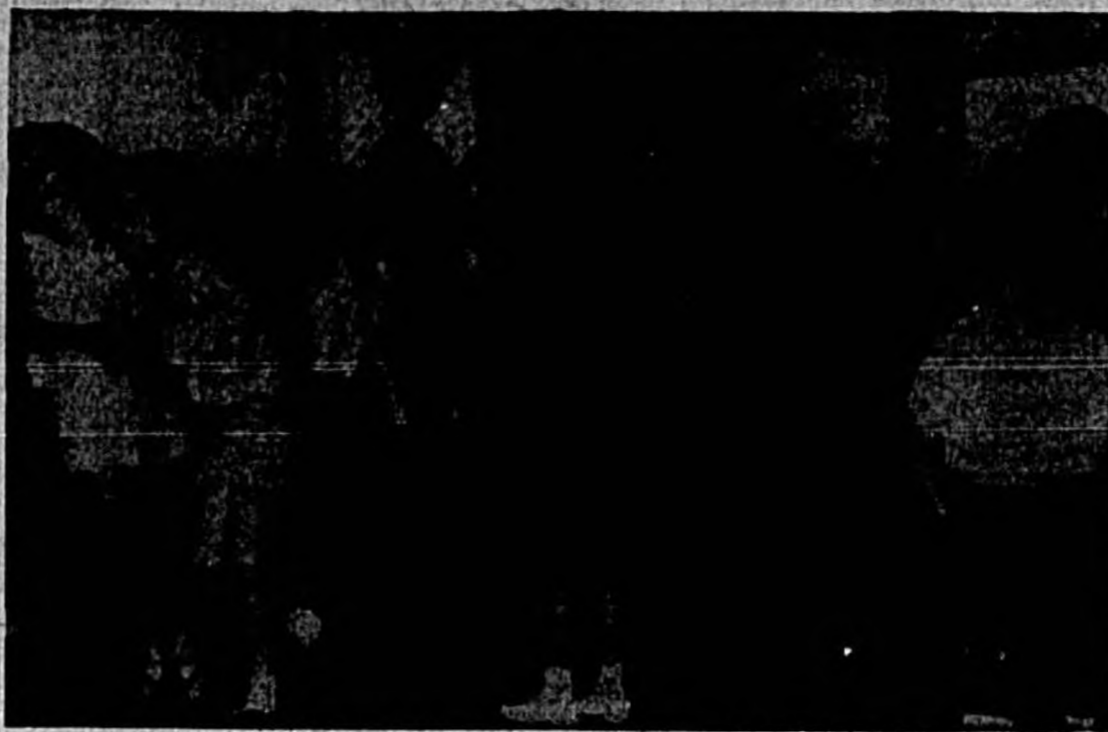


Summer Program Offers Varied Activities

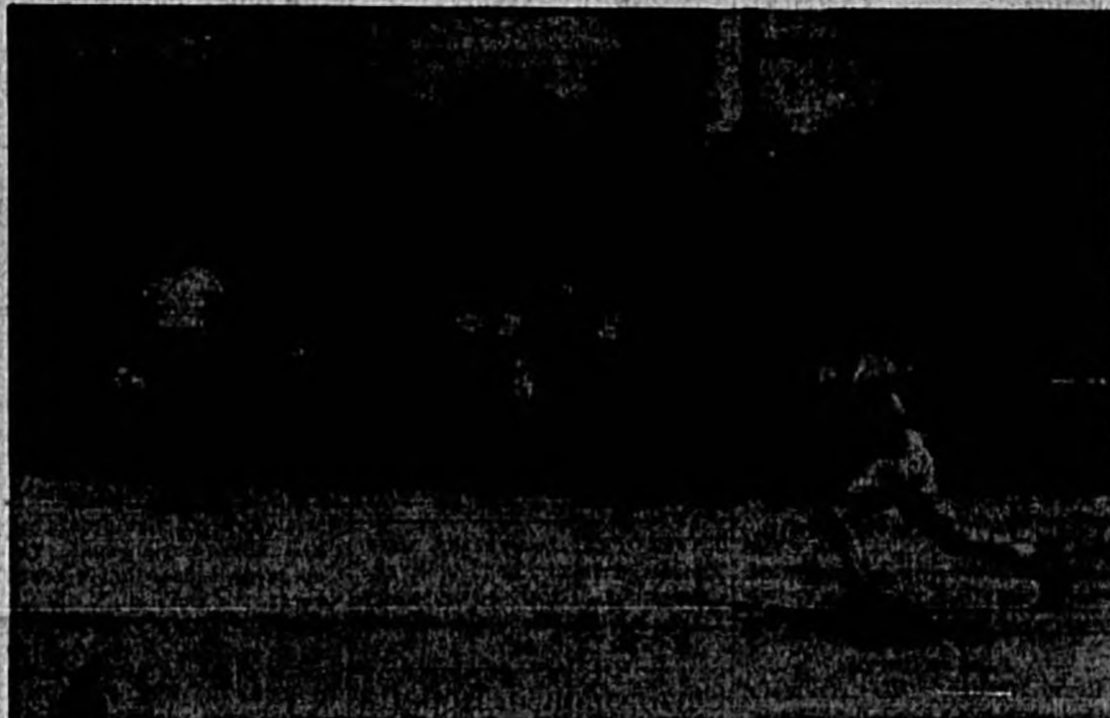

South Seminole Bank Starts Business Monday

Open House For Public Preview Set Saturday

The South Seminole Bank, central Florida's newest financial institution, will hold a special preview showing of its modern facilities Saturday between 2 p. m. and 8 p. m.

lock & Fritz, architects and engineers. The structure was built by W. L. Richards, general contractor. The large paved parking area contains space for 50 cars.

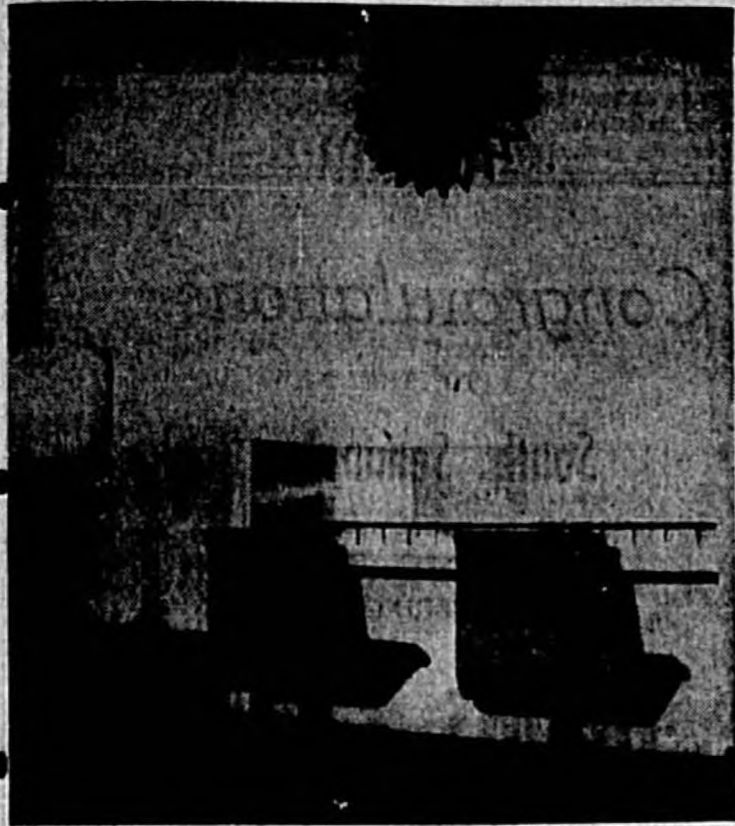

Three days ago a rhesus monkey turned up in Lake Mary, was finally captured and will be destroyed because of its age and physical condition according to Mrs. Arnold Hood, Sanford Zoo director.

The monkey turned up just across the highway from the George A. Stubbings ranch by Country Club Rd. about 1:30 p.m. Monday.

Stevenson Says Progress 'Good' On Aid Program

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Adlai Stevenson reported today a good start on the groundwork for President Kennedy's multi-million dollar alliance for progress program in Latin America.

The UN ambassador, back from a 19-day, 10-nation, 6,647-mile air tour of 10 South American capitals, planned to submit his findings to the President at the White House.

