Engineer Exhibit On Display In Mt. Dora On Friday

MOUNT DORA, Apr. 11, (Special)—The U. S. Army Engineers will have a complete exhibit of projects construction in Florida including hyacinth control at the meeting of the Florida Waterway Congress in the Community Building at Mount Dora tomorrow.

The Engineers exhibit which will occupy a space 20 by 25 feet is made available by courtesy of Col. A. B. Jones, of Jacksonville.

A remarkably interesting sound motion picture of the atomic bomb tests made in New Mexico and at Hiroshima and Nagasaki will be shown Friday morning at the Congress following the address of Col. Herbert C. Ge., Washington, D. C. of the U. S. Army Atomic Research, who speaks on "The Coming Pacific Atomic Bombing Test."

Among the other distinguished speakers at the congress will be Brig. Gen. James B. Newman, Jr., Atlanta, Division Engineer, U. S. Army, Col. Mark M. Boatner, Jr., New Orleans and Col. A. B. Jones, Jacksonville, Florida, District Engineer, Congressman J. Sardin Peterson and Joseph E. Hendricks, Maj. Gen. Sanderford Jarman of Pensacola, Walter F. Coachman, Jr., Jacksonville, Chairman of the Florida Waterway Congress, H. C. Brown, Clermont, Vice Chairman, Stanley Kitching of Stuart, Col. C. Russell Mayo, Sarasota.

Delegations will be in attendance from more than 30 cities representing every major waterway project in the state.

The sessions of the congress are open to the public but reservations for the luncheon must be made in advance with the secretary of the Congress, Karl Lehmann, Tavares.

