#### Minor injuries in auto accident

SANFORD - An auto accident ended in extensive damage to two vehicles but only minor injuries to the drivers involved.

According to a spokesman for the Sanford Police Department, the accident occured at about 9 last evening at the curve where U.S. Highway 17-92 and Seminole Boulevard join on the shores of Lake Monroe.

The police report states that when the car driven by Maurice Terrell, 18, of 2501 Byrd St. in Sanford, failed to yield the right of way to an oncoming vehicle driven by James Marks, 42, of 224 E. Fern Dr. in Sanford, the vehicles collided.

Both were taken to HCA Central Florida Regional Hospital, treated to minor injuries and released a short time later, according to Susan Prather, hospital spokesman.

The accident report prepared by the police department indicates that Terrell was traveling eastbound on Seminole Boulevard, entering the curve, when he falled to yield to Marks, who was entering the curve from northbound U.S. Highway 17-92. Terrell, the report said, struck Mark's car in the left rear quarter panel, causing extensive damage.

Police said that Terrell was charged with failing to yelld the right of way.

#### Trumbo given 1953 award

LOS ANGELES - The late Dalton Trumbo. blacklisted during the McCarthy era, has officially been given the 1953 Academy Award

for his screenplay for "Roman Holiday." The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences announced Tuesday that it was amending its records to show Trumbo as winning the Oscar.

Trumbo, unable to find work in the 1950s during the anti-Communist furor, had enlisted fellow screenwriter Ian McClellan Hunter to act as his "front," and it was Hunter who was received the Academy Award.

Trumbo's widow, Cleo, will be given the Oscar in May at a screening of the film, which starred Audrey Hepburn.

Trumbo also received an Oscar in 1956 for "The Brave One," written under the pseudonym Robert Rich. The academy presented Trumbo with a trophy for that film in 1975, a year before his death.

# Billups harassed?

## Ex-football player charged with rape says women annoying him by phone

#### By VICKI DeSORMIER Herald Staff Writer

SANFORD - Sheriff's department reports show that Lewis Billups, charged earlier this month with raping a Longwood woman and then trying to blackmail her. says that he is being harassed by two women, one of whom is trying to get money from him.

His attorney said this morning that he wishes the sheriff's department to press on with their investigation of the calls as he believes it will have some bearing on the case involving charges against Billups.

We're looking into it," said George Procehel, public information officer for the department said. "But so far there is no other information."

The former pro football cornerback who played for

the Cincinnati Bengals and was recently cut by the Green Bay Packers, was arrested Dec. 16 and charged with rape after allegedly inviting a woman to his home in the exclusive Alaqua community for hunch, then drugging her coektail and forcing her to have sex with him while his roommate Greg Calloway videotaped the

Billups and Calloway were also charged with attempting to extort \$20,000 from the woman by allegedly threatening to show the videotape to her husband if she did not pay.

Billups plans to plead innocent to the charges when he goes before the judge next month.

Sheriff's officials said that other women have made similar complaints regarding Billups, but only the one Bee Billups, Page 5A

## Child killer's release nixed

Donald McDougall will not walk free on New Year's Eve. His release scheduled for tomorrow was thwarted by State Senator Gary Stegel, R-

Altamonte Springs, Seminole-Brevard State Attorney Norm Wolfinger, and about 6,000 Seminole, Brevard and Orange County concerned effizens who signed petitions to prevent McDougall's early release from prison.

The redefining of the release laws may go far beyond the McDougall case, Corrections officials say dozens more sexual child abusers may now end up serving longer prison sentences following an attorney general's opinion that blocked McDougall's early release.

LAKE MARY - Work on the stalled Lake Mary Boulevard widening project is expected to resume within a few weeks. The final completion date of June 14. 1993 is still expected.

According to Seminole County Attorney Bob McMillan, "The bonding company has now selected the highest bidder for the project. The agreement calls for the Job to be completely finished by the same date as originally set up when the work first began."

The name of the new contractor has not been announced.

