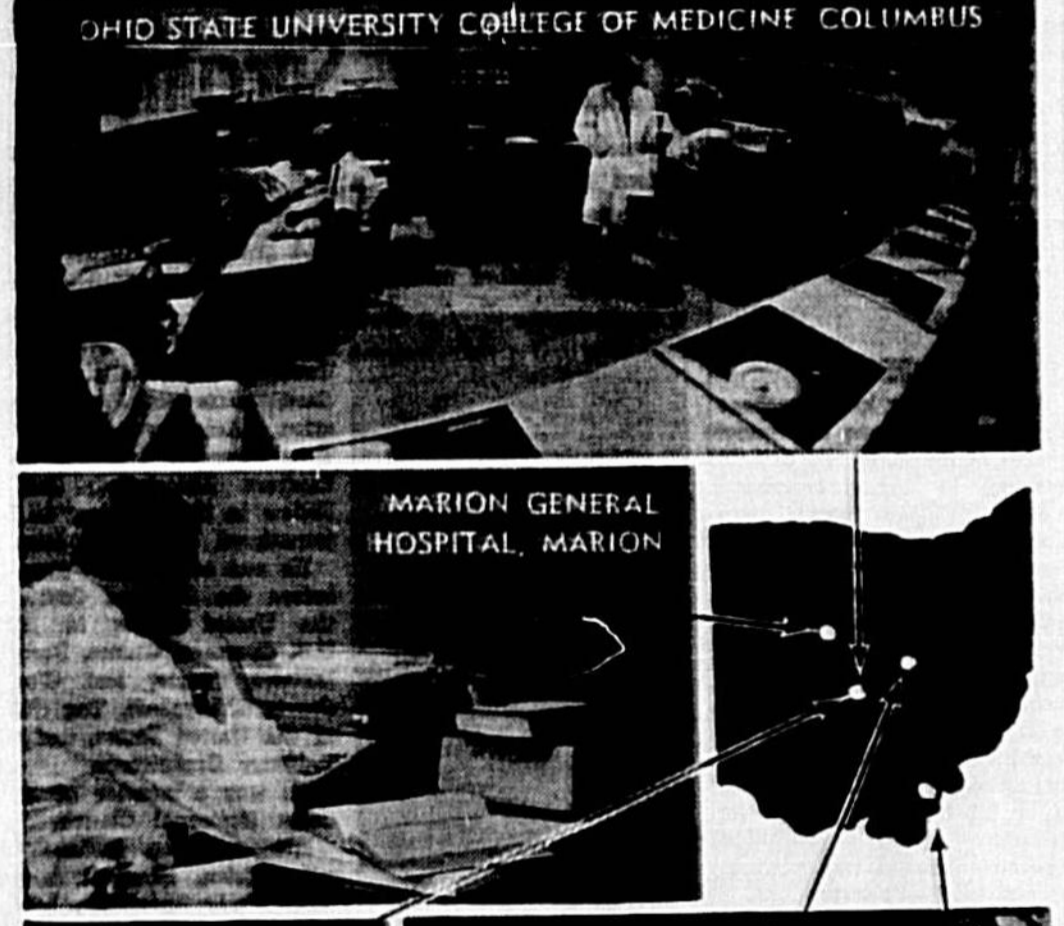

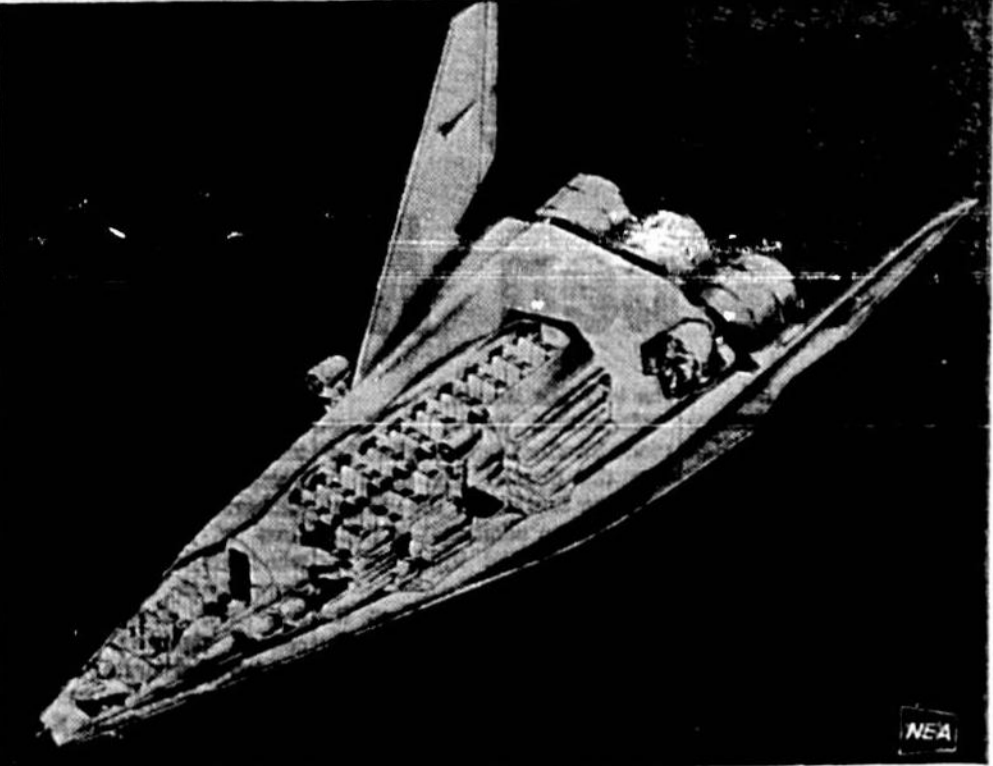

THAT FANTASTIC LIGHT, the laser beam, intrigues scientists as they devise special optical device to broaden its potential use. A researcher at PPG Industries' Harrogate, Pa., glass laboratory (below) measures optical characteristics of an experimental glass laser rod by mirror reflection of the laser beam. Object to focus laser light to produce high energy density, an IBM scientist switches a laser beam from one spot another in 25 millionths of a second through the shifting of glass prisms. The beam deflection operates at speeds required in future optical memories systems.

