp (\$3) and a Federal Duck Stamp (\$15).

All of these can be obtained from county tax collectors' offices or their subagents, except for the federal stamp which is available at some U.S. Postal Service offices.

Hunting licenses can also be purchased instantly by calling toll-free 1-800-HUNT FLOR-IDA (1-800-486-8356).

The free migratory bird permit is part of a program implemented by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) called the Migratory Bird Harvest Information Program (HIP). This nationwide program is an effort to gather better information on the harvest of America's migratory game birds.

In order to obtain the free permit, hunters are simply asked to answer five questions about migratory bird hunting when they fill out their application for a hunting license.

Later on, some hunters may get a survey from the USFWS asking for details on how well they did during the last hunting season.

This information will help state and federal agencies properly manage migratory game bird populations and set appropriate hunting regulations because wildlife managers will have more

accurate harvest figures than ever before.

#### GENERAL GUN, FALL TURKEY, GRAY SQUIRREL AND QUAIL

In the state's Central Zone, which includes most of central and northeast Florida, general gun season for antiered deer and wild hog began Saturday, Nov. 14 and will continue through Jan. 24.

Fall turkey season (gobblers only) also began on Nov. 14 and will run through Jan. 10, and gray squirrel and quail season began on Nov. 14 and will continue through March 7.

While some hunt on private lands, many hunters take advantage of Florida's extensive wildlife management area (WMA) system - pubhe lands managed by the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC) to provide good hunting opportunities for a variety of wildlife species.

There are 28 WMAs in the GFC's 12-county Central Region that are open at various times during general gun, waterfowl, turkey, and squirrel and quail seasons: Baird Unit of Richloam WMA, Bull Creek WMA, Caravelle WMA, Citrus WMA, Dexter/Mary Farms Unit of Lake George WMA, Etoniah Creek WMA, Flying Eagle WMA, Fort McCoy WMA, Georgia-Pacific WMA, Guana River WMA, Half Moon WMA and Homosassa WMA.

Also, Jumper Creek WMA. Kilbee Unit of Little Big Econlockhatchee WMA, Lake George WMA. Miami Corporation WMA, Ocala WMA, Prairie Lakes Unit of Three Lakes WMA. Relay WMA. Richloam WMA, Rima Ridge I Unit of Tiger Bay WMA, Rock Springs Run WMA, Seminole Forest WMA. Seminole Ranch WMA. Three Lakes WMA. Tiger Bay WMA, Tosohatchee WMA and Triple N Ranch WMA.

Hunters should note that some of these areas are by quota permit only, while others require only a valid Florida hunting license and a valid

wildlife management area stamp. Not all areas offer all hunting opportunities. For specifics, hunters should refer to the hunt map for the particular WMA or WMAs they are interested in. They should also obtain a copy of the Florida Hunting Handbook for statewide regulations.

#### WATERFOWL

## Honesty the best policy with doctor

old closet homosexual with a recurring anal itch. My doctor, who has no idea that I am gay, gives me antifungal cream, which is only temporarily effective. Is my condition caused by my sexual encounters? What can I do

DEAR READER: While it may be difficult to do so, I think it is very important that you tell your doctor that you are gay. Repeated anal stimulation can certainly lead to persisting irritation, even chronic fungus. You need to be tested for a variety of sexually transmitted diseases, which may be contributing to your symptoms, as well as for HIV, which - if present will predispose you to a variety of unusual infections. Be honest with your doctor so that he or she can help you with this troublesome problem.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have a muçus cyst on the nail bed of my left middle finger. It is sometimes painful, but not always. I've been to four doctors: One cut it out, another injected it, the third froze it. I still have it, so the fourth doctor suggests extensive surgery to remove it. The doctors say there is no

Mucinous cysts are common on the fingers and usually can be ignored. The cause is unknown, but they're not a hazard to health. Moreover, they often disappear without treatment. Obviously, extensive surgical removal would take care of the problem, but why subject yourself unnecessarily to the expense and risk of an operation that isn't needed? If I were you, I'd say: "No, thanks."


DEAR READER: That depends on what is causing the problem If the heart disease is caused by

coronary narrowing, hypertension or a valve disorder, these conditions must first be treated. Without such treatment, exercise could be downright dangerous

On the other hand, if the heart is weakened by prolonged inactivity, exercise could improve the situation.

Your doctor or cardiologist should address your question and advise you. In general, the heart condition that you describe would not ordinarily be helped by exercise alone.

word "etrog." What is an etrog?
In this deal, what do you think of the bidding? Against six clubs, West leads the diamond queen. Who will triumph, declarer or defense?

The auction was the heart 10 short clubs as forcing - no stopping on pin-

heads. In reply to Roman Key Card Blackwood, South showed either two aces, or one ace and the heart king. and denied the heart queen. This told North six hearts wasn't best.

king, declarer cashed dummy's heart ace. This was super play. But East was wide awake - he unblocked the king. South drew trumps, played off the diamond ace, and cashed his three spade tricks ending in the dummy. Now came a heart, but West took two tricks to defeat the contract.

If East doesn't jettison the heart king, he has to win trick nine with that card. Then, he must return either a spade or diamond. This permits declarer to ruff in hand and discard his last heart loser from dummy.

That was sharp play by both South and East, and an etrog is a lemonlike citrus fruit. It is used during Sukkot, of excellent! It is best to play three the Jewish Feast of Tabernacles, or harvest festival.