According to Seminole County Manager Ron Rabun, "We have received no formal notification regarding the identity of the low bidder." He continued, "Due to the interruptions of the holiday season. the bonding company has thus far been unable to complete negotiations with the low bidder."

Rabun said the low bidder for the contract is expected to be revealed by no later than the close of business on Mon., Jan. 4.



## City grants final OK to teen home, beer distributor

SANFORD - A major beer distributor and a residential facility for troubled teens won approval from Sanford city commissioners this week.

It took only intuites for commissioners to OK the two major operations. Both items were approved on second and final reading Monday

A rezoning was approved for approximately 5 acres of land off S. Sanford Avenue for Teen Challenge. The land had been zoned as RI-1. restricted industrial. The commission has approved a rezoning to RMOL multiple family residential/office and institutional.

The faellity will house up to 100 persons, and have a live-in staff of 10 occupying the 30,000 square foot building presently on the site.

When the matter was brought up several weeks ago for first reading, owners of several industrial operations surrounding the property objected to the rezoning, saying that it should remain industrial. The commissioners however approved the rezoning unanimously at both readings.

Commissioner A.A. McClanahan said at a November meeting, "I fail to see this type of use would affect other areas. We have an empty complex, and this is an opportunity to put something positive into it."

MIAMI - A routine internal Cuban flight

MIAMI — A routine internal Cuban flight became anything but that when passengers subdued the co-pilot, dragged a guard and burst into cheers as the pilot headed the atritner for Florida to complete a long-planned escape.

High drama in the sir gave way to builderous high-fives, applease and wide griss as the pilot and 47 of the 53 passengers and crew about the twin-engine bovist-built turbsprop set fact on the tarmac at Miami International Airport saking for political saytum.

The escape began as a regularly scheduled commuter flight to Cuba's north coast, according to Anne Eldridge of the Federal Aviation Administration in Atlanta. The Aero Caribbean airliner took off from Havana at 8:00 a.m. for the Cuban resort of Varadero Beach.

Once in the air, Cancio told reporters, he sent his co-pilot into the passenger cabin, saying he wanted to give another pilot on board some experience in the cockpit. Cancio said that as soon as other pilot went forward and they locked the cockpit door, the passengers grabbed the co-pilot and subtissed him for the remainder of the flight.

"I gave instructions that he was not to be struck," said Cancio, who then turned the airliner north as the passenger cabin erapted in cheers.

"At the same time, chloroform was used to pacify the security officer on based," said U.S. Customs Service spokesman Michael Sheehin. "He was also restrained with handcuffs."

In fact, Cancio said, they first put omething in the guard's coffee to knock im out — then used chloroform to keep

him out for the remainder of the trip.

The guard's hands were bound with rope and his feet were bound with a red and blue striped belt, according to Lt. Joaquin Delcueto, one of the Metro-Dade paramedics who on duty at the airport.

The guard, Andres Hernandes Ledesma, 31, was placed on a stretcher and taken to Pan American Hospital, where he was treated and released later Tuesday, according to hospital spokeswoman Michelle Othson.

"He got very excited from time to time over what happened," Delcusto said of Ledesma. "He was calling them traitors. He said if he could take them back to Cuba they

would be shot."

All 48 passengers and crew members who'd allegedly participated in the plan were taken into custody by the U.S. immigration and Naturalisation Service and moved to INS' Krome Detention Center for the night.



## Cops: Teen admits to killing girl

#### By The Associated Press

TAMPA - A 16-year-old who confessed to the slaying of another teen-ager had joined others working to find the young woman's killer.

Three weeks ago, David T. Sheren walked through his neighborhood handing out filers to help find a missing Cham-beriain High School atudent. But it was just an act.

Sheren, who sugrendered Twesday in Indianapolis, knew exactly where 18-year-old Linda Bonck was, police said, because he had stabbed her to death.

"It just turns my stomach. It just turns my stomach that he sat here in my house, handing out those brochures like he was truly trying to help," said Julie Johnson, whose house Sheren visited.

