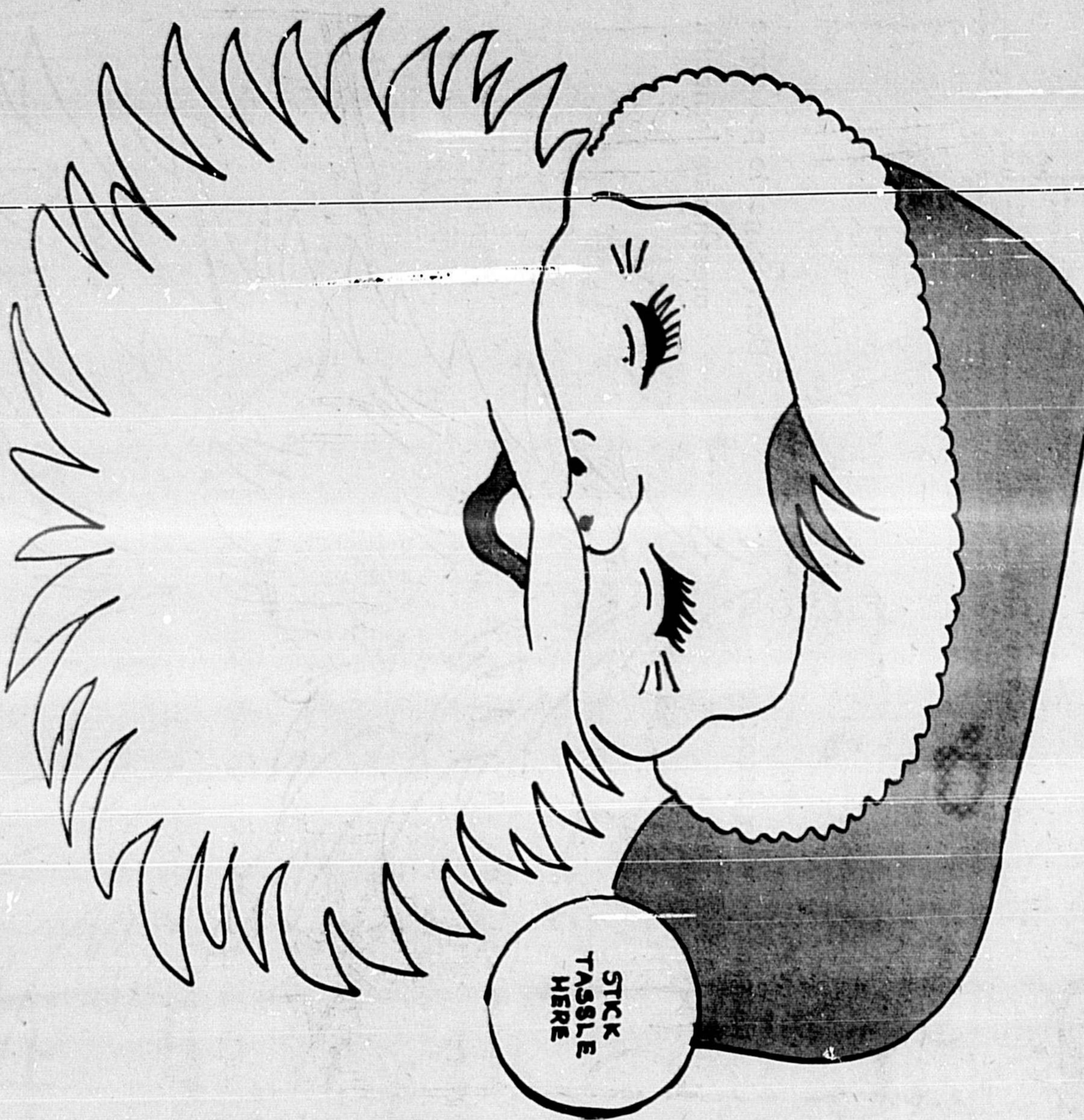


Santa Claus Game

And Still Another Delay?

Only Seminole County Commission action approving participation by the county maintenance department to help in the renovation of a Sanford Airport facility is needed before a regional narcotics laboratory is established.

This was disclosed today by Sheriff John Polk, who said the commission would be asked to approve maintenance participation at Tuesday's meeting.

The commissioners will also be called upon to approve \$3,200 expenditures for the salary of a bookkeeper.

Sheriff Polk said the City of Sanford had already participated in the federally-funded laboratory by furnishing \$1,000 worth of materials to be used in the remodeling.

The sheriff said barring any unforeseen problems, the first stage of the crime lab, would begin operations in mid-January with Pete Hagdale, as chief chemist and a female bookkeeper.

As the facility adds additional crime fighting units in phases each year during a total five year period, employment will increase to a total 20-25 persons.

Most of these will be highly trained technicians with yearly salaries between \$12,000 to \$14,000, Polk said. They will include three chemists, a ballistics expert, fingerprint expert and others, he continued.

Recently the sheriff received a \$18,102 check from the Interagency Law Enforcement Planning Council at Tallahassee, through a grant made under the Federal Omnibus Crime Bill.

This legislation encompasses a local government study commission which Chairman John Alexander has recommended over the past four years. Studies would relate to revisions in county government in order to make it more effective and economical. Alexander has stressed that this would not be a consolidation study, per se, but could relate to a metro type government, or could effect little or no change in the government structure.

