WASHINGTON, June 12. (AP)—The Navy announced today that work on 22 new 45,000-ton battle-ships and 20 other warships, and auxiliaries last night within an hour after President Roosevelt signed the Navy's \$1,400,000,000 appropriation act. The 22 ships will cost more than \$427,000,000 in complete.

The speed with which the Navy acted found an army counterpart in the measure which authorized the construction of 100 new tanks to be built in the United States and 100 more to be built in England.

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Expenditures in Seminole County through the various federal agencies from May 1, 1934 through June 30, 1939 total \$2,295,281, including both repayable and non-repayable expenditures, according to information contained in a bulletin issued by the Office of Government Reports, Statistical Section.

Other benefits include 221 loans for modernization and improvements insured through the Federal Housing Authority and totalling \$109,941. Also a total of 49 mortgages totalling \$110,400 were accepted by the FHA for insurance, making the total benefits derived in this county from this federal agency \$1,141,441.

Also outside the total of federal expenditures are 60 farm mortgages through the farm debt reduction program of the Farm Security Administration. The total of these mortgages is \$37,979.

The report reveals that the largest expenditure of federal funds for the period is through the Works Project Administration. This agency expended a total of \$556,714 in this county for the period.

Under the heading of federal expenditures, this county received \$93,456 from the Public Roads Administration for three road projects, while there were no federal or non-federal projects financed through the Public Works Administration, nor were there any expenditures in this county through the Public Buildings Administration.

For social security in this county, including the government's share of payments to aged, dependent, children and to the blind, the total was \$71,789 for this period.

Through the Department of Agriculture, the farmers of this county received a total of \$17,305 from the federal government in 1936 for compliance with the A. A. A. conservation programs while in 1937 the farmers received \$2,925 making a total for the two years of \$20,230. Through the rural rehabilitation program of the Farm Security Administration, 120 projects were started at a cost of \$2,448.

This county has received \$297,754 through the Federal Emergency Relief Administration and \$128,660 through the Civil Works Administration, the forerunner of the WPA. There have been no projects in this county through the United Housing Authority.

The total non-repayable federal expenditures in this county is \$1,207,904 while the total of repayable loans through various federal agencies was \$1,087,377 and are as follows: Reconstruction Finance Corporation, \$69,722; Farm Credit Administration, loans through the land bank commission, \$502,996. There were 254 of these loans.

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The formation of a Baseball Boosters Club under the presidency of Martin Beam is a timely move on the part of local baseball fans to stimulate attendance at ball games and support the team while there is yet time to do so. T. Bradford Byrd, one of Sanford's most enthusiastic followers of the sport, deserves great credit for his thought and efforts to this end.

As one of the fans aptly put it at the boosters meeting yesterday, when it comes to attendance, Sanford is in the cellar, though the Seminoles are far and away the best team in the league. Mr. Byrd's comment on this was that "We have a record to be proud of in everything except attendance."

Up to last night the club reported 10,892 paid admissions since the season began. Last year over this same period of time paid admissions had reached a total of 18,922. Thus the club is over eight thousand paid admissions behind this same time last year.

Pointing out that it takes approximately 600 paid admissions every night to meet expenses, supporters of the club reveal that so far the average attendance has been only 368 paid admissions, while last year up to this same time they had averaged some 653. This is a loss which cannot be overcome by economies.

Clearly such a situation cannot be allowed to persist for long. Either the attendance will have to be increased or Sanford will have to be abandoned as a baseball town, or at least with a very inferior one. A number of excellent suggestions were advanced at yesterday's meeting for increasing attendance and it is to be hoped that they will be promptly carried out and will bear fruit.

Sanford's baseball team has been the source of an enormous amount of excellent publicity for this city. Reams of news stories and feature articles have been carried in the leading newspapers of the country as well as in many of the sporting magazines, about Sanford's remarkable baseball record, and as a result many people are now familiar with Sanford who had never heard of it before.

It would be most unfortunate for the city, if because of poor attendance at the games, the baseball team and the publicity which it gives us should be abandoned. Local fans should give it their utmost support.



