The plutonium is part of the Galileo probe, scheduled to be launched from Atlantis' bay during the flight. The judge should rule Tuesday.

# Tallahassee braces for special session

### United Press International

TALLAHASSEE - The Florida Legislature's special session on abortion doesn't begin until Tuesday afternoon, but the people of this normally quiet town are already showing unmistakable signs of preparation for the event.

The vanguards of several planned caravans appeared Sunday In

activists on both sides of the emotional abortion issue, and local hotels reported they were rapidly filling up.

Pedestrian barricades around the Capital are now in place, and the parking lots across the street are already filling with satellite-Transmission trucks from a number of Florida television stations.

Other early arrivals included members of Florida Right to Life, who had called for Sunday to be a state-wide day of prayer and fasting. and the Florida Abortion Council, whose leaders held a day-long meeting at a downtown hotel.

Attendance was higher than normal at many local churches, too. Several posted anti-abortion messages on outdoor signs, and

some ministers devoted their sermons to the subject.

Authorities expect anywhere from 15,000 to 100,000 demonstrators and up to 500 out-of-town Journalists to converge on the town for the special session, and law enforcement people have gone to special lengths to prepare for the crowds. So far, four anti-abortion rallies and



# Renovation has become a passion

SANFORD - Jean and Warren Skipper have spent more than one year and \$35,000 restoring their 207 E. 10th St. home to the way it was built about 74 years ago.

Even with that time and expense behind them. Jean Skipper said, their work puts them at least

10 months away from completion.

Skipper said their work will step up in preparation for the Dec. 2 Sanford Historic Trust tour of eight downtown homes. As part of the group's tour, the Skippers will open their home for guided tours with detailed history they have collected about the house.

Before the Skippers moved to Sanford after 15 years in Fern Park, they were avid sailors. spending every weekend on water. But now, Skipper said, their boat sits unused and up for sale at a Melbourne dock.

"It's a sacrifice," she said about giving up leisure time to do restoration work.

The Skippers are the third owners of the home. which was built by one of Sanford's first doctors. The house was used as a medical clinic for 15 years after World War II when the doctor became too disabled with arthritis to leave his home.

As work was done on the house. Skipper said. she and her husband found some unusual features: a garage behind the house connected to □ See Home, Page SA

# Man kills self in shootout with cops

ORLANDO - A man known by friends for his violent temper is dead from a gunshot wound, apparently self-inflicted, after trying to force his girlfriend to drink poison and exchanging

shots with a sheriff's department SWAT team.

Friends of Sedrick Moore. 21. said the incident began Friday night as the man was leaving home to attend a high school football game. His live-in girlfriend. Rhonda Brown, asked him where he was going, and Moore lost his temper.

Moore punched Brown in the nose, and the incident soon escalated in a confrontation with Orange County deputies, who were called to the scene by a relative of the woman. Moore barricaded himself inside the house with a gun and tried to force Brown to drink insecticide.

At about midnight. Brown managed to escape from the house. Moore shot at her from a window, and SWAT team members returned fire, splintering the doors and walls of the frame house. About 90 minutes later, deputies entered the house and found Moore's body. A preliminary investigation showed that "none of the rounds fired by the SWAT team injured the man." leading authorities to speculate that Moore

Her suit requests damages in the neighborhood of \$500,000.

# Shuttle countdown begins today

# Court decision due tomorrow on launch

CAPE CANAVERAL — Engineers com-pleted final tests and readled the shuttle Atlantis Monday for the start of its countdown to blastoff Thursday, federal court permitting, on a long-awaited flight to launch a plutonium-powered probe to

Anti-nuclear activists, meanwhile, vowed to trespass at the Kennedy Space Center and disrupt the countdown Thursday if a lawsuit to block the launch is not successful. A hearing is scheduled Tuesday.

Atlantia's crew — commander Donald Williams, 47, co-pilot Michael McCulley, 46, Williams, 47, co-pilot Michael McCulley, 48, flight engineer Franklin Chang-Diaz, 59, Shannon Lucid, 46, and Ellen Baker, 36 — planned to fly to the Kennedy Space Center from Houston later in the day Monday for final preparations.

Williams and company are scheduled to blast off at 1:29 p.m. EDT Thursday to ferry the 81.4 billion Galileo probe into space for a

largest planet in the solar system.

