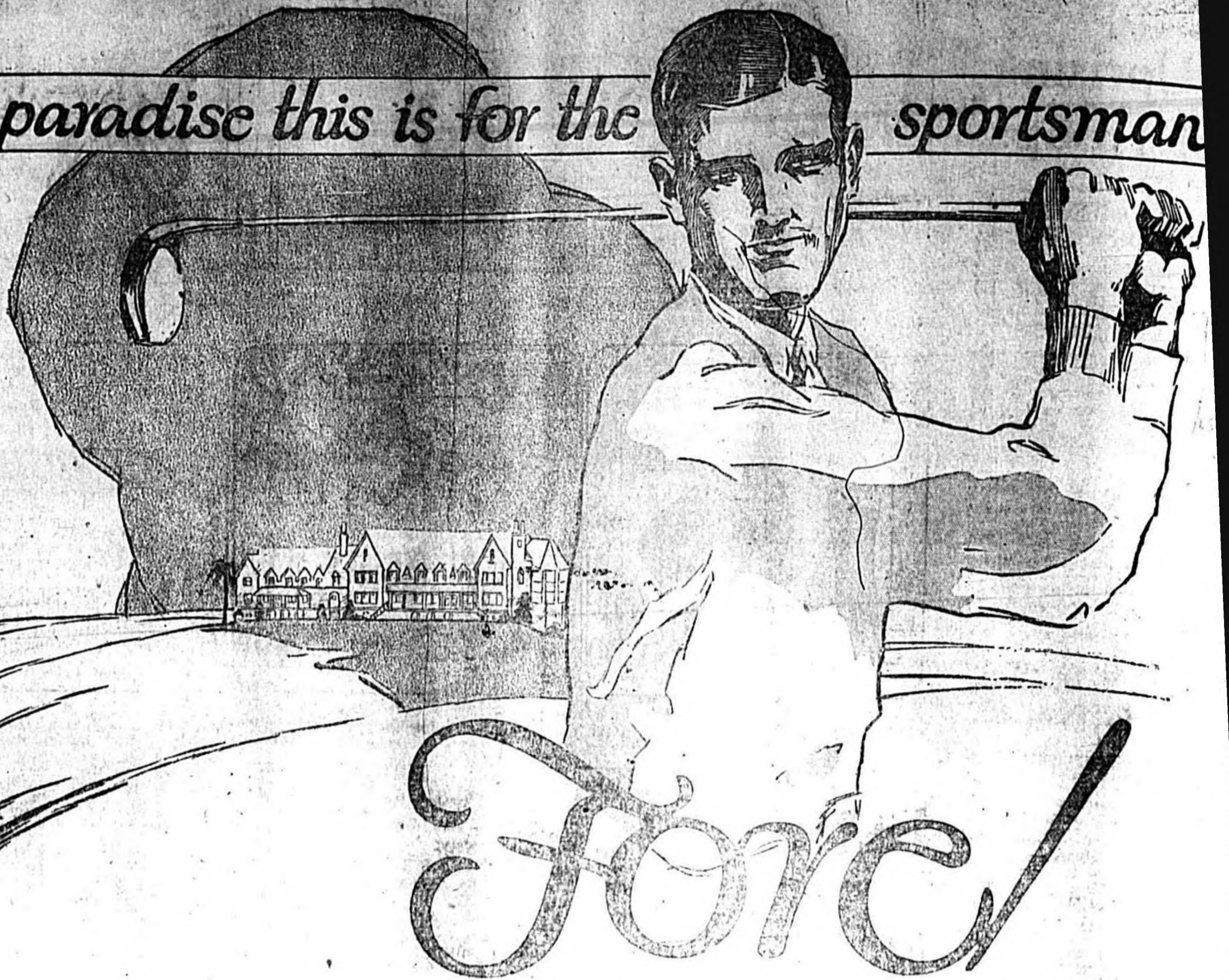

He didn't sit on the wall, and up to the present time at least some of the King's men have been able to put him together again, but if there is anything in a fall making men or things similar, Humpty-dumpty and the Prince of Wales are alike as two peas in a pod.

