### More Draught Laws Needed

Although automobile casualties reached the stupendous figure of 58,000 deaths in 1936, this number was one percent less than the 58,842 who had their lives in the highway accidents during the preceding year. In view of the fact that drunken driving was on the increase throughout the year, and that the number of cars using the highways increased, it is believed that the decline in accidents, though it was, must be attributed to the higher degree of accident-consciousness on the part of the public.

Safety campaigns have been waged in practically every community in the country by means of different organizations. In some places classes have been conducted in the public schools for the purpose of teaching children the dangers of the highways in the hopes, perhaps, not only that the children will be more careful themselves, but also that they will take some lessons to their parents. Newspapers, preachers, and public speakers of all kinds, have joined in the crusade to reduce automobile fatalities.

In spite of all these efforts, there were still some 35,676 persons who met death in highway accidents last year. There were at least a million others who were injured. The situation calls for something more than talk and education. It is not enough to be content with a mere reduction in the number of accidents as long as hundreds of thousands are being killed or injured. Something decidedly more drastic has got to be done.

Among the principal demands developed at the Accident Prevention Conference, recently convened at the instance of Secretary of Commerce Roger, was the enactment of drivers' license laws by those states which do not already have them. At this conference it was definitely proved that in proportion to population and automobiles, the accident rate was considerably lower where drivers' license laws are in effect than in those states which do not have them.

It was also pointed out that in a number of states, of which Florida was one, measures have already been prepared for the consideration of legislatures which meet this year. And it is hoped that Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico, South Dakota and Wyoming, among the entire nation, Boy Scouts will observe the occasion with fitting ceremonies which include an address by the President of the United States.

In this connection it is interesting to learn that the Boy Scout organization has just completed the most successful year in its entire history. "During this period more than 7,000,000 boys have graduated from its ranks to adult citizenship, and more than one million grown persons have been connected with various activities."

"As we have watched the Boy Scout Movement in operation here and elsewhere," says a bulletin from national headquarters, "it occurs to us that here we have a truly national instrument of self-education which is non-partisan—open to every race and creed and class. It says we do not care how you vote, but vote honestly—we do not care what your party may be, but we urge you to love America and to forget your merely selfish interest, in seeking what is good for America."

"February is the birth month of Scouting in America and of other nations. It seems to us as we view the world from our editorial windows, that this spirit of Scouting which says to a boy 'To be a good citizen you must care about others'—this gets in very close to what is all about in all the problems of our democracy and of world relations."

**Hedges Advises Home Owners To File Exemptions**

**Homestead Bill Says Earlier Statement Was Misconstrued**

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 5.—(Special)—Senator "Homestead Bill" Hedges in a statement released here struck back at those who have attempted to misconstrue his statement released last week on homestead exemption. The Senator said "This attempt to misconstrue my statement is but further proof of the unyielding efforts of a minority group to thwart the will of the people and nullify the homestead exemption which was adopted by a 2 to 1 majority."

Senator Hedges further said, "My previous statement did not even intimate that the home owners should not file application for exemption, as the law specifies it is necessary that they do this in order to secure their exemption. However, it should not be necessary, and as previously stated the requirement is simply a lot of expensive red tape injected by those who fought the Amendment originally and are still trying in every way possible to nullify it."

"In order to make this statement clear it would be necessary to review the passage of the law in 1935, which cannot be done completely in a brief article. However, anyone who is familiar with the facts, or cares to take time to review the complete record, will observe that the law was originally passed by the Senate and that the Senate endeavored, first, to broaden the scope of homestead exemption and second, to simplify the method of procedure, in so far as possible. After this Bill was passed by the Senate and sent to the House the same old forces which fought homestead exemption in 1934 immediately relunched their fight."

"The Bill was completely rewritten by the House Committee on finances and taxation and the Senate was forced, by virtue of despotic control of the House, to accept the best substitute for the original Bill that they could secure. The plain people of this State have always been confronted at every section of the Legislature by those who were able to employ high-priced lobbyists, lawyers and spokesmen to look after the interests of the rich and powerful and the people had to get along the best they could without help and I want it known now that I do not propose that any high-priced lobbyists, or high-powered lawyers are going to misconstrue or thwart the will of the people on the exemption granted to the people on their family shelter, without letting the people know on the floor of the Senate what they are doing and how they are trying to do it."

