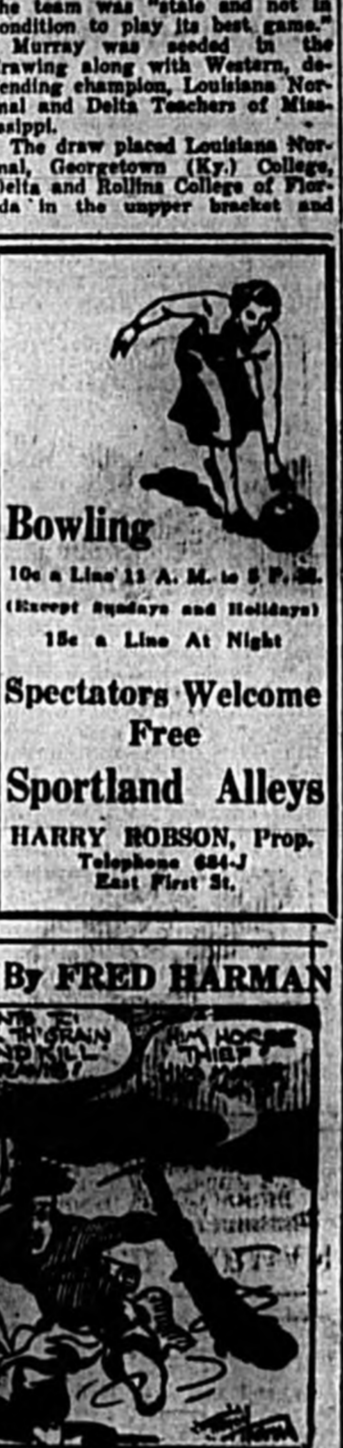

Netherlands' And Rumania's Plight Creates Concern

Germany Seeks More Rumanian Supplies; Dutch Charged With Violating Neutrality

Britain May Send Expeditionary Force, Supported By Ships, Planes, Is Discussed

The plight of two neutrals, Rumania, and the Netherlands, created new concern in Europe today as talk of sending an expeditionary force to relieve the beleaguered Finns increased in Britain.

Germany accused the Netherlands of acting as a regular gateway for British aerial squadrons to reach the Reich and asserted that it was established definitely that British planes, which scouted Germany last night, were flown over the Netherlands.

Dutch anti-aircraft guns barked intermittently for five hours at unidentified foreign aircraft. Netherlands is on a direct air route between Britain and Germany, and is a neutral. Both sides are accused of violating neutrality.

The diplomatic war for control of Rumania's rich oil and other supplies took a new turn today with authoritative reports that Germany had offered to guarantee Rumanian frontiers in return for long leases in all oil-bearing provinces in all Rumanian naval bases in Rumania, and the possibility of sending an expeditionary force supported by ships and planes.

The Red Army, meanwhile, advanced on the Arctic front. Finnish bombing planes struck at Rumanian communications and troop concentrations.

The Finns said that 221 Russian planes had been shot down, 1210 Soviet tanks captured or destroyed since the war began.

The Western front continued comparatively quiet but Germany reported strong French infantry assaults had been repulsed in the Meuse sector near the Luxembourg frontier.