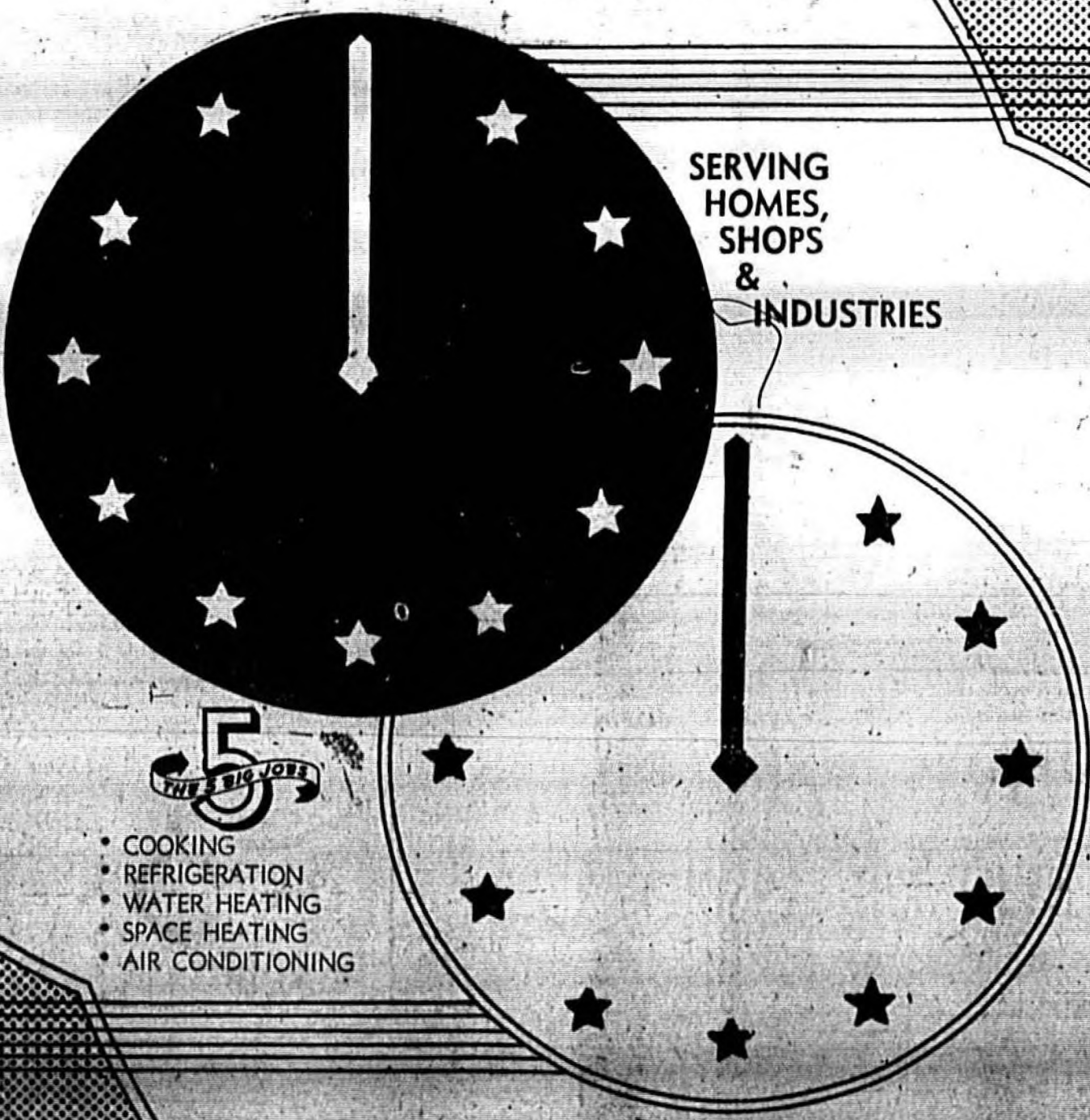

Effort Underway To Avoid Walkout Of Sugar Employees

Coal Miners' Strike Is Felt In Europe; Harvester Workers Ratify Agreement

Labor conciliators this afternoon were making a final effort to avert the scheduled strike of 8,000 AF of L and CIO sugar refinery workers on the east coast at midnight tomorrow. Meanwhile, the effect of the coal strike in the United States is being felt in Europe. The UNRRA director for Italy, Spurgeon J. Keeny, has requested an early meeting of the European commission to consider an emergency situation. Keeny said this emergency is growing out of John L. Lewis' coal strike. Keeny hopes to get an additional allocation of coal from the Ruhr to replace American fuel. The Italian government has issued emergency decrees to control fuel consumption. In Chicago this afternoon, the National Harvester Council of the C.I.O., United Farm Equipment and Rural Workers ratified an agreement to end the international harvester company strike. The council called ratification meetings of rank and file workers. Thirty thousand employees have been out in ten plants since Jan. 21. Federal conciliators in the schedule sugar strike arranged a conference with the unions and the American Sugar Refining Company in New York for this afternoon. They scheduled a stop at Boston tomorrow between the unions and representatives of the American and the Reverse Sugar Refining Company. The conciliators also are seeking to bring together union spokesmen and representatives of the American National Refining Companies in Philadelphia tomorrow. A fact-finding panel named to study the wage dispute will open hearings in Washington on Tuesday.

Waterway Congress Approves Plan For Legislative Group

MOUNT DORA, Apr. 12. (AP)—Directors of the Florida Waterway Congress have approved a proposal to create an "all-Florida legislative committee." The committee will be made up of one representative from each federally authorized river and harbor or flood control project in Florida. This plan was presented by Major General Sandford Jarman of Pensacola, who is retired from the United States Army. The recommendation that the new group be formed is included in a resolution adopted at a round table conference of representatives of federally authorized Florida waterway projects. The conference was a forerunner of general sessions of the Florida Waterway Congress scheduled at Mount Dora today. The new group will try to see that all approved Florida projects be completed as soon as possible and will also make an effort to get other projects approved by the Federal government. The new committee will hold two meetings a year in Florida.

Canadian Wants West Indies As Security

OTTAWA, April 12. (AP)—A member of the Canadian Parliament has suggested that the United Kingdom put up the British West Indies in security for a proposed Canadian loan of \$1,000,000,000 loan by the London Government. The member is Jean Francois Pouliot from French-speaking Quebec. Pouliot points out that Canada has not had a general climate. He suggests the Canadians should put in their claim for the British West Indies as a guarantee for what Canada is doing for the United Kingdom financially.