The Prince of Wales is the Humpty-dumpty of the Twentieth Century. He is the Prince of Falls. He is all-time all-English head-over-heels tumbler. A few days ago the Prince while hunting at Melton Mowbray had just cleared a jump when his horse fell dead. The Prince picked up a few bruises but remounted another horse and continued the hunt. On the very next day he suffered another fall in which he broke his collar bone.

No doubt the cries which will now be emitted by the English press against the Prince's equestrian activities will be both voluminous and terrific. This is the fifteenth time he has fallen and the second time the horse broken his collar bone since 1920. Much will be said about the succession to the throne, rights of the English people, and marrying and settling down. Gray haired chancellors of one thing or another will probably urge that the Prince confine his sports to the stick horse or the chess board.

But in this country we think the tendency will be rather to admire the man who continues to follow the hounds when he seems to be pursued by somewhat unusual ill luck. If the Prince wants to die with his boots on, more power to him. That is as good a way as any. Besides he may not die. Buffalo Bill lived to a ripe old age and he bit the dirt from the back of many a bronco. Even if the Prince should break his neck as a fitting culmination to one of his nose dives, one of his brothers would probably look just as well as the Prince in the receiving line at Buckingham Palace and that's about all an English king has to do anyway.

And we don't think the Prince is a poor horseman either. Fifteen falls in five years is not so bad for anyone who rides as much as the Prince does. Besides who wouldn't fall, if his horse dropped dead beneath him?

Sanford doesn't need the metropolitan speculation with its migratory ways as much as it needs men who will come here to assist in this community's development, men who are prepared to further this county's reputation as the greatest producing section of the South.

And the benefits that will come from the delegates' trip here are not confined to the agricultural sphere. Representatives from industrial sections were visibly impressed with Sanford's strategic location and attractive factory sites. Visitors with an eye trained for commercial activity were quick to appreciate Sanford's inland harbor position and its possibilities as a distributing point for a wide area.

The entertainment accorded the journalists here yesterday was a success and those Sanford business men who neglected their businesses to greet Sanford and Seminole county to the visitors are deserving of much credit and recognition for the way the matter was handled. Visitors to this community cannot be very favorably impressed even with our conspicuous evidences of prosperity unless these advantages are intelligently presented and described. J. G. Ball and his committee did their work well.

