

Deliberately set fires destroyed over \$4 last year, eight times the dollar amount of property destroyed by all other structure and car fires.

Shah In Stable Condition After DeBakey Operation

CAIRO, Egypt (UPI)- The deposed shah of Iran was in an intensive care ward today recovering from surgery to remove his spleen while tests are conducted to determine if his cancer has spread further. The 20-member medical team headed by American heart specialist Dr. Michael DeBakey said in a bulletin issued just before midnight Friday the operation, the

WASHINGTON (UPI)- The Soviets, continuing to meet heavy resistance and suffering heavy casualties, have wiped out entire Afghan villages and are executing hundreds of political prisoners, U. S. of-

The United States is suffering reverses around the world because the federal government and the Congress has hamstrung the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). That's the opinion of David Best, Democratic candidate for Florida's fifth district seat in the U.S. House of Represen-

"Congress is requiring the CIA to conduct itself like Eagle Scouts," said Best, who formerly worked for the National Security Agency as a special intelligence agent to counter foreign surveillance operations against the U.S. "Other nations do not require their intelligence community

to behave like that," he said, adding the country for its own protection has to use covert operations "within the bounds of morality." Best said a bill, being considered in the Senate, is designed to put teeth back into intelligence agencies. He said if the CIA had been able to act as it should have, the situation with the hostages in Iran could have been prevented. But once the hostages were taken, he said, President Carter did not have many options. "Now we are dealing with the lives

of the hostages," Best said. The Orlando and Brooksville attorney said a time limit must be set on how long the U.S. will allow the situation to continue. "The time is not right to give that time limit, yet," Best said. "I think every American wants something done about this. We can't afford to let countries like Iran kick us around. It sets a precedent for every little country to start kicking us," he

"If Iranians start killing the hostages, we should go in by air and sea and destroy every plane they have on the ground. Assuming they turn the hostages loose without harming them, the situation is still différent than it was before the Russians went into Afghanistan," Best said. He said it is obvious that the U.S. is supplying arms to inthis hemisphere, noting, however, supplies of oil under a



Carter Won't Campaign Despite Kennedy's Jabs

United Press International Despite a hint from President Carter's campaign chairman that he may soon make politically beneficial trips outside Washington, the White House says Carter still does not intend to actively campaign for re-

Meanwhile, Sen. Edward Kennedy repeatedly challenged Carter Friday to abandon his stay-at-home policy and join him on the road. "You can't remain in the White House for the period of the last six months and understand the anguish and the pain that millions of American people are feeling with runaway inflation," Kennedy told an audience in Pittsburgh. "You just can't do it, Mr. Carter."

Volcano Spews Huge Rocks

COUGAR, Wash. (UPI) - Aerial observers reported rocks the size of beach balls shooting out of Mount St. Helens, while dark columns of steam and ash rose more than a mile above its expanding, rumbling crater in an increase of volcanic activity. Scientists hoped Saturday to learn from samples of debris scooped up below the crater what to expect from the raging mountain in the time ahead. Don Miller of the Volcanic Hazard Project of the U.S. Geological Survey in Denver said after a twilight flight over the mountain Friday he saw hundreds of chunks

of rock about a meter more than 3 feet in diameter showering from the black crater. A plume of steam and ash rose to 7,000 feet above the mountain's 9,671-foot summit. "It was quite spectacular," he said.

Accused Man Near-Catatonic

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (UPI) — Psychiatrists say a Ferris State College student accused in the classroom slaying of his accounting professor seems to be coming out of a near-catatonic state into which he had lapsed after the fatal snooting. Thomas D. Kakonis has not spoken a word since Wednesday's slaying of the professor who flunked him on a test. But he now is writing messages and has started eating, said the doctor treating the 20-year-old

Singer Dick Haymes Dead

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Big Band era singer Dick Haymes, once compared with Frank Sinatra until his career collapsed under pressure of alcoholism, legal problems and six marriages, including one to Rita Hayworth, died Friday. He was 61. A spokesman for Cedars-Sinai Hospital said Haymes died at 8:05 p.m. EST of lung cancer. Haymes' career hit its high point in the 1940s when he sang with the bands of Bunny Berrigan, Harry James, Benny Goodman and Tommy Dorsey, replacing Frank Sinatra with the last two. He made nine gold records and appeared in 35

Disease Killing **Palms**

WESLACO, Texas (UPI) -, An insidious disease that has nearly eliminated coconut palms in Dade County, Fla., has begun slowly killing off stately date palms that dot the semi-tropical Lower Rio Grande Valley and scientists say there is not too much they can do about it.