PROGRAM APPROVED

WASHINGTON, Apr. 12. (AP)—The Senate has approved a 25-year program for trade relations with the Philippines after the island becomes a republic on July 4. The measure now goes back to the House for action on some changes. The only major change is Senate approval of a 25-year period. It is now 20 years. The measure is sponsored by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

PAULKY OKAYED

WASHINGTON, Apr. 12. (AP)—The Senate today confirmed William D. Paulky of Florida to be ambassador to Brazil. Approval was by voice vote without objection.

Conservatives Get Majority Of Jap Votes

Coalition In House Of Representatives Will Be Dominated By Liberal Group

TOKYO, Apr. 12. (AP)—Japanese conservatives apparently have clinched a majority of the vote in the first post-war election in Japan. Final returns are in from a but six districts in the nation wide election. On the basis of these returns it appears that the so-called Liberal Party, which is the conservative group, will dominate the coalition in the Japanese House of Representatives. Election returns today give the Conservative group 145 seats in the House. The Progressives have 88; the Social Democrats 78, and the Communists three, with three more Communists apparently certain of victory when the returns are complete. Minor parties got 30 seats in the Japanese House of Representatives and Independent won 72 places. This line-up means a coalition in the House, which will be dominated by a conservative viewpoint. Many Social Democrats and probably most of the Independents fall into this category in Japan. The Socialists, however, showed surprising strength in the election. With most of the returns in Japanese women who were allowed to vote for the first time in history, won 32 seats in the House of Representatives. Thirty-three members of the 1942 "Tojo Diet" definitely were re-elected to office in the election. Forty other former members of the House of Representatives were also re-elected. All of the election candidates will be re-examined by the Allied occupation authorities before they will be allowed to assume their offices.

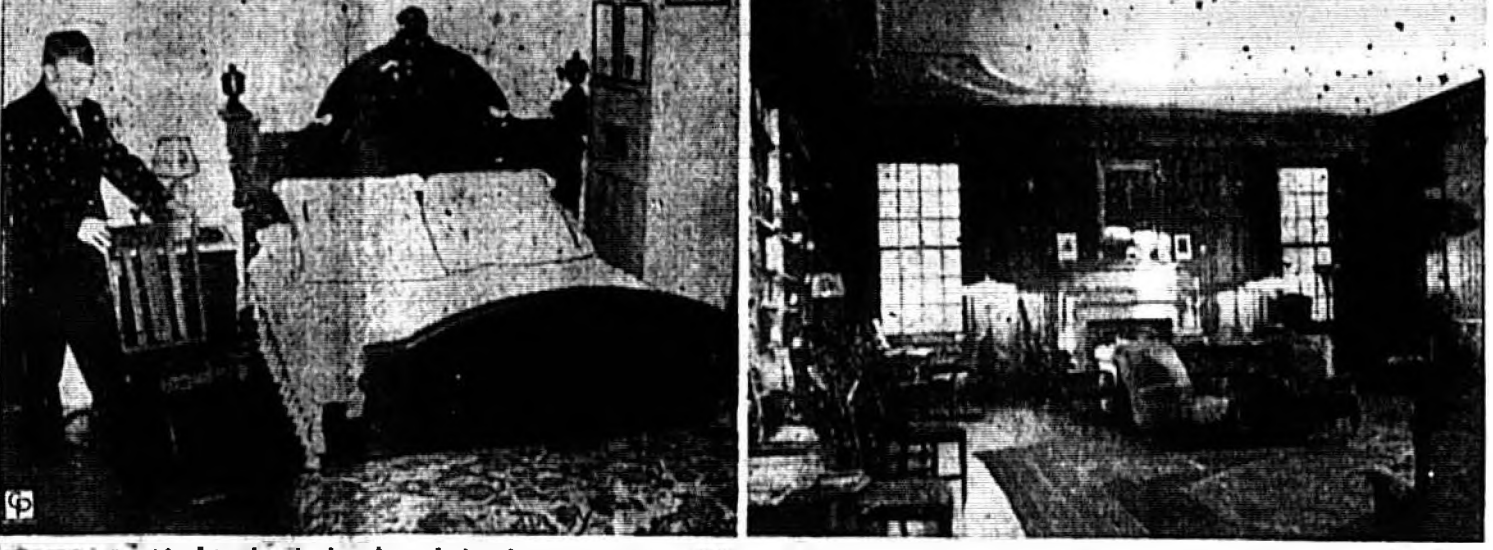

Truman Vows He Will Carry On F.D.R.'s Fight Against Tyranny

F. D.R.'s Hyde Park Mansion Dedicated Today as National Site

CEREMONIES formally dedicating to the nation the home of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt as a national historic site are being held today at Hyde Park, N. Y., to commemorate the first anniversary of the president's death. The estate is under the jurisdiction of the Interior Department and open to the public for inspection.

