



Woolen mills, in opening their next spring lines this week at a level 40 cents higher than a year ago, say that the price hike reflects two wage boosts the last year rather than the sharply fluctuating price of raw wool. The fiber hit a peak last winter, but meeting no American demand at that level, slumped back to pre-Korea prices this fall.

The clothing trade hasn't responded much to the mills' price







Crops Are Ruined On Over 14,000 Acres Of Farm And Grazing Land In Area

MIAMI, Oct. 2—(/P)—Violent downpours flooded much of the Lake Okeechobee area today as a tropical storm whipped across Florida from the Gulf of Mexico. Miami and the Florida Keys were raked by winds up to 60 miles an hour. Awnings were ripped, some window glass broken and about 20 small pleasure boats sunk in the Miami area. 