He was expected to report that although he found the situation in South America has deteriorated to a point where it is easily exploitable by the Communists, individual governments are showing new awareness and readiness to meet economic and social problems.

Stevenson returned Thursday night with an unofficial estimate that it would take \$3 billion to meet the financial needs of the biggest countries in the hemisphere over the next decade.

On his arrival at Washington National Airport from Puerto Rico, he termed his mission "successful in all respects."

Stevenson said he had found "tremendous interest and hope" in Kennedy's alliance for progress. He added: "The conviction is universal that more rapid social development is absolutely essential. While this is a long-range undertaking, it is important to demonstrate promptly that we are making progress on this point."

The Kennedy emissary said he was gratified by the awareness of South American leaders that "old molds have to be broken and that society which does not translate economic progress into social progress is doomed."

He said that there was widespread concern in the countries he visited about whether the U. S. Congress would support the alliance for progress program "so as to make it fully effective."

But Stevenson said the Western Hemisphere now knows that to barter liberty for social gains is too high a price to pay. "If there was any idea that communism in Cuba is only a problem for the United States, I believe we dispelled this illusion," he said.

Hearings To Wind Up On Motor Price Fixing

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Chairman Estes Kefauver of the Senate Anti-trust subcommittee planned to wind up hearings today on electrical motor pricing practices.

The Tennessee Democrat summoned two witnesses to the price-fixing investigation — James A. Kutz of the H. K. Porter Company's Peerless Division, Warren, Ohio, and Philip Sorensen of Carrier Corporation's Wheeler plant at Jeannette, Pa.

Kefauver Thursday had kept secret until hearing time the identity of two motor industry witnesses. He said the move was an effort to protect them from pressure not to testify about possible cooperation among firms on their prices.

The chairman said their stories of private price talks among competitors in the electrical motor industry convinced him of the need to toughen anti-trust laws.

He said the laws should be broadened to cover "informal understandings" and "attempted conspiracies" to stabilize or set prices.

A. C. Allen of Wagner Electric Co., St. Louis, and William A. Davis of Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Co., disclosed that such talks sometimes were followed by