Johnson had been requested to advise the Commission whether to initiate the studies under home rule provisions or a legislative act. Johnson has stated that since the matter is within the scope of the whole of the county that a legislative act would be necessary.

Commissioner Sid Vihlen said that he favored the studies if it would improve the county efficiency and if funding could be provided. Commissioner Greg Drummond had questioned the possibility of the legislative delegation calling for a referendum for the committee to be funded by the county, and pro-rated through municipal bodies.

New Policy

Gratis Use Of Schools To Stop

Persons or organizations using county school facilities are going to have to pay for the privilege if the School Board goes ahead with policy changes to effect payment.
First reading of the proposed changes were heard at a special meeting and the following procedure was recommended: auditorium lease with seating capacity from 100-300 at \$8 an hour; 301 to 600 at \$12 an hour and from 601 up the rate would be \$15 an hour.
With heat add \$4 an hour; air conditioning add \$7.50 per hour; custodial services would increase the amount by additional \$2.50 an hour.
Classroom lease would be \$3 hourly with \$2 per hour extra for heat and \$1 an hour for air conditioning.
Cafeteria rentals would include \$4 hourly fee with \$2 hour extra for heat and \$4 per hour additional for air conditioning.
Cooking facilities cannot be utilized by outside organizations or individuals. Freezers or coolers may be used provided the cafeteria manager or her designee is present at \$1 per hour. The manager or her designee will receive \$2.50 per hour.
Hourly rates shall be assessed for rehearsals, decorations or pre-event preparations. No smoking or alcoholic beverages will be allowed in school buildings. Damages to equipment, facilities or buildings shall be on us in another five years," assessed against the lessee.

Most of the meeting chores were handled by Janet Springsfield, with Commissioner Meyer speaking up at intervals.
Mrs. Springsfield said over 300 letters had been collected with the object being to save the zoo.
Carolyn Gager, describing herself as a city resident, taxpayer, teacher and father, told the group of the plans of a "Save Our Zoo Taxpayers Association." It was formed by Janet Pione and herself with intent to obtain the aid of city, educational, ministerial and business people. She said 220 petitions circulated among city residents seeking 75 per cent of city residents signatures for presentation to the commission on the Dec. 25 commission meeting.
At the same time, another petition was being circulated at yesterday's meeting by an unidentified group to seek the recall of the four commissioners voting to close the zoo.
"ZOO WILL BE SAVED," Meyer, speaking over public address facilities, said "the zoo will be saved by the public, not by the zoo committee."
He then informed the gathering of a Friday afternoon meeting between himself, three city commissioners, two zoo committee members and SISTER President Ruth Swinner.
It was indicated during the two-hour session held at the city hall that if the city freeholders would vote in a February referendum to tax themselves up to four mills to fund a relocated zoo, the commissioners would favor keeping the zoo.

One In Ten In County Is Receiving Benefits

Paul Vogentz, manager of the Sanford social security office, reports that one of every ten persons in Seminole County is receiving Social Security benefits. Payments are made to three main groups: Retired workers and their dependents, 78%; Survivors of deceased workers, 22%; Disabled workers and their dependents, 116%.
Interestingly enough the national figure is one of every eight persons receiving social security benefits. Why only one out of every ten in Seminole County? Is the population of Seminole County so much younger that fewer people are filing for retirement benefits? Could it be that we are so much healthier and less prone to accidents and therefore file fewer claims for disability benefits? Do we live so much longer and therefore have fewer dependents to file for survivors benefits?
No, I'm afraid that none of these are the correct explanations because Seminole County is statistically normal in these respects. What's probably happening is that many people in

In Atlanta Area Air Pollution Affects 3 States

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) - Gustly winds aloft and higher ground temperatures combined Saturday to begin breaking up a weather condition which produced metropolitan Atlanta's highest recorded air pollution index Friday and affected a three-state area. A National Weather Service (NWS) spokesman said, "It was in this situation Friday that officials attributed the record high air pollution index in Atlanta."
Mrs. Jeanette Maulding, supervisor of air monitoring for the Fulton County Health Department, said the reading—98 on a scale of 100—was the highest recorded since the department began taking daily readings last June.
Atlanta is known as temperature inversion. The NWS spokesman said the condition occurs when a layer of warm air aloft "traps" a layer of cold air near the ground.
"It was in this situation Friday that officials attributed the record high air pollution index in Atlanta," Mrs. Maulding said. "The National Weather Service, formerly the U.S. Weather Bureau, said the temperature inversion began breaking up Friday afternoon and was being pushed southward before Jacksonville, Fla., late Saturday.
"With ground temperatures reaching 70 degrees and high altitude winds gusting at 25 miles an hour, it won't take too long for it to break up," the NWS spokesman said.
Ironically, the record air pollution reading came simultaneously with a State Health Department public hearing at which more than 50 Georgians turned out to urge that stricter standards be adopted to control air pollution.

