Fastest Freight Runs By Remote Control

SANTA FE, N. M. (UPI)—The fastest freight train in the world is in New Mexico, but its engineer sits in a blockhouse a quarter-mile away from the tracks.

The "train" really is the Air Force's rocket sled at the White Sands Missile Range. Its freight consists of missile guidance systems and nose cones of rockets. Its speed over the six-mile track is far beyond the sound barrier.

Used to test all types of equipment for the nation's space program, the sled is powered by three liquid-engine rockets. In power tests, the rocket has plunged end through nine-foot thick concrete objects as if they were paper bags. It can travel the six-mile track in a few seconds. In essence, it's an Atlas missile on the ground.

The only man ever to ride the sled was Col. John P. Stapp. Since 1961, when Stapp took his last sled ride, the rocket's speed and power have been too much for a man. Only instruments are seated on the lightning run today.

The so-called sled is a massive three-chambered rocket which pushes various testing equipment down a two-rail track. Beneath the track is supporting concrete. "Enough," an Air Force major said, "to build 10,000 cement outhouses."

Roaring Blast

With a roaring blast, the rocket jumps down the track on skids fixed beneath the rails as well as on top. The sled's greatest danger is that it might fly off the track.

Shortly after the initial blast—about four seconds—the sled slams through the sound barrier with a peal of thunder and roars past the controlling blockhouse. At the end of the track the sled is

reined in sharply by water brakes, a system of deploying water through the sled.

In some tests, the brake might be a concrete cube or a hillside. In these cases, the intense speeds of the rockets add tons of explosive power to the units.

Recent tests included the effect of rainfall on rocket nose cones. Sprinkler systems were established along a portion of the six-mile track. The system produces everything from a downpour to a gentle mist. The object is to find a nose cone material that won't erode when rockets travel through rain at high speeds.

Other tests have been used to produce new ejection seats for jet aircraft. The most recent tests produced seats which can eject men safely from aircraft still on the ground but moving at supersonic speeds.



Potential Painted In Glowing Colors

Potential progress and prosperity of Seminole County in the next 15 years is painted in glowing colors by the data presented in the "Key Findings" of the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council. This opinion was voiced today by George Touhy, executive vice president of First Federal Savings and Loan Association, who attended in Titusville a briefing for finance and industry leaders in

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Urban Renewal Administration announced today a \$29,332 federal grant to the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council to aid the federally impacted East Central Florida area in its program of planning for growth and development. The seven-county complex that is under study and analysis by the staff of specialists in economic evaluation working under

the banner of the ECFRPC. Of special local significance is the status of agri-business and water recreation in the regional picture. The data reveals that 23 per cent of all capital created in the region stems from agri-business and that it is possible to continue to average five per cent a year growth into the 1970's. By 1980 this phase of development could generate from 700 to 800 million dollars of capital, Touhy said.

Pertinent to the importance of the speedy development of Sanford's riverport facility, the finance official pointed out several excerpts from the Key Findings report. One remark is that "water is the most valuable recreation resource of the East Central Florida region, but has not been, and is not being, adequately protected." Touhy said that the review should have

added "nor adequately promoted." Another excerpt says, "Commercial recreational development should be encouraged on both private and public lands to reduce the need for public funds." Employment should be doubled by 1980 in the seven counties, and by that year they should have 1.6 million people with incomes of \$4.8 billion a year, the experts say.

Business leaders and public officials have been pleasantly surprised and impressed with the many opportunities that this unprecedented growth presents, Touhy said. All of them are conscious of many attendant problems that must be solved to attain the expected benefits, but very few are evidently willing to unite in working out their solutions. It is essential that the seven counties work together in the

planning of agricultural, commercial, industrial and residential development, because their facilities are so closely inter-related, he added. Transportation — highway, water and air—must be developed on a Central Florida scope, the planners are convinced. It is the purpose of the Regional Planning Council to develop this co-operative effort. The presentation in Titus-

ville, using slides, graphs, charts and maps, was made by Executive Director Robert H. Doyle and his staff of research specialists. Touhy said that plans were being made to have this group bring their findings, as they affect Seminole County, to Sanford for a meeting of business leaders and public officials. Announcement of the development of these plans will be made soon, it was added.

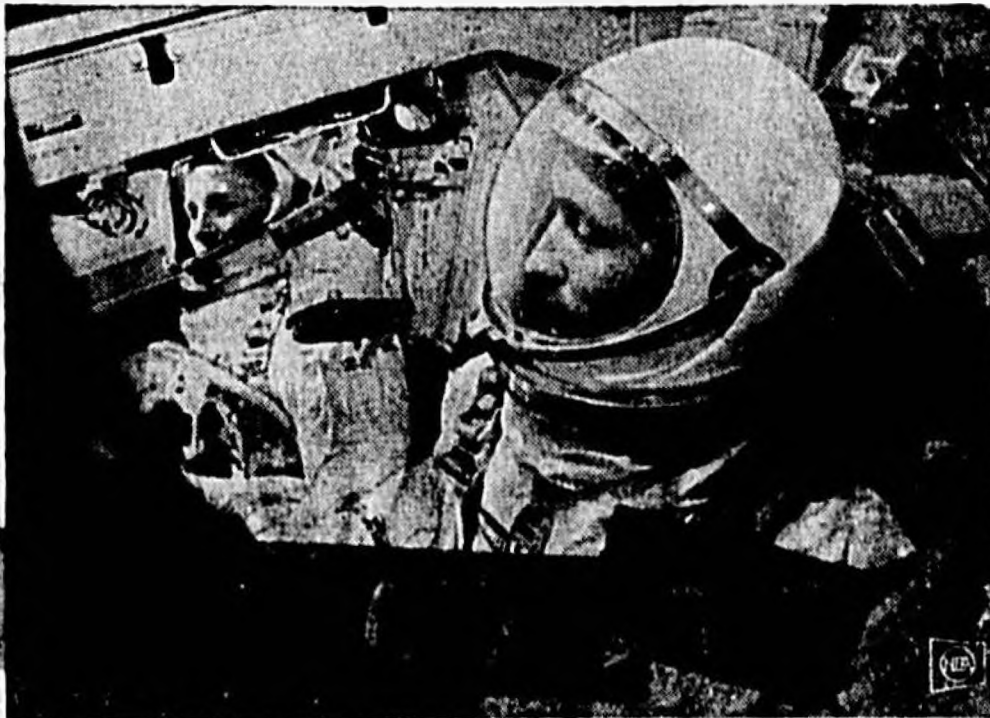

Gemini Twins Go For Record

Complete 16 Orbits In 24 Hours

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI) — Gemini twins James McDivitt and Edward White, keeping a sharp eye on the gas gauge and a growing collection of trash, whizzed through their first full day in orbit and set their sights on a U.S. space endurance record.