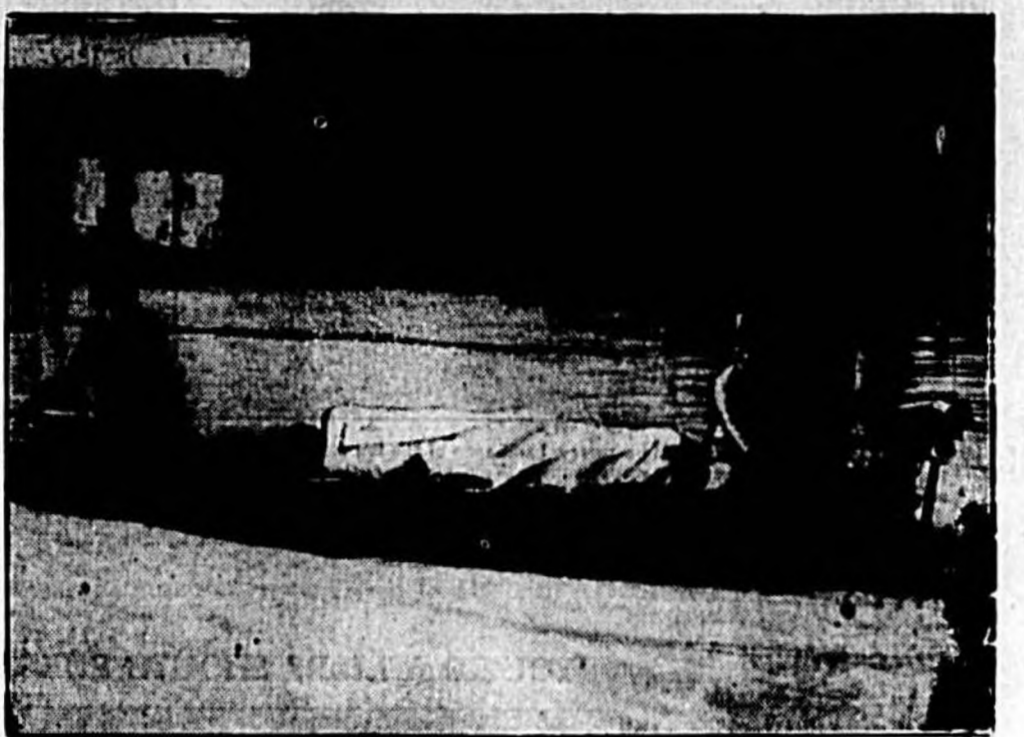
"I want to reiterate my previous statement that the people are in no mood to have their homestead exemption nullified by the 'juggling' of those who desire to keep their own taxes down, at the expense of the people who own and occupy homes, and if the special interests keep this monkey business they may soon find that the entire valorem tax system has been abolished in order to make the homestead exemption effective, and further, to protect the small property owners from the continued efforts of certain groups or special advantage."

**Entombed Man Recovered By Rescue Party**

**Mail Carrier Found After Eight Days In Coal Tunnels**

FLEMINGTON, W. Va., Feb. 5.—(AP)—Robert Johnson, lost for eight days in the debris-filled passageways of an abandoned mine, was carried to safety today, alive, well and puffing happily on a cigaret.

"I'd given up all hope," said the 36-year-old rural mail carrier to rescue workers who found him nearly two miles from the mine entrance early today.

Johnson, who started coal from the mine in his spare time for sale to neighbors, was found huddled behind a heap of jagged chunks of slate.

Three of the scores of volunteers who had searched the mine night and day since Johnson disappeared Jan. 27, heard his feeble cries for help while exploring a narrow tunnel.

Many believed Johnson had been drowned in a pool of water. He was carried down a snow-covered path to a waiting ambulance and rushed to a hospital at Clarksburg.

**'Baby' Tornado Is Seen By Citizens In Gulf Community**

CORTEZ, Feb. 5.—(AP)—A "baby" tornado reached down from murky skies over Palma Sala Bay yesterday and with a lusty roar swept through Cortez.