A Breakdown in Communications

VALLEJO, Calif. (AP) — A breakdown in communications between work crews filling and emptying water tanks on opposite ends of the ship, unaware of each other's work, caused the 850 million nuclear submarine's nuclear reactor to shut down May 18, 1968. The reactor, built by Westinghouse, had been in operation for 18 months. The breakdown occurred because the two crews were not communicating. One crew was filling the tanks while the other was emptying them. The result was a dangerous situation that could have led to a meltdown.

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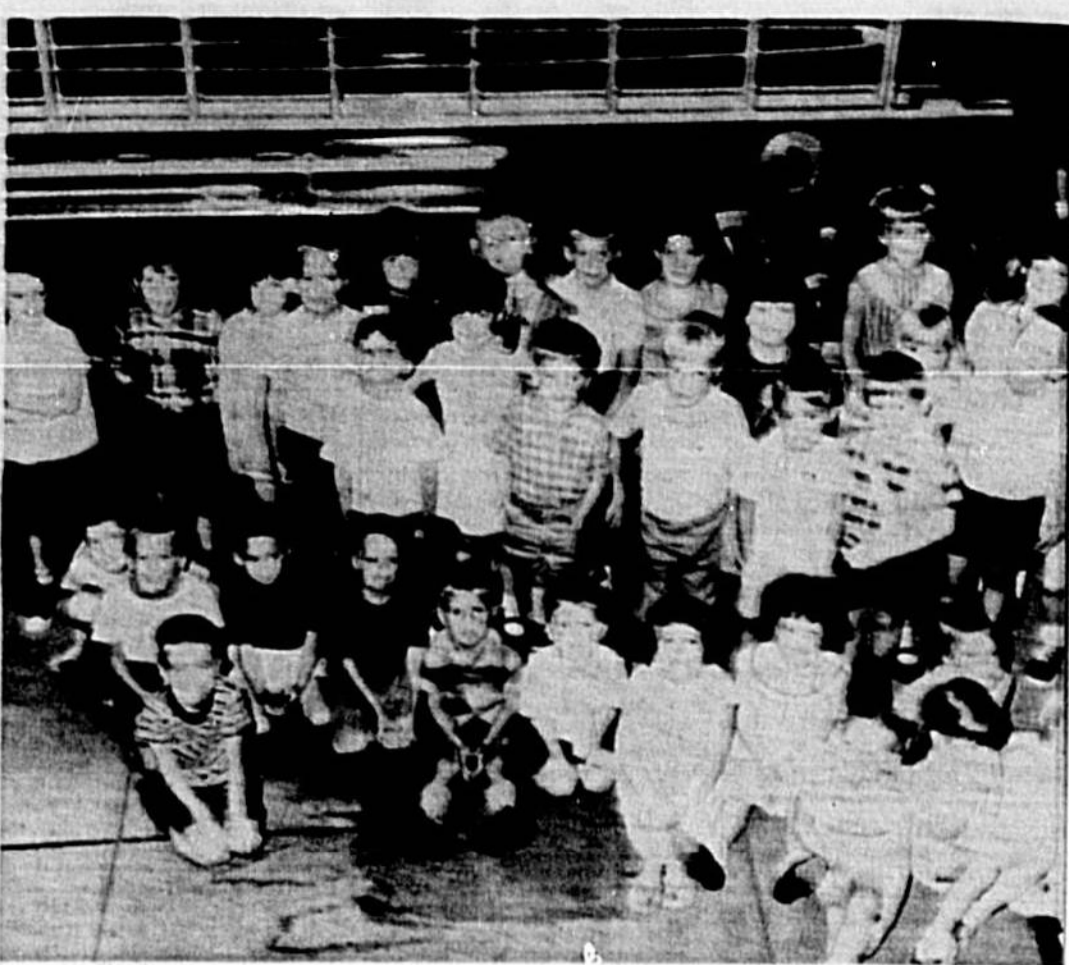
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Deltona Officers Elected

MIAMI (AP) — A mysterious figure known as Commandante Varela, reportedly leading guerrilla forces against Fidel Castro in eastern Cuba, has emerged as a hero — legendary or real — among exiles. Varela was reported killed in combat against Castro forces two weeks ago. But the Cuban Exile Representation (RECI), which says he's real and is its military commander inside Cuba, reports accord to the hills after the fight is continuing his war against anti-Castro groups produced a tape it said was smuggled into the United States after the battle. "I said he never did slide into me as long as I was a second baseman," Martin told newsman. "As a second baseman you expect to be taken out into the field. He used to run out of the baseline."

Williams, who has had his differences with sportswriters in the past, said he also thought the press was misinterpreting what he said about Martin. "His one ad, it takes him more than I did. He was a little player who really hit. But in order for him to play, he had to have four or five good hitters on his team." The controversy was started when Anna Gabriel, baseball writer for the St. Paul Dispatch, quoted Martin as saying Williams was one of the worst players he ever saw. "It was one of the worst things I ever said."