The disease identified in the Valley as "palm lethal decline" is similar or identical to the virulent mycoplasma-like organism which denuded coconut palms from Key West to Miami over a 17-year period, leaving only the trunks as remembrance of their former beauty.

Although there are no coconut palms in the Valley a 100-mile citrus and vegetable growing area and winter tourist haven stretching northward from the mouth of the Rio Grande the deadly infestation is proving equally lethal to two ornate palm varietes in the

area, the Canary Island date palm (Phoenix canariensis) also known as ornamental date, and true date palm (Phoenix dactylifera). "The future appears grim for date palms," the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service announced after calling in an expert from Florida to identify the tree disease that has spread from Brownsville to La Feria over the past three years and is predicted to spread through

the entire Valley in time. About the only good news the scientists have about palm lethal decline is that the two varieties of date palms comprise only about 15 to 20 percent of the Valley's total and the disease does not seem to bother the other species. Dr. Randy McCoy of the University of Florida, the scientist who identified the disease in the Valley, said it kills palms in about four months. Although it does not necessarily spread from tree to adjacent tree, and may skip several trees before attacking another. McCoy said in time

another, McCoy said in time "all mature palms in a focus (planting) are eliminated." For some reason the mycoplasma spreads more rapidly through mature trees than it does the younger specimens, McCoy said.

Dr. Marvin Miller, a plant patholgist at the Texas Agriculture Experiment

Station, concurred with McCoy that "it (lethal decline) will virtually eliminate ornamental date

palms from our area."
Along with Dr. Jose
Amador, Texas Agricultural
Extension Service plant pathologist, Miller has been working on the palm decline problem two years and the two scientists requested McCoy's services recently when their own investigations proved inconclusive. McCoy has been contending with the disease almost from the day it turned up in the Miami area in

McCoy said the Texas strain appeared at least as virulent as the Florida mycoplasma and that the rate and pattern of spread was similar to that of lethal yellowing in both Florida and Jamaica as well as sudden wilt or heartrot seen in coconut and African oil palms in Latin America. Because of confirmation of

the disease, the Texas Department of Agriculture has imposed a quarantine limiting area nurseries on shipping date palms and ornamental date palms. Norman Maxwell, experiment station hor-ticulturist, said only two or three nurseries in the Valley were affected to a major

"Although date pairs were widely planted along high-ways throughout the Valley years ago, recently developers and others have gone more to the Washingtonia (palm), which is virtually immune to lethal decline," Maxwell said.







Alcoholic: Priest Preaches NEW ORLEANS (UPI) -The Rev. Jack Fulford crusades against a modern enemy - alcoholism. Each week he steps to the

pulpit in a different church, stands before an audience of strangers and bares his soul: "My name is Father Jack, and I'm an alcoholic." The public confession, stated bluntly and without emotion, momentarily stuns the congregation. But it also makes them eager to hear more from a man who struggled with alcoholism for five years. Now, 10 years after overcoming his weakness, he

preaches the message of "This disease can be incurred as innocently as cancer, as tuberculosis, as heart disease, and so forth," says Fulford, who subscribes to the theory that alcoholism is primarily genetic in origin. The first factor in the genetic theory is a supposition that all alcoholics have a bodily trait

consumption of intoxicating beverages. "Then all that it takes is the second factor, the ingestion of alcohol," Fulford says. "Then a person inexorably crosses the line into dependent, addictive, alcoholic drinking.' Fulford, 64 and a member of the Catholic Church's Redemptorist order, was a priest for more than 20 years before drinking overpowered

"I spent eight years as an Air Force chaplain and 17 or so as a home missionary going from parish to parish in the Midwest," he says. something. "But I didn't want to talk to anybody. I went to one of our parishes in Chicago and every day I'd walk down to the Loop area. I'd see people smiling and I'd sigh a prayer, 'Dear God, let me be able to do that,

Fulford lessened his drinking, but the physical reaction to the reduced intake put him in the hospital. A doctor there recognized his trouble and brought a psychiatrist to his bedside, but the priest resisted their offers of help. "As always with alcoholics, there is that fierce denial,'

Justice Has Gone Astray

William Rummel has been cruelly used, indeed, by the law. The Supreme Court turned its back on justice recently when it refused to deliver him from a life sentence for stealing \$229.11.