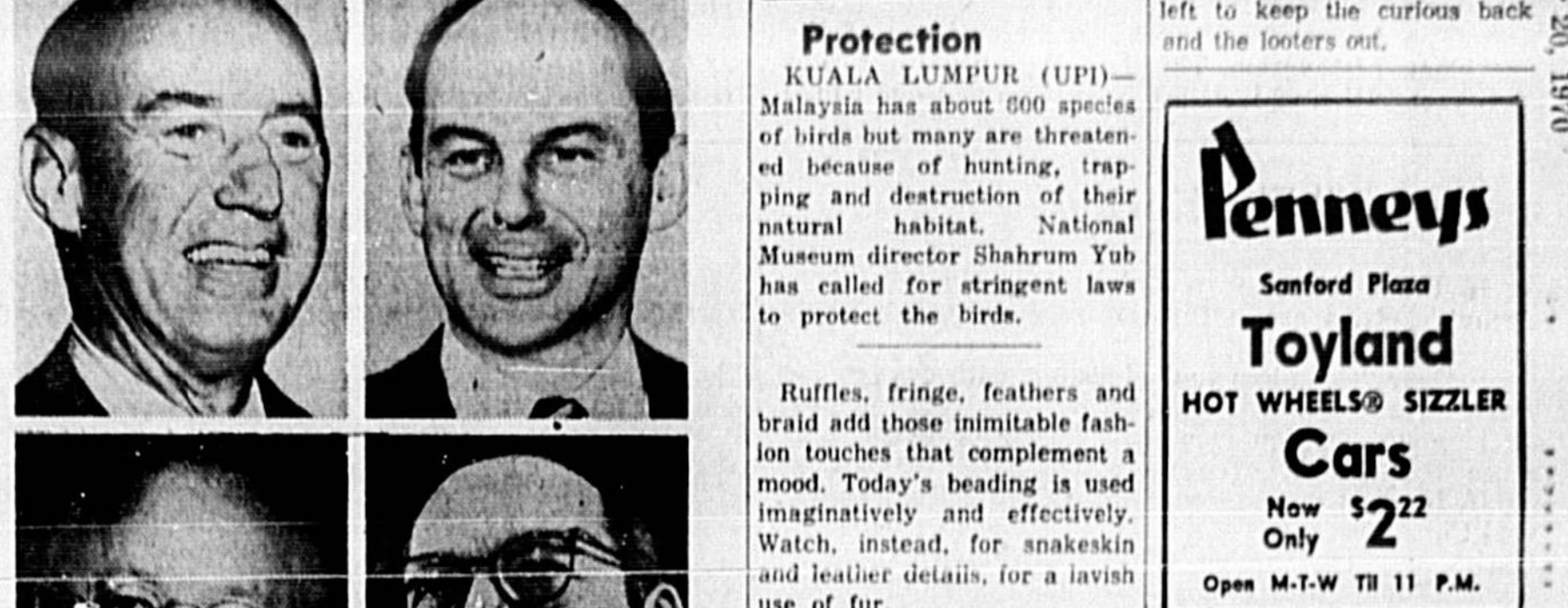
Surprise... There Isn't Any Gap!

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The college freshman of 1970 is older and more liberal than his predecessors, strongly supports legalized abortion and equal rights for women, and is twice as likely to favor legalizing use of marijuana as he was just two years ago.
It may come as a surprise to their mothers and fathers, but a nationwide survey published Saturday also indicated that only 18.3 per cent of this year's crop of incoming freshmen believed there was a "generation gap" between themselves and their parents.
The survey taken this fall by the American Council on Education (ACE) indicates that most freshmen believe the federal government should be more active in controlling pollution and preventing crime.

\$2 Million Tampa Blaze Is Battled For 10 Hours

Firemen were injured in a 10-hour blaze that gutted a block-long \$2 million shopping complex Saturday and left fire authorities worried that it's weak steel frame will collapse. Off-duty firefighters were called to Zayres Department Store on the fringe of a residential section near West Tampa, where the fire raged out of control for eight to nine hours. They relieved exhausted crews who had worked through the night pouring tons of water on the smouldering 131,000-square-foot center.
Besides Zayres, the complex also housed a Kish N' Karry food store, a barber shop, a drug store, a beauty salon and a furniture store.
Two firemen were hospitalized with back injuries and another for smoke inhalation. Several were treated at the scene after being overcome by dense billowing clouds of smoke or suffering from exhaustion.
Zayres manager, F. W. Hiles told an investigator the store was locked at midnight after technicians repaired a malfunctioning burglar alarm. Fire Marshal Joe Gomez said the blaze broke out about a half-hour later.
More than 100 firemen on two shifts battled the blaze but were hampered by dense smoke that Gomez said was difficult to vent because of a dropped acoustical ceiling that trapped flames and smoke and allowed them to spread. Firemen worked from all four sides of the complex training aerial hoses to control the spread of the flames.
Beams cracked to the ground at intervals, glass panes that had supported buckled under the blaze. Black smoke billowed hundreds of feet into the air and intense heat kept firefighters from going inside to determine the cause.
There were minor explosions as 15,000 rounds of ammunition were triggered and propane and aerosol tanks—stock for Christmas shoppers—went up.
"The big concern now," said Gomez as the fire was brought under control "is the possible collapse of the building. The building is a total loss."
The walls were cracked and Gomez said security guards would be posted after firemen left to keep the curbside bank and the looters out.