Guard Against Frozen Citrus Is Maintained

LAKELAND, June 12.—Right up to the last minute, the Florida citrus industry is jealously guarding the reputation it established following the freeze for shipping only good fruit out of the state.

Latest development along this line is an order from Nathan Mayo, commissioner of agriculture, that all roadward stations be kept open until it is certain no frozen fruit remains. With commercial shipments down to the vanishing point, it was expected that two or three weeks more would see the season completely closed.

Commissioner Mayo, however, has not indicated just when he would close the stations. This will be dictated by circumstances, he said, in emphasizing that the stations would remain open just as long as possible. Even if some of the stations are closed, he said, roving inspectors will be kept at work and any trucker with a load of damaged fruit may find himself confronted by an inspector at any time.

The citrus commission requested Mayo last week to keep the stations open as long as necessary to keep frosted fruit off southern markets. The commission's field man has learned, it was said, that a number of truckers planned to take advantage of the closing of the stations by attempting to transport large quantities of questionable fruit to southern markets.

Mayo's response was immediate and emphatic in assuring the commission he was in complete accord with the suggestion.

Miami's Magic

The federal census of 1940, just released for Miami and Dade county, reveal some surprising figures on the present size and remarkable growth of that locality. Dubbed the "Magic City" some 30 years ago when it was little more than a small fishing village, it has continued to live up to its reputation to this very day.

There are now 170,877 permanent residents of Miami, not including Miami Beach, Miami Shores, or Coral Gables. Altogether in Dade county, there are some 266,164 permanent residents. Miami Beach alone now boasts a year-around population of 27,340, or over four times as much as just ten short years ago.

In the federal census of 1930, Miami had a population of 110,637. Ten years before that, or just 20 years ago, it had a little less than 30,000, and in 1910, believe it or not, Miami had only a few more than five thousand persons residing there, or just about half as many as Sanford has today. In these 30 years Miami has grown from 5,280 to 170,877.

Tourists did that for Miami as they have done it for many other Florida cities to a somewhat smaller extent. To be sure, there has always been some agricultural activity around Miami. Pineapples were once a very profitable crop. Tomatoes and truck gardening have seen their day. Citrus is still quite a large enterprise in Dade county. There has also been some industrial activity.

But the thing that has made Miami grow has been its winter business of entertaining tourists. One or two hotels at first accommodated them all. But the people who stayed in them at first soon built homes, and their friends came to take their places in the hotels. Then more hotels became necessary and more homes were built. And thus the town grew. Climate, recreation, entertainment facilities did the trick.

Sanford does not want to be another Miami. It probably could not be if it wanted to. But an increase of a few thousand in population and a modest growth throughout the year would be a big help to our merchants and other business men and make possible many civic improvements. We can get this growth by going after tourists. There is a tremendous opportunity for Sanford in this great field.

Appropos the President's request for power to use the National Guard it is interesting to turn back the calendar 24 years to this very month.

The Mexican bandit, Villa, had raided Columbus, N. M., and Wilson had sent an expeditionary force into Mexico after him. Many More Flying Cadets Are Wanted For U. S. Air Corps

Lieutenant Colonel Aubrey Hornsby, Air Corps, Maxwell Field, Montgomery, Alabama, announced today that an unprecedented number of flying cadet applications were received following President Roosevelt's recent announcement. Hundreds of young men made inquiry at Maxwell Field either by letter or personal interview regarding the appointment.

An unlimited number of vacancies still exist, Colonel Hornsby said, for the classes which will commence about September 1 and young men between the ages of 17 and 27 are urged to apply. He also said he understood that the general requirement for the flying cadet appointment were to be reduced. This will permit acceptance of some trainees previously considered ineligible.

Aside from the patriotic elements involved in the appointment, a flying career in itself is a splendid profession and offers unlimited civilian and military possibilities. Those who complete the course successfully will have increased opportunities for advancement in the Air Corps, Regular Army, or Navy.

The general qualifications prescribed for a flying cadet appointment are that the applicant must be an unmarried citizen who has reached his twentieth but not his 27th birthday; excellent physical condition; the educational requirement consists of subjects completed in any regular high school course (those who have completed two years of study at a recognized college or university are exempt from the educational tests); others must take