The Texas Legislature, too, bears a share of the blame for the plight of Rummel, a small-time drifter who was thrice convicted of minor fraud. In one case he was sentenced to prison for an \$80 credit card swindle. Again, he was jailed for forging a \$28.36 check. In his final collision with the law, he took \$120.75 on a promise, never admitting blacks for the first time. Meanfulfilled, to fix a broken air conditioner. Under Texas law, the sentencing judge had no alternative but to impose a life term upon "whoever shall have been three times convicted of a

It may be argued that Rummel had by this time proven himself an habitual criminal, albeit a bungler. But few would argue that his crimes warranted so savage a punishment as life behind bars. Lawyer Continues To Fight For Controversial Clients

BALTIMORE (UPI) - Attorney Harold Buchman has been public tennis courts in Baltimore

The 63-year-old lawyer's latest case adds to his lengthy list of controversial clients — alleged Communists, draft resisters, Black Panthers and a priest and eight others accused of burning draft board files during the Vietnam War. "I represent anybody except fascists, the Ku Klux Klanners and the racists," said Buchman. "If they have a generally humanistic approach to people, I'll defend them even though

they may have a distorted sense of history or are politically naive, counterproductive, or even dangerous." He is now defending three of five Iranian students recently charged with putting disassembled Winchester rifles in suitcases bound for Iran. "I never discuss politics with my clients because there are so

ew that agree with me," Buchman said. Buchman has asked a federal judge to delay the Iranians' rial until the 50 American hostages being held at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran are released.

"My solution to the Iranian crisis is to take the shah, have (David) Rockefeller write a check for the shah's fortune in the Chase Manhattan's vaults, take him and Kissinger and send them all to Iran," he said.


We are selling the American way by putting up the wrong iorses everywhere and we are shocked when they are deposed. It's about time we started backing the right people."

Buchman first defended Iranians in 1976 when 18 students were arrested for disrupting a Johns Hopkins University convocation at which the shah's sister received an honorary degree. The charges were dropped when the students agreed to refrain from similar protests in the future. Buchman also helped prevent deportation of an Iranian student convicted of posting an anti-shah poster on a telephone

"There used to be a time when America was a place of refuge for those fleeing the crowned heads of Europe," he said. "Now it's the reverse. All the scum and dregs are over here fleeing the popular revolutions." The government should not be so anxious to deport Iranian

"Those colleges hustled those students," said Buchman. "If the \$10 billion or \$15 billion the shah spent on armaments had been spent on schools, they wouldn't be here in the first place." Buchman's 41-year legal career includes fights against segregation, the anti-Communist scare of the McCarthy era of he 1950s and the Vietnam War furor of the late 1960s and early

He risked disbarment and social ostracism in 1948 when he




tilting at windmills all his life. His latest unpopular legal Buchman was convicted of conspiracy to disturb the peace battle: defending three Iranians accused of trying to smuggle and received an 18-month suspended sentence and a \$50 fine. He received a gubernatorial pardon many years later.

He tangled with the House Un-American Activities Committee in 1951 and again in 1957 by refusing to answer questions about his political beliefs, which included supporting Henry Wallace for president. He invoked the Fifth and First Amendments when asked if he was a member of the Communist Party.

"That period destroyed some of the best talent in America," The local bar association upheld his right to remain silent

and refused to disbar him. "Walking into the courtroom in those days was like walking to Dante's Inferno," he said, recalling the tension when he represented five persons convicted and jailed for being members of the Communist Party and allegedly advocating the violent overthrow of the federal government. The case rested on their possession of Marxist-Leninist



Court Supports Deportation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court today refused to block deportation of Iranian students - an action President Carter ordered in retaliation for the taking of American hostages in Tehran

Without comment, the justices declined to grant a stay to the Confederation of Iranian Students, which was seeking to bar the Immigration and Naturalization Service from deporting students pending a full-scale appeal to the high court.