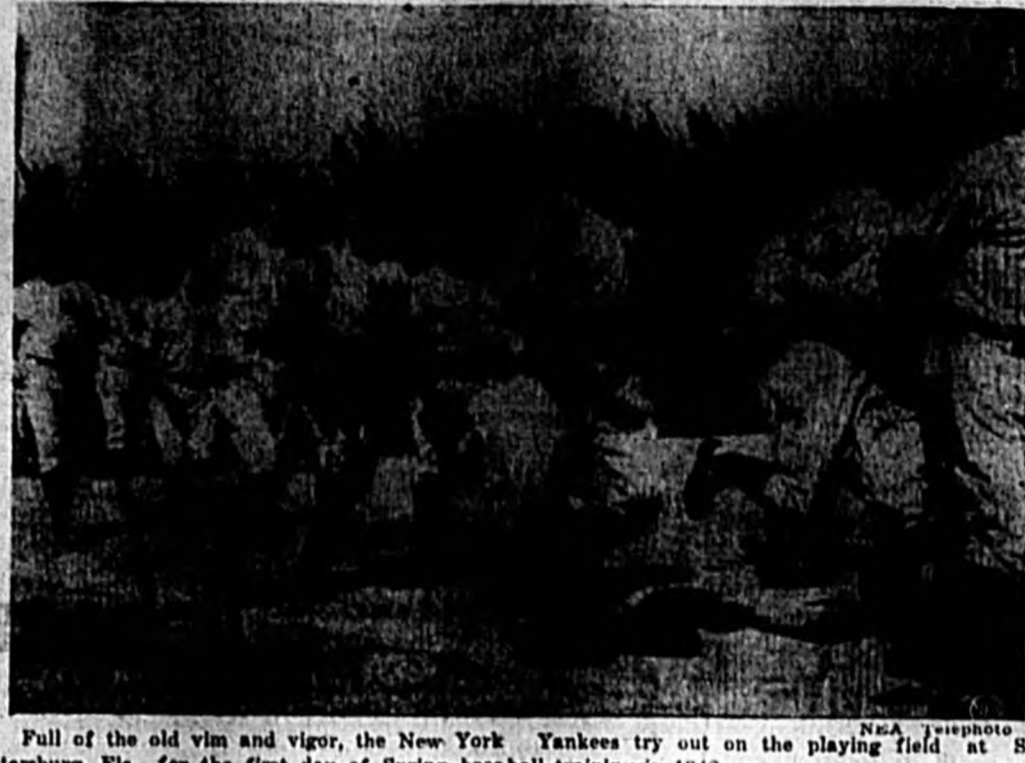

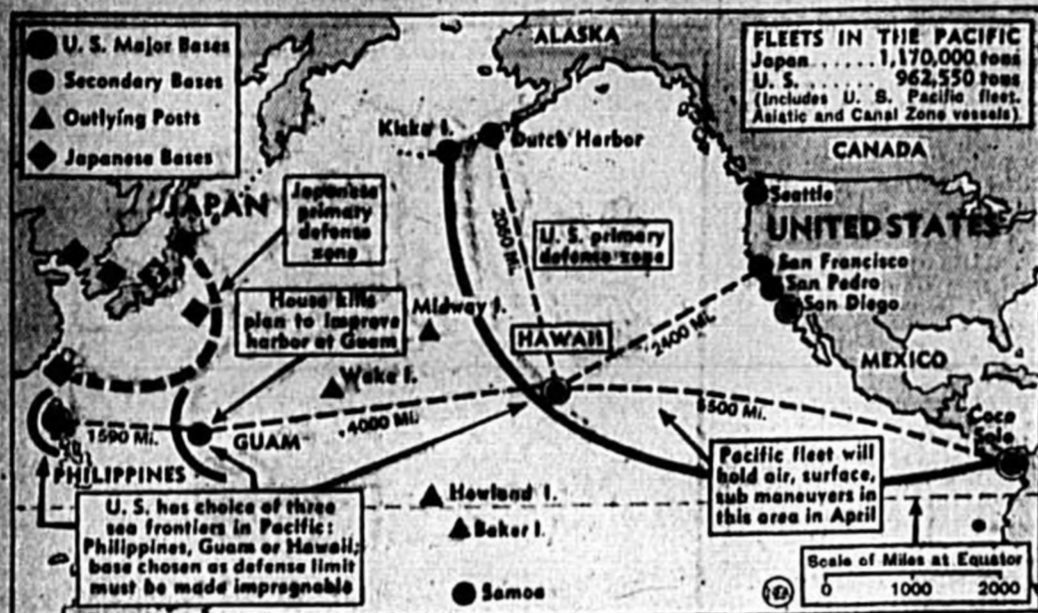

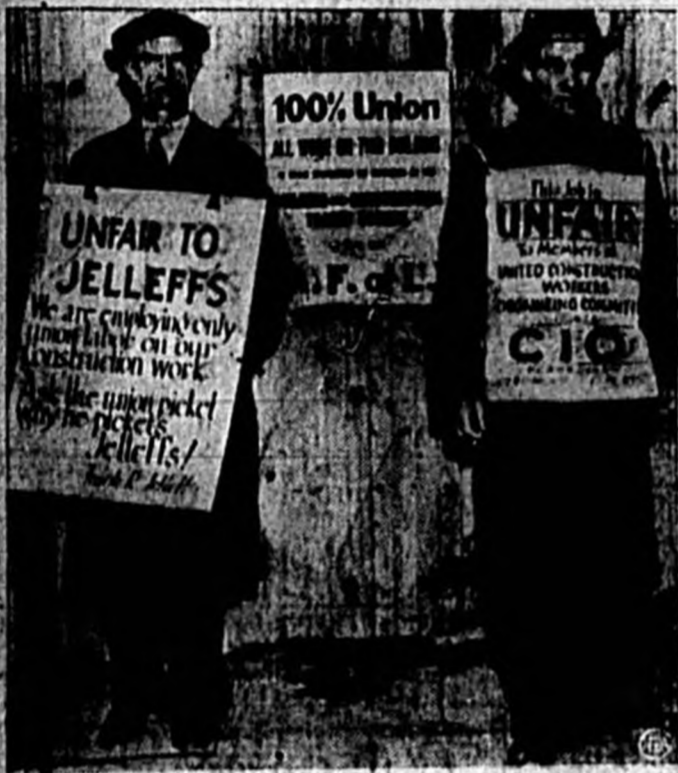

Holland Defense Planned Largely On Water Barrier

By RILEY O'SULLIVAN
AMSTERDAM, Feb. 23.—(AP)—With the Netherlands army building its manpower and gunpower around a basic system of water defenses, Holland in six months has reached a point where the high command speaks more confidently of the army's ability to stand off any invading force.