When it had passed, one building was destroyed, three badly damaged, about a dozen more unroofed and hanged or so persons were frightened but uninjured.

Mrs. Frank Smith, who with Mrs. Minnie Knight, was in one of the buildings, said there was a sudden roar and the house began to rock and sway crazily.

"I thought we would all be killed," Mrs. Smith said. "Then, as suddenly as it started, it was all over."

Thibaux and two others were lifted off their foundations and set down several feet away with considerable damage.

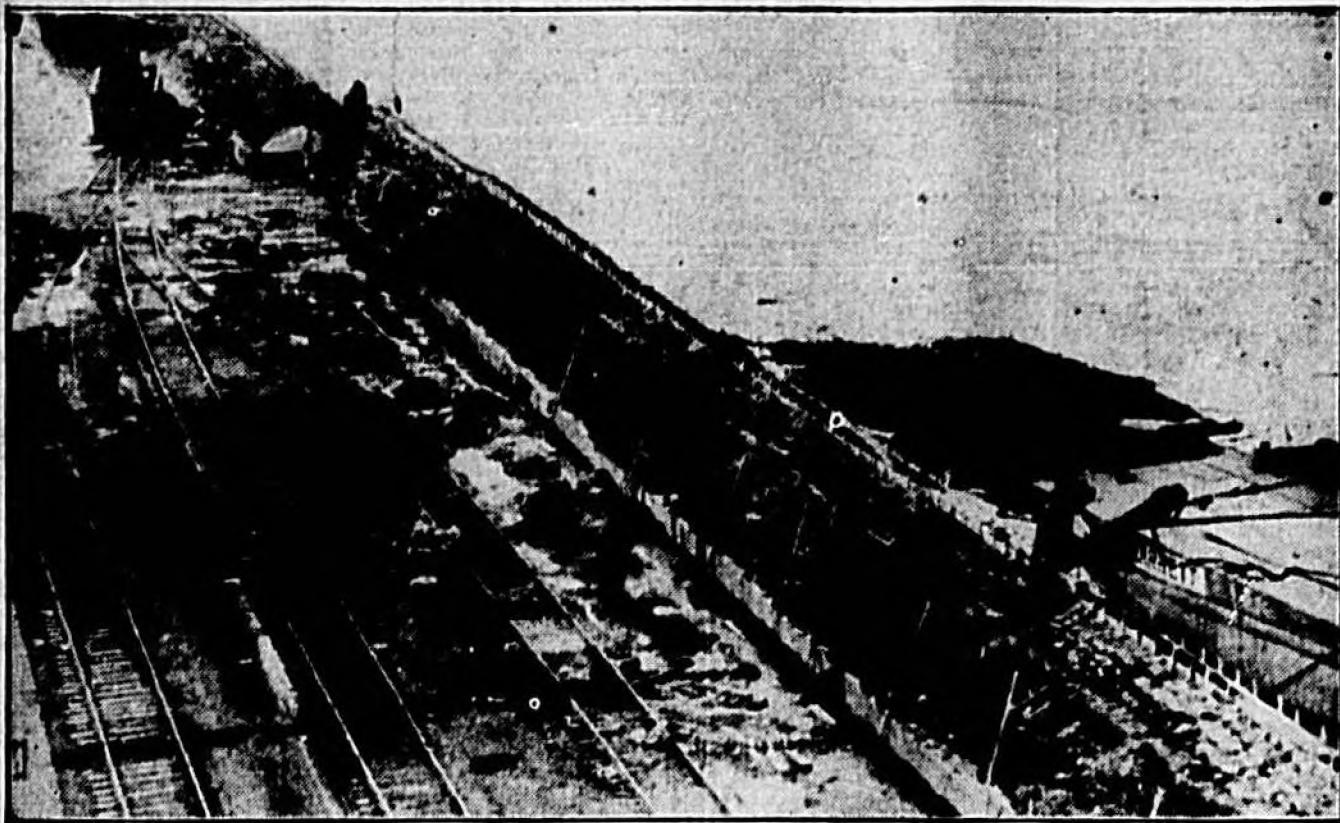

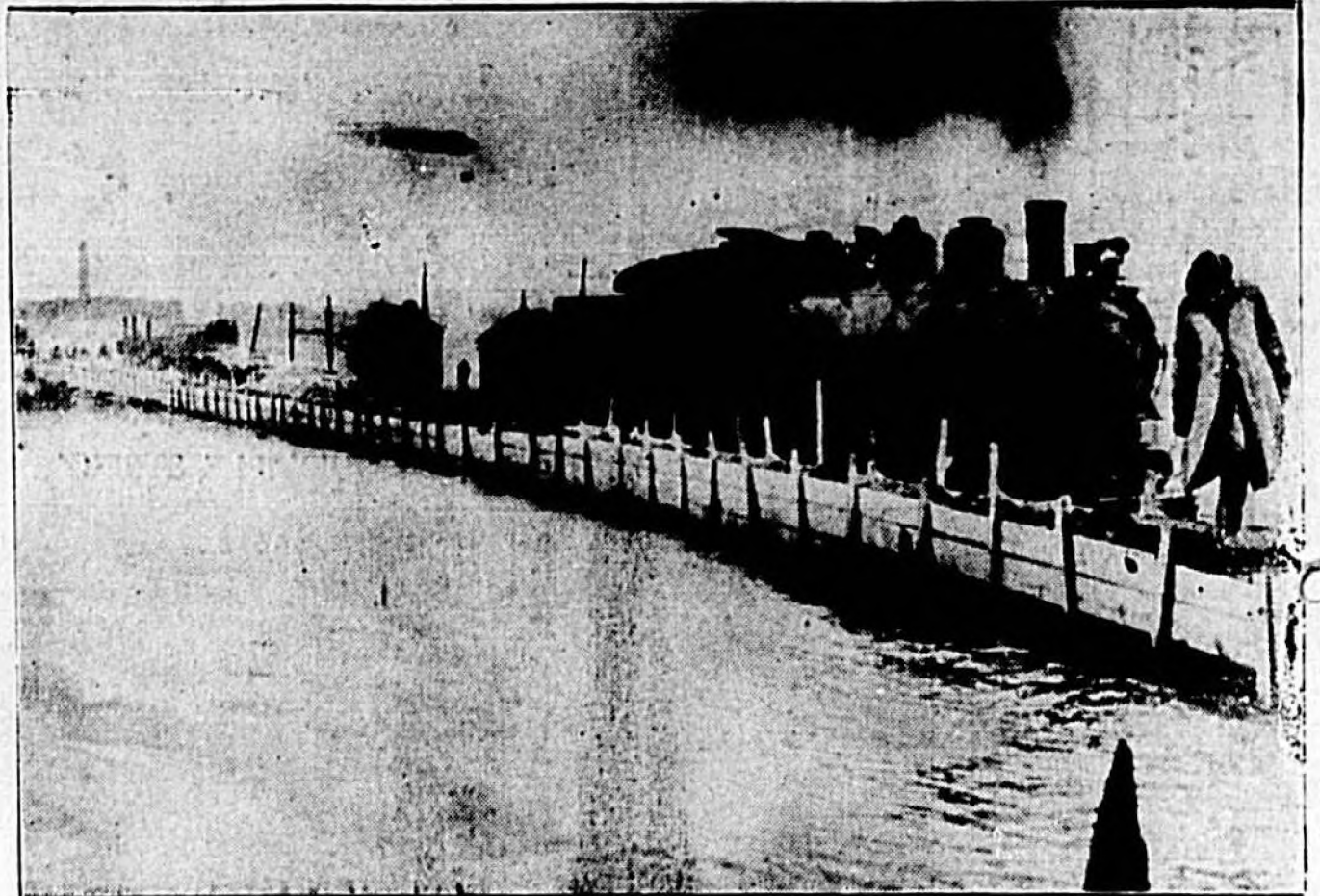

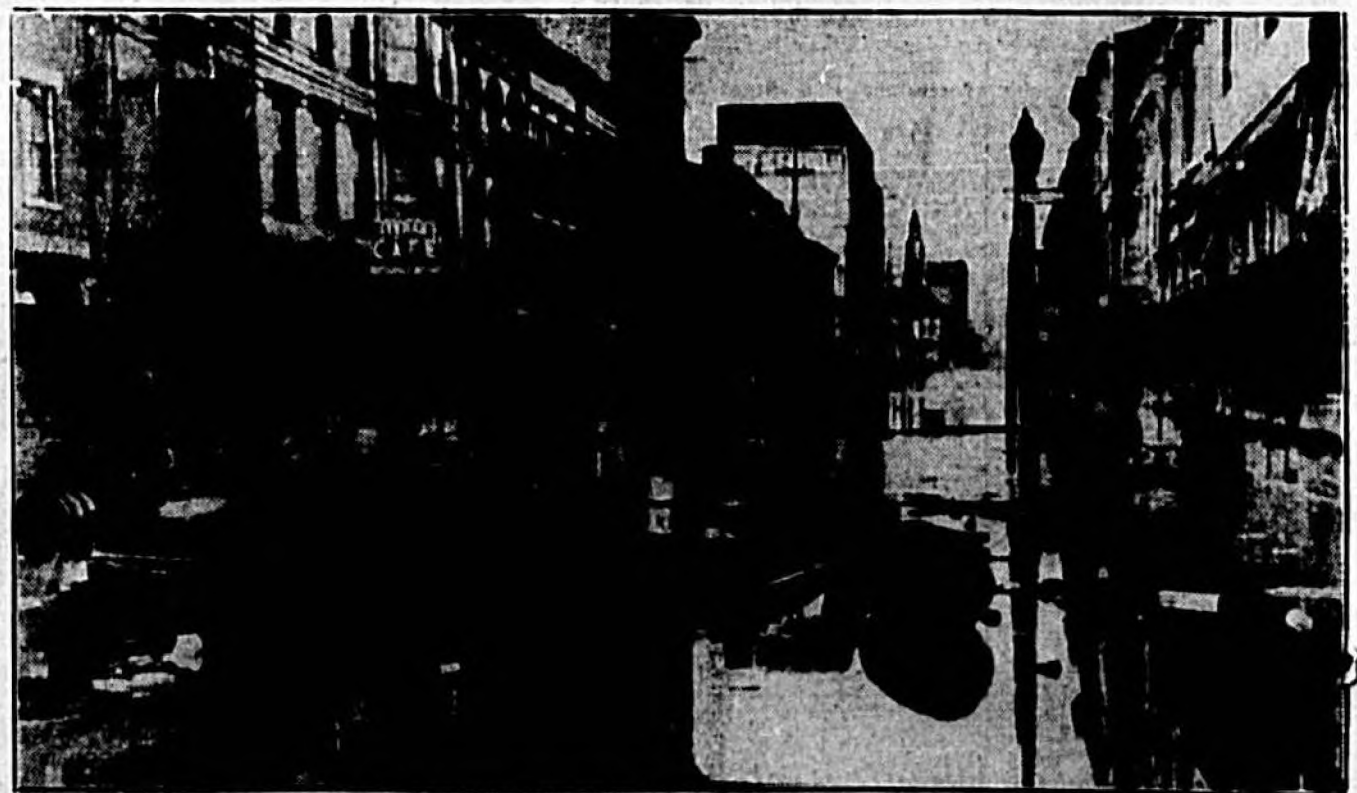

## Antique Display Attracts Many As Centennial Opens

Historical Lore Is Seen In Hundreds Of Objects Shown In Store Windows

**Piece Of China Is 300 Years Old**

Mostly with the lore of antiquity and alive with the spirit of men and women pioneers of Seminole County, hundreds of antiques in Sanford store windows bore the inspection of thousands today as the City began a three-day celebration of its first centennial.

Probably the oldest individual item on exhibition is a piece of china in Yowell's window. It is said to be about 300 years of age.

The Yowell window also includes an old surveyor map dated 1700, drawn in ink that has retained its full face through the centuries. Too, there are other documents—a land grant awarded by Jacobus Taylor—and diplomas from old universities.

Sanford before the great fire of the last century is vividly portrayed in an ancient photograph in the window of Perkins' store. Another picture shows more than a block of the settlement laid bare by the inferno.

One object, which received particular attention was the sketch from life of Oseola, the Seminole Indian chief whose door is laid the blame for much of the trouble in Florida during the days when this settlement was striving to gain a foothold.

The Perkins display is centered around a large photograph of Gen. Henry Sanford, after whom the City is named.