The youth walked into a police station and confessed to the crime, then drew a map to show authorities where to find the body, police said.

investigators used the map to locate the corpse in a wooded area near a shopping plaza, said Jack Espinosa, spokesman for the Hillsborough Sheriff's Office.

Miss Bonck, who suffered from cerebral paisy, had been missing since Dec. 8 when she left home to walk to a friend's house.

Indianapolia Police Sgt. Greg Bieberich aud Sheren was arrested on a murder charge and was being held in the Marion County Lockup pending extradition to Florida.

Espinosa said detectives would go to Indianapolis to question Sheren. He would not disclose whether the youth gave a

## Siegel true to his word about violent crime

When Gary Siegel of Altamonte Springs was running for election in Florida Senate District 12, he said one of his first priorities would be to deal with violent crimes. Siegel has stuck to his word.

During his campaign, he was quoted as saying, "I will be a strong advocate of no early release for convicted felons who are violent. dangerous and/or sex offenders."

Siegel has certainly carried out the promise in the case of Donald McDougall, who will now remain in prison for at least another five years rather than being released early on New Year's Eve. Provisional credits granted to many convicted criminals, would have allowed McDougall to walk out of prison after serving only ten years of a 34 year term.

Even with the five years returned to his time, he will still be serving only 15 years, unless additional changes are made in the sentencing statutes.

Siegel, along with Seminole Brevard State Attorney Norm Wolfinger and Corrections Secretary Harry Singletary, led the fight in keeping McDougall in prison. Siegel is also planning on expanding the drive beyond the McDougall situation, to include other similar

# n old argument for a new era

Who won the right to govern? Behind the scenes, foreign policy officials allegedly representing George Bush are trying to shape long-range decisions in direct opposition to the views of Bill Clinton. On the surface the issue is the "largel transmitter." Just beneath the surface is an old argument that never goes away.

During the campaign there were distinct differences, along classic lines, between the candidates. Clinton's position was a textbook explication of the "Idealistic" school of thought. He said American foreign policy should stress promoting democracy in the world. He criticized Bush for not being assertive enough as a democracy-purveyor — not in Russia, the Balbana Brania as Chica

Balkans, Bosnia or Chinà.

Bush took the "Pragmatic" position. It has always been pushed by the State Department. (Often regardless of the president's views.)

Pragmatists have no problem with democracy but often place a higher value on stability. It's a

dangerous world, they say, so let's not rock the bost, and let's make deals, even with bad guys.

\$180 million appropriated for a new field of short-wave transmitters in Israel. A project of the Radios, the transmitters are designed to beam home-service signals to restive Islamic populations in South Central Asia, as well as to other African and Asian locations.

### False claims riddle worker compensation

WASHINGTON - The nation's oldest social program - workers' compensation insurance is reeling from grossly inflated medical bills, rocketing litigation costs, fraud and

The flies of insurance investigators are teeming with cases like that of a Baltimore man who was lifting a box on the job at a supermarket and felt a twinge of pain. He collected for lost work and medical bills on

the first injury and then made a second claim, saying he had slipped on an oily floor and re-injured himself. investigators sur pected that his dis-

comfort stemmed more from a broken jaw received in a barroom brawl. But he refused to go back to work — at least refused to continue his day job. Then Investigators investigators learned he was working nights as an exotic dancerina Chippendale-like strip joint, wearing fur boots and a fur bikini and passing a torch between his legs

that his discomfort stemmed more from a broken Jaw received in a Drawi.

Today, some 98 million American workers are covered by workers' comp, which is something on the order of nine out of 10 workers. Although strip-dancing may not be covered, the variety of jobs under this umbrella is staggering. Workers' comp pays when actor Mel Gibson gets bruises and pains doing his own stunts on the set of "Lethal Weapon 3." Former Washington Redskin quarterback Doug Williams, who led his team to a 42-10 Super Bowl rout of the Denver Broncos in 1988, reportedly collects a weekly \$513 workers' comp payment from the club.