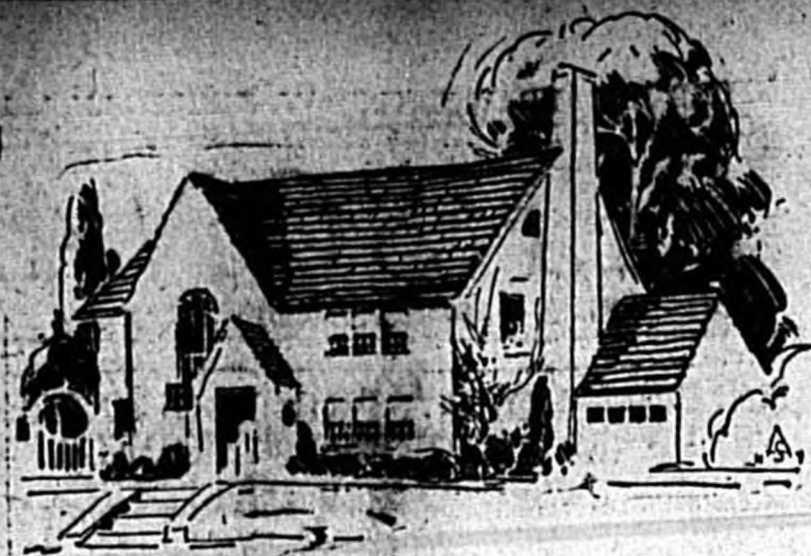

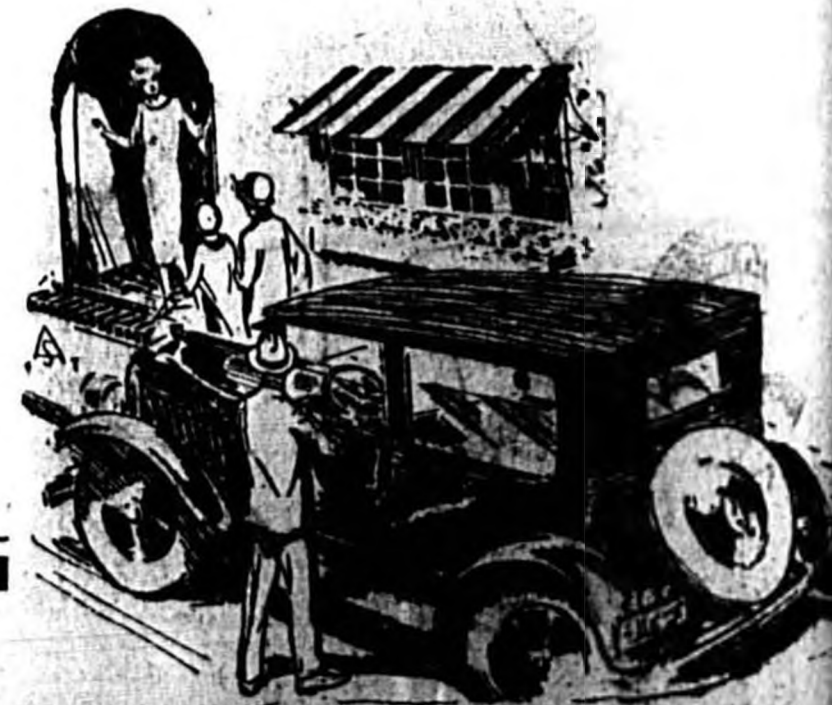

Dr. Harold Pender, dean of the Moore School of Electrical Engineering, said that in collaboration with Dr. J. H. Muller, assistant professor of chemistry, he had perfected a new noninductive, high resistance, filament to take the place of impregnated paper used widely in a grid leak.

These filaments are mounted in glass tubes. A coating of metal a thousandth of an inch thick upon a glass core gives a grid leak of uniform resistance which does not vary with weather conditions, whereas the impregnated grid leak varies as much as 100 per cent, throwing the receiving set out of perfect adjustment.

A well adjusted grid leak prevents the tubes from "spilling over" draining off the static charge gradually and without noise.

Coast guardmen stationed at the picked boat house at Sandy Hook complain that their wives are frequently insulted on their way to the stores at Atlantic Highlands, N. J. Other coast guardmen from base 2 on Staten Island have been deliberately assaulted ashore. At New London, Conn., a coast guard sailor was murdered in cold blood. His slayer has never been apprehended.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 3.—Material improvement in the congested condition of freight traffic on all railroads in Florida was reported today in the meeting here of the Florida division of the southeast advisory board of the American Railway Association. Nearly 500 hundred shippers, receivers of freight and railroad men were in attendance. Conditions, while not back to normal, are rapidly approaching the pre-embargo state, various terminal district men reported.

M. J. Gormley, chairman of the car service division of the American Railway Association, told the meeting that the railroads have virtually cleared up all congestion at Jacksonville, where a few months ago more than 7,000 cars jammed the yards, and northward. "It is clearing," he said, "but that does not mean the embargo will be lifted. The best way to keep the tracks clear is to keep the embargo in effect, for the time being at least." Requirements for February for receivers in the state were estimated by terminal district chairmen at 65,000 carloads of construction materials, of which 17,000 carloads would be moved within the state. This left 48,000 carloads under embargo railings and the railroad officials expected to move between 40 and 50 per cent of this amount during the month.

