









# Army Engineers Walk 'Tightrope' On Canal

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Army engineers observed their 15th birthday anniversary today with an attempt to walk a tightrope between critics and supporters of the canal project.

The Corps of Engineers must provide professional engineering services to all segments of the public," said Col. Avery S. Fullerton, Jacksonville district engineer. "To us, both viewpoints must be considered to achieve wise resource management."

The corps has been getting considerable heat from the new raised voice of opposition at the 15th anniversary of the project which is nearly one-third complete.

If the critics succeed, it would be the first time in the 116-year history of the federal agency that a major project dragged to a halt in midcourse.

Sen. Spessard Holland, D-Fla., attempted to avert such an abrupt end to the Jacksonville-Yankeetown waterway, asking interior Secretary Walter J. Hickel Monday to withdraw his June 8 request for a 18-month moratorium on construction for the project.

A spokesman for Florida Dept. of Environment, William H. Partington, has predicted a moratorium which would be considered next week.

Jacksonville business leaders, wary of such a fate, have asked Hickel to conduct a new survey if he feels necessary, but let the canal construction continue.

Speaking on the anniversary of the Corps of Engineers, which was formed June 16, 1775, when George Washington took command of the Continental Army, Fullerton noted that it often is a center of controversy over its water resources public works.

"We recognize the dramatic interest in conservation which has emerged in the past few years and which has threatened development interests in the background," he said.

The corps must also take into consideration, Fullerton said, that Florida's population growth requires wise development to meet the people's needs.

In addition to the canal, Army engineers are currently active in Florida in constructing the \$476 million Central and Southern Flood Control Project, about 50 per cent complete; the \$101 million Four River Basin Flood Control Project, about 16 per cent complete; a dike and erosion control studies; and a new set of jetties at Pomca de Leon Inlet to stabilize the water passage between the Atlantic Ocean and Intracoastal Waterway south of Daytona Beach.

# Snipers, Police Battle In Miami

MIAMI (AP) — Snipers perched on rooftops and hidden in bushes, Monday night traded bullets with police when violence erupted in a Negro district because a white grocer allegedly called a housewife "a dirty nigger."

The angry blacks, under cover of darkness, pumped bullets into passing cars and fired at police in a disturbance that lasted for several hours.

Several policemen, including two policemen, were injured but none by gunfire. Four arrests were reported.

Police, armed with high-powered rifles and shotguns, blocked off an 18-block area, and attempted to disperse the crowd with tear gas, but this failed to stop the shooting.

"We will close this business one way or the other," said James Williams, a young black militant referring to the grocery store.

The area, known as Liberty City, was the scene of shooting and rioting during the 1968 election National Convention. Three persons were killed in that fighting.

Before violence exploded, several young blacks who said they were members of the Black Co-

alition, a militant group, circulated pamphlets calling for "united action" against the supermarket.

They accused the owner of charging "inflated prices for damaged and inferior goods." They claimed the store charged up to \$5 to cash welfare and other checks.

A black youth said a few weeks earlier, Mrs. Gladys Taylor, complained about the exorbitant charge to cash a check and was chased out of the building and insulted.

Blacks picketed the supermarket until Monday's outbreak.

Police set up a command post in front of the building to prevent damage or looting to the supermarket.

One policeman was severely burned with tear gas and rushed to hospital. Another was cut in the head by flying glass from a shattered windshield.

A white man, Dan Beckler, 36, was badly beaten and his car overturned and burned when he drove unsuspectingly in the middle of the fighting.

"I didn't even know there was any trouble out here. They turned my car over and burned it. And they lay some good heavy ones on me," Beckler said.

# Court To Review Candidate Law

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The Florida Supreme Court will be asked to look backward at two of its own — perhaps contradictory — opinions in settling the appeal of a decision upholding the new office holder resignation law.

Attorney James Mahoror of Tallahassee is citing a 1962 decision in which the high court said the Legislature can't prohibit the Legislature from imposing restrictions on candidates.

The question of whether the previous decisions are contradictory is one for the seven Supreme Court justices to decide. They were notified Monday that Mahoror's client, Florida County Circuit Judge Charles W. Holt, intends to appeal.

