

LONDON (AP) - Marjorie Wallace, a 19-year-old blonde from Indianapolis, has been named the 1973 Miss World. The 5-foot-7 model became the first American to hold the title in the contest's 22-year history when she defeated contestants from 53 other countries. Miss Wallace received \$7,200 in prize money and a chance to make as much as \$100,000 more in earnings during her

Restraining West

MOSCOW (AP) - Two dissident Soviet scientists, physicist Andrei D. Sakharov and computer expert Melik Agursky, say Western public opinion is one of the few restraining forces on Soviet leaders in internal politics. Their statement was a response to an essay earlier this month by dissident Soviet historian Roy Medvedev, who said Western pressure could provoke the Kreolin into even harsher repression of dissent.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) - The General Assembly's finance committee has approved a plan to distribute the estimated \$30 million bill for the first six months of the U.N. Oil Rationing

BOSTON (AP) - A national program of fuel of rationing that will cut residential use by 15 per cent and industrial use by 10 per cent has been approved by the federal government, according to an official of the New England Fuel Institute. Charles Burkhardt, executive vice president of the institute, said Friday the proposal would be revealed either Monday or Tuesday. Under the plan, residential users of No. 2 fuel oil - the most widely used - would cut consumption by 15 per cent of their 1972 level by turning down thermostats six degrees. Businesses would be required to turn their heating back 10 degrees, cutting consumption 18 to 20 per cent.

Big Cars Scrapped

DETROIT (AP) - Consumer demand for small automobiles during the energy crisis apparently has claimed its first victims: some 79,000 large cars. General Motors Corp. is scrapping production of the large 1974 models by shutting down 15 of its U.S. assembly plants for one week before the Christmas vacation. GM Board Chairman Richard Gerstenberg cited a 10 per cent sales decline in the industry from last year and consumer preference for smaller cars.

At the heart of the continuing power struggle between President Nixon, the Congress and the courts over the complex issues of Watergate lies the little-known doctrine of executive privilege.

Executive privilege, although never officially defined, is basically a contention that the president can withhold information from the other branches of government if he deems such action is in the public interest.

The withholding can take many forms, such as refusing to let members of his staff or Cabinet testify before Congress, refusing to provide documents or records, or more recently, refusing-at first-to give the courts recorded conversations of the President with his aides.

The President has consistently argued that he must uphold and preserve the traditional right of past and future presidents to confidentiality in contacts with aides and advisers if he is to conduct the nation's business effectively

Conflict with this position arises over the fact that Congress also has a traditional role of investigation and believes it must at times have access to information only the chief executive can provide.

The courts too are required to adjudicate criminal activity, a function that sometimes requires information controlled by the executive

Other Thoughts

Postal Plans For Christmas

By JACK ANDERSON

WASHINGTON- While the Postal Service forecasts a Merry Christmas for mailers, insiders say postal authorities are planning to use the energy crisis to explain away Yuletide mail slowdowns that are really the result of ordinary inefficiency.

Among middle-echlon officials, there is talk not only of slower mail, but of a post-Christmas limit of three home deliveries a week. Such proposals would have been heresy

only a few years ago. Already, an internal "Situation Paper" has been distributed to middle-level postal executives for use in dealing with employes and the public when complaints of slow service begin.

"Although no one is sure of the extent, the energy crisis could seriously impair our ability to transport mail,"says the document. "Of 14,000 airline flights, approximately 300 have been lost to us because of cutbacks connected to the fuel

Our postal informants say the 300 flights are "peanuts" in the overall picture and should not delay the mails. However, the memo goes on, "Because the extent of the fuel shortage and ou ability to find alternate forms of energy are still not known, postal officials will continue to watch the

But once these fears are expressed, the "Situation Paper" points out that the Federal Office of Oil and Gas has so far solved problems of "Individual shortgages for both highway and air taxi contractors," and dealt efficiently with ()

Actually, some top level official loyal to impulsive Postmaster General E. T. "Ted" Klassen have heaved a little sigh of relief over the energy crisis. In October, Klassen promised this Christmas would see one of the best mail deliveries in history.

Since then, Klassen has been criticized for throwing fat contracts to his cronies, morale has dropped and postal deficits continue.