President Dedicates Roosevelt Estate As National Shrine During Ceremonies

HYDE PARK, Apr. 12. (AP)—President Truman solemnly vowed today that he will carry on Franklin D. Roosevelt's battle against tyranny. He pledged himself to continue the new deal of his predecessor, with emphasis on its progressive and humane principles. Mr. Truman's promise to follow in the footsteps of the late President Roosevelt, both at home and in world affairs, was given at ceremonies dedicating the Roosevelt Hyde Park estate as a national shrine. Speaking on the first anniversary of Mr. Roosevelt's death, President Truman said: "May almighty God, who has watched over this republic, give us from weakness to strength, give us the wisdom to follow in the way of Franklin D. Roosevelt." Mr. Truman declared that those who have survived President Roosevelt in the conduct of government can best pay homage to his memory by their deeds. He pointed out that Mr. Roosevelt's foreign policy represented America's solemn duty toward nations which have been weakened in the death struggle against tyranny. Mr. Truman said we are determined to fight with all our strength for these principles of international cooperation. President Truman, discussing domestic policy said Mr. Roosevelt's program organized the government for the benefit of a country for all the people. He linked the new deal to the principles of the Roosevelt program. Mr. Truman declared that these very same principles apply to legislation assuring full production, full employment, a healthy program, Social Security, an educational program, a veterans emergency housing program and a long-range program to provide homes for all Americans. Plain people all over the world, said Mr. Truman, recognize that it was largely because of Mr. Roosevelt that civilization has survived. Only history can add to the President Roosevelt full justice. Mr. Truman said that the people President Roosevelt loved will visit the Hyde Park Shrine. He expressed the hope that Mr. Roosevelt may forever share with these visitors something of his timeless qualities—his contemplative vitality, gallant courage and his infinite compassion. Mr. Truman flew from Washington to West Point, N. Y., and then to Hyde Park for the ceremony.

Price Ceilings On Citrus Fruit To Be Increased

WASHINGTON, Apr. 12. (AP)—The Office of Price Administration today disclosed that the ceilings on oranges, lemons and tangerines will be increased slightly next week. The official, however, asked that his name not be used. Meanwhile, the OPA has removed price controls from Florida's strawberry and raspberry crops. The price controls were lifted after the Department of Agriculture estimated this year's strawberry crop will be 45 to 50 percent larger than last year's. The OPA said this will tend to bring available supplies nearer into balance with demand. The official announcement of the ceiling hike on oranges, tangerines and lemons, said that the increase at the retail level would be only a fraction of a cent a pound. He stated that producers' ceilings would be raised because of a legal requirement calling for price adjustments upwards as farmers' costs increase.

\$82,829 In Land Sales Recorded By County To Dec. 31

A total of \$82,829, representing land sales of County land, foreclosed by the County Commission and sold to the highest bidder at public auction for the period ending December 31, 1945, is reported by O. P. Herndon, county clerk, and values of which were set as required by law, have been distributed and paid over to various agencies, according to Mr. Herndon. Of this amount, the City of Sanford received \$31,694. School received \$26,700 of which the general school fund was given \$11,124 and district funds, \$15,276. Various County funds, said Mr. Herndon, got \$10,569 and \$5,276 went to individual certificate holders. The following other payments were made: to the State, \$863; to Longwood, \$587; to Altamonte Springs, \$500; to Ojeda, \$133; to J. D. Jenkins, county tax collector, \$370 and to Sanford County, tax collector, \$60. Lands sold covered city lots in various communities as well as acreage in the county.