Holt's appeal probably will be considered next week. A quick decision is important because the law requiring resignations will become effective 10 days before qualifying opens on July 7.

"I think the primary point is that it adds qualification to the office," Mahoror said. "It's a question of whether it's an additional qualification, or whether it's part of the Democratic election machinery."

The decision he is citing held that W. Fred Cobb of Jacksonville could not be prohibited from qualifying for superintendent of public instruction because he had no Florida graduation certificate.

"The Legislature is prohibited from adding to or taking from the qualifications of the superintendent of public instruction so as to make the same different from those prescribed in the Constitution," said the court's 1962 opinion.

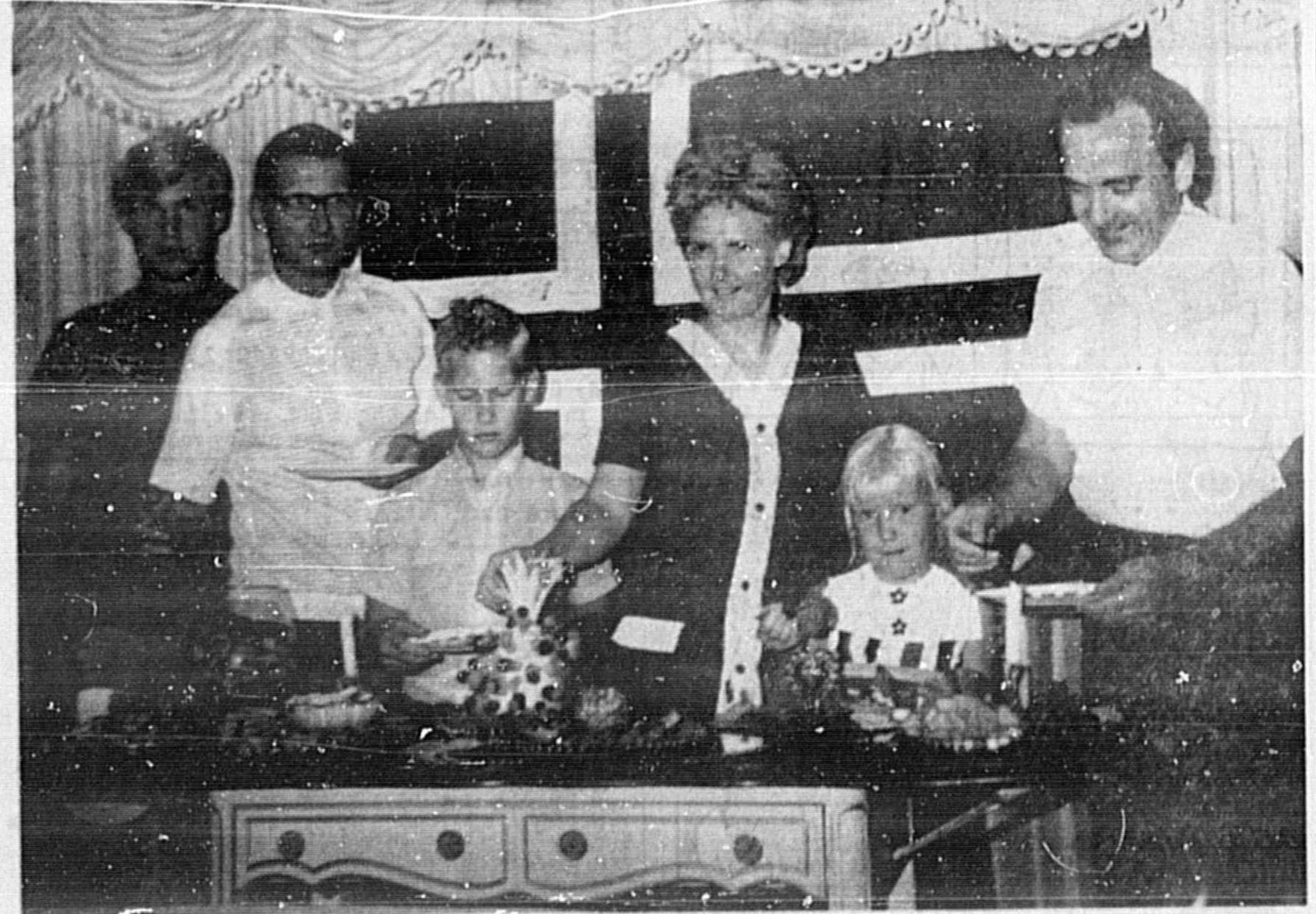
Miss Englehardt chose for the memorable occasion a white waltz pique dress with navy trim and navy blue accessories.