Galileo, the most sophisticated spacecraft ever built, promises to revolutionize mankind's knowledge about Jupiter, beaming back pictures 20 to 1,000 times better than those received from the highly

nuccessful Voyager probes.

Like the two Voyagers, Galileo is powered by radiotsotope thermoelectric generators. or RTGs, that convert the heat produced by the radioactive decay of plutonium 238 dioxide into electricity.

Callieo's two 124-pound RTGs were

loaded aboard otherwise empty tractor trailer rigs Saturday and hauled to the launch pad under heavy security. Once at the pad, an overhead crane hoisted the power packs into a special "clean room" that fits against the shuttle's open payload

The use of RTGs is mandatory for Gaileo because at Jupiter's great distance from the sun — about 484 million miles — solar panels would have to be prohibitively large to generate enough electricity for the probe's science instruments.

Anti-Galileo activists argue that Atlantis should not be launched because of the threat of a plutonium release in the event of

a launch estastrophe or an inadvertent atmospheric re-entry by Galileo during either of two Earth flybys that are required by the probe's convoluted trajectory to

Jupiter. Three public interest groups - the Foundation on Economic Trends, the Christic Institute and the Florida Coalition for Peace and Justice - filed a lawsuit Aug.

jor Peace and Justice - filed a lawsuit Aug.

28 to block the launch, arguing that NASA underestimated the odds of a radiation release in the event of an accident.

For its part, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration says a \$50 million test program conducted in the waite of the Challenger disaster proves the power packs would easily survive another such disaster and that swan in more wideast accidents. and that even in more violent accidents. only trace amounts of radiation could be

The RTGs were installed abourd Galileo Saturday and hooked up to special cooling lines that circulate a mixture of water and alcohol through the power packs to keep

their temperature down.

While RTGs are physically incapable of exploding, they are hot to the touch — about 350 degrees — and cooling is required to pretect Galileo's sensitive instruments until the spacecraft is in space.

# Hearings to start on bullet train through Central Florida

ORLANDO - Two companies vying to build a \$2-billion bullet train from Miami to Orlando and Tampa embark this week on an important series of hearings into how their proposals would bring high speed ground transportation to Piorida.

The Florida High Speed Rail Transportation Commission has scheduled 10 days of hearings in Orlando beginning Tuesday and stretching into November if nec-

The seven commissioners and their staff will hear from state and local agencies and officials from both rail companies — TOV of Florida Inc. and Florida High Speed Rail Corp. — who will have the opportunity to question

"What the commission is doing is deciding whether either one or both of these companies can produce a high-speed rail commission spokeswoman

Both companies paid a \$35,000 application fee in March 1968 when they submitted their initial proposals. Another fee of 9628,000 will be required after this series of hearings to continue through the selection pro-

Hull said private citizens will be allowed to speak, of course, but these hearings will focus primarily on technical issues. More public hearings will be held across the state next apring after the commission has evaluated the latest proposals from both compani

This set of hearings. Hull said. "is an agenda that deals with the applications that have been presented and the impact they would have on the environment and growth management."
Hull added, "These hearings

are really technical in nature." with many legal and regulatory to be discussed and re-turns. The agenda, in fact.

The legislation also includes
81 million for land acquisition at Key Deer Wildlife Refuge, the only habitat for the Key Deer, which has been on the en-dangered list since 1967.
Also included in the legislation is 64. million to buy land sur-

rounding Silver Glen Springs.





# Local schools and nation lag in metrics

SANFORD - While the rest of the world has converted to the metric system as their standards of measurement, the United States remains staunchely entrenched in using the old.

more cumbersome, measures.
"Really, we've backed away from it completely," said Clem Boyer, Seminole County School District's coordinator of mathematics.

While the schools teach the metric system as a skill in all basic math classes, the conversion from the U.S. Customary

System to the metric system is not taught. They are viewed as unrelated units.

According to Boyer, Florida law requires that all math textbooks must have at least one unit devoted to the teaching of the metric system.

"To be honest," he said. "there is only the most minor attention given to the subject."

As recently as six or seven years ago, according to Boyer, the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM) was conducting a major campaign to promote the conversion to the international system of measurement.