RATE HIKES

There is talk of first class rates of 20 cents or more by Our informants insist that Klassen's noble aim of having all mail "current" by December 24 was impossible to

achieve even before the energy crunch came. Publicly, the Postal Service insists Klassen can still realize his aim if mailers comply with his recent bid for earlier Yule mailings. For the record, the service denies vehemently the energy crisis is being used to cover up other postal problems or that a three-time-a-week home delivery

Please stop arguing and turn on the lights

WASHINGTON (NEA) The energy crisis was not necessary. The Middle East

War and the Arab sanctions did not cause it; they merely hastened the day of reckoning. And when the embargoes are lifted, the emergency will not go away - except tem-The crisis is here because several successive presidents and Congresses, state and local governments, environmen-

talists, oil, coal and nuclear power companies are guilty.
All have ignored the signs of impending scarcity and spent
more time quibbling and arguing than researching the facts and preparing for the day of reckoning. First, as to the several presidents and Congresses: with all signs pointing conclusively to a critical energy shortage within 10 years, and knowing from experience that it takes at least a decade of preparation to forestall such crises. several administrations and the legislators on Capitol Hill have been miserly with research funds. These were the

easiest budget items to cut. The debate over the Alaskan pipeline has been proceeding for more than three years in one form or another. Yet a settlement three years ago would have meant that we'd now be utilizing the North Slope oil, alleviating today's crisis - though the Alaskan oil, of itself, would not solve the longtime problem ahead.

Not only has there been an urgent need this past decade for developing practical new sources of energy and finding ways to produce more of those fuels we use currently, but we have needed to put considerable funds into discovering why the U.S. conversion of energy into power apparently is so much more wasteful than in some other industrial countries. There are reports that in our conversion processes we waste about half the energy we consume. Some other countries lose only 40 per cent.

Government agencies have been equally amiss. It takes 10 years these days to get a nuclear plant approved and installed. The Japanese, building the same plants with equipment they buy in the United States, can do the same job in less than six years. U.S. licensing procedures are slow and

The situation is complicated by the fact that officials nuclear power companies and environmentalists can't agree on what the dangers to humans and the environment will be. There are continued unresolved arguments on standards that slow the nuclear industry expansion plans to a crawl. This is not to argue against environmental standards; it is to suggest they be defined.

To a major degree, the paucity of research on pollution and related dangers is at the root of the problem. The same situation exists in offshore oil drilling, in the surface mining of clean Western coal, needed to replace the dirty high-sulphur coal now banned for electric power plants. The arguments go on and on. The problem again is not whether there should be pollution standards, but rather that men debate and argue instead of agreeing on what the standards and safety precautions should be. The lack of agreement comes back to a scarcity of research on what safety measures are necessary during production and what steps need to be taken afterward to reduce environmental effects to an acceptable level.

Without knowing what we're doing - without the esearch data — we cannot, of course, come to agreemen Men and women with varied viewpoints stand in corners arguing that their opponents are greedy or fanatic. All of which gets us nowhere.

Political and diplomatic dividends were expected to flow from the rapprochement with China and they obviously have Not expected were economic dividends, at least not immediately. Mainland China might be the world's largest untapped market, but the expert word was that the Chinese economy was still too underdeveloped to offer significant trading opportunities for some time to come.

It is something of a surprise, therefore, that in the short two years since President Nixon's historic visit to Peking, U.S.-Chinese trade had developed so briskly that the 1973 total is expected to reach \$900 million worth, according to a New York Times report. The United States has, in fact moved up from last among China's major trade partners to second, trailing only Japan.

China's chronic harvest problems account for much of this - Peking is making large purchases of U.S. grains and cotton - but U.S. exports also include jetliners and machinery The exchanges with China are still far short of U.S. trade with China's immediate neighbor, Japan (some \$14 billion in 1972), or with the No. 1 U.S. partner, Canada (more than \$27

Cuba Holds American

Seaman MIAMI (AP) - A young American seaman has been stranded in Cuba for nearly three months because the owner of a sunken yacht has apparently refused to pay a cash bond

to the Cuban government, U.S. State Department officials say. The youth, 20-year-old Ralph Brembt, was one of three men taken into Cuban custody when the 95-foot yacht First Lady went down near the island in early September, a State De-

partment spokesman said Fri-Brembt's two companions both British citizens, were released after the British consulate in Miami intervened in

their behalf. Cuban authorities demanded \$6,000 from the First Lady's owner, identified by the State Department as Irving Feldman of Miami Beach. A State Department spokesman said the money represents repayment of expenses invoived in the rescue

Feldman has paid \$2,800 but the spokesman said, "our information at this time is that he is not willing to put up the rest it.

New FREC Chairman Is Named

-Hollenbeck Jr., West Palm Beach, to the Florida Real Estate Commission, Just recently Hollenbeck was named chairman of the Florida Real Estate Commission. In the long history of the Commission Hollenbeck became part of the first father and son team to serve both as a member of the Commission and as chairman of the board which regulates the real estate profession in this state.