And on the horizon are a host of new ills, a Pandora's box of troubles for workers' compensation claims never foreseen in the original comp acts seven decades ago — AIDS cases from health-care workers, and those suffering from "secondary smoke" inhalation. And now, low levels of radiation emission from computer monitors and even police radar guns might result in compensa-ble claims in some states.

We have been publishing the results of our own long-term investigation during a series of columns. including one focusing on California, where a recent survey found that one in four businesses now has plans to relocate some or all of its operations out of the state. The total cost now for all this coverage annually is more than 962 billion — nearly tripling in the last decade alone; and far outpacing the rise in health-care costs during the same period.

Fraud. abuse and related escalating costs in the workers' comp system — besides weakening the competitiveness of American business — is also crippling for Alabama. Connecticut, Florida, Louisians. Massachusetts, Montana. Pennsylvania and Texas. The two states in greatest crisis today are Rhode island and Maine.

Only a 300-percent rate increase could persuade private insurers to return to Maine, from which most have fled. "Maine is the best eximple of the total crisis — a melidown is a good way to describe it," Thomas Smith, a vice president of the Travelers Insurance Cried a "Mafety Lottery" for six months to cut down on workers comp costs. She began it when 55 of 165 refuse workers were cut or abown on workers' comp costs. She began it when Bill of 165 refuse workers were out on workers' comp. So she began randomly drawing 10 names of annitation workers at the end of each month. If not one was out on receive \$200. He was convicted in 1983 of aggravated child abuse and second-degree murder in the torture-stabbing of 5-year-old Ursula Sunshine Assaid. The dramatic case was the subject of a book.

The girl, who lived with McDougali and her mother in Seminole County, was deprived of food and water for days, fed sosp and forced to stand naked for hours and recite the alphabet, according to trial tes-

"We use a nationally. recognized costing firm. Marshall and Swift," said Grimm. "They are used all over the country.'

Seminole County assessed the the AAA headquarters in Heathrow at \$46.3 million in 1992. When the company protested the amount, the Value Adjustment Board reduced the assessment to \$42.4 million. The VAB. comprised of county commissioners and school board members, has the power to lower appraisals.

The \$42.4 million is still too high, according to the company. In the suit against the county. AAA attorney Stephen Snively said the assessment "cannot be supported by a reasonable hypothesis of values."

# Officials say highway deaths hit 30-year low

WASHINGTON - Americans are enjoying their safest year on the highways in three decades, federal officials say, as deaths and drunken driving are down and use of seat belts is up.

Transportation Department officials projected Tuesday that when 1992 is over, 39,500 people will have died in motor vehicle accidents — the lowest death toll since 1962.

They also expect the fatality rate based on total miles driven to continue the annual decline it began a decade ago, dropping one-tenth of a percentage point to 1.8 deaths per 100 million

miles of vehicular travel. 'We're talking about the lowest fatality rate in history. It's something we all should celebrate," said Marion Blakey, administrator of the National

Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Officials attributed much of the decline to increased use of seat belts, encouraged through ment, and a decrease in the incidence of alcohol-related traffic deaths. They did not find any decrease in speed.

Based on figures for the first six months of the year, highway safety officials project alcohol involvement in 45.8 percent of vehicle fatalities in 1992. That would be down significantly from 48 percent last year, and continues a decline from over 57 percent in 1982.

The rate motorists and their passengers used seat belts increased to 62 percent nationally, based on the findings of surveys within each state. That was up from 59 percent in 1991 and just 10 percent a decade ago.

"There truly has been a sea change for the better on seat belts." said Transportation Secretary Andrew H. Card Jr.

Total deaths by motor vehicles has been on the decline since 1988, when the toll was 47.087. The 1992 total, if it holds up, would mark a 5 percent decline from last year's 41,462 deaths.