Ground control got a lot of McDivitt and White walking co-pilot to go they on the fuel, and cancelled a pair of orbital changes that would have drastically reduced the supply.

As Gemini-4 soared across the northwest coast of Africa and finished its first 24 hours in space at 11:16 a.m. (EDT), project chiefs assured the rookie pilots their orbit—101 to 179 miles above earth—was enough to keep them aloft a full 97 hours and 49 minutes.

A fuel supply depleted by a full six cases after another satellite, clouds of "paper and stuff" that began to fill the cabin, and continued problems with communications headed a lengthening list of minor troubles plaguing the mission one-fourth of the way to its goal.

But flight chiefs at Houston appeared unworried—and White and McDivitt, refreshed by plenty of sleep and a successful return to their original flight plan, took dead aim at the U.S. space mark of slightly more than 34 hours, set two years ago by astronaut Gordon Cooper.

They reached the 24-hour mark in the 10th orbit, entering it at 10:58 a.m. (EDT). At 24 hours past lift-off—11:16 a.m. (EDT)—the astronauts had compiled this record of space triumphs and setbacks:

Spaceman 'Walks' Hawaii To Atlantic

Astronaut Edward H. White seemed almost to be in love with space.

For the moment, it was all his. Like a child, he didn't want to leave. "Get back in," came the near stern command from his fellow astronaut James A. McDivitt.

The reply? Laughter could be heard as White dangled 108 miles in space silently coasting through the great void at 17,500 miles an hour. This was an exhilaration known only to one other man. This was excitement,

and beauty. This was the reason for being an astronaut. The schedule called for only a nine or 10 minute stay. But things like that are hard to give up. White seemed to dawdle.

McDivitt cautioned him again: "You still have three and a half more days to go, buddy."

But McDivitt was strapped in a capsule. That was one thing, but White was floating in space, tied to the capsule only by a 28-foot-long goldplated lifeline. The planned 10 - minute stay was stretching out.

White, toyed with his space gun in a Buck Rogers-like exercise. Firing a blast of compressed oxygen, he moved himself around the space capsule. Inside, McDivitt took pictures.

At one point McDivitt had trouble keeping White in sight. "Move closer," he urged White.

When he did, McDivitt told him, "smile." Then the free - wheeling White apparently got too close to McDivitt's windshield with his jet-propulsion gun. "You're smearing up my

Construction Slated To Start About June 15

Construction is scheduled to begin about June 15 for a modern 28-unit apartment building on Onora Road in Sanford, about one mile east of Highway 17-92.

The new apartment complex, to be known as Commodore Apartments, will be constructed by L & D Properties, of Maitland, and will have a replacement value estimated at \$200,000.

Occupancy is expected to be available by Sept. 15. The complex will be two two-story buildings, one containing 16 units, the other having 12 units.

Completely fire proof, the buildings will be of concrete block construction, with steel beams and studdings and a concrete roof. The only wood in the buildings will be the doors and cabinets.

The front of the apartments will be decorated with wrought iron grill work and decorative block on the stairwells.

The units will include all electric appliances including air conditioning, range, oven and refrigerator. They will have terrazzo floors. There will be equipped laundry rooms available to tenants, storage rooms, and a landscaped picnic area in the rear. Paved parking will be available for 40 cars.

The 55,000-square-foot complex, at the intersection of Onora Road and Magnolia Avenue, will be adjacent to a fully equipped city park.

Architect for the project is Edward Thomas, AIA, of Orlando. Contractor is W. M. Earnest, of Maitland. Van Villanyi, of Orlando, is structural engineer.

Construction financing is being handled through the South Seminole Bank in Fern Park and permanent financing is through First Federal Savings and Loan Assn. of Orlando.

He-e-ey, Kids! School's Out!

Seminole County turned loose 15,547 school children today for summer vacation.

Longwood Awaiting Legislative Action

The Longwood City Council officially requested the Seminole County legislative delegation to pass a special act now in the possession of Rep. S. J. Davis Jr. extending the city limits to include the property incorporated into the city by ordinances 161, 175 and 178.

Properties included are on Highway 17-92 from Longwood Plaza south to the Wind-Dixie; west on SR 431 to the old city limits line, and on Orange Avenue and Church Street west from 17-92 to the old city limits.

Council's action took place at a special unannounced meeting held at 9 a.m. Wednesday, minutes read at Thursday night's regular meeting revealed.

The validity of annexation of the above described property has been in question since the State Supreme Court ruled in January, this year, that such annexations were illegal.

The Herald received word from Tallahassee that the House of Representatives already has passed a bill val-

dating the annexations and it was expected to pass the Senate today.

Substitute For God



We have named our age many things. It has been called "the Age of Opportunity," "the Age of Science," "the Age of Anxiety" as well as numerous other designations. Please be patient with me if I suggest one more. I think it should be entitled, "The Age of Substitutes."

We substitute artificial sweeteners for sugar, wigs for hair, lamps for sun, and many other things far too numerous to mention in this brief column. Certainly some of the substitutes are good, but there is one that is extremely bad and yet so subtle that it is to be feared it is becoming rather common. The one I have in mind is man's making substitutes for God.

We can do this even with good intentions of worshipping, trusting, and serving God. How often we have heard someone give an excuse for attending the worship services of their church by becoming all misty eyed and pious toned as they tell of being so close to God as they fish, boat, golf or simply meditate on the beach. Certainly the above mentioned pursuits are good at the right time, but let us not make the mistake of thinking that any idea of God we might happen to dream up is really God no matter how pleasant the circumstances. Certainly, we should worship God when we look at the splendor of a sunset, or listen to the whispering of the ocean waves, but we should not substitute our idea of God for the true one.

The problem arises when we try to learn of God without His specific aid using only man's reason. The ultimate result of such a pursuit is a fabricated God. It has been noted that when man fabricates an idol that he makes it to suit his purposes and according to his own likes. Such a god will take on the characteristics of its maker. Then environment, time, and place will do much to determine the character of such an object of worship. Actually this idea is merely a substitute for the real God.