"They were telling us that we

Springs area.


No changes in fees or service are expected initially because CableVision is assimilating Storer Cable into its own opera tion, Pickett said.

# Franking farce

in an egregious attempt to fool the voters. the House and Senate voted to curb the abuse of free postage for congressional mass mailings, then moved surreptitiously to preserve this costly perquisite of incumbency.

As a result, a serious effort at franking reform was transformed into a farce.

The exorbitant "franking privilege" enables lawmakers to bombard their constituents with hundreds of millions of unsolicited pieces of propaganda each year, all at taxpayer expense. In 1968, franked mailing costs for the Senate and House ballooned to \$113 million. It is no coincidence that the volume of self-promoting newsletters and other political material sent to the voters en masse grows dramatically in election years.

Lawmakers were put on the spot by a reform measure introduced by Sen. Pete Wilson, R-Calif., to eliminate free postage for congressional mailings sent to every postal patron in a state or district. The Wilson plan called for the money to be shifted to a program to help prevent drug-addicted bables.

Under heavy pressure from the voters to curb franking abuses, the Senate approved the Wilson bill by an 84-4 vote, and the House, not to be outdone, approved it by a vote of 245 to 137. Less than an hour after the House action, however, the measure was gutted by members of the House-Senate

This slick, hypocritical maneuver enabled lawmakers to vote against franking abuses while being assured that nothing serious would be done to jeopardies the practice.

The guisy Wilson bill would have banned unsolicited congressional newsletters, "town meeting" notices and mailings to more than 500 households, for an annual savings of \$45 million. In addition, House members would have been forced to disclose how much junk mail they send. This already is required by Senate rules.

Soon after the House vote, Rep. Vic Fazio, D-Calif., saved the day. He prevailed on his colleagues to cut short debate. "Let us resolve this in conference," he declared, pronoucing the Wilson bill to be "not a serious proposal."

So once again, legislators who rely on mass mailings to capture votes at election time can rest easy. No one will go wanting for congressional junk mail, and drug-addicted mothers and their babies will look elsewhere

All is back to normal, including the blatant hypocrisy of Congress.

# McCarthy, Helms; two of a kind

WASHINGTON — There are times in the life of the Senate when one member seems to dominate the institution so thoroughly that an observer can be led to believe the rest of the senators have become "potted plants."

So it seemed in the early 1950s when Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R-Wis., conducted his search for communists in government.

Even though such established or potential political powers as Sens. Robert A. Taft, R-Ohio, Richard Russell, D-Ga., Lyndon Johnson, D-Texas, Richard Nixon, R-Calif., and John F. Kennedy, D-Mass., served with McCarthy during his 10-year tenure, the Wisconsin senator at times appeared to be the tail wagging the dog.
When McCarthy first came to Washington in

1947, he made very little impression. But, after toying with various causes such as housing for veterans that got only a minimum amount of attention. McCarthy hit on the communists in the State Department issue and rode it. with variations and extensions, on a dizzy three-year reign of terror.

It was said that conservatives in both parties who had no stomach themselves for a political inquisition privately encouraged McCarthy because they felt Franklin D. Roosevelt and his associates really had been "soft on communism" before and during World War II. If so, they

helped create a political monster that turned on themsand ultimately had to be stopped by them. The Senate conservatives were glad to all back

in 1951 while Mc-Carthy waved lists of what he said were communists in the State Department, but alarm bells began ringing a year later when "Tail Gunner Joe" set his sights on icons such as Gen. George C. Marshall.

With his own investigating subcommittee to run after the Republicana took over the Senate in 1953, McCarthy began looking for subversives in the Army, an expedition that brought him

into conflict with the Bisenhower White House. It was then that McCarthy amended his 1962 campaign description of the Roosevelt-Truman years from "20 years of treason" to "21 years of

They helped create a political monater

Excesses of that sort plus personal attacks on such GOP Senate pillars as Arthur Watkins of Utah and Ralph Flanders of Vermont earned McCarthy in 1954 an official Senate condemnation. He served three more years until his death at age 48, but he was almost invisible in the Senate after the establishment slapped him down 35 years ago.

