Potential Painted In Glowing Colors

Potential progress and pros-perity of Seminole County in the next 15 years is painted in glowing colors by the data presented in the "Key Findings" of the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council. This opinion was voiced today by George Touhy, execulive vice president of First Federal Savings and Loan Association, who attended in Titusville a briefing for finance and industry leaders in

WASHINGTON (UPI) -The Urban Renewal Administration announced today a \$29,832 federal grant to the East Central Florida **Regional Planning Council to** aid the federally impacted East Central Florida area in its program of planning for growth and development. the seven-county complex that is under study and analysis by the staff of specialists in economic evaluation working under

the banner of the ECFRPC. Of special local significance is the status of agri-business and water recreation in the regional picture. The data reveals that 23 per cent of all capital created in the region stems from agri-business and that it is possible to continue to average five per cent a year growth into the 1970's. By 1980 this phase of development could generate from 700 to 500 million dollars of capi-

tal, Touhy said. Pertinent to the importance

of the speedy development of Sanford's riverport facility, the finance official pointed out several excerpts from the Key Findings report. One remark is that "water

is the most valuable recreation resource of the East Central Florida region, but has not been, and is not being, adequately protected." Touhy said that the review should have

added "nor adequately promoted."

Another excerpt says, "Commercial recreational development should be encouraged on both private and public lands to reduce the need for public funds."

Employment should be doubled by 1980 in the seven counties, and by that year they should have 1.6 million people with incomes of \$4.8 billion a year, the experts say.

Business leaders and public officials have been pleasantly surprised and impressed with the many opportunities that this unprecedented growth presents, Touhy said. All of them are conscious of many attendant problems that must be solved to attain the expected benefits, but very few are evidently willing to unite in working out their solutions.

It is essential that the seven countries work together in the

planning of agricultural, commercial, industrial and residential development, because their facilities are so closely Inter-locked, he added. Transportation - highway, water and air-must be developed on a Central Florida scope, the planners are convinced. It is the purpose of the Regional Planning Council to develop this co-operative effort.

The presentation in Titus-

ville, using slides, graphs, charts and maps, was made by Executive Director Robert 11. Doyle and his staff of research specialists,

Touhy said that plans were being made to have this group bring their findings, as they affect Seminole County, to Sanford for a meeting of business leaders and public officials. Announcement of the development of these plans will be made soon, it was added.

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Era Of Little War'

We are living in what, thanks to the absence of a shooting war between any major powers, automatically earns the title of peacetime.

But though the world is in no immediate danger of dying from a nu-clear heart attack, it has broken out with a rash of measles, says Harlan Cleveland, assistant secretary of state for international organization affairs.

There are (or were, as of the time he spoke), 49 little wars, guerrilla campaigns and border disputes currently going on around the world. One reason, he says, is the nuclear

stalemate; war between the big pow-ers has become unthinkable. Add to this situation the emergence of scores of new, independent nations in Asia and Africa and the spread-ing of the idea, which the United States has encouraged, that every country has the right to determine its own destiny. With the fear of nuclear war in-

hibiting the big powers from keep-ing the small ones in line as they once did, the result has been a series of minor disputes.

"It seems," says Cleveland, "that the alternative to a world war is a world full of wars."

Spark Seminole Curriculum

Seminole High School has innovated several new programs in its academic curriculum during the 1964-65 school year according to Principal Andrew J. Bracken.

One which has affected all phases of the school program is the new time schedule. Each class operates on a seventy minute period rather than the conventional fifty-five minutes, as in the past. A new course in chemistry has been initiated, with the addition of "Chem Study" to the science curriculum. This course offers the students a new approach to conventional chemistry. It has proven to be a great help in the transition from high school chemistry to college chemistry.

"Agriculture IV offered the students an opportunity to attend classes at the high school in the morning and participate in a job placement program during the afternoon. Boys enrolled received actual experience in farming, dairying, landscaping, agri-business and other related fields. The program has been successful as each boy employed this school term has been offered permanent positions," the principal noted.

For the past two years beginning typing has been offered students on a large group basis. A master teacher, assisted by an aide can meet the typing needs of a great many students each year.

Senior business education majors were given an opportunity to enroll in a special program for advanced training in office practice and business machines. These students attended the high school until noon, then reported to the Adult Vocational school for this additional training. This program will also continue for qualified students next year.

"Another innovation this year at Seminole High is the new driver education program which incorporates a large driving range. The addition of the range enables one instructor through the use of walkle-talkie to direct a fleet of cars simultaneously practicing all phases of driving experiences," Bracken pointed out.

Seminole High anticipates its largest enrolment next year, with over 1600 students scheduled in grades 10, 11, and 12.

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)-Space aces James Mc-Divitt and Edward White, "feeling great," splashed down in the Atlantic from their four-day space ride today 40 to 50 miles short of their assigned target, but well within the swift reach of recovery forces.

At least two helicopters were hovering protectively over the spot when the capsule, now weighing about 4,700 pounds, hit the water.