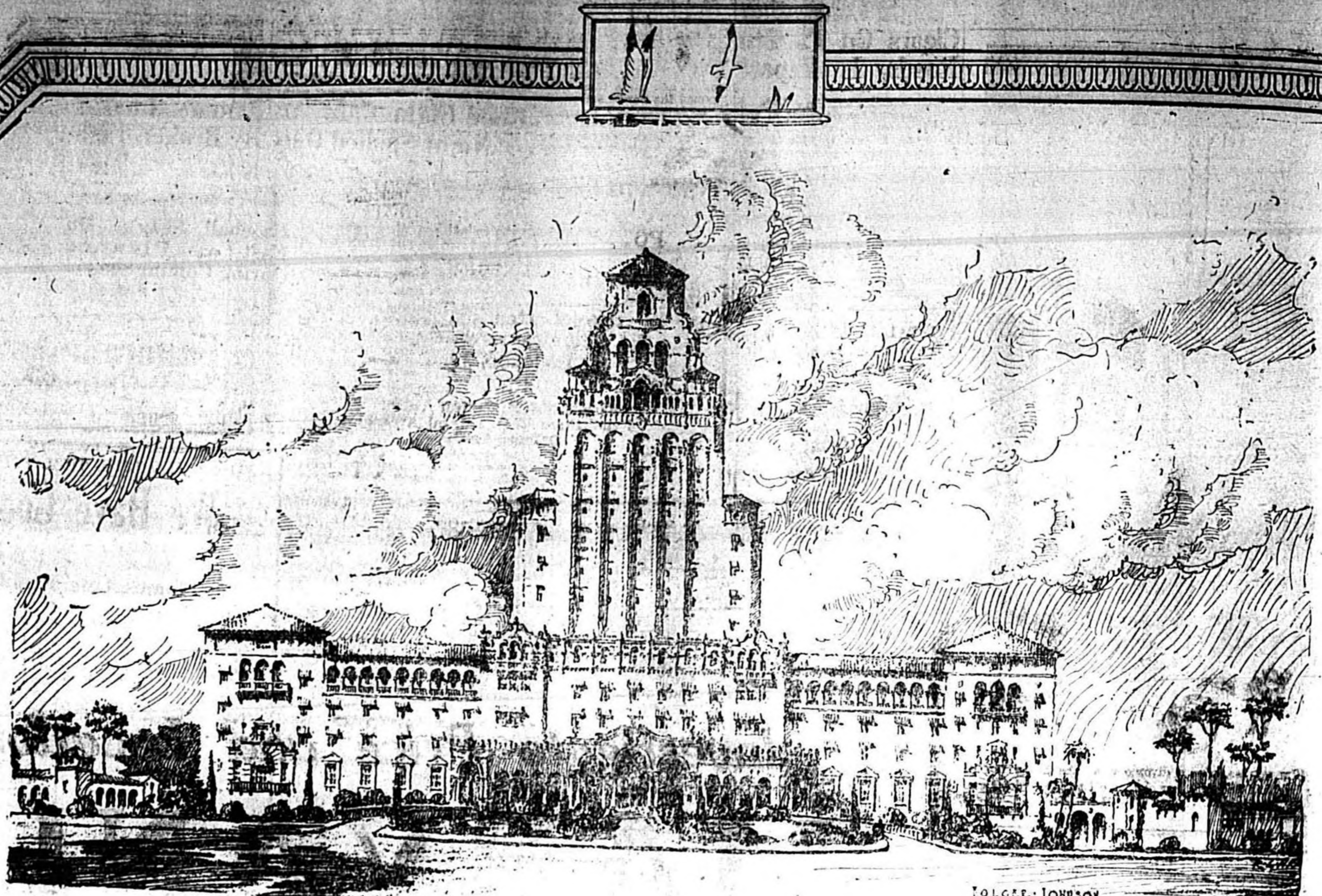

Dempsey Says Fight With Wills Planned

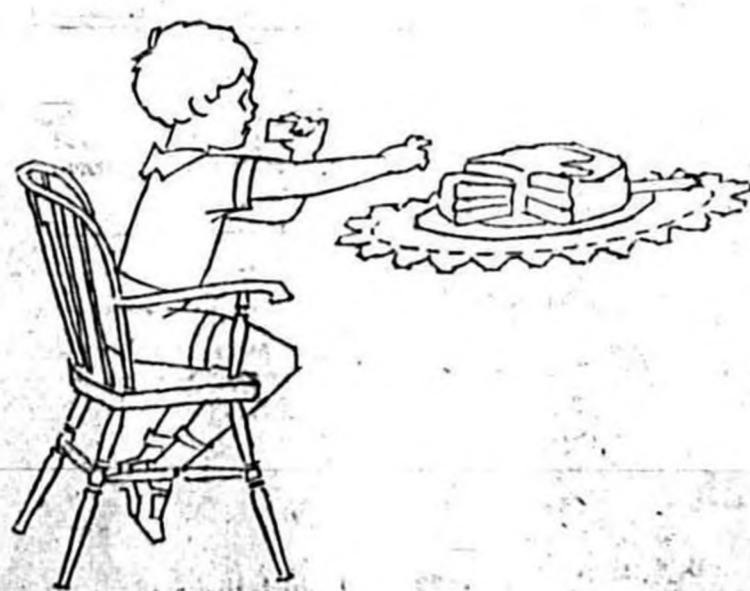

MARS SPEEDING AT RAPID SPEED TOWARD EARTH

Huge Planet Will Travel Many
Millions Of Miles During
Month And Will Be So Close
To Outshine Rival Antares

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. (AP)—Mars will travel 22 million miles toward the earth during February—almost a million miles a day—and by April 1, will be neighborly enough to outshine his rival Antares. Even then it will be one hundred and sixty-six million miles away.