Nikita Creating Personality Cult

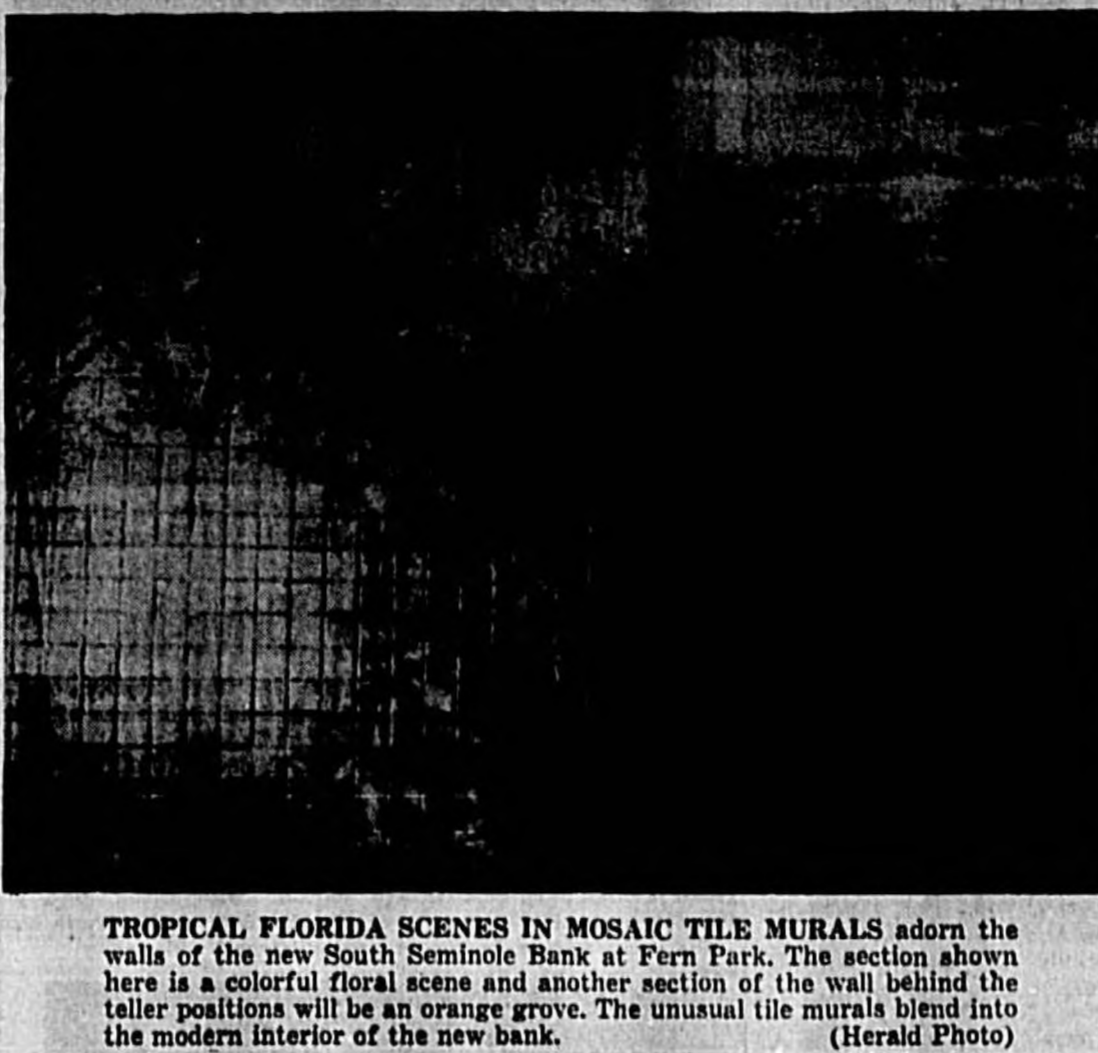
GENEVA (UPI)—Moscow's propaganda factory has begun shaping a new "personality cult" around the pudgy figure of Nikita S. Khrushchev.

A series of major pronouncements from Moscow in the past few days has depicted the Soviet premier—who doubles as Communist party chief—as the man who always is and always has been right.

The Moscow press and radio and other Soviet leaders are spotlighting Khrushchev as the man behind everything good—even in the misadventures of Josef Stalin.

The campaign, which carries all the earmarks of organized and inspired strategy, may be calculated to forestall any potential criticism from other party leaders of Khrushchev's alarmingly provocative policy line of the last few weeks.

But above all the Soviet leader is believed setting the scene for next fall's Communist party congress in Moscow at which he intends to present a new version of Lenin's party program — a Red bible of international communism, Khrushchev version.

Convicted Slayer Who Risked Life In Cancer Experiment May Have Symptoms Of Disease

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI)—Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard, serving a life term for slaying his wife, will be brought back to the Ohio Penitentiary today for tests to determine if he has developed cancer as a result of an experiment three years ago.

Sheppard, an osteopath from the Cleveland suburb of Bay Village, was convicted of the murder of his pregnant wife, Marilyn, in a trial which attracted nationwide attention. His conviction came in 1956, two years after the slaying.

Dr. Sheppard, who has stood behind his younger brother since the bludgeon killing, disclosed in Cleveland his brother has a tumor.

Another brother, Dr. Richard Sheppard, said he did not believe the prisoner has cancer. He said Sheppard has an enlargement of the lymph nodes in the breast area which could have been caused by any number of things.

Maury Kobients, head of the State Division of Corrections, said Sheppard will be brought back to the penitentiary today for medical tests "to determine if he has a cancerous condition."

Top Echelon Of Gridders Set For Tilt Tonight

Not a single expert was rash enough to pick the Cincinnati Reds to win this year, but they're beginning to win over more and more supporters quicker than you can say Frank Robinson.

Even those skeptics who couldn't see the Reds for dust, can plainly see now that Robinson could be the man to lead Cincinnati to its first National League pennant in 21 years.

The first-place Reds have won eight of their last nine games, during which Robinson has ripped the ball at a 452 clip to pace the club to a two-game lead over the second-place Los Angeles Dodgers.

