We thought he believed in leaving the protection of civil rights to the states, including Alabama and Mississippi. He voted in the Senate against the Civil Rights Law. In fact, a major strategy of his campaign is aimed at winning the votes of Southern segregationists such as Sen. Strom Thurmond and his fol-

We disagree with all this but at least we thought we understood Goldwater's position. But not any

The other day Goldwater talked about civil rights in Portland, Maine. He criticized the Civil Rights Law he

voted against, saying: "The law passed on civil rights will never correct the inequity in this country.

Then he said he hoped the law he voted against will help do the job. And then he said it won't unless it is enforced and criticized President Johnson for not supporting the law:

"The President shows no inclination toward supporting it." We are lost.