There is in this history a possible contemporary parallel. While no senator today looms over the Capitol like McCarthy at his pinnacle, Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N,C., recently has become increasingly vociferous in his attacks on those who dispute the tenets of his brand of conservatism.

Helms has for years sought to trap senators with whose politics he disagrees to cast votes that later were used against them in "attack" campaigning. That tactic was publicly de-nounced recently when Helms seemed to be attaching the pornographer label on senators who opposed his efforts to outlaw federal grants for art he considered indecent.

Although some accounts pictured the outcome of the battle over federal arts money to be a resounding slap at Helms, nothing actually was done to punish the North Carolina senator.

# Baseball is as American as baseball

TORONTO - Concision and simplicity can be elements of eloquence, as Jamie Quirk showed when he said, "I'm a professional catcher." Those words in context revealed one reason why it is right for grown-ups to play, and care about, baseball games.

With one out in the eighth inning of their 160th game, the Baltimore Orioles were leading the Toronto Blue Jays 1-0 and were five outs from tying them for first place in the American League East. But a Blue Jay runner was on third, The Orioles' pitcher was a rookie who has, as baseball people say, a knee-buckling curve. Quirk called for a curve low and away. It was too much of both, It went in the dirt, bounced to the screen, the runner scored. The Blue Jays won in the eleventh.

The official scorer called it a wild pitch. Quirk called it a passed ball: "A major-league catcher has to block that ball...! should have blocked ita. I'm a professional catcher." Maybe he should have, maybe not. Two things are certain. One is that America would be immeasurably improved if more Americans — teachers, workers, journalists, everyone — had Quirk's exacting standards of craftmanship and accountability. The other is that Quirk, who will be 35 this month, did a manly thing in trying to block blame from reaching a 22-year-old pitcher.

In the hours before D-Day, Gen. Eisenhower drafted a statement to be issued if the invasion failed. Pirst he wrote: "Our landings in the Cherbourg-Havre area have failed to gain a antisfactory foothold and the troops have been withdrawn." But then he struck the last six words and wrote instead: "...and I have withdrawn the troops." By replacing the passive tense with the first-person pronoun. Elsenhower stepped up to the pitch: He took responsibility. Quirk was like lke.

Quirk is, in baseball's evocative language, a journeyman. His travels took him to the Royals, Cardinals, White Sox, Indians, Royals again. He may not be back in Baltimore next year, but he is a nice emblem of this year.

Haschall teams often reflect their cities. The

Cubs have the edgy insecurity of The Second City. The Mets and Yankees are pure New York: Chaos leavened by recriminations. Baltimore is just a nice town build around basics - a harbor, some manufacturing. The Orioles rebuilt around baseball's basics, speed and defense.

Frank Robinson - Hall of Famer, 1969 Manager of the Year (surely) and all-star aphorist — says: "Speed comes to the ballpark every day. The three-run home run does not." Speed serves defense, which improves pit-ching: Pitchers become aggressive, putting the ball in the strike zone, counting on fleet fielders to catch it.

Defense is baseball's underappreciated (by fans, not baseball people) dimension. Players

spend more time with leather on their hands than with wood in their hands. The 1989 Orioles were the second team in history to have fewer than 90 errors. Their fleiding percentage (.98602) was the best ever.

"When you've been around seven or cight years," said Cal Ripken, the shortstop, during this his eighth scason, "you might think twice about making a diving catch on gravel and sliding into the wall. But at this stage of our young players' development, they don't think about it."

Ripken is not exactly Methuselah. He will be 29 on opening day, 1900. This is awfully far away. Today, baseball, the sport that combines, better than any other, team play and personal accountabiliity, is coming to its autumn crescendo, beyond which stretches...

Most of us do not elect leaders to serve as models of private morality, however nice it might be if they did. Instead, if we bother to vote at all, it is probably because we cling to the remote hope that our leaders will bestir themselves into addressing such inconvenient facts as this nation's continuing budget deficits, a Social Security "surplus" that is nothing more than government IOUs, a tax code that punishes personal thrift and an investment rate barely half that of Japan's.

But isn't it equally discreditable — and of far greater danger to our future — for so many House members to refuse to confront the grand policy questions of the era?