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — What television programs are we likely to remember most from the past year?

Clearly, from popular to critical acclaim, this was the year of "Sesame Street," the children's series on National Educational Television.

Another NET production, "The Andersonville Trial," about a Civil War prison camp commandant accused of responsibility for thousands of deaths during his tenure, was without question the most powerful and superbly done single drama. The director was George C. Scott.

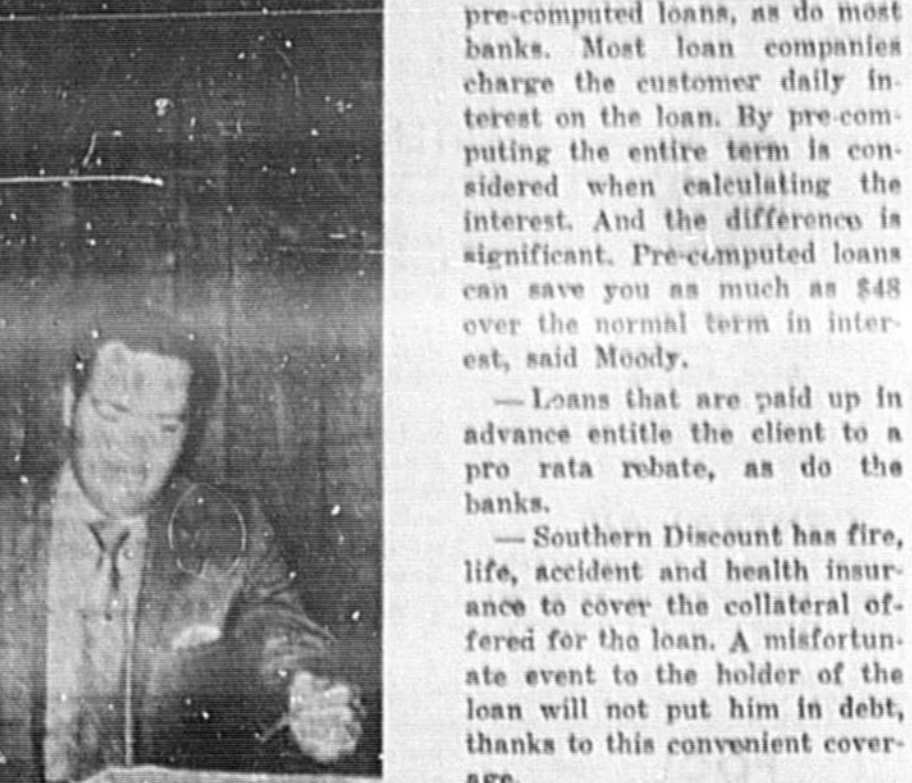

### Delayed Kiss Proves Smugglers' Boobytrap

CAIRO (UPI) — When the attractive blonde lingered a little longer than necessary over a welcome kiss in Cairo Airport's transit lounge, security police became suspicious.

Investigating, they found the woman and her male companion attempting to smuggle several large diamonds. Caught by transferring the stones from mouth to mouth during the embrace.

In the desert to the south, police stopped a camel train, slit open the animals' stomachs and discovered enough marijuana wrapped tightly in plastic bags to make the several smugglers rich for life.

In a variety of ways, thousands of people from all walks of life are trying to cash in on Egypt's vulnerable coastline and understaffed customs force by peddling drugs, narcotics, gold and jewelry.