Progress in the intensive training of a citizen army and construction of fortification along the war broke out in Europe has been such that the general staff conducted a group of correspondents of the Netherlands and neutral countries on a three-day tour designed to demonstrate the effectiveness of the defenses. Another purpose apparently was to combat doubts said to be held in some quarters abroad that the country was determined and ready to use all resources to resist invasion.

The picture gained on the trip along the Dutch-German frontier defenses, main inundation zones through central Holland behind which to the west lie the richest and most populous centers, and the north sea coastal defenses is one of elaborate preparations, not fully realized even by the Dutch public.

Addressing the correspondents, Lieut.-Gen. Baron J. G. Baron Van Voerst Tot Voerst, commanding the field army, boldly declared that any attacks from the east were sure to bog down against the fortified water lines of central Holland—even lightning motorized assaults accompanied by heavy aerial bombardment.

Further, he expressed confidence that the enemy would be unable to negotiate the ice, which the army demonstrated can be blown up and cut in channels to trap tanks and vehicles.

Lines along the German frontier are being strengthened and bridges are mined and heavily guarded.

As is generally known, the defenses in the east are based behind the Maas river following north near the frontier until it turns abruptly westward, roughly paralleling the Waal and Rhine rivers on the way to the sea.

The northward line extends roughly along the IJssel river, which reaches the Zuider Zee. It is commonly stated that the strategic province above the IJssel could not be defended except for delaying action.

In the south, we saw how machine gun posts can be concealed with a bit of ingenuity in hedges and houses, reinforced with slabs have been constructed which would take a sharp eye to notice the apertures.

The east opening of one of the larger posts was painted to give

the appearance of a curtained window with a tulip plant on the sill.

The swampy Peel area back of the River Maas, coordinated with the fortified canal systems and new anti-tank canals, gives depth to the defenses stretching south of the great rivers to the Belgian border. The forbidding pest bogs of Peel have been mined and ditched, and the region where even the natives have become lost and perished in the bogs was pronounced impassable. It looked like it.

Between the great rivers there is evidence of strongly fortified defenses.

To the north, we walked through snow-decked young fir trees just off the highway. There was no sign of military activity. Without a warning three guns blasted the icy air. Then we were led through trees to a camouflaged, entrenched battery less than 100 yards away.

At another place, the party got a laugh when a staff officer unknowingly walked onto a camouflaged mine trap covered with wire and concealed with a thin layer of earth and leaves. He bounced about, but he was not of tank proportions and the surprised officer remained solid ground.

Wingless Airplane Is Being Used By Takers Of Census

DENVER, Feb. 23.—It appears for a time as if high mountains and deep snow were going to slow things down, but, like the mail, the census gets through in Colorado, thanks to ski snowshoes and a new invention.

Snow from five to 20 feet deep is no novelty in some parts of southern Colorado, but it was a terrific handicap to census enumerators.

For instance, John Henschel, district supervisor at Glenwood, had to drive more than 200 miles to reach Walden, only 35 miles away, by ski. Henschel couldn't use skis because of a hip injury.

At Durango, Howard Davis and Jack Price decided to do something about the situation. They constructed a "snowmobile" by adding ski runners, two in front and one behind, to a plane without wings.

"The thing will go up the side of a mountain at a 45-degree angle and it's almost impossible to overturn," says George Dwir, Colorado census supervisor, who had a ride in it.

"It will go 80 miles an hour on snow and 120 on ice. When it strikes a boulder of a tree stump it hurls them. They seem to do no damage, although the edges of the propeller have been slightly frayed by striking tree limbs."

The snowmobile usually follows snow-blogged roads, many of which are impassable for automobiles in early spring, but it frequently cut across country.

Paint-Stained Seats May Be Made Like New

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—(AP)—Each chair seat, in their natural color, are sooty beautiful. They stand well with any other color in a room and they're being shown a great deal in the better furniture shops.

But perhaps you've fallen heir to some rush-bottomed chairs that have been painted or varnished. Maybe you have painted them over yourself—it need to be done, to save wear and tear on the rush. If you'd like to restore them to their natural beauty, don't despair, it can be done.

First, tape the chair frame around the rush seats, to protect the wood, then apply a coat of flat white paint to the rush and let it dry a least twenty-four hours. Wipe the paint well into the rush as you go along, using a moderately stiff brush that's not too large. Give it a second coat of the flat white, possibly a third one to insure a good working surface. This is important, if you want good results. And be sure to let it dry thoroughly each time!

From a tube of burnt umber oil paint squeeze a small quantity into a small jar, with some thinner and mix well. Take a clean brush and wash this color over a small part of a board that is painted white, just to try out the color. If it is too dark, add more thinner, until it is just right after painting.

When your brown mixture is right, wash it over the chair seat, being careful to cover all the white. Work quickly. When the surface is just damp, but not dry