A bulletin by the American Nature Association also brings out the origin of "Dog Days" heard about in summer. Canis Major, meaning Greater Dog, is the name of the constellation following immediately after Orion and visible in the southeast in the early evening hours of February. To the northeast of Canis Major and not far distant is Canis Minor, The Lesser Dog. These two constellations represent the two hounds that follow close on the heels of Orion as he strides across the heavens facing Taurus, The Bull.

Sirius and Procyon, the brightest stars of these two constellations, often are called the Dog Star. Canis Minor is a very inconspicuous constellation. Canis Major however, contains in addition to Sirius, the brightest of all the stars in the heavens, four stars of the second magnitude and two of the first magnitude. Sirius is known to the Egyptians as the Nile Star and was an object of worship. As it then rose with the sun at the summer solstice, just before the annual overflow of the Nile, its influence was believed to be very favorable to agriculture. Among the Greeks and Romans it was looked upon with disfavor because it rose with the sun during the torrid heat of summer and to its influence was attributed all the evils of that season.

The unhealthy summer period in Italy, from early in July until well into August, received its name of the "Dog Days" from the supposed evil influence of the Dog Star, and even down to the present time this name for the torrid days of mid-summer has persisted.

CHURCH BOARD MEETS

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 3.—(AP)—The Board of Missions, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened Tuesday at Methodist headquarters, indications that an additional \$1,000,000 asked for missions was in sight. This is the first special session ever held by the board, the business being to fix the annual budget for missions.

Southwest's Greatest Barbecue Is Being Prepared For Doctors Meet

DALLAS, Tex., Feb. 3 (AP)—The fatted calves now are being prepared for the Southwest's greatest barbecue which will be served members of the American Medical Association at its national convention here in April. Seven tons of meat to feed 10,000 doctors is to be prepared. Out on the Staked Plains of Texas 80 pure blooded heaves are being nursed and fed a diet that will turn them into the most succulent of steaks. Down on a farm in Navarro county 29 cords of hickory and pecan wood is being seasoned for the fire over which the meat will be cooked. This wood gives the beef a much desired flavor. From his herd of 2,000, Dr. John H. Dean of Dallas, has selected 80 cows and calves and has turned them into a separate pasture where the grass is knee deep. The calves will not be weaned, because the milk is adding to the succulence of the meat. Their mothers are being fed sorghum and cottonseed cake, and by the time the baby heaves are dressed it is expected they will weigh 600 pounds each. Ten days before the date of the barbecue, April 20, the calves will be shipped to Dallas, slaughtered and placed at once in cold storage. The meat will be cooked in especially constructed pits at Fair Park, and an expert staff of barbecue chefs, aided by 10 carvers and 80 waiters, will cook and serve the meat.