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Apollo 14 Astronauts Pass Readiness Tests

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) - The Apollo 14 astronauts and their launch team Saturday successfully executed a flight readiness test for next month's lift-off toward the moon.
The test, originally set to last three days, extended into a third day because of two problems—one with a computer, the other because someone forgot to set a switch on a control panel in the launch control center.
Astronauts Alan B. Shepard Jr., Stuart A. Roosa and Edgar D. Mitchell climbed aboard their spaceship atop a Saturn 5 rocket about two and a half hours before a simulated lift-off, just as they will on launch day, Jan. 31.
Elephants are used in place of railroad switch engines at a control plant in India. One animal can push three loaded freight cars and throw track switches with its trunk.
The countdown went smoothly Saturday and the make-believe launch of the Saturn 5 took place on schedule.
Afterwards, the astronauts remained in the command ship to practice abort procedures in case of rocket trouble and other in-flight operations.
The first day of the test, Thursday, was delayed seven hours when a rocket computer had to be replaced. Late Friday, just 25 minutes before the countdown was to reach zero, the rocket computer's memory was scrambled when a control panel monitor, neglected to flip a switch during a power transfer test.
The computer was removed and reset and the test resumed Saturday.

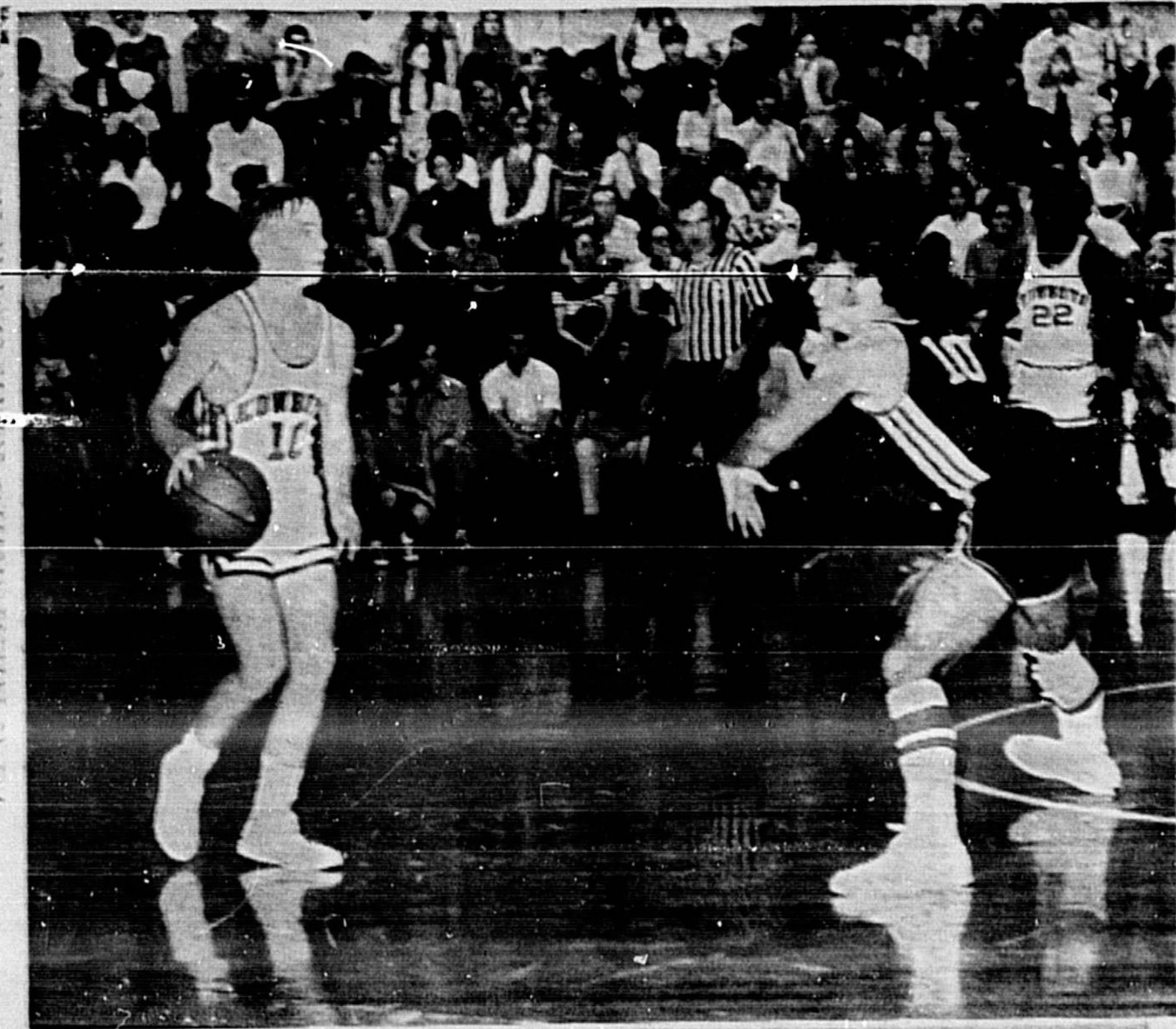

Kowboys Cagers Victorious Over Oviedo Lions, 57-44

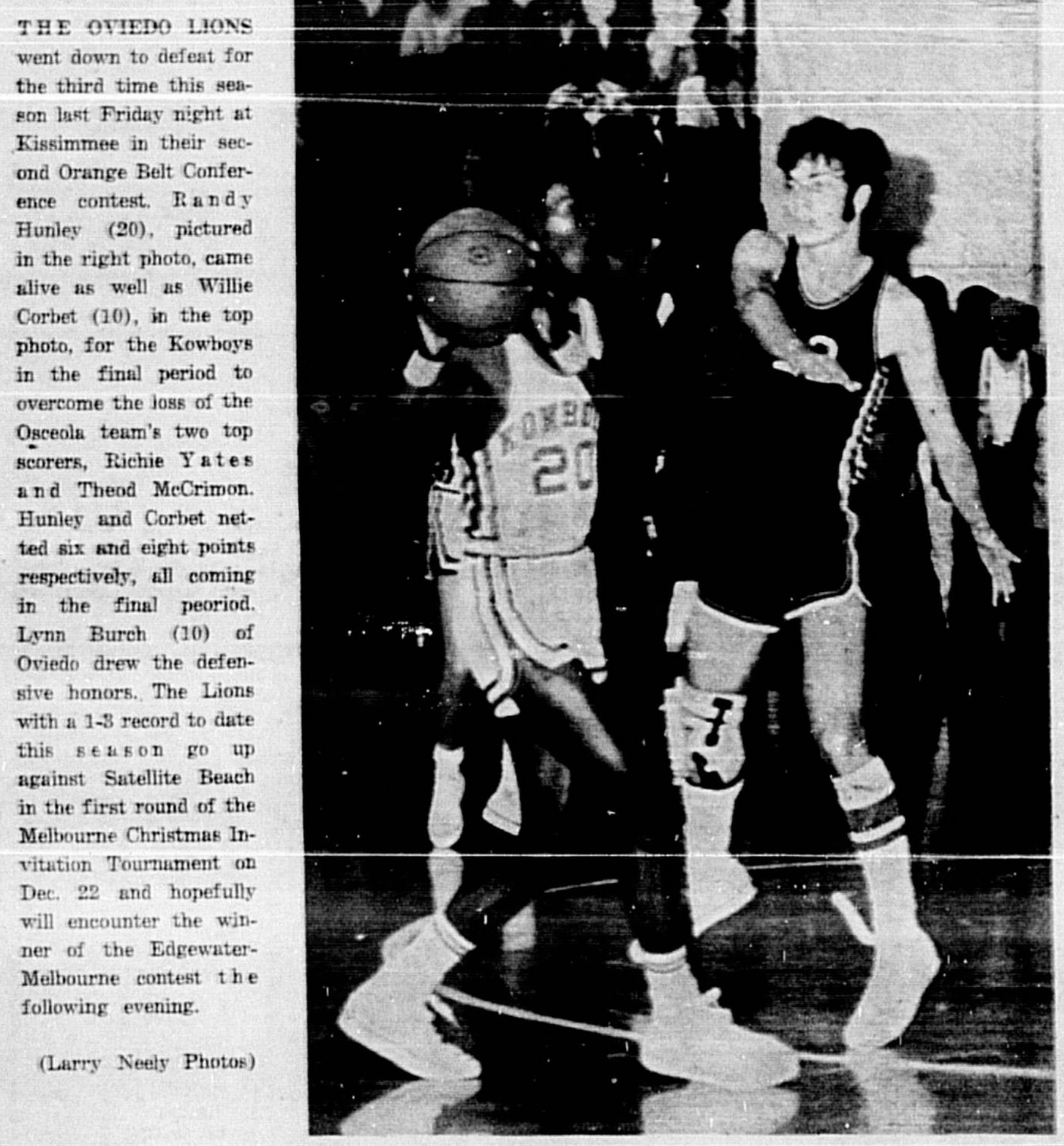

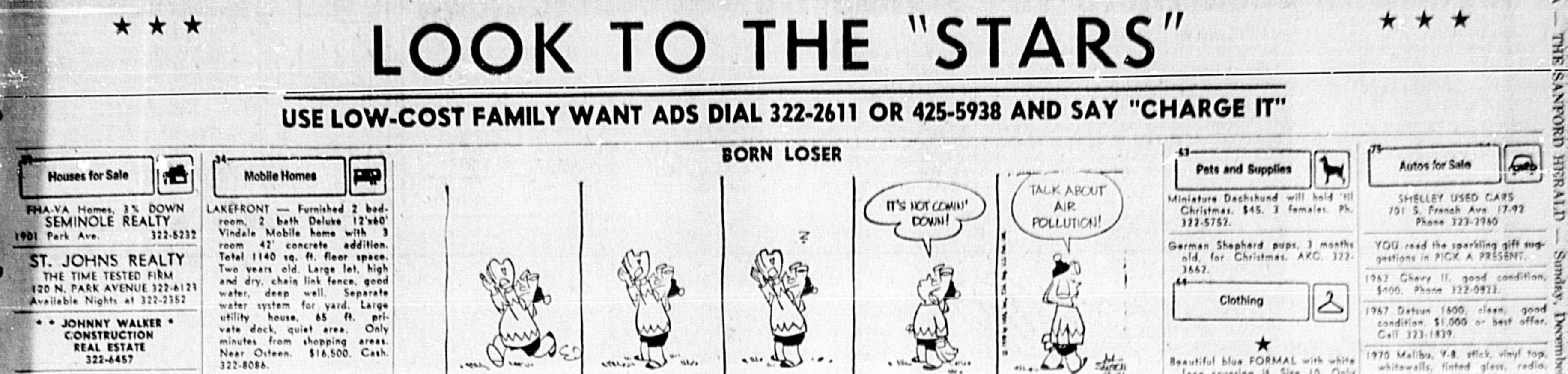

Florida Chief Justice

Ervin Disagreed More Times Than He Agreed

By BARBARA FEVE
TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—During his current term as chief justice, Florida Supreme Court Justice Richard Ervin has disagreed more times than he has agreed with the majority court view on key decisions involving rights of individuals.

