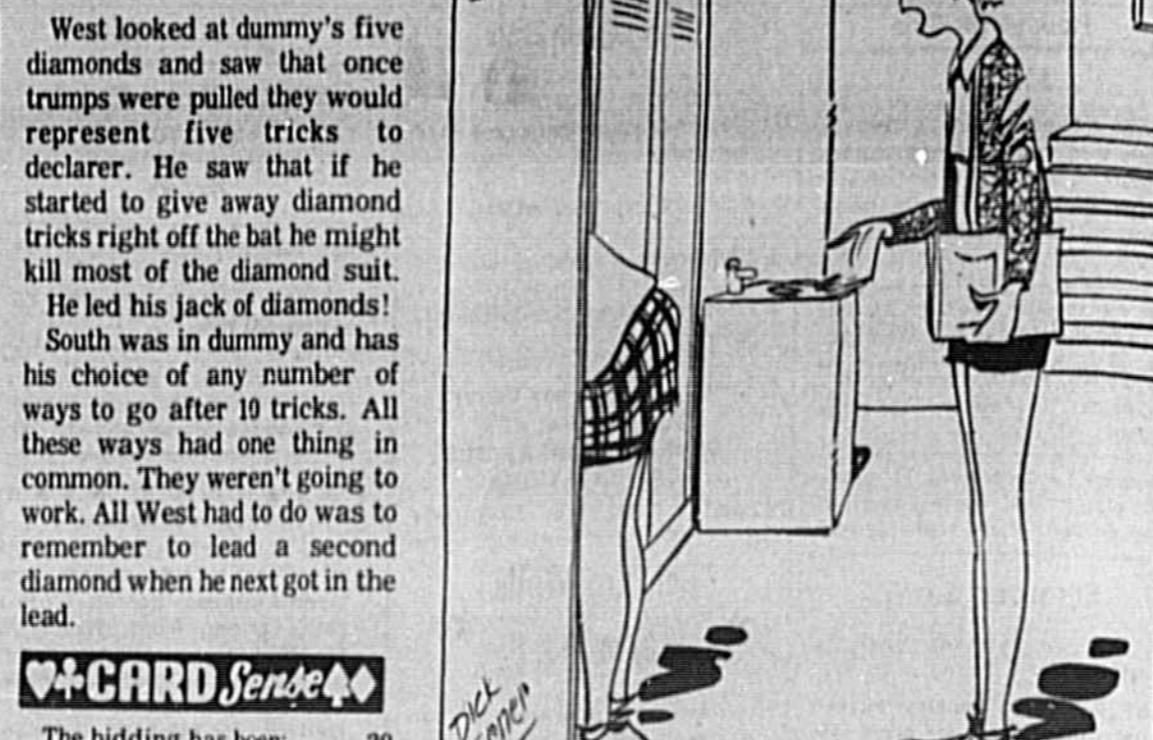

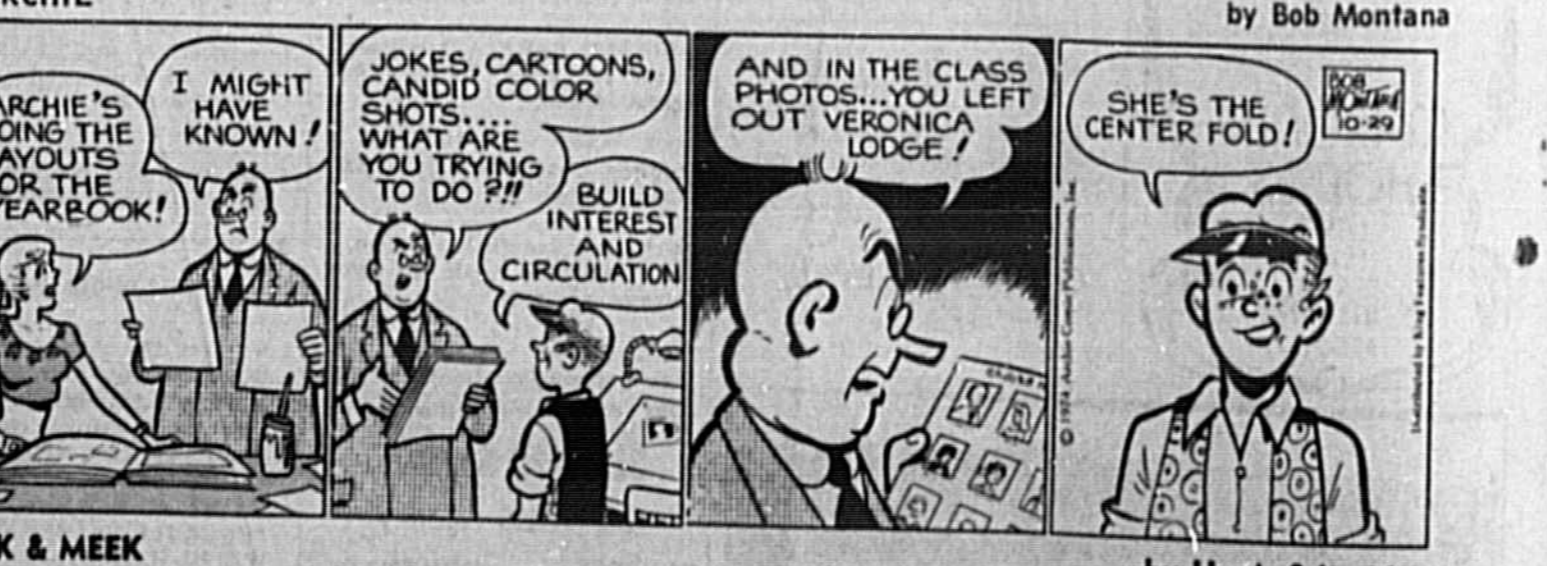
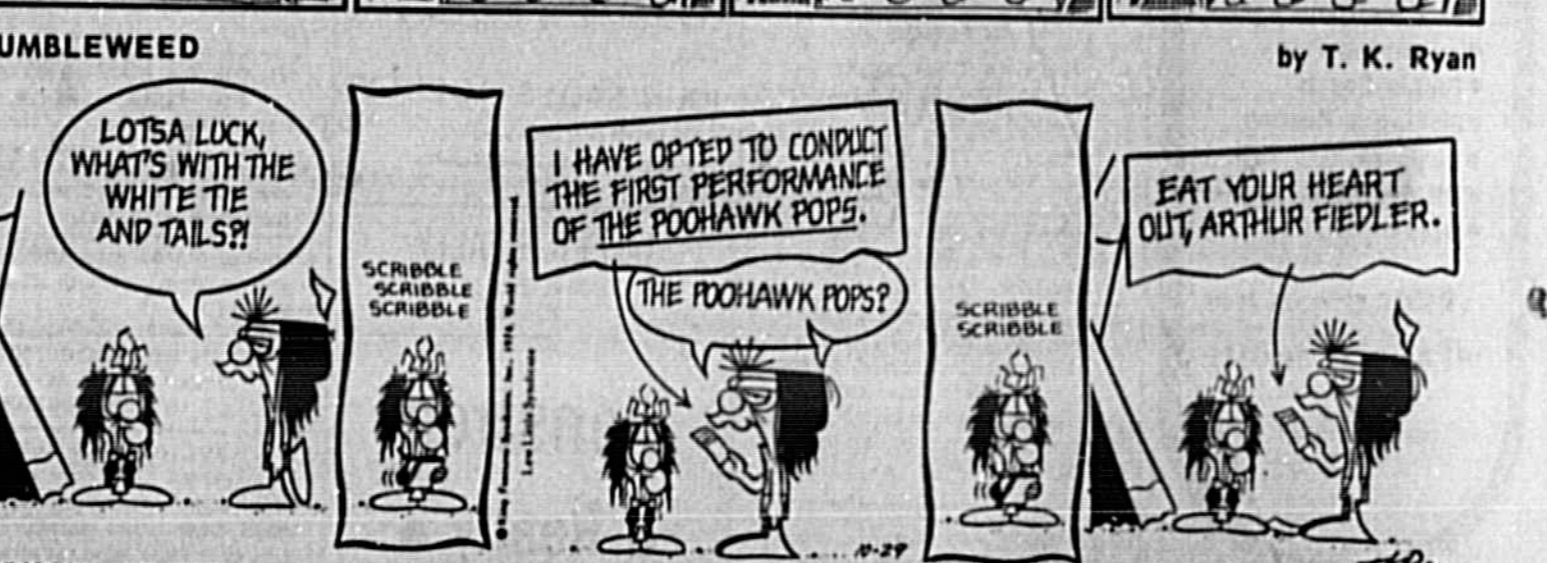

Political Flyer May Land Layer In Jail

A little yellow handout could land Seminole County's Superintendent of Schools, William Layer, in jail.