Personally, I hope Frank is insocent of the more serious charge, survives his ordeal and remains in the House. Not because I admire his lifestyle or politics, but because he'll

remains in the House. Not because I admire his lifestyle or politics, but because he'll count in the future as one more member to give the benefit of the doubt to his colleagues on personal (as opposed to public) conduct. Remember how quiet Sen. Ted Kennedy remained during the hand-wringing over John Tower's alleged drinking? Given Kennedy's own checkered past, he could hardly afford to utter a word.

Come to think of it, maybe the only way to stop the feeding frenzy over the private lives of public figures is to air the dirty laundry of everyone, politicians and journalists alike.

# Negotiators fail again on budget

WASHINGTON - Senate Democratic and Republican negotiators failed again to reach agreement on how best to handle a needed but complicated deficit reduction bill and the thorny issue of a capital gains tax cut.

"We don't have an agreement yet," Senate Republican leader Bob Dole of Kansas said Sunday after the 90-minute negotiating session which did not produce a plan to facilitate consideration of the deficit reduction bill, "We're still negotiating.

Dole said he presented Democrata with a new GOP proposal on how to unscramble the partisan problem of passing a deficit reduction bill, called reconciliation, but he did not reveal details of the plan.

Senate Democratic leader George Mitchell of Maine said during the session that Dole made several "constructive and positive suggestions" to address a key Democratic concern that expanded child care benefits passed by the House and Senate earlier, not "fall through the cracks" amid talks on paring down the overloaded deficit reduction bill and on the capital gains cut issue.

## NOW calls for open abortion access

MILWAUKEE - The president of the National Organization for Women said Sunday every woman in the United States should be able to get an abortion if she wants one and Medicald should pay when women cannot afford to.

"We are not going back, we are not going to see pre-1973 when women got abortions because they were illegal and unsafe and it was the leading cause of maternal death," Molly Yard said at the Wisconsin NOW State Conference at the Park

# College seniors lack knowledge

WASHINGTON — A study found college seniors do not know much about history or literature - with nearly a quarter unable to identify Franklin Roosevelt as president during the Depression or distinguish between sections of "The Communist Manifesto" and the Constitution.

The survey by the Gallup Organization was Sunday released in conjunction with a National Endowment for the Humanities report calling for a core curriculum in colleges that would teach students "basic landmarks of history and thought."

'A core of learning ... encourages community." NEH Chairman Lynne Cheney said in the report "50 Hours," which offers a sample core curriculum. "Having some learning in common draws students together — and faculty members as

The NEH-commissioned survey asked students in the spring of their senior year 87 multiple-choice questions about history and literature. Fifty-five percent flunked, answering fewer than 60 percent of the questions correctly.

man said. Senators voted Friday not to repeal a year-old Medicare law that is meant to protect senior citizens against the high costs of catastrophic illness. Instead it voted to keep some of the expanded benefits such as extended hospitalization. The House previously voted against the program because of an unpopular income-based surtax.
McCollum told the audience

that he supported the partial repeal measure of Sen. John McCain, R-Aris. which abolished the surtax while keeping the benefits of extended hospitaliza-

"Keeping drug benefits and doing away with everything else didn't make sense," McCollum said. He said he wanted to retain hospital and medical benefits. With the surtax gone, the catastrophic iliness measure will be financed by a \$4-a-month increase in the \$27.90 flat-rate premium paid by those on Medicare.

On the issue of drugs, one woman said that the U.S. government should follow Singapore and China's examples where, she said, drugs are not a

problem.

McCollum said we have to "tackle the problem on all fronts" but the U.S. would never tolerate death penalties for drug crimes like other governments. He suggested more prisons are needed.

About 10 individuals who identified themselves as striking Eastern Airlines mechanics asked McCollum why he flew Eastern Airlines and did not

"If you use the tax credit system, you will get the cash. It's a system that would allow you to have the choice," Mc-Collum said.

# Bush points to peace, prosperity

BALTIMORE - President Bush boasted before a convention of Republican women Sunday that his administration has delivered to the American people on political promises of sustained peace and prosperity.

Offering a "look at the record," Bush used a speech to the National Federation of Republican Women to tick off strides in areas from arms control to good government as evidence of "some of the promises we're

Bush did not so much as allude to the criticism he has faced in recent days over his reluctance to support last week's abortive coup in Panama, described by a senior administration official as "our first bloodletting."