God has not let us go without knowledge of Himself. He provides us with a way of understanding the true God who makes substitutes untenable. God chose to reveal Himself in Jesus Christ. When we look at Christ we look at God. We do not grasp all that there is of God, but enough to supply our every need. Our Lord said to Philip, "He that hath seen me hath seen the Father." He is saying this to you and to me today! If you would know the true God learn of Him through Jesus Christ the Revealer. It will be necessary to read your Bibles, to study through the church as well as privately, and to pray so that God will be real to you at all times.

The sunset will take on a more glorious color and the ocean a more beautiful sound. Life will become more meaningful if we cast out substitutes and worship only the true God.

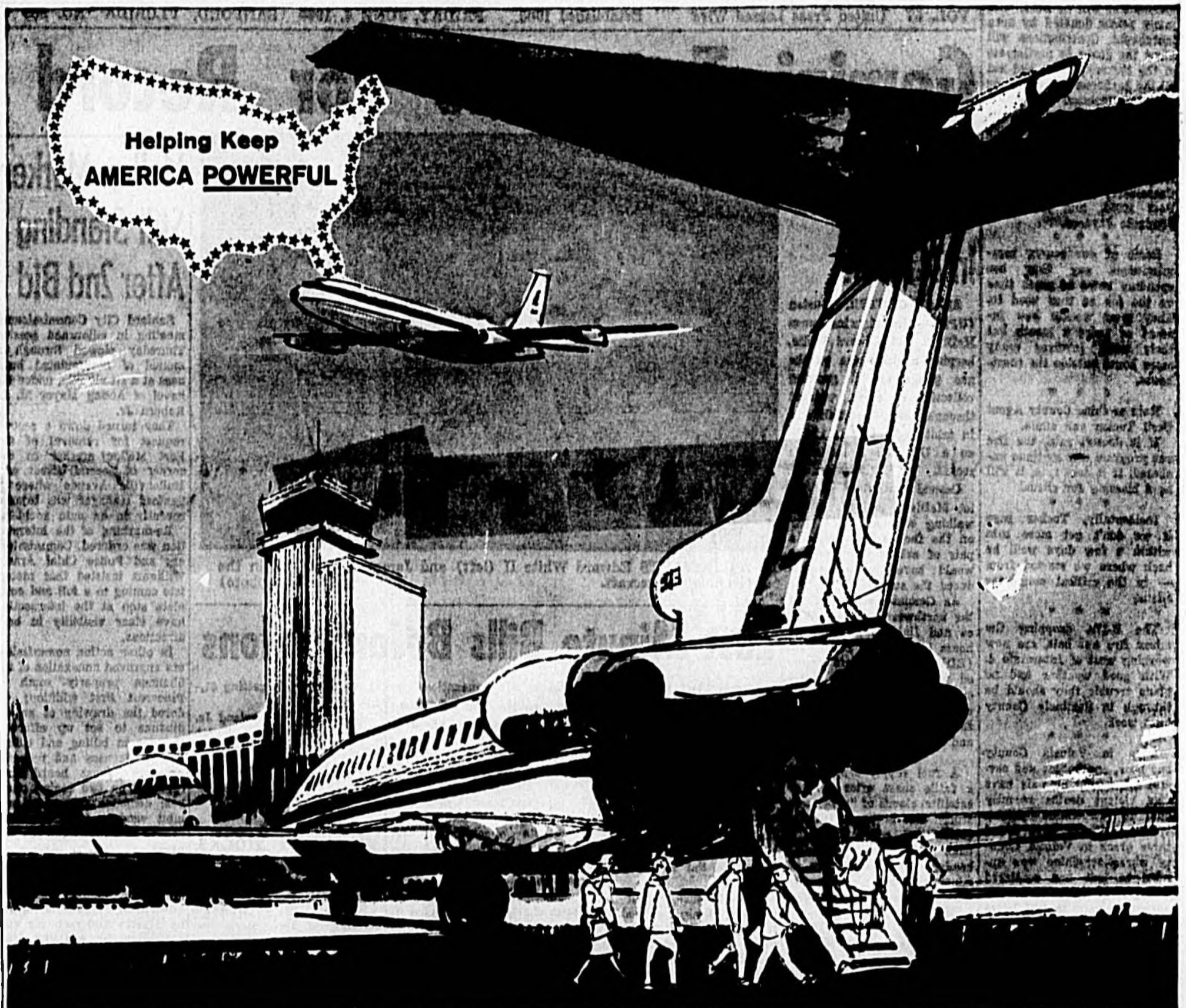

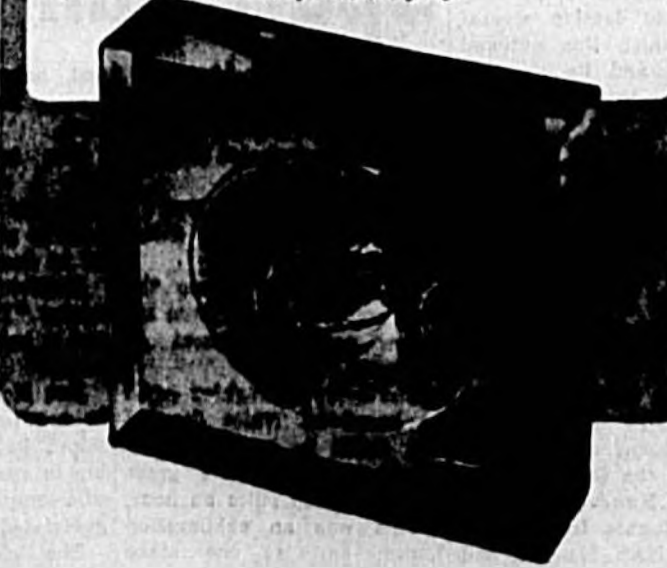

Era Of 'Little War'

We are living in what, thanks to the absence of a shooting war between any major powers, automatically earns the title of peacetime.

But though the world is in no immediate danger of dying from a nuclear heart attack, it has broken out with a rash of measles, says Harlan Cleveland, assistant secretary of state for international organization affairs.

There are (or were, as of the time he spoke), 49 little wars, guerrilla campaigns and border disputes currently going on around the world. One reason, he says, is the nuclear

stalemate; war between the big powers has become unthinkable. Add to this situation the emergence of scores of new, independent nations in Asia and Africa and the spreading of the idea, which the United States has encouraged, that every country has the right to determine its own destiny.