It was Robinson who was chiefly responsible for the Reds' 7-3 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals Thursday night. He hit his 17th home run of the season, a double and a sacrifice fly to drive in three runs, in addition to stealing a base during a two-run rally in the fourth inning which put Cincinnati ahead for good.

Bob Purkey was credited with his ninth victory against three defeats although he needed help from Jim Brosnan in the eighth. Larry Jackson went down to his seventh defeat even though he yielded only four hits in the six innings he pitched.

The Chicago Cubs utilized a 14-hit attack to defeat the Dodgers, 7-5; the Milwaukee Braves beat the San Francisco Giants, 8-6, and the Pittsburgh Pirates downed the Philadelphia Phillies, 8-1.

In the American League, the Detroit Tigers retained their one game lead with a 6-4 victory over the Washington Senators; the New York Yankees beat the Kansas City Athletics, 8-3; the Boston Red Sox nipped the Los Angeles Angels, 3-2, and the Baltimore Orioles mauled the Minnesota Twins, 8-2.

Six homers were hit in the Cubs-Dodgers game, with George Altman, Billy Williams and Jerry Kindall connecting for Chicago and John Roseboro, Daryl Spencer and Duke Snider reaching the seats for Los Angeles. Williams singled home the winning run in the eighth off loser Dick Farrell to give reliever Barney Schmitt his first victory of the season.

Buffalo, N. Y. (UPI) — The top echelon of the collegiate football ranks are poised "mentally and physically" for tonight's first East-West All-America Bowl game in spacious War Memorial Stadium.

This joint pronouncement came from the rival camps as the cream of the nation's college seniors wound up last-minute training today for the summer gridiron classic sanctioned by the American Football Coaches Association and the All-America Bowl Association.

A portion of the game's proceeds will go to the Football Hall of Fame.

Rip Engle, who will direct the East squad along with Bill Murray of Duke's Cotton Bowl champions, predicted a wide-open game.

"Our boys have worked real hard to get ready for the game," Engle, the Penn State coach, said. "We have spent a lot of time on offense this week and will try to get the ball in the air a good deal against the West. We look for a high-scoring contest."

Murray Warmath of Minnesota and Washington's Jim Owens, the West coaches, proclaimed that "our boys are up for the game."

"Our passers, Bob Schloredt of Washington, Bill Klimer of UCLA and Tulane's Phil Nugent, have looked good in practice," Warmath said.

The 1960 college coach of the year indicated he would use Schloredt as the No. 1 quarterback. Halfbacks Glynn Gregory of Southern Methodist and Tom Mason of Tulane and fullback Tom Watkins of Iowa State round out the front-line backfield.

Engle, the winning coach in the 1959 Liberty Bowl, and Murray have employed two alternate attacking units which also will get their chances at defensive assignments.

One man is certain to play both the offense and defense for the East team. He's All-America Joe Bellino of Navy.

Engle and Murray consider as first string the foursome of quarterback Norman Sneed of Wake Forest, halfbacks Herb Adderley of Michigan State and Bellino, and alternate fullbacks Bill Brown of Illinois and Claude Gibson of North Carolina State. 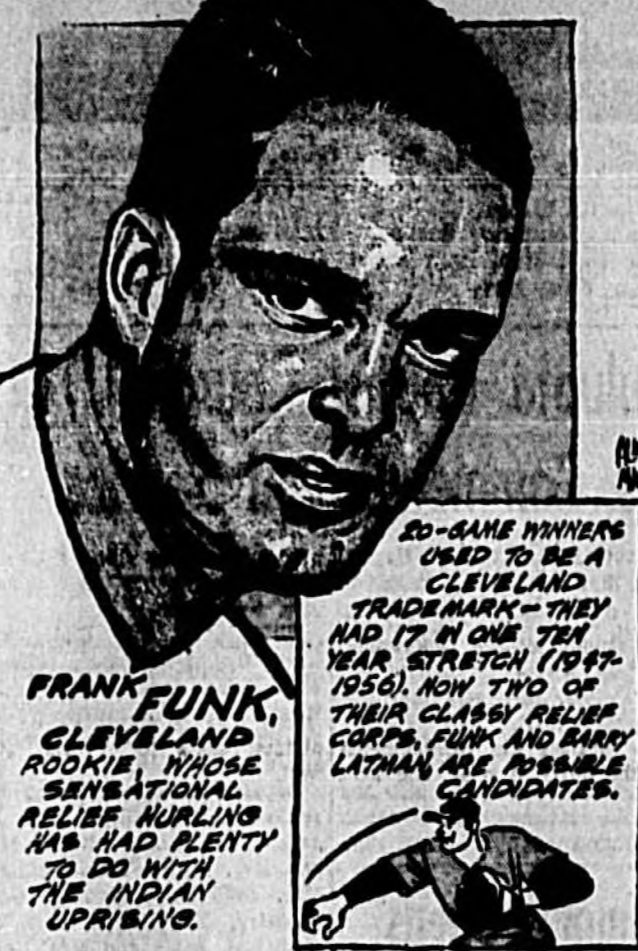