Rather, ne claimed steady progress in

attacking a broad range of national problems with a declaration that "we promised America peace and prosperity and we're keeping that promise.

In the face of a brightened outlook for reductions in conventional, nuclear and chemical weapons, he said, "peace isn't breaking out all over, but because of our policies, the potential for world peace may be greater now than ever before."

Bush cited rising employment among blacks and Hispanics and an improved Midwestern economy in ballyhooing 83 consecutive months of economic growth he attributed in part to "the leadership" of his predecessor. Ronald Reagan.

Bush touted his ethics-in-government reforms and "record of appointing talented and qualified women" to upper-level federal jobs and praised his recent summit with the nation's governors as "the beginning of a

process whose only and ultimate goal is excellence in American education."

Welcoming the emergence of a compromise clean-air bill last week in the House, Bush said his administration has "found new ways to move beyond partisanship in the battle against pollution."

And in a rebuke to the skeptics. Bush said he still believes he can make good on an inauguration Day pledge that the scourge of drug abuse will end. "If all of us work to see that America no longer tolerates so-called casual users and that drug dealers - these merchants of death - get the penalties they deserve and that lives are saved through treatment and, yes, once again, through education."

Bush and his wife. Barbara, interrupted a long Columbus Day holiday weekend at Camp David to appear before the more than -2,000 Republican women. They were to return to the White House this afternoon.

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## Bus bombing Colombia's deadliest yet

BOGOTA. Colombia — A bombing that killed seven bus passengers was the deadliest attack in the cocaine cartels' 6-week-old anti-government offensive and came just hours after Bogota officials confirmed they had spurned the drug lords' 1988 peace overtures.

The Sunday afternoon gasoline bombing of a public bus in northern Bogota transformed the vehicle into a charred mass of twisted metal. killing seven people - three of them children - and wounding seven, witnesses and police said.

An unknown number of passengers managed to escape the inferno that engulfed the bus, but the attack nonetheless was the deadliest since cartel-financed hit squads declared "total war" on Colombia Aug. 24.

### Pope arrives in Indonesia, kisses ground

JAKARTA, Indonesia — Pope John Paul II arrived today in Jakarta, kissed the ground of the world's most populous Moslem country and headed to a soccer stadium where 100,000 cheering Catholics gathered for his first mass in Indonesia.

The pontiff's chartered jetliner landed at Halim military airport, where he was greeted by Foreign Minister Ali Alatas and other dignitaries prior to a courtesy call on President Suharto.

Indonesia is the pope's second stop on his three-nation, 11-day Asian trip, following a whirlwind 44-hour visit to South Korea, where he called for reunification of the two Koreas and expressed a wish to visit China. which does not recognize Vatican authority over Chinese Catholics.

# Jews worldwide observe Yom Kippur

JERUSALEM - Jews throughout Israel, as well as elsewhere, at

sundown Sunday began observing Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the year when Jews worldwide fast and ask forgiveness for their sins.

During Yom Kippur, Hebrew for "day of atonement," everyday life in Israel comes to a halt and the nation shuts down. All businesses, restaurants and places of entertainment close for the 25-hour fast.

# IRA jail breakout folled; officer killed

BELFAST. Northern Ireland - An attempt by Iriah Republican Army prisoners to blow their way out of a top-security jail under the cover of rioting in Catholic neighborhoods was folled by the discovery of explosives in and near the prison, police said.

Separately, a senior Northern Ireland police officer was killed by a car bomb as he drove his wife to church Sunday.







Luckily, the clothes don't make the man or the woman when you're faced with match point or the game is on the line. To look good doesn't necessarily mean to play good, so making a fashion statement while sweating no longer is deemed impor-tant. Although it doesn't hurt.

But now we've made what appears to be the ultimate leap. It's not the game, not the clothes, not even the equipment that we use to set ourselves apart. We've entered the era of

It used to be that we had a tennis elbow, a sore shoulder, a trick knee. But thanks to the advances in modern sports medicine (and I mean that in all

treatment techniques previously reserved for multi-million dollar athletes has become readily available to the weekend hack.

It used to be you only saw knee braces when watching an NBA game or whenever Joe Namath went back to pass. Now, you can see Lenox-Hill braces (made popular by Namath) in almost any recreational or pickup game.