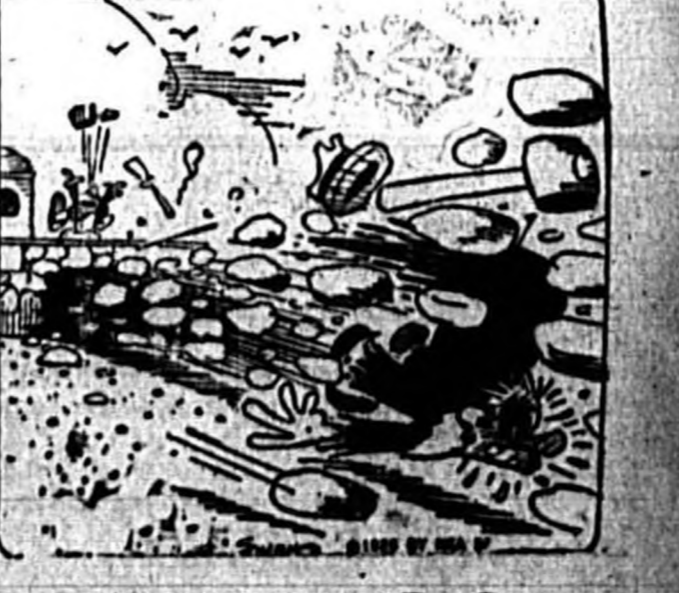

Revona Park, occupying a full square in the southeastern part of Highland Park, is to be the social and recreational center, with club house, courts for tennis, croquet and bowling on the green, and along all the drives the planting will be under the direction of one mind, with all its artistic effects worked out in harmony and beauty.

PLAN FOR DIXIE FARM AID GIVEN AT CONVENTION

J. S. Wannamaker, President American Cotton Association, Urges Cotton Acreage Reduction Of 15 Per Cent

More Food, Forage Crops Are Suggested

Keynote Address Delivered At Annual Meet Of Body In Session At Memphis

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 4.—(AP)—An increase of 15 per cent in food, feed, and forage crops, and a similar decrease in cotton acreage, was urged Wednesday by J. S. Wannamaker, president of the American Cotton Association, as a program essential to the welfare of the Southern farmer, and outlined a plan of campaign proposed to bring about a reduced cotton acreage during the coming crop year.

Mr. Wannamaker, delivering the keynote address at the opening session yesterday of the South Cotton acreage reduction convention here, told delegates to the convention that cotton acreage must be cut at least 15 per cent if the Southern farmer is to prosper.

Under the plan outlined by Mr. Wannamaker, campaigns to insure an increased food and feed crops and decrease in cotton acreage will be placed in the hands of the state commissioners of agriculture, extension officials, bankers' committees and representatives of the American Cotton Association in the various states.

"All who realize the paramount importance of this campaign to the cotton farmer and economic life of the entire South will cooperate and push the work to a successful conclusion," Mr. Wannamaker said, "urging that cotton today is selling below the cost of production. We should immediately set steps to organize the cotton producing industry of the entire South, so as to stabilize profits along these lines. It is only in this way that permanent prosperity can be brought to the South and the entire nation benefited. If this is not done the cotton producer is doomed to sink to a lower standard of living."

Records of thirty years give proof he declared that every effort on the part of the Southern farmer to increase food, feed, and forage output, and other money crops in lieu of cotton, have resulted in higher cotton prices.

No National Policy

"We have been without national agricultural policy and agricultural legislation has been without adequate representation at the national capital practically since the War between the States," Mr. Wannamaker said, "urging that the Southern farmer should bestir himself to work out his own program."

He declared that relief through national legislation could come only through correlation of the South and the West.

Control of food, feed, forage and cotton acreage under the provisions of joint committees or boards to be made possible by uniform legislation in the various cotton states was offered by Mr. Wannamaker as a means to bring relief to the agricultural interests in the South, and urged as a further move for the betterment of the farmer, that the government exercise such state within the cotton belt name a special cotton committee of six men to study the problem and jointly prepare uniform legislation.

Freight Unloaded At Local Water Front In January Totals Over 7,000 Tons

Approximately 7,000 tons of freight were delivered to Sanford by water during the month of January, according to figures compiled today from the estimates given out by the St. Johns Transportation Company and the Clyde Line Company. The former reports an average tonnage brought in of 6,400 while the Clyde Line estimates its unloaded freight at 1,600 tons. Other smaller companies, including boat owners brought in about 100 tons, it is said.

G. F. Tresher, of the St. Johns Transportation Company, stated today that within the next few months his company contemplated many improvements and enlargements of their service, and that with the completion of the new dock a great amount of tonnage could easily be handled.

He said that the company is planning to handle at least 10,000 tons per month in the immediate future.

Much of the freight now being unloaded here is for building interest in this city and in Orlando. A fleet of 15 trucks is operating for the company between this city and Orlando, daily, carrying steel girders and other materials which are necessary to complete many projects in Orlando by spring.

Embargo Effects Lessened

While the City of Sanford has been handicapped by the freight embargo to a certain extent, city officials and prominent builders state that the existing facilities for receiving freight by water at this point have aided the local building programs to keep far ahead of those programs of inland cities not so fortunately located as regards water transportation.