With the fear of nuclear war inhibiting the big powers from keeping the small ones in line as they once did, the result has been a series of minor disputes.

"It seems," says Cleveland, "that the alternative to a world war is a world full of wars."

For Safety's Sake

If tests being conducted around the country prove out, our streets and highways may one day be mansplendored things of different colors—at least at interchanges and where there is abrupt merging of lanes or a special traffic situation.

"Color-co-ordinated" roads, if they come, will not be for aesthetic reasons but for safety and to augment the signals, signs and warning devices that are now used.

Red pavement, for instance, would alert a driver to an approaching top or dangerous intersection. Yellow would mean a safety zone and blue a school zone. On freeways, green would indicate a through lane and orange a deceleration lane or exit.

This color code is only tentative at present and waits upon more proof that it contributes to safety and that colored paving materials stand up to heavy wear.

Safety experts report that the evidence in so far as is in favor of color.

Budget Of Timid Numbers'

Some of President Johnson's best friends will be telling him that he cannot build his proposed Great Society on a skimpy federal spending program of only \$100 billion a year.

These friends of LBJ are the spokesmen for Americans for Democratic Action (ADA). ADA met in Washington's Statler-Hilton Hotel in its 18th annual convention.

ADA is a class organization long on brains but with political muscle. Its purpose is to influence the thinking of politicians and to direct the votes of the masses of the American people so that ADA may realize its own objectives. These are stated in its program.

"Americans for Democratic Action is an organization of

liberals banded together to help all mankind toward freedom, justice and peace."

As a beginning, ADA is committed to obtaining in the United States the total welfare state. In a conservative-oriented account of ADA objectives written by James Burnham for the magazine, National Review, appears this summary: On every specific issue in every field, ADA supports government control, planning, financing, or takeover.

Such programs cost money and ADA believes emphatically that Johnson is not spending enough. ADA's opinion of the new Johnson budget is on record but subject to ratification. The ADA National Board in February praised LBJ's policy of compassion but condemned the spending program by which

the President proposed to translate his compassion into action.

The ADA board said LBJ's spending program would neither promote full employment nor accomplish his dream of a Great Society. ADA called it a budget of timid numbers.

The organization's position is important to the taxpayers because ADA surely is the best situated and probably the most effective of the pressure groups seeking to direct Johnson administration policy. The late President John F. Kennedy permitted a Good Will infiltration by ADA members. Johnson has not reversed that trend. On the contrary, he invited former ADA National Chairman Hubert H. Humphrey to be his vice presidential running mate.

Professional politicians, political writers and such will be alert to detect LBJ's reaction to the ADA's consistent sniping at his spending programs. So far all is sweetness and light and is likely to continue so because LBJ will not want to alienate the liberal lobby which can so effectively help him in Congress and at the polls. But Johnson has staked his own claim as a government economist, a protector of the taxpayers' interest.

So the President seems to be in the middle with the ADA spenderband on his left and balance - the - budget conservatives friends on his right. The question arises: Who will twist whose arm?

This is a situation which might embarrass the President but not one which is likely to do him much damage. The weakness of ADA is that it has no alternative to Johnson. ADA's man Humphrey is not yet ready.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — A letter from a contact in Cuba with relatives in high Castro circles says relations between Fidel Castro and his top Red theoretician Che Guevara are bad; don't be surprised if Che leaves Cuba "forever."

This letter was written in February when Guevara was on his worldwide trip which emphasized visits to Red China and Algeria. When Guevara left, his house was boarded up.

A short time back a cartoon in one of Havana's controlled papers made a play on the words Argentine (Guevara is from Argentina) and stupid.

A paper in Paris recently ran what was purported to be a statement by Guevara slapping at Fidel.

Between March 14 and this writing (two months) there has been no word of Guevara. After returning from his trip he disappeared into silence.

The U. S. government is known to be attempting to find out where he is and what he is doing.

Guevara's child was with Fidel Castro at Cuba's May Day celebration. But Guevara was not seen.

There have been rumors he was in the Dominican Republic masterminding the attempted coup. But at this writing there has been no confirmation of these reports.

He has been rumored dead, but no facts back this up.

He is rumored to have been at a meeting in Montevideo, Uruguay, in April at which Red agents from Latin countries met with Communist underground directors from

Czechoslovakia, Poland and the Soviet Union.

The meeting, held in the basement of the Czech embassy, had two Cubans present and representatives of a number of other Latin lands, including Argentina and Brazil. An Argentinian and other activists were at these sessions.

Che Guevara differs from Castro on a number of key issues. He's openly for Red China and Mao's way of doing things. For political-monetary reasons, Castro keeps his ties with the Soviet Union.

Guevara follows a straight party line. He's a doctrinaire Communist. Though Red, Castro is unpredictable. He jumps from this to that.

Guevara is a "cold fish," strongly bureaucratic, never well-liked in Cuba. Castro is dramatic and emotional.

The guessing here is that if Guevara has "moved on" from his Cuban economic post, he has shifted his base of operations to plotting for Red take-overs in hemispheric soft spots, wherever the Reds can take advantage of a crisis. Theoretician Guevara's forte is getting in early and planning revolut.

But where Guevara is as of

this writing is conjecture. He could turn up back in his old post in Cuba, in the Dominican Republic, or wherever else there's trouble.

Wherever he is, Cuba or elsewhere, Guevara's personal fight with Castro is expected to continue. The likely result: more Red activity in the hemisphere.

