Home Building Under FHA Help
Record Level

Applications in U.S. Top \$100,000,000 For Second Month

The 1949 program of home building, which in April saw the \$100,000,000 mark in applications for FHA assistance, continued without faltering in May when applications again topped the \$100,000,000 mark.

According to Stewart McDonald, FHA assistant secretary for home building, applications for new homes to be built under the program showed a gain of 10 percent in May over the month of April and about 50 percent in comparison with the same month of 1948.

A total of 28,000 mortgages amounting to \$100,000,000 were submitted for approval by the FHA in May, an increase of 10 percent over the month of April.

McDonald said this was the largest number of mortgages in number since the April figure of 25,000 mortgages in the month of April.

May was also the most active month ever recorded under the FHA program for home building under its inspection. He said that a weekly average of about 1,000 new mortgages were being started under the program in May compared with about 800 in April and about 600 in May 1948. In 1948 during the month the program was started amounted to 1,000, the first time in the FHA's existence compared with the year's weekly peak of 1,100, which does not include about 1,000 mortgages being financed under the program.

McDonald also stated that the program received 44,000 in the amount of \$100,000,000 compared with \$11,000,000 in April and \$11,000,000 in May 1948.



Lithuania Accepts Soviet Ultimatum For Troop Passage

The capture of Verdun and a breach in the Maginot Line were claimed by the Germans as high Allied councils apparently were shaping momentous decisions.

A breach in the Maginot Line was said to have been made on a "broad front" south of Saarbrücken.

For two days German artillery hour after hour had hurled shells into the steel and concrete of France's bastion on the Western Front and stukas had dived down to punish with bombs in the Saar region.

Both the town of Verdun and the famed fortress fell, the Germans asserted.

British reports of vital decisions indicated that the "next 24 hours" might prove to be the climax of the fight in France.

There was no jangling of steel impeded, but an authoritative, fast news consensus of a German capitulation, declared: "In view of the fact that victory is already within our closest reach, there is hardly any occasion on the German side to approach the question of French capitulation."

The talk and trouble of running a ball club are not all the manager's, nor is paying the players' salaries the big worry of the owner. These words, or something similar, are what Frank Lamson, secretary of the Seminoles' organization, had to say when we cornered him and asked for a little inside information on the expenses of the Sanford baseball team that we could pass on to the public.

Mr. Lamson kindly obliged and supplied us with more figures than you'll find in a show-up book. According to Lamson, it is the little matter of replacing under water. Number one home run in Spring training expenses. The Seminoles management must pay "through the nose" for player transportation to Sanford and for their room and board during three weeks to a month of training.

There is the cost of two sets of uniforms, one for at home and a road uniform, for at least 12 players. The electricity to light the park runs to \$25 a game for all home games. And there is the little matter of replacing broken or worn out lights at \$250 a pop. Fans will remember one game recently in which no fewer than ten lights popped, costing the management a cool \$2,500. That was an unusual night, but the cost of lights over a season's time will run from \$200 to \$500.

Let's not be discouraged, there's more yet. Baseball runs to \$10 a game. Everyday you see a ball player over the fence that isn't in the book. Most of the expenses, however, it is not in last night, but in balls that are broken or worn out or the cover is worn. Traveling expenses meant high. Gas and oil for the bus runs to \$100 a month. There is the cost of two meals for each ball player on all out of town games with the exception of Orlando and DeLand in which the players are allowed one meal.

And in case there are any people who think that last night's game was just a fluke, we'll just say in the ball game at \$10 to \$20 a week social security, paymaster, and league association. After looking over those fancy figures, we think we'll give up our ambition to own a baseball team.