The city is at present planning the new dock in connection with the establishment of other barges on the river by the Tresher Brothers, who hope to soon have a large fleet operating between Sanford and Jacksonville.

Orders are being received daily from inland cities within a radius of many miles for freight deliveries from this point. Permits to use the new dock will be confined strictly to local interests while outside freight receivers will be carried for by existing docks, it is believed.

Two Versions Of 'College Liquor Party' Revealed

Missouri Football Star Is Suspended With Other Students After Dinner Ends In Alleged Attack On Girl

COLUMBIA, Mo., Feb. 4.—(AP)—Suspension of Harry N. (Pet) Jackson, star quarterback of the University of Missouri football team, as the result of an alleged liquor party at a boarding house attended by several co-eds, today had developed two versions of the affair.

Denial was made by Jackson that he had made improper advances to one of the girls, as stated by Dr. A. H. Heckel, dean of men, at a press conference at 11 o'clock Monday night where he is employed by a mining company. Jackson said he believed the girl would clear him if she were questioned and declared that Dr. Heckel's action in suspending him followed his refusal to give the names of the other members of the party. On the other hand, Dean Heckel said yesterday in announcing the result of this investigation that the girl herself was the complainant and that her charges had been found true.

Ladly Made Complaint

Jackson expressed the belief that a boarding house landlord made the complaint against him under the impression he had made unwelcome advances to the girl. She heard two girls, who had attended the party, shouting his name about the house, he said.

The football star said he remained at the party only 10 minutes, on finding that it was unwhispered and that liquor was being drunk.

Dean Heckel said the girl told him she was out riding with Jackson and upon passing a house that was lighted he proposed that they go in.

While in there Jackson attempted to attack her, she said. She fled to the motor car, followed by Jackson, who attempted to follow her. Her complaint followed. Two co-eds and a man student were suspended along with Jackson.

Dean Heckel said he believed the affair would aid in stamping out liquor at the university. He declared Missouri was no worse than any other institution.

Extensive Repairs Finished, Princess Reopens Monday

With the reopening of the Princess Theater Monday following remodeling operations completed at a cost of \$33,000, the Florida Enterprise, Inc., will inaugurate an improved theater service here that will shortly result in bringing to Sanford some of the best screen productions and musical comedies in Southern circles, according to J. L. Marenco, manager of the Princess Theater.

Upon the delivery of the new \$20,000 Wurlitzer combination organ and unit orchestra now in operation at the Princess, the organ formerly in use there has been installed in the Princess. Mr. Marenco said today, and continuous from 11 to 11:30 p.m., Sunday, will be observed at both houses.

Many improvements have been made in the Princess, including the installation of new chairs increasing its seating capacity to 700.

Negotiations are now under way with several large stock companies, Mr. Marenco said this morning, and it is believed that several of them will be booked for February and March.

Bill Provides No Increase In Size Of Army

Expenditures Of More Than \$39,581,000 Recommended, Which Is About A Million More Than Budget Estimate

Last Year's Expense Topped By 6 Millions

Number Of Non-Commissioned Officers And First Class Privates Would Be Reduced

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—The War Department appropriation bill, calling for an army of 118,683 enlisted men and 11,740 officers, or approximately the existing strength, was reported today by the House.

It recommends expenditures during the next fiscal year totaling \$39,581,000 or \$1,087,000 above budget estimates. This represents an increase of \$3,000,000 over last year's appropriation and makes the first instance during the present Congress where budget estimates have been exceeded.

Of the total amount, military activities would be given \$201,081,000 or an increase of \$1,223,000 above budget figures. Non-military activities would receive \$78,500,000 an increase of \$5,741,000 over current funds, and 223,000 above the budget.

Funds directly provided for the army would be expended as follows:

For the air service, \$15,250,000, an increase of \$345,000 over current figures. An authorization to conduct for \$3,000,000 additional expenditures would be provided.

Of the total \$7,604,000, or an increase of \$704,000, would be for new equipment.

The bill would provide for a reduction in the number of non-commissioned officers and first class privates in order to effect a saving of \$908,000. The appropriations sub-committee, which drafted the bill, said this reduction would be brought about by failure to fill such vacancies when they occurred.