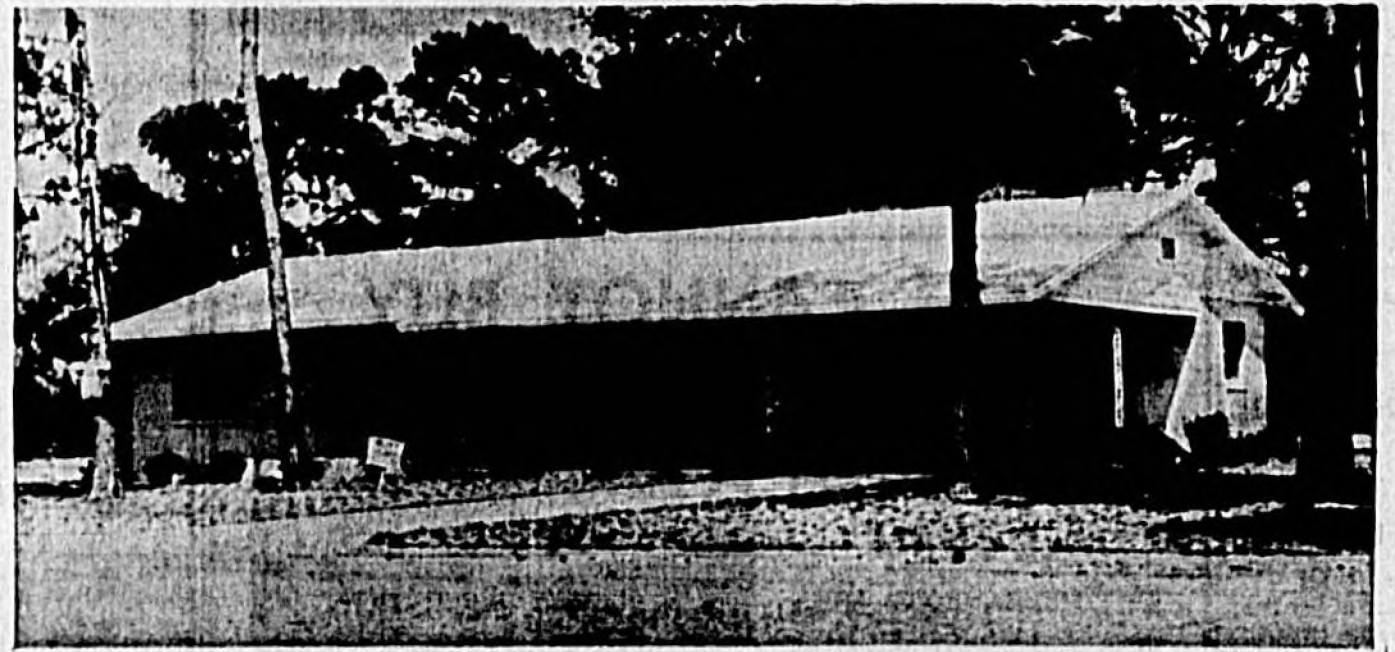

He would also know that his opponents might make five clubs or five hearts against him so that his bid would shut them out. North would not expect his partner to bid again but South's hand is of such nature that he wants to try for a slam as long as his partner has good spade support. In fact, South has some mild interest in seven. Hence his four no-trump bid to ask for aces. When North shows no aces, South settles for six. The slam makes easily because South is able to discard one of dummy's clubs on his high hearts and ruff out two clubs and a heart.

Six To Run In Belmont Stakes

NEW YORK (UPI) — Tom Rolfe, bidding for his second jewel in racing's Triple Crown when he challenges six rivals in the 97th edition of the \$125,000 Belmont Stakes Saturday, must contend among others with fast-chasing Dapper Dan, Jersey Derby winner Hall To All and hitherto untested La Cima, perhaps the biggest racehorse in America.

The field, which up until Thursday looked like the smallest in the history of the classic, the final race in the Triple Crown, also includes Wheatley Stable's Bold Bidder, Valley Farm's Selari and Meadow Stable's First Family.

Powhatan's Tom Rolfe, the 6-5 favorite to capture the \$102,900 first prize, will have Ron Turcotte in the irons. The same combination successfully raced in the Preakness, the middle of the Triple Crown events, and finished third in the Kentucky Derby.

Trainer Bill Winfrey said he would start Bold Bidder along with Ogdon Phipps' Dapper Dan to "insure an honest pace." Winfrey, and all other trainers in the classic, faced an unusual problem before Bold Bidder was entered: None of their Thoroughbreds were pacemakers; most were "come from behind" horses who ran best when behind the early leader.

Dapper Dan, who rose to prominence when stablemate Bold Lad failed to live up to advance billing, probably will

benefit most from the presence of Bold Bidder. The 3-year-old son of Ribot ran the last half mile in the Kentucky Derby in 47 seconds, coming from last place and finishing second, a neck behind Lucky Debonair.

The chestnut colt turned in just about the same performance in the Preakness, losing to Tom Rolfe, also a son of Ribot, by a neck.

La Cima, who stands 17 hands high and didn't race as a two-year old because he was such a gangling, green colt, won impressively last week at Aqueduct, where the Belmont will be run. Trainer Homer Pardue believes that the Joseph Straus colt can run all day and the 1 1/4 miles Belmont distance is ideally suited for his big strides.

AFL Indicates Growth Plan Next Season

NEW YORK (UPI) The National Football League beat the American League to the punch Thursday night by announcing plans to expand its present 14-team league to 16 teams for the 1967 season.

The AFL, however, landed a counter blow when Commissioner Joe Foss revealed that he will recommend to club owners next Monday that his circuit add two teams "immediately starting next season."

Thus, the expansion cold war between the rival leagues erupted overnight into a hot one, with no hold barred.

Apparently, the central battleground will be Atlanta, a city with a new \$18 million stadium and no pro football tenant. It is no secret that both leagues are hungry for this southern plum.

Pete Rozelle, the commissioner of the NFL who recommended the expansion Thursday night to club owners, mentioned Atlanta as one of the cities that will receive consideration along with Montreal, Toronto, Boston, Miami, Memphis, Cincinnati, Houston, Phoenix, Seattle, Portland, Ore., and New Orleans among others.

With the exception of Houston and Boston, which are already AFL members, Foss and the eight AFL club owners have their eyes on the same cities plus current NFL sites, including Washington, Chicago, Philadelphia, Los Angeles and Milwaukee—part time home of the Green Bay Packers.

Rozelle said the two cities that gain NFL franchises will be determined within the next eight months on the basis of a marketing research study to be done by an independent firm. The findings will be presented to the annual league meeting next February, where 12 affirmative votes out of 12 are required for approval.

Rozelle explained that the expansion would provide two eight-team conferences within the league, with each conference divided into two four-team divisions. There would be playoff games among the winners of the four team groups and then a final championship game between the best team from each eight-team conference.

Four Games Yield 59 Runs

National League Bats Explode

Who put the bounce back in the National League baseballs?

This is supposed to be a season of glib-edged pitching but balls were flying around NL parks Thursday night like they were powered by Titan II rockets.

No less than 30 pitchers saw action in four games yielding a total of 59 runs, including 14 doubles, two triples and nine homers, walking 34 batters, making seven wild pitches and hitting one batter. And when all the bombard-

ing was over, the hitless-wonder Los Angeles Dodgers had opened up a five-game first-place lead — their largest of the season — with a tidy little 11-10 victory over the world champion St. Louis Cardinals. It was like the married men against the single men with a keg of beer at every base as the Cardinals bombed out Sandy Koufax with six runs in two innings and then saw their own pitching collapse. The score changed hands four times with the Dodgers finally pulling out the victory in a three-run eighth inning climaxed by Ron Fairly's two-run homer.

