### **City Authorizes Disposal Plant Eost Study**

The City Commission has authorized a study of the most feasible financing for a city sewage treatment plant after being advised that the plant could be a factor in goiting a \$500,000 industrial plant located here.

The commission already had discussed investigation of the costs and possible ways of financing a primary treatment plant after the State Board of Health told the city it would not approve any further extension of the city sewer lines until a plan is submitted for a plant.

Commissioners Instructed City Berk Henry Tamm to ask fiscal agent Loomis Leedy to submit possible financing methods.

Chamber of Commerce Manager John Krider met with commissioners Thursday to reveal that a firm which would employ about 100 persons to start is considering locating here. He said two other Florida cities

are being surveyed by the firm Bao and asked the City Commission to belp advance avery possible encouragement to the company to put the plant here. Krider pointed out that adequate

A Herald Editorial Why Wait?

The subject of the importance of a sewage treatment plant to the City of Sanford has come up again. The city was asked by the chamber of commerce

to keep in mind that indications are that expanded sewerage facilities will become a factor in attracting industry to the area.

The State Board of Health already has told the city that it will not approve any additional extension of the city sewer lines to homes-inside or outside the city limits.

This means just one simple thing-Sanford can't grow any more until the state ruling is complied with by the city in regards to submitting a plan for a sewage treatment plant.

This puts the crimp on growth of home areas at a time when a widely known developer has just announced that he thinks the Sanford area is ready for more growth and showed his faith by starting 150 houses and saying he will build more.

It puts a question mark on the possibility-and the probability-that we can get some new industrial blood into the city's veins.

There must be some way that the city fathers can figure out to go ahead and remove this treatment plant question as a factor which can hold the city back.

As one commissioner said, why wait any longer when our whole future growth may hinge on this treatment plant?