Mauch's temperature soared past the boiling point at the charge that he ordered his pitcher deliberately to throw at Burgess. And the umpire was just as vehement in maintaining they heard him do so.

The roly-poly Burgess, with four runs batted in, was a dodging duck when he batted in the sixth. He fouled off Bushardt's first pitch, high and outside. Then he ducked a high inside pitch.

Two more inside pitches followed and with the count 2 and 1, Bushardt pitched back of him. Smoky fell away and the ball struck his bat for a foul.

That brought the warning from Pelekoudas and Mauch streaked from the dugout. A jaw-to-jaw argument ended with the manager's banishment and then Bushardt hit Burgess on the hip with the 2 and 3 pitch.

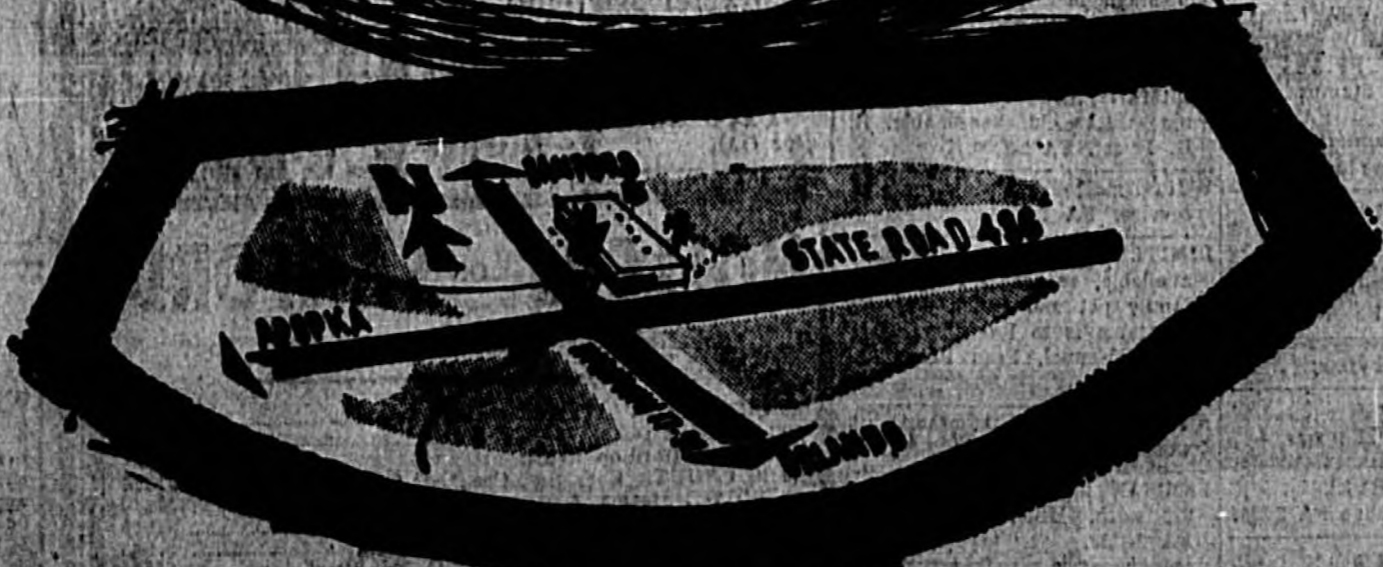