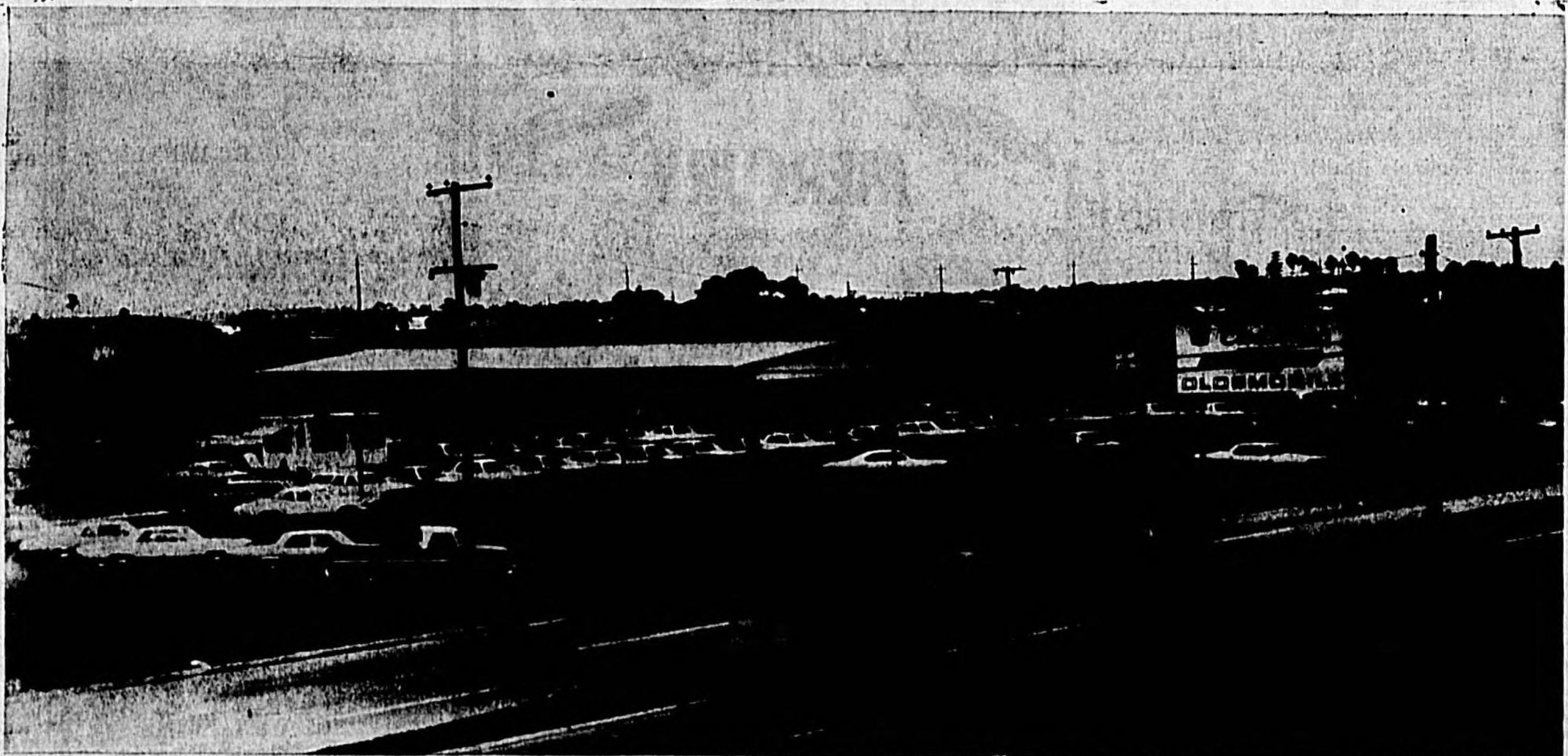

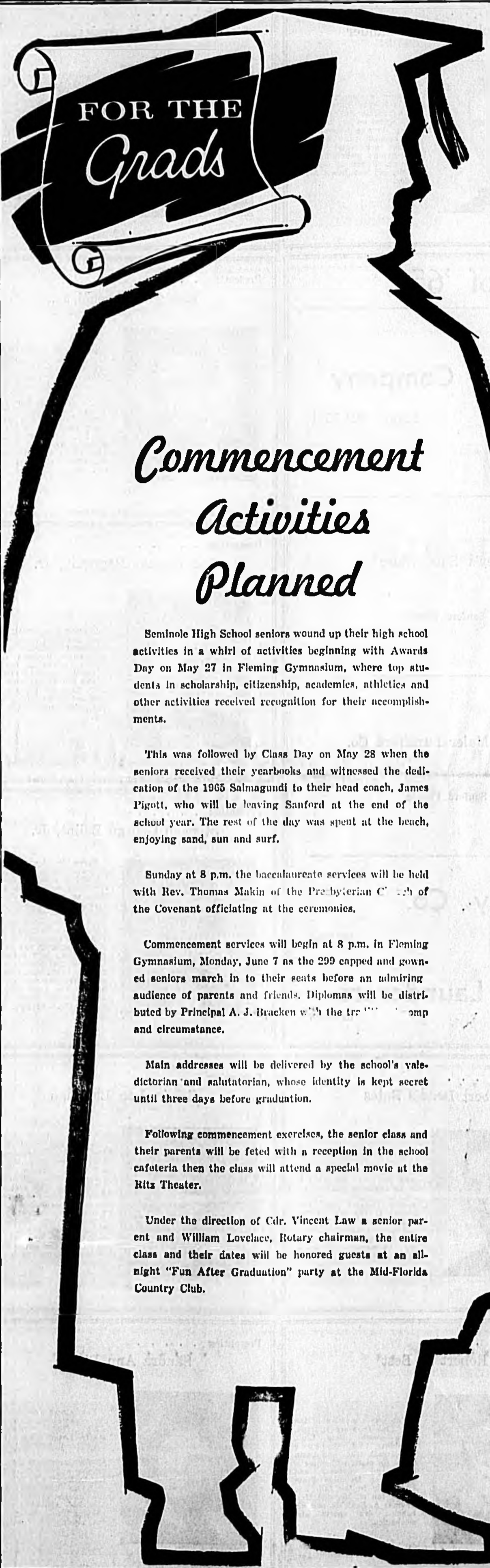

Innovations Spark Seminole Curriculum

Seminole High School has innovated several new programs in its academic curriculum during the 1964-65 school year according to Principal Andrew J. Bracken.