The paper, distributed by Layer at a weekend political rally, urges the voters to reject the November ballot issue requesting the school district appoint rather than elect future school superintendents.

The handout lacks the notation explaining who paid for its printing, which is required by Florida election law.

Layer has taken the "I'd rather fight than switch" attitude when asked if he would add the credit to the handout, thus complying with the election code.

"A court decision would have to be requested in order to rectify it," he said Tuesday when asked if he would bring the yellow flyer he distributed at

had been approached by Layer on Monday, and was shown the flyer. Beckwith, admitting to Layer he is neither an attorney nor judge, read the statute regarding election political advertisements, but gave no

opinion whether the absence of the credit, the name of the author, publisher and printer was legal.

However, Florida Secretary of State Dorothy Glisson, after hearing the handout's wording, replied the handout was a political advertisement, and therefore required a credit of the financier.

"All campaign literature shall be marked if it concerns an issue on the ballot," she explained. The penalty for failure to do so, upon conviction of a misdemeanor of the first degree, can be one year in the county jail, a \$1,000 fine, or both.

Informed of Mrs. Glisson's statement, Layer said, "that's just an interpretation of the law also."

He was expressed surprise at the objections to what he called "the most innocuous thing I've ever seen." But he refused to change the handout to comply with the law.

Nixon Fights For Life; Condition Is Critical

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) —

Former President Richard M. Nixon is in critical condition today after lapsing into shock for three hours and experiencing internal bleeding following surgery for pleuritis.

"The doctors are fighting for that man's life," hospital spokesman Norman Nager told newsmen Tuesday night. He said later he didn't mean the statement to carry the seriousness it denoted.

But a source close to the situation later confided, "I know the doctors are worried" about Nixon's chances of survival.

In a statement read by Nager, Dr. John C. Lungren said a team of physicians administered "countershock" measures for three hours until a stable vascular circulation condition was once again restored late Tuesday.

He added, "The patient is still from the pleuritis in his left leg. The jaw-like clip allows blood to flow, but impedes the movement of life-sustaining blood to the heart."

In Memphis, Tenn., Dr. Robert M. Miles, inventor of the surgical clip used in Nixon's operation, said that postoperative hemorrhage is infrequent and patient shock is rare in that type of surgery.

A five-man medical team participated in the hour-long operation which started at 5:30 a.m. Tuesday. After the operation — described as relatively simple — doctors told a news conference that the former chief executive was "doing well."

Hickman, an assistant professor of surgery at the UCLA School of Medicine, called the operation "uneventful" and said, "Mr. Nixon is doing well . . . recovering in the normal manner."

But just over six hours later, Nixon slipped into vascular shock which arrested the circulation of his blood for three hours before doctors and nurses were able to "stabilize" his condition.

Lungren said the complication was probably caused by "some retro-peritoneal bleeding secondary to anticoagulation therapy." Retro-peritoneal bleeding means bleeding behind the membrane that surrounds the abdomen.

Earlier, Lungren had said there was "some retro-peritoneal bleeding secondary to anticoagulation therapy were instituted."

The amount of blood transfused into Nixon was not disclosed, but doctors not connected with Nixon's case said that in situations such as his massive blood transfusions are normally required.

Seminole Teacher Group Sues Local School Board

A \$250,000 lawsuit was filed Tuesday afternoon by the Seminole Education Association (SEA) against the five members of the Seminole County School Board.

The board members, Davis Sims, Jean Bryant, Stuart Culpeper, R. G. Feather and Allan Keeth, are charged with "repeated refusing and continuing to refuse to engage in collective bargaining" with the teachers, a right granted all public employees in the revised state constitution in 1968.

Neither Board Chairman Sims, nor Keeth expressed surprise at the SEA action. Both said the suit seemed silly and unnecessary, because the negotiations must commence with the new year.

Mrs. Bryant reserved comment until she could consult the board's attorney Douglas Stenstrom. Neither Feather nor Culpeper could be contacted for comment.