Another court source, who admits to being an admirer of the chief justice, put it this way: "He always wants to do the just thing. But the law is not always written that way."

If it's not, Ervin's dissenting opinions propose that the law should be stricken down as unconstitutional.

For instance, in holding that almost any state law that automatically denies an adulterer his wife, Ervin suggested that the 1828 law that required it was archaic.

"I do not believe it is constitutionally permissible for our state to automatically strip the rights of a person for a crime committed 70 years before his elevation to the court in 1964, occasionally gets support of Judge Roberts and sometimes as many as two fellow Justices.

But more often than not, he's the lone dissenter.

Ervin's dissenting opinions are not "sign to run" law which makes a public official resign, one of Ervin's dissenting opinions is to seek another with a concurrent term.

Five judges ruled it was valid. Ervin disagreed, saying it impinged on the people's right to have a full range of candidates for public office.

Viet Fighting Marks Start Of 24th Year

SAIGON (AP) — Sharp fighting was reported on the battlefields in South Vietnam Saturday on the heels of Viet Cong terror strikes to mark the 24th anniversary of the start of the Indochina war.

Action involving U.S. troops was reported near the demilitarized zone separating the two Vietnams. South Vietnamese forces engaged the enemy in the Delta, far to the south.

Infantrymen of the U.S. 101st Airborne Division supported by helicopter gunships engaged 15 North Vietnamese soldiers in an open area 10 miles south of the DMZ, and killed 10 of them without suffering any losses, the U.S. Command reported.

South of there, other airborne troops pushed an enemy force out of a trail junction 16 miles west of Hue. They killed five of the enemy soldiers, again without suffering a single casualty, the command said.

South Vietnamese rangers and infantrymen claimed killing 26 Viet Cong in a continuing sweep of the U Minh Forest in the Delta. One of the government soldiers was killed and five were wounded.

Regional forces operating in other delta regions reported killing 39 Viet Cong and capturing six others in two firefights 114 and 163 miles southwest of Saigon. Field reports said there were light government casualties.

Military spokesmen also reported an ambush and enemy mining of a train, both in the northern region.

A U.S. convoy was attacked Friday near the dangerous Hai Van Pass 13 miles northwest of Da Nang. One American was killed and four were wounded, but there was only light material damage to the convoy.

Rocket attacks on Saigon early Saturday climaxed a week of Viet Cong terror in South Vietnam, marking a string of Communist holidays.

In one of the final attacks Saturday, enemy mortars aimed at a U.S. Army brigade headquarters northeast of Saigon fell into a nearby civilian area and officials reported one Vietnamese was killed and eight others were wounded.

Interior Secretary Wants More Parks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Roger C. B. Morton, first Easterner designated as Secretary of the Interior, says the government should buy land for parks near coastal population centers, instead of tracing more parks on the remote western land it already owns.

"If you're going to spend money per capita on parks in any kind of an equitable formula," the Maryland congressman told The Associated Press in an interview, "I think a lot of that money is going to have to be spent in the Great Lakes area, the West Coast and the East."

In the wide-ranging interview, Morton forecast a new role for the Interior Department: adoption of a flexible approach to land use; and explained some of his views in Congress that have raised eyebrows among conservationists—including his support of the controversial superconductor transport plan.

Morton, now chairman of the Republican National Committee, was named to succeed Alan W. Walker J. Hinkle, who was abruptly fired by President Nixon on Nov. 25.

Nixon Threatens Special Session

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon plans to call the newly elected Congress into session on Jan. 3 unless the current lame-duck session votes his major proposals up or down, the White House said Saturday.

Nixon, who earlier had urged Republican leaders of the Senate and House to hold round-the-clock sessions even on Sunday to clean up pending legislation, hardened his position this afternoon.

Press secretary Ronald Ziegler said that, if Nixon does not get the action he wants out of the dying 91st Congress, he will withhold his signature from a measure that would permit the 92nd Congress to wait until Jan. 21 to convene.

Ziegler said that, under the 20th Amendment to the Constitution, the new Congress would have to meet at noon on Jan. 3 unless Nixon approved of the postponing resolution.