One which has affected all phases of the school program is the new time schedule. Each class operates on a seventy minute period rather than the conventional fifty-five minutes, as in the past. Every student is assigned six periods but attends only five each day, rotating one period off, thus he attends four seventy-minute periods in each class weekly.

"This has proved especially helpful in such areas as home economics, science, industrial arts and physical education. Faculty members and students agreed that this schedule was effective and it will be continued next year," Bracken said.

A new course in chemistry has been initiated, with the addition of "Chem Study" to the science curriculum. This course offers the students a new approach to conventional chemistry. It has proven to be a great help in the transition from high school chemistry to college chemistry.

"Agriculture IV offered the students an opportunity to attend classes at the high school in the morning and participate in a job placement program during the afternoon. Boys enrolled received actual experience in farming, dairying, landscaping, agri-business and other related fields. The program has been successful as each boy employed this school term has been offered permanent positions," the principal noted.

For the past two years beginning typing has been offered students on a large group basis. A master teacher, assisted by an aide can meet the typing needs of a great many students each year.

Senior business education majors were given an opportunity to enroll in a special program for advanced training in office practice and business machines. These students attended the high school until noon, then reported to the Adult Vocational school for this additional training. This program will also continue for qualified students next year.

"Another innovation this year at Seminole High is the new driver education program which incorporates a large driving range. The addition of the range enables one instructor through the use of walkie-talkie to direct a fleet of cars simultaneously practicing all phases of driving experiences," Bracken pointed out.

Seminole High anticipates its largest enrollment next year, with over 1600 students scheduled in grades 10, 11, and 12.

