

New Policy

Gratis Use Of Schools

Persons or organizations using county school facilities are going to have to pay for the privilege if the School Board goes ahead with policy

changes to effect payment. First reading of the proposed changes were heard at a special meeting and the following procedure was recommended: auditorium lease with seating capacity from 100-300 at \$8 an hour; 301 to 600 at \$12 an hour and from 601 up the rate would be \$15 an hour.

With heat add \$4 an hour; air conditioning add \$7.50 per hour; custodial services would increase the amount by additional \$2.50 an hour.

Classroom lease would be \$3 hourly with \$2 per hour extra for heat and \$1 an hour for air conditioning.

Cafeteria rentals would include \$4 hourly fee with \$2 per hour additional for air conditioning.