A total of \$5,500,000 would be for the procurement of ammunition and other supplies to build up the reserve corps on hand.

Chamber Commerce Members Conduct Complete Program For The Delegation

Motorcade Through Fields Emphasizes Solidity Of Sanford

A delegation composed of about 200 citizens of Knoxville and eastern Tennessee cities arrived in Sanford this morning at 9 o'clock and were met at the station by the entertainment committee of the Chamber of Commerce, which took charge of the party for a morning of sight-seeing in the city and surrounding territory.

Included in the party was a 60-piece high school band from Knoxville which provided music along the line of march followed by the Chamber of Commerce motorcade, to the Hotel Forrest Lake.

Presented Celery at Depot

The morning's program began at the station when the tourists were presented with a large bunch of celery, a bouquet from the city of Sanford, as one citizen remarked, and were welcomed by Mayor Forrest Lake.

After inspecting the hotel, the party was loaded into machines and carried over the city and shown the many points of interest which Sanford boasts. The water front and shipping facilities are said to have made a strong appeal to the visitors who were happy to say that no other section of the state, which they have visited thus far, has shown the possibilities that exist here.

Following the tour within the city limits the long line of cars turned toward the outskirt and within a short time was amid the crops and trucking activity surrounding the city proper.

Much enthusiasm was shown by the members of the party when they came in sight of the fields of celery extending on every side. Some of the visitors were visibly impressed by the spectacle of such intensive cultivation in this region, and one prominent member of the party stated that the Sanford district was without a doubt one of the greatest areas in the world for the production of a vegetable and celery in the last few years, and have become well acquainted with your slogan, "The City Suburbia, Sanford, a substantial city and your back country is probably the richest and the most intensively cultivated in the entire United States. Sanford reaches heights in the future of which all little dreams today."

Among the visitors was Alf Taylor, former governor of the state of Tennessee, who expressed himself as being delighted with Sanford and its people.

The party in charge of General Carl F. Spence, of Knoxville, left here at noon to continue its way to the west coast and back to Knoxville Sunday afternoon.

Brick Wall Falls, Killing Seven Men

NEW BRITAIN, Conn., Feb. 4.—(AP)—Six men are known to have been crushed to death, 11 others, some in a serious condition, are at the New Britain General Hospital, and 10 were unaccounted for as the result of a collapse of a brick wall at the foundry of North and Judd Manufacturing Co., at East Main Street shortly before noon today.

The dead were not identified. It was first thought that the wall was raised by an explosion in the foundry. This theory has been abandoned and it is now believed the building collapsed because of the weight of snow on the roof.

Burned Body Of Woman Is Found In Home Furnace

George Solomon, 73, Held For Further Questioning When Police Are Informed That Body Was Wedged In Door

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 4.—(AP)—Burned almost beyond recognition, the body of Mrs. George Solomon, 47 years old, and the mother of nine children, was found wedged in the furnace door of her home here last night.

The two oldest sons asked police to take into custody their 73-year-old father, Solomon, at first maintained that his wife was away visiting friends, but finally asserted that she had been burned in adjusting the furnace door.

No formal charges have been placed against him but the police planned to subject him to a lengthy interrogation when they arrived. Physicians said today the mother died of asphyxiation from the furnace fumes. The face and shoulders were charred.

Some noon yesterday, children told the police, the father had argued their inquiry regarding their mother's whereabouts, and when she was at a friend's home. When the older boys came home from work he told them the same story.

Sons Hear Death Story

Nearly eight hours after the time the father fixed up his wife's body, the boys came to the house. The older sons, were preparing to leave home for the evening. Solomon called them and said he had something to tell them. He said their mother had gone into the basement about 11 o'clock to fix the furnace, but the drafts had not been properly adjusted and a puff of flame enveloped her as she opened the door and burned her to death.

Hurrying into the basement, the boys found their mother wedged into the open door nearly to the waist. When the father did not answer, the boys came to be in such a position, the sons called the police. The children said their parents had quarreled considerably lately. Younger ones said when they came home from school at noon for lunch their father told them "Mother is away."

The police said they were not satisfied with Solomon's explanation and would place some charges against him if necessary to hold him for questioning.