The annual toll hasn't been below 40,000 since 1962. The record high was 54,569 in 1972. people tend to travel less and highway deaths tend to decline during tight times.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Unlike most inventions recognized by the government, patent num-bers 5,175,383 and 5,175,384 and 5,175,385 can squeak, eat, drink, mate and even wiggle pink noises. The new patents are mice made by genetic manipula-

The U.S. Patent and Trade-mark Office announced in its Official Gazette on Tuesday that patents for laboratory mice had been granted to Harvard Univer-aity in Cambridge, Mass., Gen-Pharm International of Mountain View, Calif., and to Ohio Univer-aity in Athens, Ohio.

The patent is the second species ownership for Philip Leder, a Howard Hughes re-searcher at Harvard. Leder and colleagues developed the first patented animal, the "Harvard mouse," in 1988.

Leder's new patent is for a mouse strain whose males natu-rally develop enlarged prostate glands, a condition that mimics a serious disorder in human

GenPharm was given a patent for a mouse strain that has been altered so it naturally fails to develop a fully functional im-

mune system.

The Ohio University patent is

human gene that constantly produces a low level of beta interferon, a protein that attacks virus and prevents infection in the mouse.

All of the mice were altered genetically through a technique in which genes are changed in fertilized eggs that then are allowed to gestate within a mother mouse. The resulting pups have a genetic pattern different from either parent.

When the pups mature and mate, their offspring carry the new genes. The changed animal is called a transgenic mouse.

Lisa Raines, vice president for government affairs at the Industrial Biotechnology Association, said in a statement that the new animal patents are significant for animal patents are significant for the industry. "Since Harvard University re-

ceived the first transgenic animal patent in 1988, there has been continued debate about whether or not additional animal patents would be granted," said Raines' statement. "This ... decision marks a positive step forward for protecting important

Leder said the prostate mouse, which he said may be called Harvard II, will be important in

the prostate in older men. The prostate, a gland that produces seminal fluid, is located below the bladder and around the tube that drains urine from the

The gland grows larger as men age and often can retard or block urinary flow. Surgical correction of enlarged prostates is one of the most common operations on

With a mouse that mimics the condition, Leder said, re-searchers will be able to test drugs that correct or control the problem without surgery.

The GenPharm mouse was genetically altered by addition of genetically altered by addition of a gene that prevents the rodent from developing fully mature lymphocytes, a blood cell vital to the immune system.

Jonathan MacQuitty, an executive at GenPharm, said the new mouse will be used in the study of immune diseases.

# U.S. troops, secret service prepare for Bush

**Associated Press Writer** MOGADISHU, Somalia -

American troops and Secret Service personnel rushed today to prepare for the New Year's visit of President Bush to one of the most chaotic, lawless towns on earth.

Razor wire barriers were being strung at the sites Bush will visit in Mogadishu, saud bags were being placed around new gun pits and machine gun posts and Marines were extending and tightening their control.

We are very concerned about the president's security when he visits here," said Marine Col. Fred Peck. "I doubt if any American president has ever visited a nation in such turmoil and such a state of anarchy ....

"We are doing everything we can to assure his safety.

Neither the military nor the Secret Service would elaborate on their plans.

On Tuesday, American troops seized a six-story building known as America House across the street from the former U.S. Embassy, a ransacked, partially destroyed compound now housing Marine headquarters.

Bush is to visit the embassy shortly after his arrival at midday on New Year's Eve and Marines who have been subjected to erratic sniper fire from America House, once the home of embassy employees, decided to clear it out.

"We have been sniped at from that location on many occasions," Peck said.

Peck said a small cache of weapons was found in America House, including an recoilless rifle, a number of rifle propelled grenades and ammunition.

A much larger cache was seized in northeastern Mogadishu, an area newly patrolled by Marines north of the line that divides the city into fiefdoms controlled by two rival warlords

Peek said that eache contained two 105 mm howitzers, ten .50-caltber machine guns, two misstle launchers, ten 80 mm mortars and many smaller weapons.

Somalis on the streets of the capital were eager to welcome the U.S. president.