CANNOT VOTE

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 12. (AP)—War veterans who reached voting age while in military service won't have a chance to register after the legal deadline has passed. This is what state's attorney general Tom Watson told the Polk County supervisor of registration. Watson says "it appears" there is no law permitting such registration.

The security police chief, Ernst Kaltenbrunner, wound up his defense with the statement that he had remained as Heinrich Himmler's lieutenant because Kaltenbrunner considered it his duty to stay and fight the wrong after he found out the conditions that existed.

Chicago Arena Filled With Gadgets As Invention Exposition Opens Today

CHICAGO, April 12. (AP)—There may not be a better mouse trap in Chicago today—but there are hundreds of other inventions that may have the world beating a path to the inventors' doors. The world's invention exposition is open again—after an absence of 15 years. The Chicago arena is filled with gadgets. Some of them are designed for easier living, some of them for safety. Some of them appear simply in the name of fancy. All of them give you a bit of a start—when you consider what must go on in the brain of the inventor. If these new contrivances prove practical—what a world we'll be living in the day after tomorrow. We'll have collapsible scissors, sliding fireplace screens and a shopping cart that safely carries both baby and the groceries. When the groceries are stacked on the kitchen shelf, the cart converts to a jumper—and baby gets around over the house, making like a kangaroo. One inventor supplies a grille—padded in the right places to provide feminine—if not downright dangerous—curves. Another contrived a chair in which an invalid can walk, sit or sleep. Still another of the 500 or so exhibitors gives a thought to the harried stenographer—and offers an electric eraser. The prize gadget at the exposition is a rear view mirror—to be attached to your spectacles, so you can see who's approaching from the rear.

Atomic Wars

At the risk of incurring the contempt of the experts who predict that the next war will be so horrible there won't be one, we venture the opinion, horseback though it is, that however terrible the next war is, there will be one and that it won't blow the whole world to smithereens.

One of our earliest childhood recollections, as we determinedly kicked the slats out of our cradle, was overhearing the old folks insist that the awful destructive power of the then modern implements of warfare such as machine guns, the new Springfield '03 rifle, and six-inch and eight-inch coast artillery would prevent another war from ever taking place. Those weapons were just too dangerous. Too many people would get killed.

And then a little later on, after the first World War, we remember how the folks used to say the developments of that war would prevent another. Airplane bombing, which made its appearance in that war and barely scratched the surface, would keep nations from fighting each other because civilian populations would be so exposed! And books were written on the deadly effects of poison gas showing how whole cities would be wiped out with every yzpher; in fact, it was so bad its use was outlawed altogether and scarcely made its appearance at all in this war.

Now we are hearing a good deal about the atomic bomb; and no doubt, it makes a good deal of noise. The folks in Hiroshima or Nagasaki, if they were around to testify, would probably present a pretty good case for outlawing all future wars on account of it and no doubt some of them think if they can think, at all, future improvements will split this old world wide open. In fact, it probably seemed to them that the world did come to an end some time last year.

We have been interested in this new book called "One World or None." It attempts to scare people into organizing one great world government and doing away with all national sovereignty by painting the horrors of the next war. In it, 17 scientists and some other experts are quoted as predicting what the "atomic war" will be like. One present day atomic bomb exploding half a mile over New York City would kill instantly some 300,000 people, and far more destructive bombs will soon be invented.

And furthermore, atomic bombs of the future may be no larger than a Hershey bar. Enough explosive energy can be concealed under a candy counter, one authority says, to blow up everything within the radius of one mile, and any city to be safe from sabotage must be surrounded by a "sanitary area" at least a mile wide. Furthermore, there is no defense against them. Even the most elaborate precautions will not prevent a good proportion of bombs from hitting their targets.

Even so, such warnings are likely to fall upon deaf ears. People won't pay any attention to the experts and the instinct to fight is too great to be overcome by anything resembling a scientific invention. May be atomic bombs will be outlawed, as poisonous gas was, so that the game can go on. Or maybe a counter-attack will be devised so that the bombs will blow up in the face of the fellow who tries to use them.

Anyway, we'll bet they don't prevent wars any more than the invention of gunpowder in 1313 did.

