

#### Plant More Azaleas

The consequences of the recent freeze in Florida which destroyed so much beautiful green foliage and most of the tender plants such as poinsettias, crotons, hibiscus and duranta, as well as citrus and tender vegetables, have brought to light more clearly than ever before the value from the standpoint of beautification of azaleas, camellias, and gardenias,

and gardenias.

So far as we have been able to discover none of these plants were damaged to any appreciable extent by the two weeks or more of sub-freezing temperature which occassionally dropped to the neighborhood of 20 degrees. Certainly the camellias were not hurt at all and if anything only bloomed all the more profusely and brilliantly because of the cold. The gardenias are just as green as ever and we are confident that when Spring comes their blooms will be fully as plentiful.

As for the azaleas which are just now coming into bloom, though the peak of their season undoubtedly was postponed a few weeks and while in a few instances their usually beautiful green leaves were somewhat browned by the frigid attack of Jack Frost, the brilliance of their blossoms does not seem to have been dimmed in the least and by contrast with other shrubs which now have been cut back to the ground, the beauty of the azales is all the more appreciated.