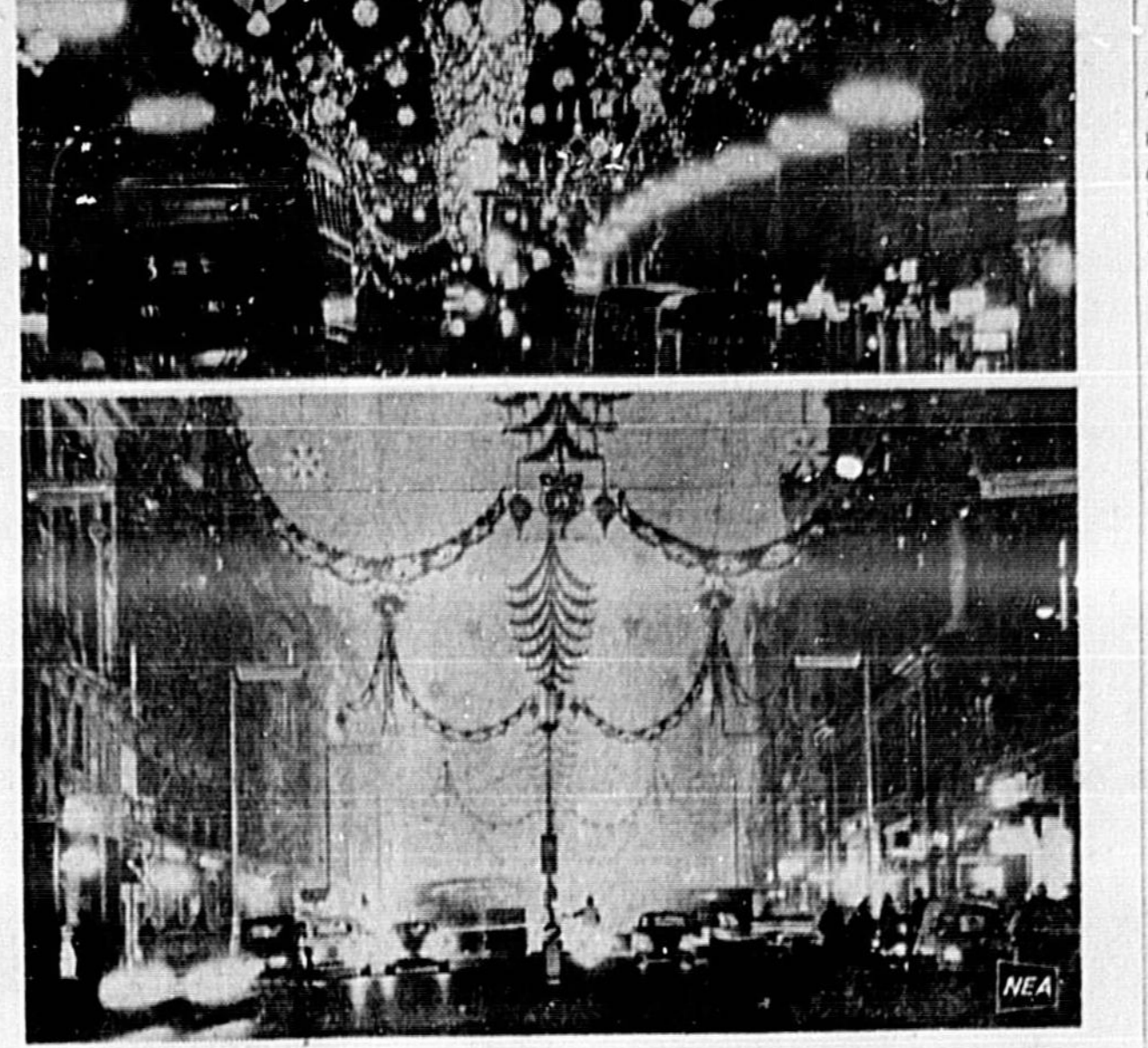
Ziegler quoted the chief executive as saying:

Unrest Continues

Pole's Rioting Unabated

WARSAW (AP) — Strikes persisted Saturday in the tense northern port of Szczecin after nearly a week of bloody rioting against price increases that spread destruction in Polish cities.

Warsaw television showed a three-minute picture of havoc in Gdansk, focal point of the violence, where damage has been estimated at \$3.5 million.

Viewers saw blazing buildings, burned houses and looted stores, with wrecked shelves, broken windows and goods littering the floors.

The Polish news agency said the situation was tense in Szczecin, but added: "However, there are no incidents."

The radio in Szczecin reported: "Some enterprises were not working normally today."

It mentioned a strike at the Warski shipyards.

The broadcast said workers wanted to "express their demands in formulations, written on posters, which say 'economic strike' and not a political strike."

Maheu Loses On His Bid

By LAS VEGAS (AP) — A state District Court judge in Las Vegas today ruled the Hughes Tool Co. has a right to control Howard Hughes' \$300 million Nevada empire. The judge ruled against Robert Maheu, who for four years had run Hughes' Nevada properties.

A proxy from Hughes giving the tool company authority to act for the billionaire was valid, Judge Howard Babcock said. He added that a letter from Hughes supporting tool company executives and ordering them to fire Maheu was authentic and weighed in his decision.

The testimony of Lawrence Forsythe, of Torrance, Calif., contractor who had testified he saw someone—possibly Hughes—being taken to a car by two men under the Desert Inn Hotel here Thanksgiving Eve, was "not credible," Babcock said.

"It is not worthy of belief and this court can only believe his testimony a fantasy," the judge said.

The ruling ended a two-week power struggle between Maheu and tool company executives that began after Hughes' departure from Las Vegas last Thanksgiving Eve.

Babcock said the nature and circumstances of Hughes' departure were not matters for the court's consideration, striking down Maheu's argument that a sick andiling Hughes had been split away by tool company forces in an unauthorized takeover bid.