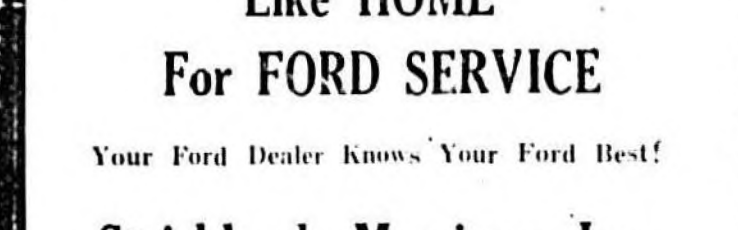

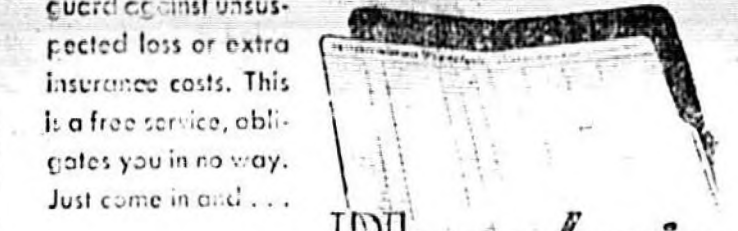

Cuban sugar producers will receive the equivalent of 5.625 cents per pound of sugar against the present 8.996 allowed. Floridian and other American producers recently declared Clarence C. 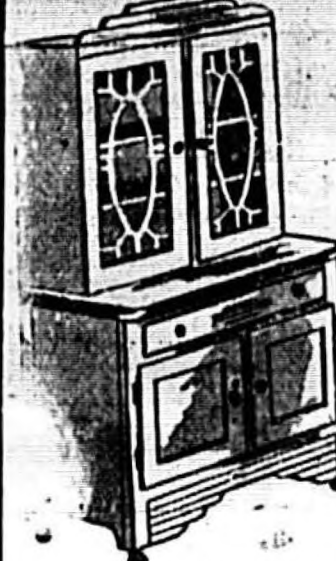

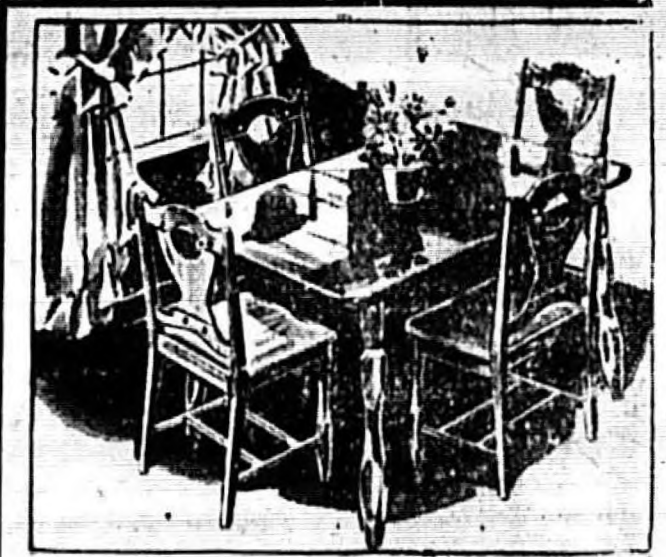

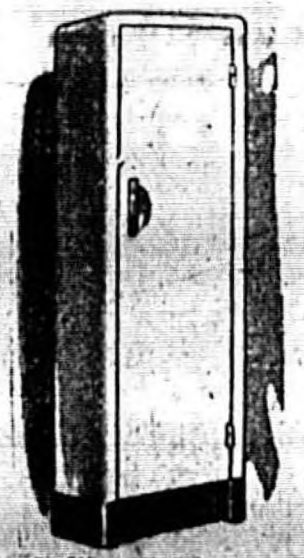

Western Hemisphere Republics Called On To Eradicate Causes Of Conflict

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15. (AP)—President Truman has called on the nations of the western hemisphere to help eradicate the poverty and despair which breed wars. Speaking at a Pan-American Day observance in Washington, Mr. Truman declared that the American republics must stick together and fight what he called "the forces of reaction in the great and dangerous adventure of the atomic age."