The suit, requesting \$50,000 judgments against each of the five members, and the commencement of collective bargaining declares the refusal to negotiate is "the result of an evil and invidious plan and conspiracy to deprive the (SEA) and the persons it represents of their fundamental constitutional guarantee."

Asked about the \$50,000 damage request, Sims asked if "they want it in cash, check or BankAmericard."

The complaint further states the refusal to negotiate violated the oath of office each member took, and "was wholly motivated by joint and several determinations to deny fundamental rights to the instructional personnel." The result of this refusal to negotiate, the suit declared, is the possibility benefits will not accrue to the teachers for the present contract, causing a morale problem, and consequent ill effects on the quality of education.

The SEA was represented at the 4 p.m. proceeding by Stanley Marable and John Chamblee Jr. of the law office of Richard H. Frank of Tampa, the southeastern counsel of the National Education Association (NEA) of which the SEA is a recent affiliate.

Marable explained a precedent for seeking damages against the individuals of a public employer. The International Firefighters' brought suit against the city council of Homestead, a community near Miami, which had refused to collectively bargain. The court found one councilman "willfully denied the firemen their constitutional right. He was reprimanded and punitive damages were awarded," Marable said.

None of the school board members expressed any fear of the lawsuit, either personally or as members of the board for

themselves or the board as a whole.

Sims vowed to "fight fire with fire" and suggested the board hire the "toughest negotiator we can find."

He added the SEA's suit is a "smokescreen" in an attempt to increase the group's membership, which he said was seriously affected by the recent realignment with the NEA. He seriously doubted the size of SEA membership, and said he would ask for a detailed accounting of the total number of members.

Parker, a businessman, was systematically cheating on his income taxes. One day his conscience-stricken bookkeeper took several incriminating documents out of Parker's safe and handed them over to the Internal Revenue Service.

In short order, Parker was charged with income tax evasion. But in court he insisted that the evidence, having been taken illegally, could not be used against him.

"This clearly falls under the Fourth Amendment," he said, "which forbids unreasonable search and seizure."

However, the court held the evidence admissible and Parker guilty. The court said the constitutional ban applies only to search by government agents, not by private individuals.

Courts generally agree. They say the Fourth Amendment was designed to protect citizens from prying by the government, nothing more. Although the private searcher

may indeed be committing an offense, the evidence that he finds remains acceptable.

The same is true if the evidence is discovered purely by accident. In another case, a departing guest in a motel left a suitcase in his room.

The manager, peering into the suitcase, noticed some odd-looking checks. These he reported to the police.

Result: the guest was arrested for possessing forged checks. The judge said that even though the manager had no right to look into the suitcase, the evidence he found was nevertheless admissible in court.

But the rule changes when the search, although conducted by a private person, is done at police instigation. Another motel manager told a policeman that he suspected one of his guests of being a drug pusher. Instructed to search the man's room, he did so — and found heroin.

But this time, the evidence was rejected in court because of the police role in the search.

"The search was just as official," said the court, "as though the officer had acted in person."

Make Tea Sandwich For Party

The only time I ever encounter old-fashioned homemade tea sandwiches is when my next-door neighbor, who grew up in Kentucky, serves them at a party. Hers are miles ahead of the bought cocktail sandwiches, straight out of a freezer, that occasionally I meet up with at other parties. Homemade tea sandwiches were at the height of their popularity from the '20s through the '40s. They came in a variety of shapes: rounds, squares, triangles and ribbons with savory fillings stacked between two to four layers of bread. In their heyday they were served at teas, receptions and bridge or mah jong parties.

If you want to offer a delicious taste of nostalgia, they may appeal to you for party fare. To spare you, here is a tea-sandwich effort of my own — in ribbon shape. The fillings were inspired by my Kentucky neighbor's way of teaming cheddar cheese with green pepper and mayonnaise and my own penchant for mixing deviled ham with chili sauce.

A few rules. The bread must be extremely fresh and thinly sliced and the fillings compatible. The sandwiches must be covered with a tea towel (well wrung out of cold water) and then with wax paper, foil or plastic film. If they are made ahead and refrigerated, they must be left to stand at room temperature about an hour before their covering is removed and they are served.