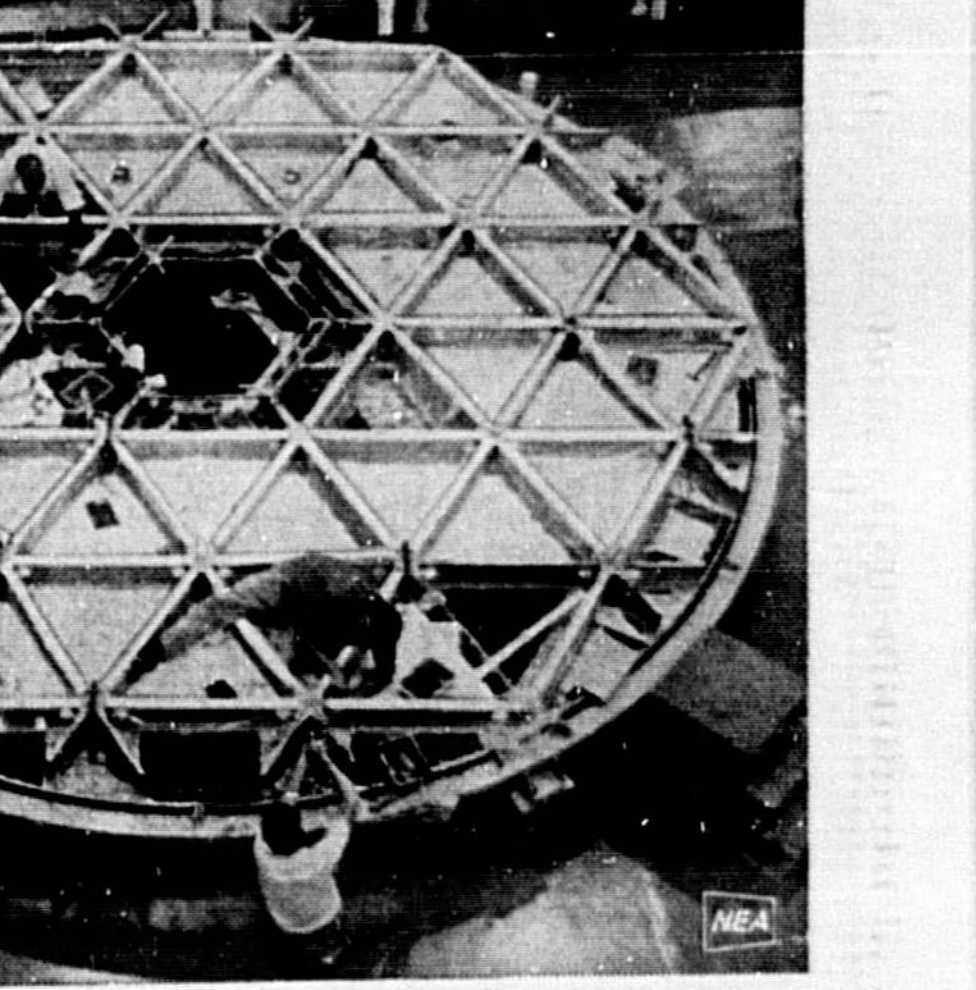
Refuses To End SST Filibuster

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate refused Saturday to cut off a filibuster aimed at killing funds for the superconductor transport, despite the threat of a forced return to work on Jan. 3 and President Nixon's appeal for around-the-clock sessions.

In a 48-41 roll call vote that crisscrossed party and ideological lines, senators decided to let debate continue on a House Senate conference report making it known that President Nixon is prepared to force the 92nd Congress into session on Jan. 3 if the filibuster, insisted the earlier Senate vote deleting all SST subsidies must be upheld.

If the \$310 million approved by the conference is approved, he declared, "we've kissed off the victory we've won."

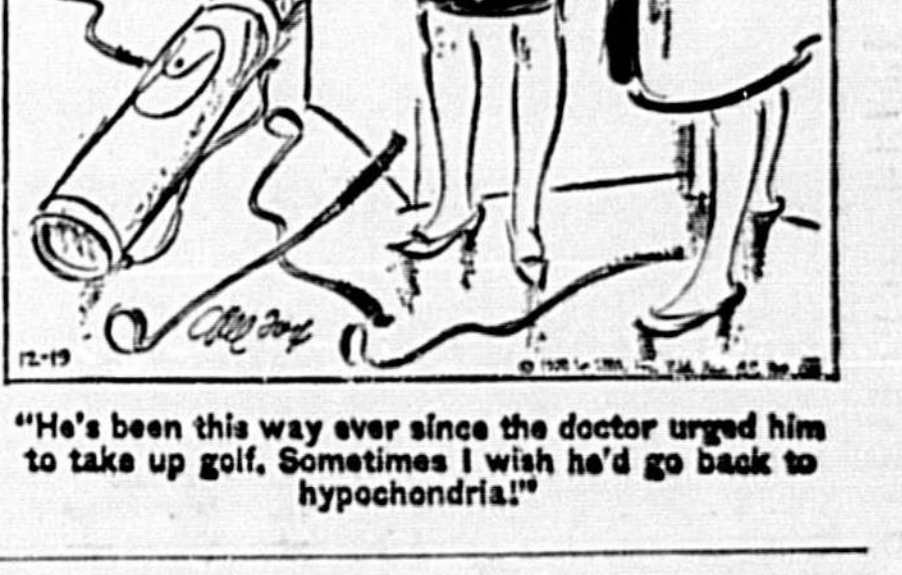