WASHINGTON, April 15. (AP)—Republican Senator Edward Robertson of Wyoming criticized the Army today for its activities in behalf of unification of the armed forces. Senator Robertson, a member of the Naval Affairs Committee, declared that the Army is conducting what he described as an intensive lobbying and propaganda campaign for unification.

Voting Rally To Be Held Tonight At Courthouse

Executives and members of women's organizations today urged citizens to attend the voting rally tonight at 7:30 o'clock at the Court House at which A. B. Peterson, former head of the Seminole Price and Rationing Board will speak on the "importance of voting" in the coming election.

RENEWED BID

WASHINGTON, April 15. (AP)—Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles went before the Senate Banking Committee today to renew his bid for an extension of OPA for one year beyond June 30. He said that if price controls are extended, the extreme danger of inflation should be removed by the end of this year. Then, he went on, it will be possible to eliminate price controls by the end of 1947, except where shortages are acute.

Three Japanese Sent To Jail For Killing Airmen

SHANGHAI, Apr. 15. (AP)—Three Japanese officers charged with war crimes in connection with the execution of three Down little airmen in Shanghai in 1942 were sentenced today to serve five years at hard labor. A fourth defendant in the trial was ordered to spend nine years at hard labor in prison. A five-man United States Military Commission which heard the trial explicated the surprisingly light sentences by blaming high Japanese governmental and military officials for the executions.

REPORT DENIED

LONDON, Apr. 15. (AP)—A London newspaper, the Reynolds News, said yesterday that the servants at Buckingham Palace were enrolling in trade unions. Today an official of the national union of domestic workers denied the story, said there wasn't anything to it.

ENROUTE TO CHINA

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15. (AP)—President Truman's special envoy to China, General George Marshall, is on his way back to his post in Chungking, Marshall stopped off in Honolulu en route by air to the Orient and told pressmen he does not know how long he will remain in China.

Native Of Peru Tells Rotarians About Solidarity

The value of Latin American solidarity to the United States during the recent war was emphasized by Herbert Ricketts, a native of Peru and a student at Rollins College, who was the principal speaker at the Rotary luncheon at the Mayfair Hotel today. Mr. Ricketts, who was introduced by George Touhy as the recipient of the American Oratorical Trophy, said that American success in many of the battles overseas depended upon Latin American supplies.

There is not one nation in the Western Hemisphere which can not benefit from the others," Mr. Ricketts said. "There is not one nation which cannot benefit the others; there is not one nation which cannot contribute to the security of the others. The outcome in the recent struggle might have been different if you had had hostile and jealous nations to the south of you, instead of friendly and helpful nations."

Speaking on a program in recognition of Pan American Day, Mr. Ricketts said that April 14 was set aside for the celebration of this occasion since it was on this date in 1890 that the Pan American Union was established in Washington, and since 1931 the date has been observed without failure and with the greatest enthusiasm by all Latin American nations.

Quoting from the words of the late President Roosevelt on April 14, 1945, Mr. Ricketts said, "The maintenance of lasting peace in the Americas is bound to the maintenance of lasting peace throughout the world."

Pointing out that there are some 120,000,000 people in 20 Latin American countries, Mr. Ricketts declared that the love of liberty and democracy is the strongest bond which ties these nations together. It is easier now than ever before to understand Latin America through wider use of the radio, newspapers, magazines and libraries, whose literature on the Latin American nations may be easily obtained.

Remnants Of German Spy Ring Nabbed

Seven Axis Nationals Arrested Following Intensive Search Throughout Orient

SHANGHAI, Apr. 15. (AP)—The remnants of a once-powerful German directed espionage network in the Orient are in American custody today after months of intensive search by United States intelligence officers. Seven Axis nationals have been arrested, all of them described as members of the spy network which operated in the Orient four months after Germany surrendered. All seven — four Germans, two Italians and one Japanese — have been charged with war crimes because of their activities — allegedly hostile to the United States. The seven also are accused of violating the German surrender terms by continuing to operate until as late as last September. American authorities in Shanghai say the arrests mark the culmination of one of the most important roundups of international figures yet concluded in the Far East.