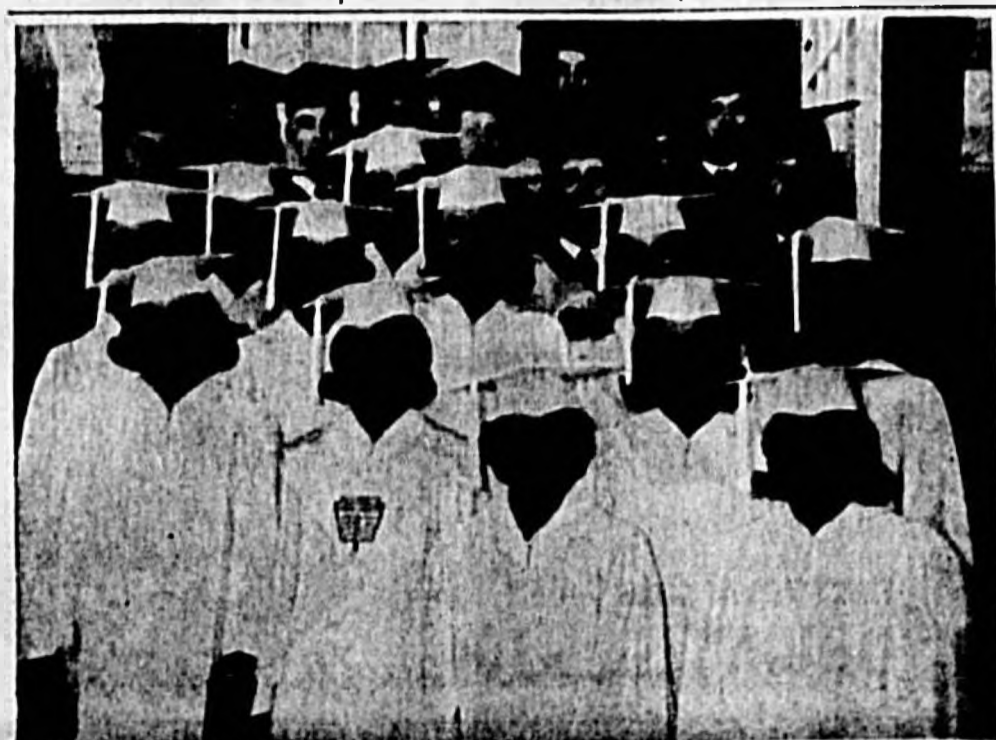

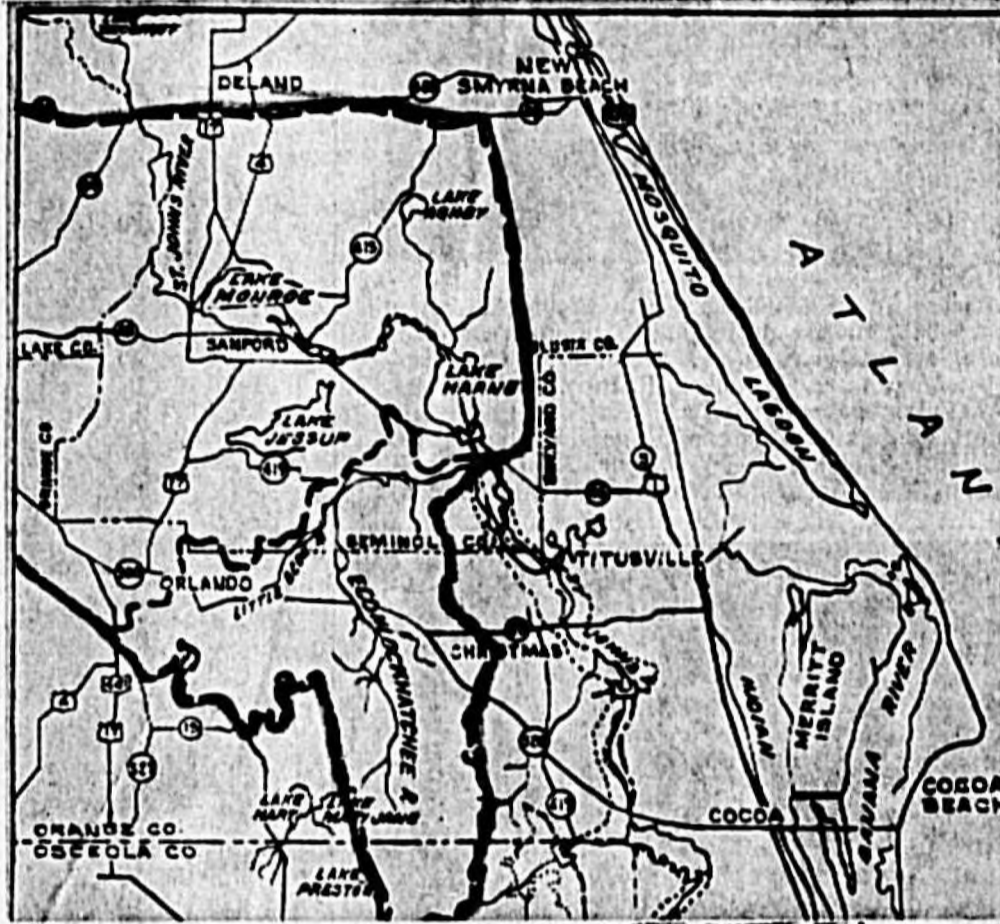

Econ Flood Study 37% Complete

Seminole Co. Worried Over Water Control

Army Engineer field crews are working in Seminole and Orange Counties compiling data and taking core borings as a part of the \$165,000 study of the Econlockhatchee River basin. Army Engineer spokesmen in Jacksonville today reported that the Econlockhatchee study is about 37 per cent completed as of June 1 and completion of the entire study is scheduled in 1967.

Study of the flood problems of the Little Econ and Big Econ was started by the Army Corps of Engineers in response to a congressional resolution requested by local interests. The area under consideration covers about 1,200 square miles in Seminole, Orange, Ocala and Volusia Counties. It includes that portion of the St. Johns River from near DeLand to Lake Harney, and the Econlockhatchee River, which is the largest tributary in that reach of the drainage basin. The Econlockhatchee River drains an area of 280 square miles and enters the St. Johns River a few miles south of Lake Harney. Lakes Monroe, Jessup and Harney are the three largest lakes in the area with a combined surface area of 39 square miles.

GLADES DROUGHT ANSWER SOUGHT

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Federal officials and representatives of Florida agencies met here today to discuss solutions to a drought that has endangered wildlife in the giant Everglades National Park. The meeting was called by Sen. Spessard L. Holland and George A. Smathers and Rep. Dante Fascell. The meeting will include representatives from Gov. Haydon Burns, the Army Corps of Engineers, the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District and the National Park Service. Park officials have asked the flood control district to release some of the water from canals near Lake Okechobee to try to save the parched park.

Solons Look To Remap Plans

TALLHASSEE (UPI)—The Legislature, in special session to reapportion itself, took today off, but its members were busy gathering support for several reapportionment plans. When the Legislature went into special session to reapportion Saturday the small county bloc was immediately given a setback. The Senate adopted a rule that would, in some cases, by-pass the small county controlled reapportionment committee. The House had operated under this rule for years, but the Senate always has followed "rule by committee" meaning if a committee killed a bill it took a two-thirds vote in the Senate to revive it. Under the rule change adopted Saturday any plan favored by the majority of

the Senate will get consideration of the whole Senate membership. Among the reapportionment plans is one from Sen. E. M. Gaultier of New Smyrna Beach. He says he will ask for a one-House Legislature with 100 members. Only one state in the United States has a unicameral legislature (Nebraska). Gaultier said that with both houses composed on the population basis, there is no need for two houses in the state government. Sen. Tom Whitaker of Tampa has developed a plan for 24 senators on a basis of two from each congressional district. Sen. Doyle Carlton of Wauchula and Verle Pope of St. Augustine have a 48-senator plan. Four senators would come from each congressional district.

The relationship between the 1965 session of the Florida Legislature and Gov. Haydon Burns was a smashing success, according to Burns. The Legislature closed its regular meeting Friday. It adopted seven amendments for the people to vote on next November, including Burns' ambitious \$300 million road bond program. Burns, although lame duck because of his two-year term, said his relationship with the Legislature was an "unqualified success." In addition to the highway program the Legislature adopted other amendments which will require statewide balloting. One of these was creation of a fourth district court of appeals to serve the eastern part of what is now the Central Florida Appeals District.

After Orange County developed its plan and passed its bond issue for construction, the scope of the Corps of Engineers study was expanded to include Lake Jessup as a possible storage area for excess water and for that reach of the St. Johns River between Lake Harney and DeLand. Major floods in recent years occurred in 1945, 1947, 1948, 1955, 1956, 1960 and 1964. Floods of 1945, 1948, and 1960 are the three largest of record. Simultaneously, office studies are underway, the Corps of Engineers spokesmen said.

McDivitt, White Drop In Atlantic

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—Space ace James McDivitt and Edward White, "feeling great," splashed down in the Atlantic from their four-day space ride today 40 to 50 miles short of their assigned target, but well within the swift reach of recovery forces.

At least two helicopters were hovering protectively over the spot when the capsule, now weighing about 4,700 pounds, hit the water. The official time given for the splashdown was 1:18 p.m. (EDT) mission control said. There was radio contact between the capsule and the aircraft carrier Wasp's recovery forces in the splash area between Florida and Bermuda.

McDivitt and White requested a helicopter pickup. The Wasp made quick calculations and reported the capsule bobbing in three to four-foot swells. The carrier was 48 miles away.

"Don't forget, I want to be recovered in a hurry," McDivitt quipped to mission control.

Mission control bet they would hit within five miles of the recovery force led by the aircraft carrier Wasp. McDivitt agreed.

"Both of you are in real good shape," the flight surgeon radioed.

McDivitt said he and White "are a little tired." But when flight surgeon Charles Berry suggested they take "item bravo"—pop pills, the reply waited back: "Negative." They would not take them.

They were told to spend no more than one hour inside the capsule on splashdown, while ships and planes went for them. Then they were to get outside it. They had individual life rafts aboard.

McDivitt, ignoring a faulty computer that forced him reluctantly to switch landing system, laughed that he was unshaven and referred to their unwashed state. "You ought to be up here now," he told Virgil L. (Gus) Grissom at mission control in reference to "fumes."

Grissom asked if there was anything he needed. "Yeah, my computer," McDivitt cracked.

The aircraft carrier Wasp, 14 aircraft, destroyers and other vessels circled in the Atlantic recovery area between Bermuda and Florida for a landing.

Plans to have McDivitt and White fly the bird, controlling its descent from orbit toward the splash site, were scrapped by the failure of the computer.

"I just think it's old-fashioned," he radioed while discussing the re-entry.