Hollenbeck's father, the late James E. Hollenbeck Sr., was appointed to the Commission in 1954 and during the year 1956 served as chairman of the agency. The senior Hollenbeck died on March 29, this year.

Charles F. Faddis of Pensacola, one of the youngest appointees in the history of the Florida Real Estate Commission, was recently named vice chairman and Governor Askew named Edgar L. Schlitt of Vero Beach to become the third and newest member of the Board.

Commissioner Schlitt, a 1950 graduate of Florida State University with a major in real estate, has been a real estate broker for the past 23 years. He established his first office in Vero Beach in 1953 and now has three offices in that area. Schlitt has been named Realtor of the Year by the Florida Real Estate Commission on two separate occasions.

CONCEPT CHANGES

Hollenbeck, in taking over the chairmanship of the Commission, said, "Things aren't the same now as they were two years ago when I was a freshman member of the Commission. The entire concept and potential trust of the Commission has changed. This has been brought about by our changing industry and changing government structure." Hollenbeck called for registered real estate brokers and salesmen to become allied with the Commission in meeting

"We can no longer operate on a day to day basis," he explained, "but must always keep our eyes on the future." Hollenbeck echoed the cry of his predecessors in declaring that "The Commission's staff has been continually beset with pressure and frustration from state level government. We find ourselves with far too much work and far too few employees." He explained that the present staff is bazely into the current fiscal year and is already hard at work preparing the legislative budget request for 1974-75.

The new chairman pointed out that the real estate profession is exploding and called on registrants to be on the alert for any digression from the Commission's primary effort to both upgrade the profession and protect the public. He directed the following statement to each of the more than 5,000 registered real estate brokers and sales people in

"Each of you should assume the role of watchdog for the Commission, and help us to help you. Through you, we shall have some 75,000 pairs of eyes watching and protecting the industry. This has to be a concern to all of us." Hollenbeck called on all brokers and salesmen to present any ideas or suggestions they might have on ways and means of properly regulating the real estate profession.

Real Estate

Question Box

(Editor's Note: Do you have a question about real estate taxes, planning, zoning, or anything else that affects your lifestyle? If so, direct your inquiry to Editor, Lifestyles, The Sanford Herald, Sanford, Fla. 32771. Be sure to sign your letter. Upon publication only initials will be used).

Do all states have an agency which regulates the real estate profession such as the Florida Real Estate Commission in this state?

Yes. At this time all 50 states have a regulatory agency to oversee the operation of the real estate profession in a particular state. All states require brokers and salesmen to be licensed. The requirements differ from state to state. Florida, by the way, is considered by many to have one of the best regulatory agencies of any state in the nation.

Years ago my mother owned a small parcel of land which she sold during her lifetime. Recently, I was contacted by an attorney who asked that I sign a quit claim deed. I am still not sure what this is all about and have written the attorney who sent me the deed for additional information. Would you explain to me what a quit claim deed is and what I will be doing if I sign it?

It is apparent that you will need the services of an attorney. However, what has probably happened is that you, as an heir, may have caused a cloud upon the title and the present owner, in an effort now to sell the property, needs your signature on a quit-claim deed to perfect the title.

Should you be advised to sign the quit claim deed all you will be doing is to release any claim you might have on the property. A quit claim deed has no warranties or covenents at all. The present owner is simply asking you to assist him in erasing a cloud on the title.

There are other circumstances, however, where a person has a full free title to a parcel of property and, let us say, he wishes to donate it to some non-profit organization such as the Sanford Christian School, it would be altogether proper for the owner to convey title to the land in question via a qu claim deed. This simply means that since he is donating the land he does not wish to be held responsible for any warranties which a general warranty deed would carry.

A warranty deed contains five warranties. The Grantor warrants the Grantee against seizure and encumbrances in addition to warranting quiet enjoyment, further assurance, warranty forever and the warranty runs with the land regardless of who owns it. So, if a grantor is giving away a parcel of land it is only sensible that he not be responsible for warranties on such a gift.

Does the City of Sanford have what is generally known as a comprehensive zoning ordinance?

Yes, sir, it does. About a year ago the City of Sanford dopted a new comprehensive zoning ordinance. The orlinance was about two years in the making. The first year was spent by the Planning and Zoning Board in the preparation of a comprehensive zoning map. The second year was spent fitting the ordinance to the previously adopted map. After thoroughly considered by the Planning and Zoning Board it was presented to the City Commission and after considerable study it was adopted. There are still some bugs in it which come to life from time to time but eforts are always being made to eliminate them.