RIBBON SANDWICHES
4½-ounce can deviled ham
2 tablespoons chili sauce
1 cup grated (medium-fine) mild cheddar cheese
2 tablespoons minced green pepper
Mayonnaise

15 thin slices bread
In a small bowl stir together the deviled ham and chili sauce. In another small bowl stir together the cheese, green pepper and just enough mayonnaise (start with 1 teaspoonful) to make the mixture of good spreading, but firm consistency. Spread the cheese mixture on 5 slices of the bread; cover and spread these with the deviled-ham mixture; top with remaining 5 slices of bread. Trim crusts from sandwiches; cut each into 3 ribbons. Makes 15.

In a 16-inch skillet cook the beef with the garlic, crumbling with a fork until it loses its red color; pour off any excess fat. Stir in the remaining ingredients except the squash and the sauce. Have zucchini lengthwise — do not pare; cover with boiling water and boil 10 minutes; drain; scoop out flesh leaving shells about 1/4-inch thick; chop flesh, stir into meat mixture and then pile into shells. Place in an oblong glass baking dish (11 1/2 by 7 1/2 by 1 1/2 inches) or similar utensil; pour sauce over. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until very hot — about 30 minutes. Makes 4 small servings.

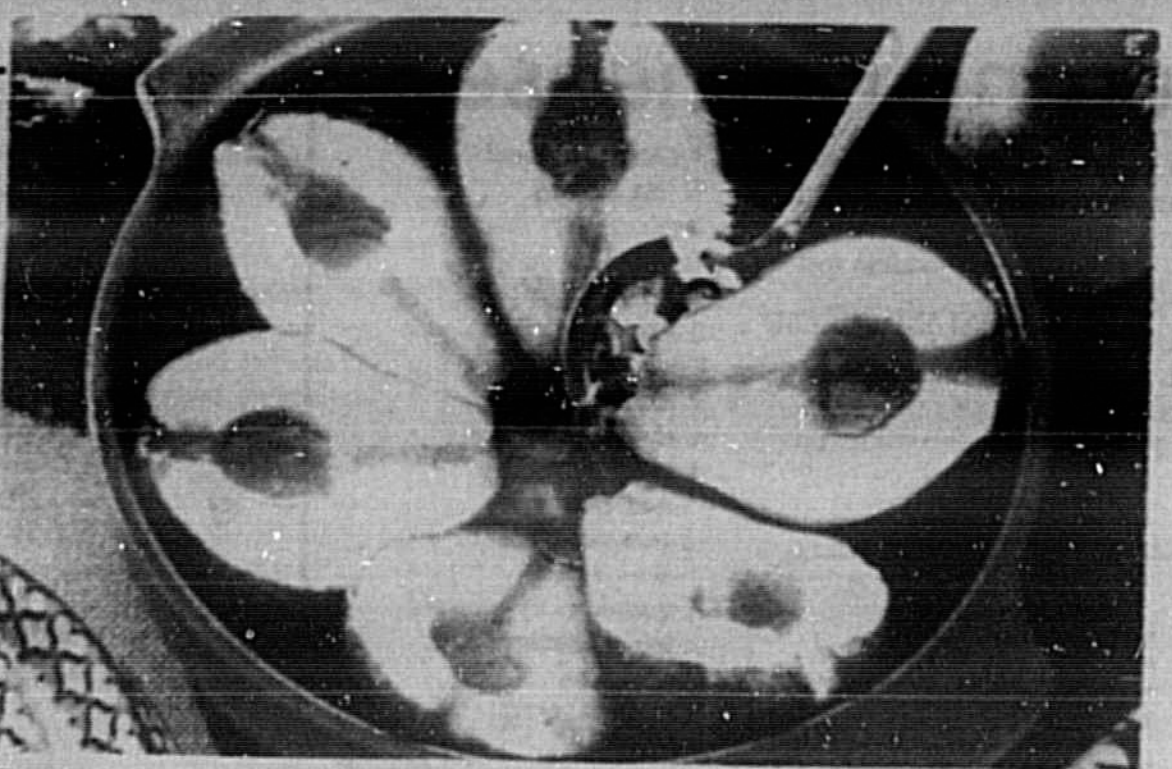

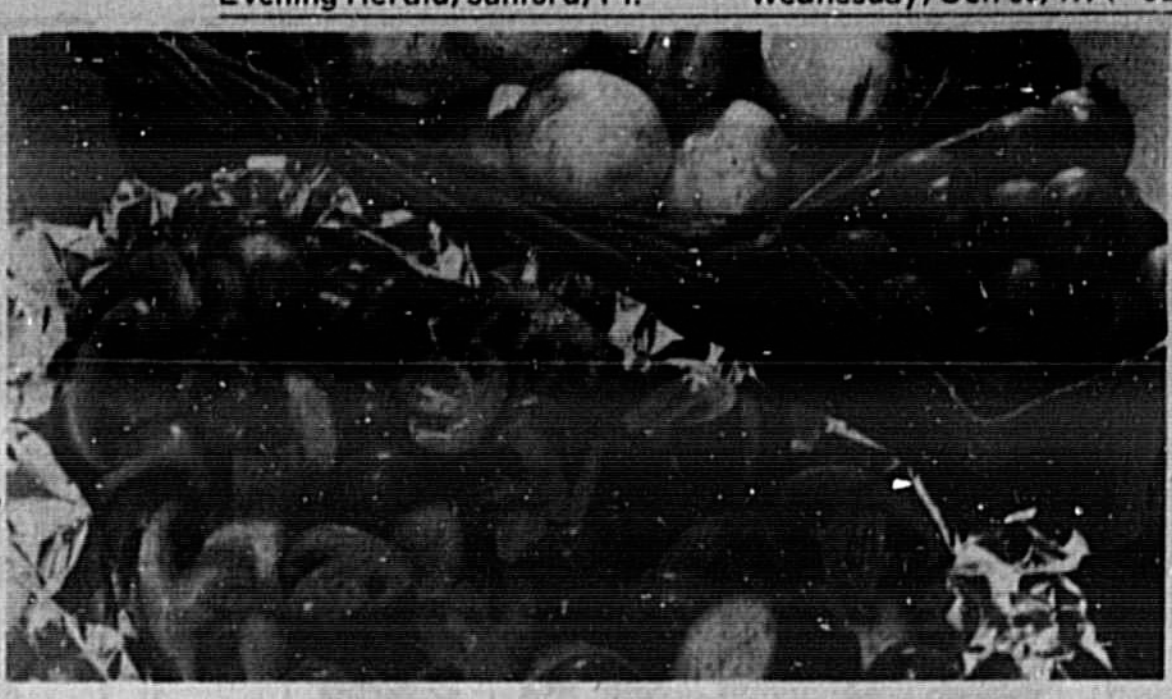

Hot Pot Is Not Fancy

DEAR CECILY: Our family is on a very tight budget, as are most of our friends. We are looking for some good, down-to-earth vegetable and meat combinations that an ordinary working man, who eats a cold lunch, would enjoy for a hearty evening meal. Most recipes we read are too fancy. — YOUNG HOUSEWIFE, P. S. I also have two small boys to fill up.