Predictably, talking about your injury with the proper medical terminology has replaced designer clothes, fancy equipment or big statistics. Somehow, saying that you have "an anterior cruciate tear with advanced deterioration of the mestel miniecus" sounds more impressive than saying "I have a bad knee." Besides, it makes for a great







# Don't quit prescription without doctor's OK

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have a mild form of cardiomyopathy from morbid obesity. One month ago, I abruptly quit taking my inderal and began experiencing PVCs throughout the day. Can abrupt withdrawal cause PVCs, as well as other ectopic heartbeats?

DEAR READER: Morbid, obesity (massive overweight) often leads to health problems, in-cluding breathing difficulty and heart disease. Cardiomyopathy, a degeneration of the heart muscle that impairs cardiac contractions, can be a conse-quence of morbid obesity because extremely overweight

Premature ventricular contractions are random, extra heartbeats triggered by maverick electrical impulses arising within the heart's thickest muscles. Ordinarily, PVCs are simply annoying; they do not indicate heart disease. However, in patients with risk factors such as yours, I'd worry that the PVCs may be caused by inadequate blood circulation to the heart

Evidently, your doctor agrees. You were probably given the beta-blocker inderal to suppress the premature contractions. Now that you have stopped the medicine, the PVCs are occurring

doctor's approval and supervision. The medicine may protect your heart by stabilizing the pulse and reducing cardiac work. I urge you to re-start the indexes

Clearly, you need to lose weight. If you have unsuccessfully tried the standard weight-reduction programs, ask your doctor to refer you to a nutrition or metabolism labora-

be able to help you shed pounds. This seems to be to be a priority. inasmuch as you appear to be suffering from a type of heart disease associated with obesity.

# Vines good for landscape fillers

and color can be brought into your landscape with use of ground covers and vines. Not only do these materials add beauty to your landscape, but they may reduce your maintenance time!

Ground covers are an asset to a landacape because they can be used in an area that is difficult to maintain. Areas like slopes, between sidewalks and driveways. or fences and walls can be covered with vines or ground covers. Also, steep slopes, ditches or areas with dense shade can be planted with ground covers and add beauty while disguising perhaps an undesirable feature of your land-

When selecting a ground cover vine, consider the type of plant. the growing conditions and the amount of maintenance needed. Native plants, like yellow jessamine, trumpet creeper and coral honeysuckle, have great potential as ground covers and vines and can be used whenever possible since they have the lowest maintenance requirements.

Many interesting patterns can he created by using vines and ground covers, but elaborate designs can increase maintenance chores. Follow the basic principles of landscape design by keeping things simple-group your ground covers or vines in masses and repeat the patterns using the ground covers in other areas of the landscape. This doesn't mean your landscape design will be boring!

Ground covers and vines can best be used as transitional elements in the design. Lowgrowing, woody plants like the shore juniper, are very effective as a transition from the lawn to larger shrubs.

Vining plants, like confederate jamine or creeping fig. can be grown along the ground and then continue up a wall or fence. Ray Sage, of DeBary, has absolutely no grass in his land-scape. He used a combinations

of ground covers, vines and mulches.

Color can be saded to rout design with use of ground covers and vines atsi. The dark green foliage color of the Carolina yellow jaamine or liriope next to the light green of grass can Some varieties of ground covers like wandering jew have different colored leaves. A number of vines and ground covers are valuable in the landscape for their flowers, like trumpet creeper and confederate jaamine.

Prepare the soil for planting ground covers and vines as if you were adding any other ornamental plant. Loosen the soil with a spade or roto-tiller nd remove any debris like sticks or rocks. Get your soil tested at the Agricultural Center for pH since soil amendments need to be added before planting. It is always advised to add organic


matter to the soil, such as peat moss or compost. A 2- to 3-inch layer is usually enough.

Plants should be spaced so that they will fill in the area as soon as possible. Plant specing depends on variety. Small plants like ivy can be spaced 3-4 inches apart while larger woody plants

can be spaced 1-2 feet apart.

Weeds can be a problem in ground covers. You can use a

weed control fabric that prevents the Florida Department of weeds from growing or use a mulch. Weed fabrics and many different kind of mulches are

available at most garden center.