One day recently airport security officers arrested a baker, butcher and hotelier for smuggling.

A businessman was grabbed when he attempted to toss a bundle to an accomplice standing on an overhead balcony. The bundle flew open and thousands of Egyptian pounds floated down onto the departing passengers.

The police are particularly concerned at an increasing number of diplomats trying to take advantage of their immunity from customs' search.

Though police are reluctant to estimate how many foreign officials may be involved, they have nabbed several in less than a month.

An African diplomat was detained when several bags of marijuana were found in his luggage. Police arrested an Asian woman for attempting to smuggle gold and then took into custody a second person from the same embassy for carrying currency illegally.

## Osteen Bridge Choice 'Up To Motoring Public'

A new Osteen Bridge can be constructed "right now" if the motoring public is agreeable to a toll span. This information was relayed to The Sanford Herald today by Rep. E. Pope Bassett from Edward Mueller, secretary of the State Department of Transportation. Bassett agreed "to explore" a suggestion by The Herald: That the question of a toll bridge be submitted in a straw vote to the residents of Seminole County in the September primaries or November general election.

Bassett explained that the bridge could be financed now with revenue bonds, to be paid off with tolls, whereas if a "free span" is erected from county, state and/or federal funds it may be a number of years before these moneys are available.

Mueller released the newest traffic count for the Osteen Bridge, conducted between May 25 and June 8. (The state road department always has maintained it will give consideration for highway changes only to those roads showing a daily traffic count average of 5,000 cars.)

Previous average count in earlier surveys was 1,200 cars daily crossing the span. A recent count, on April 25-26, numbered 3,200 cars on Saturday and 6,188 on Sunday.

Latest count, released by Mueller to Bassett, reads for the number of cars passing over the Osteen bridge daily:

May 28, 1239; May 29, 2332; May 30, 2335; May 31, 3109; June 1, 1344; June 2, 1706; June 3, 2096; June 4, 2023; June 5, 2239; June 6, 3239; June 7, 4790; and June 8 (a Monday), 944.

## Dissatisfied With School Transfers Parents To Present Protests

Tonight the Seminole County School Board will meet with parents, apparently dissident over the transfer of 1000 children from Goldsboro Elementary to Idylwild Elementary.

## Neophyte Receives 'Baptism Of Fire'

ALTA MONTE SPRINGS — Newly appointed City Councilman Dan Dorfman got his "baptism of fire" yesterday by entering the arena of the continuing controversy between City Council and the Seminole County Commission. The issue stemmed from the problem of residential drainage in the area, and in which border charges were buried last winter at a job meeting of the council and commission.

Mayor Lawrence Swofford stated that he was of the opinion that the city should adopt an ordinance establishing a special improvement district within the city limits in a watershed area. He continued that this would be subject to the county joining, since the district could not be undertaken unless the county participates.

Dorfman asked what the county had done so far to alleviate the problem, to which Swofford answered, "Talk . . . but they might talk more at election time."

The county must be involved in the issue since approximately half the area is within the county. Swofford felt that the county should assess individuals outside the city, if both contribute to the water in the lake, but that only one assessment would be made residents; either by the county or municipality. Swofford continued that "all rates in the county should be assessed."

Dorfman queried if the setting-up of the district would be the solution. If a lift station would control the water, and whether any geodetic survey had been made to ascertain the source of the water. Swofford said that there was no evidence that the waters were fed from an underground stream.

City Engineer William Palm said that there were two avenues of possible solution: one a pumping station from Lake Okechobee to Spring Lake and the other laying a gravity line at cross SR 436 to Lake Adelaide.

The entire city would not be assessed, Swofford stressed, on the property that contributes to the problem.

Council authorized Palm to prepare a cost estimate of the improvement district, and to ascertain the area which would be involved, with recommendations as to solving the problem.

Councilman Alex Sabre expressed that the city "was whistling in the dark . . . if the county does not participate we are wasting our money and Palm's time and efforts."

Dorfman, snick back, "Well, somebody has to take the initial step . . . this just might motivate the county to do something about the situation."

## County To Hire Planner