DEAR YOUNG HOUSEWIFE: To make a start on the sort of recipes you want, here's Lancashire Hot Pot. There's nothing fancy about it — just a delicious way of combining potatoes, onions and meat. It originated in the north of England where, according to a British food writer, "it was designed to fill the needs of a hard-working people who live with a bleak climate and less fertile land than people in other parts of England." I am enthusiastic about the dish because there's nothing to mask its good natural flavor and it has fine food value. It's sometimes forgotten that potatoes, in addition to their other nutrients, supply vitamin C. If you and your friends try Lancashire Hot Pot, I hope you approve it. — C. LANCASHIRE HOT POT
4 shoulder lamb chops, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pounds (1/4 to 1/2-inch thick)
Salt and pepper
3 medium onions, about 1/2 pound
4 medium potatoes, 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 pounds
1/2 cup condensed beef broth (bouillon), undiluted
1/2 cup (from a 10 1/2-ounce can) 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
Cut away fat from around chops; place chops in a 12-inch, proof 10-inch-square shallow baking dish or similar utensil. Sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper. Peel onions and pare potatoes; cut crosswise into 1/4- or 1/2-inch thick slices. Place half of onion over meat; place half of potato over onion; sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper. Add remaining onion. Arrange remaining potato slices in rows over onion. Pour beef broth over all. Cover tightly with foil if necessary and bake in a preheated 325-degree oven for 1 hour. Uncover; brush top with melted butter. Continue baking uncovered, at 325 degrees, until very little liquid is left — about 1/2 hour longer. Place under broiler, close to high heat, just long enough to lightly brown top. Makes 4 servings.