"The world is talking about Somalia now," Hussen Alt Omar, 21, a math teacher, said Tuesday. "Somali people are optimists. Bush is trying to help the Somali people

"Bush is the president of Somalia now," said Mohammed Abdi Farali, 25, who said he was a former clothing salesman.

In one of his last foreign policy decisions as president, Bush ordered U.S. troops to lead an international military force to get food past looters in Somalia, where civil war and drought have combined to kill 350,000.

About the only people who

about the Bush visit are the bandits largely forced underground in the towns where U.S.-led troops have set up positions.

Military planes dropped 100,000 leaflets on all parts of Mogadishu on Tuesday warning residents that looting, killing and the display of almost any kind of weapon "will not be tolerated."

The leaflet warned that anyone aiming or pointing a weapon at the troops in Somalia will be shot, the leaflet said in what Peck called "a rather direct message going out to Cross before spending New Mogadishu." Cross before spending New Year's Eve aboard the USS

Bush was to arrive Thursday at Mogadishu's international airport, now a sprawling military base, aboard an Air Force C-141 cargo plane from Jeddah, Saudi Arabia.


He was to be greeted there by Marine Gen. Robert Johnston. the commander of the multinational force in Somalia, then be whisked by helicopter to the former embassy, where he was to informally talk to Marines.

The president also was to visit a hospital run by the International Committee of the Red

Year's Eve aboard the U.S.S. Tripoli off the coast of Mogadishu.

On New Year's Day, Bush was to visit American troops and an orphanage in Baidoa, an important aid distribution point in the interior, and the U.S. 10th Mountain Division's headquarters in Beli Dogle.

Despite the presence of thousands of foreign troops, there are daily reports of looting. threats against foreign aid workers and journalists, and shootouts between rival clans in

# Scleroderma diagnosed by biopsy of tissues

vide information on scleroderma. What starts it and how is it treated?

DEAR READER: Scieroderma. a chronic disease of unknown cause, is marked by inflammation and scarring of many body organs, notably the skin and joints, but also the intestinal tract, lungs, heart and kidneys. The disease usually begins with arthritis and swelling of the skin. Later symptoms include ulcers of the fingers, difficulty swallowing, shortness-of-breath, irregular pulse and fatigue (due to kidney failure). Scieroderma is diagnosed by

biopsy of affected tissue.

The prognosis varies. Some patients experience few symptoms for years; in fact, the disease may appear to stabilize for extended periods, only to progress eventually, for no known reasons. On the other hand, other patients exhibit more rapid progression. especially in the presence of heart, lung or kidney manifesta-tions. In severe cases, death usually occurs from renal fail-

Because no single drug is effective in treating scieroderma, doctors are forced to use separate drugs to treat symptoms as they arise: for example, calcium channel blockers for poor circulation, Tagamet for esophageal inflammation, cortisone for relief of arthritis and Captopril for kidney damage.

Because scleroderma is suspected to be an auto-immune disorder, I am sending you my Health Report on "Lupus: The Great Imitator," which is a related disease. Sometimes a player clings to a card that will never win a trick, instead dis-carding a vital card. Alternatively, a player signals with a card that costs a trick in that suit. A third possibility occurs in today's deal. It is one of the problems in the final chapter of Hugh Kelsey's instructive book "Simple Squeezes" (\$14.95, Gollancz, 800-274-2221).

Look at the West cards only. Which one would you lead against seven no-trump?

When partner doesn't double the Blackwood response of five diamonds, asking for a lead of that suit, there is no reason to attack with anything other than


South wins the first trick with

the club ace, unblocks the A-Q of spades, plays a heart to dummy's king and cashes the spade king, discarding a heart. Now comes an avalanche of diamonds. At the end, South holds the club three and heart 10. Dummy has the A-8 of hearts. East has to keep two hearts to hold that suit. Which cards do you have left? Probably a spade and the club two. But if so, South cashes the club three, which is now high.

Have you seen the answer? You must lead the club two at trick one, not the club four. Only then is the grand slam defeated.

I feel sure this lead problem would defeat everyone except those players who lead low from a doubleton, a style popular in Poland.
